

TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE HISTORICAL SUMMARY

The earliest Methodist activity within the bounds of present day Texas occurred in northeastern Texas in the settlements of immigrants along the Red and Sulphur Rivers and their tributaries. William Stevenson was the most prominent early preacher who was appointed to Hot Springs, Arkansas, and ministered to Methodists in northeastern Texas from that post. Appointments were made to Texas charges even before the organization of the Arkansas Annual Conference in 1836.

Although adherence to Roman Catholicism was a precondition of receiving a land grant in Mexican Texas, Mexican authorities tended to be tolerant of Protestant activity in eastern Texas. In the early 1830s two groups of Methodists were particularly active. One group was in extreme eastern Texas near Gaines' Crossing of the Sabine River. James Porter Stevenson, son of William Stevenson, organized a religious society at Samuel Doak McMahon's in 1833. In 1834 Henry Stephenson, a member of the Mississippi Conference, was instructed to travel in Texas. He preached in settlements near San Augustine and Nacogdoches and continued westward to settlements in Stephen F. Austin's Colony in present day Washington and Austin Counties. He found there a concentration of Methodists—local preachers, class leaders, and devout laity—who had organized for regular religious observances. Stephenson consulted with local preachers John Wesley Kenney, William Medford, and others in the area. As a result of the consultation, they held revivals in the fall of 1834 and 1835. The revival of 1835 resulted in an appeal for missionaries from the United States.

The call for missionaries arrived at the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church meeting in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1836. News of the Texian victory at San Jacinto also made its way to the General Conference. In 1837 a Texas mission was authorized, and four missionaries were sent to Texas. Martin Ruter, Littleton Fowler, Robert Alexander, and Lewellen Campbell began their work in Texas in 1837/1838. In May, 1838, the Texas Mission was attached to the Mississippi Annual Conference. Bishop Morris, who presided over the 1838 session of the Mississippi Annual Conference, was forced to assign Campbell to New Orleans instead of Texas. In consoling Fowler upon the loss of Campbell to the Mission, Morris wrote, "But be of good cheer. The day is not distant when Texas will be able to sustain itself as a Conference." (Morris to Fowler, June 11, 1839).

Bishop Morris was prophetic. On December 25, 1840, Bishop Beverly Waugh organized the Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Rutersville in Fayette County. Its boundaries consisted of all the charges in the Republic of Texas with the exception of those charges north of Cypress Bayou in northeastern Texas which were part of the Arkansas Annual Conference. Eighteen members of the newly formed Texas Annual Conference were appointed to charges in the San Augustine, Rutersville, and Galveston Districts.

Church growth in the new Texas Conference was so rapid that the General Conference of 1844 authorized the division into two new conferences. Accordingly, the Texas Conference was divided at the Trinity River, and Texas now had two new conferences, the Eastern Texas and Western Texas Conferences. The northeastern charges, formerly in the Arkansas Conference, became part of the Eastern Texas Conference. Neither name was used very long. The Western Texas Conference took back the name "Texas Conference," and the Eastern Texas Conference shortened its name to East Texas Conference. Those two conferences remained divided for the next fifty-eight years.

The territory of the Texas Conference was further decreased by the establishment of the Rio Grande Mission Conference in 1858. The Rio Grande Mission Conference eventually became the Southwest Texas Annual conference.

The Civil War and its aftermath initiated massive changes in the Texas Annual Conference and the East Texas Annual Conference. The division of both conferences was authorized at the 1866 General Conference. Such division was accomplished by creating new conferences from the northern portions of the Texas and East Texas Annual Conferences. The Trinity Conference, which later was renamed the North Texas Conference was created from the East Texas Conference and the Northwest Texas Conference, which later was divided into the Central Texas and Northwest Texas Conference was created from the Texas Conference.

Such divisions were not the only significant changes during the period. Before the Civil War the Texas and East Texas Conferences had significant percentages of enslaved African American members. After emancipation, thousands of African Americans chose to exercise their freedom by leaving the M.E.C.S. which had firmly defended slavery. Many became Baptists, but others preferred to remain Methodist, as African Methodist Episcopal, Colored

Methodist Episcopal, or Methodist Episcopal. The end of the Civil War meant that the Methodist Episcopal Church could freely operate in Texas again. In January 1867 Bishop Matthew Simpson organized the Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Trinity Church in Houston. Its charter members included sixty-seven African American preachers and three German immigrant preachers. This new Texas Conference of the M.E.C. included all of the state of Texas.

Racial and linguistic tensions resulted in the split of the Texas Conference of the M.E.C. after such splits were authorized in the General Conference of 1872. African American Texans continued in two conferences, the Texas and West Texas. German speakers were organized in the Southern German Conference, and English speaking European Americans were organized in the Austin (later Gulf Mission) Conference. In response to the formation of the Southern German Conference, the M.E.C.S. created the German Mission Conference with several charges including Bering Memorial and Ludtke Memorial in Houston.

Meanwhile the Methodist Protestant Church was also organizing churches in Texas. Through most of the latter part of the 19th century the Texas Conference of the M. P. Church consisted of charges east of the Trinity River. The territory between the Trinity and Brazos constituted another conference. Many M. P. churches were rural with part time pastors. Traveling long distances to meet in conferences strained the resources of the Methodist Protestant East Texas, and German Mission); four M.E.C (Texas, West Texas, Austin, and Gulf Mission). There was also at least one Evangelical Association (a predecessor of the E.U.B.) church within the boundaries.

As the 19th century had been a century of division, the 20th was one of reuniting. In 1902 the Texas and East Texas Conferences of the M.E.C.S. combined and retained the name "Texas Annual Conference." As part of the reorganization, the Texas Conference ceded the Austin Port Arthur, Addicks, Marshall, LaPorte, Pearland, and Texas City, came into the Texas Conference from the M.E.C. The unification was far from complete, however. Most M. E. C. members in Texas in 1939 were African American. Houston alone had thirteen M.E.C. churches ministering to African Americans including Trinity, Trinity East, Sloan, Boynton, and Ebenezer. Marshall, Beaumont, and Galveston also had more than one M.E.C. church. They, and the other African American conferences created by the M.E.C., continued in a racially defined Central Jurisdiction.

In 1968 the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church united to form the United Methodist Church. The Texas Annual Conference added churches in Houston and Lissie as a result of the unification. Pursuant to action of the 1968 General Conference the Central Jurisdiction was abolished. A service of uniting was held in Houston in May, 1970, in which African American and European American Methodists came together in one conference.

The Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist church thus celebrates a diverse heritage stemming from Methodist Episcopal, Methodist Episcopal South, Methodist Protestant, and Evangelical United Brethren, roots. Through its more than century and one-half it has provided ministries to farm communities, saw mill towns, port cities, oil boom towns, newcomers to the Sun Belt, suburbanites, retirement communities, inner city residents, and immigrant communities from all over the world. From its origins as a foreign mission to its present status as one of the leading conferences of the UMC, it has been marked by its boldness in seeking new opportunities for witness and service.

2022 SPECIAL SESSION OF THE TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

DECEMBER 3, 2022

Greeting and Call to Order

[Bishop Jones called the session to order at 9:07 a.m.]

Bishop Jones: Friends, I think we'll begin our session as people are relocating and a few more people are coming in. I have asked for some help in gathering this conference session into order. I want you to see five of my seven grandchildren. This is Emily Potts, Samuel Jameson Jones, Ella Reece Jones, Taylor Potts and she is holding Charles Scott Potts... Taylor Reece Potts, my apologies. Thank you, kids, for helping me start this important meeting. You're excused.

I do want to welcome you to this special called session of the Texas Annual Conference.

Mary Lou Reece: She wants to hold the hammer. Hit it.

Bishop Jones: I'd like to begin our conversation with prayer. I've asked Rev. Chappell Temple to offer an opening prayer. Microphone No. 1.

Rev. Chappell Temple: Let us pray: Oh Lord, we thank you as we come to this gathering today. We invoke your divine presence among us.

This is holy work we've come to do, but only you can make us holy. We've come to the end of a long process - for many, the beginning of a new one, and for those who remain and for those who feel called elsewhere. Help us to remember this day that the real task you've given us is not simply to govern your church -- and it is your church, Lord, not ours -- but the higher calling is to extend your kingdom on this earth, not your kingdom, it's not about us, but your kingdom, for you alone are sovereign of our lives. It is not merely to maintain an institution, but to keep alive a dream first nurtured in the hearts of John and Charles Wesley and then entrusted to the labors of Francis Asbury and Thomas Coke, manifested in a myriad of Methodist expressions fed by your flame.

And until that day when the distant triumphal trumpet sounds on our ears, and hearts are brave again and arms are strong, keep us from our own agendas so that we may focus on yours, not just for this conference, but for the world to which you have called us.

Help us in our discussions today to treat each other with kind hearts and true affection so as to short circuit at least some of the bitterness that has overflowed our world. Let us seek not to win, but to love, as we do good, and we do no harm.

And when this conference is over and we are apart, may we still be joined in heart and hope to meet again. For all this we pray to your eternal glory, Amen.

Bishop Jones: Friends, we are gathered in this holy conferencing session. I will remind you throughout the meeting there are no winners or losers here - we will not tolerate applause. But we are going to do the work that we have been called to do with the right kind of spirit of mutual respect, love, and a focus on what's best for God's church.

I do want to say a word of thanks when we begin. Holding a special session like this requires an incredible amount of hard work and preparation. I want to specifically name Colly Enochs, the assistant to the assistant of the Bishop, Robin Rodriguez, who is my administrative assistant, Shannon Martin, Troy Griffin, and our host team here at first United Methodist Church, led by Lance Richards, Amanda Davis, and Judy Saenz. But I also want to really lift up Kip Gilts, the assistant to the Bishop. Frankly, I get to preside over this and be out in front leading, but he's done all the hard work to coordinate all the various teams. Kip, you've done an amazing job to get us here today and I thank you for that.

Rev. Kip Gilts: I believe he said he will not tolerate applause. But thank you.

Roll Call and Setting the Bar of Conference

Bishop Jones: That was an exception. Trey Burns is the Secretary of our Annual Conference. He did a great job of being secretary for the session of the Jurisdictional Conference. I think he has some work to do to get ourselves organized today. Trey...

Rev. Trey Burns: Thank you very much, Bishop Jones, and good morning members of the Texas Annual Conference. We have just a little bit of organizing business to get to before you can get to your business this morning.

First is the matter of the roll of this special session. The roll of this session will be constituted of all the clergy members and duly elected lay members of this conference who have checked in at one of our check-in sessions at the narthex this morning. That is not an official motion, but if you hear that and receive it say Amen. Thank you very much.

And now to the bar of this special session. We heard a lot about in this morning, so hopefully this will go nice and smoothly. I move that the bar of this session be set as the first floor of the sanctuary situation with the exception of the last eight rows in the section by the piano... I'm seeing people say no over there.

Rev. Jordan Czichos: We moved the bar back a little.

Rev. Trey Burns: How far back?

Rev. Jordan Czichos: All the way.

Rev. Trey Burns: Are there any rows for visitors?

Rev. Jordan Czichos: There are six mows -- three.

Rev. Trey Burns: Three rows. Jordan, thank you very much for your help. Friends, if you would allow me to restart that motion. I move that the bar of this session be set as the first floor of the sanctuary space with the exception of the final three rows in the section by the piano on the west side of the first floor.

Bishop Jones: This motion comes from your Secretary. If you approve it, say yes. Any opposed, no. And it's done.

Rev. Trey Burns: Thank you very much.

Report From Preconference Meeting

Bishop Jones: Alright. Kip has facilitated our pre-conference meeting that was held by a virtual method eleven days ago. Kip, anything we need to know before we move forward on action items?

Rev. Kip Gilts: Thank you, Bishop, We did have just under 400 attend. We have a few more here today. We did have it just two days before Thanksgiving. We received three recommendations that are stated in the calls for this conference. They are going to be offered as motions this morning. We also had the opportunity to hear three presentations which do not require action, but they do relate directly to the last action item on our agenda. The questions were received through the Q&A function on the Zoom webinar. All questions and responses to those questions have been found on our special session web page accessible through our conference website that is currently also live streaming this event. The Q&A's are also uploaded on to your Guidebook app.

I hope all of you have those because that's where your Pre-Conference Journal can be found and other information as well as the questions and answers. It's under special session, December or dDec3. The Guidebook guide that can be found on that app. It will be handy reference for today. Bishop open, you'll be glad to know that no electronic voting occurred during the course of that meeting or during the course of this meeting. But speaking of electronic voting, people have asked me and I'm sure you how they're going to vote on matters today.

I understand our practice as a conference is to receive votes by show of hands. I believe it is still the plan. If it's too close to call, you'll ask for a standing count, and we'll proceed in that direction. We do have tellers ready should that need arise, but we anticipate following our standard practice here. So that's all I have, Bishop.

Bishop Jones: Thank you, Kip, for all the hard work to get us to this place and we hope the voting members of the Annual Conference are clear about our procedures and how we will be conducting our business today.

Election of Interim Treasurer

Bishop Jones: Our first action item is -- that was part of the call is a motion from the Council on Finance & Administration regarding the election of an interim conference treasurer. Don Morriss is with us. He chairs that Council on Finance & Administration. There is a recommendation that you can find on Page 5 of our Pre-Conference Journal. Don, we're grateful for your service as chair. Please introduce yourself to the conference if there is anything else you want to say and then begin with the action item.

Don Morriss: Thank you, Bishop. Good morning, everyone. I'm privileged to be here. I'm a lay delegate from Texarkana. Pleased to be here to first of all recognize and thank my recently new best friend, Carol Bruse, who has walked me through as the chief staff person and treasurer for my position as chairman of the Council on Finance & Administration. Carol, thank you for your assistance, your help with the committee. I know you look forward to retirement, and we appreciate the opportunity to work with you. Thank you.

Reverend Bruse currently serves as the Texas Annual Conference Center for Connectional Resources benefits officer and treasurer and is retiring December 31.

Reverend Robert Besser, who currently serves as associate director of church leadership with the TAC Center for Leadership Formation has been appointed by the cabinet, has been interviewed, approved and recommended to you by the Council on Finance & Administration.

The discipline requires a new treasurer to be elected by the Annual Conference. The Council on Finance & Administration recommends Reverend Besser effective January 1, 2023. Bishop, that's our motion.

Bishop Jones: This motion is appropriately before you from the Council on Finance & Administration. Is there any discussion? Friends, if you've not been to an Annual Conference session before, if you are seeking to speak or make a motion, the right way to do that is move to a microphone where I'll recognize you.

I see nobody wishing to speak and therefore I'll put the question to you. If you'll approve Robert Besser as the interim treasurer effective January 1st, 2023, would you say yes. Any opposed, no. And it's done. Robert, welcome to the office.

Rev. Robert Besser: Thank you, friends and colleagues. As we begin a new era in the Texas Annual Conference, I look forward to doing what I have done these last 32 years as a pastor in our conference, and that is to support the congregations, the laity, and the clergy of the Texas Annual Conference. And I look forward to doing that as we continue and move forward. My Email, my phone number, office number, my mobile number, all are on the conference website. So, if you need to get a hold of me, please text me, call me, my cell phone number is on the website. God bless each of you in the Texas Annual Conference. God bless. Thanks.

Bishop Jones: Thank you, Robert. We're grateful for your willingness to serve in this interim way. What we have done with a number of appointments in this conference applies to a principle that I have given to the cabinet -- stability and flexibility. We understand there are changes

coming to the life of our conference, including a new Bishop. There needs to be a well-functioning Annual Conference organization. That's the stability part. And yet we're not making promises that will bind Bishop Harvey and the future, and that is the flexibility part. I've told Robert if this election goes through, he's got the job for six months. And then we'll see what you all decide next May when the regular session of Annual Conference continues at that point.

Amendment of Houston Methodist Hospital Bylaws

Bishop Jones: Friends, in the call for this session of Annual Conference, there were three action items. That was the first. Our second action item is a recommendation from the Houston Methodist Hospital Board of Directors.

Without objection, I want to give privilege to the floor to Dr. Marc Boom, the President and CEO of Houston Methodist. Very familiar to many of us as the guru and guide for so many people during the pandemic. And also, to Greg Nelson, chairperson of the Houston Methodist hospital Board of Directors. And then Tom Pace, a member of that board and Senior Pastor of St. Luke's United Methodist Church will be offering a motion that comes to us from that Houston Methodist board. So, if the three of you, Marc, Greg and Tom would come forward, we'll be glad to hear from you at this time. The report is on Pages 6 to 43. of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Dr. Marc Boom: Thank you, Bishop. Thank you for the invitation to speak at this important meeting. You know, I have a very detailed description of what you're recommending here and requesting. I want to give you a short version first.

This is critically important to Houston Methodist. I've been at Houston Methodist 25 years, actually the last 11 of them as CEO. I frankly kind of eat, breathe, sleep Houston Methodist according to my wife. We had a long-term stable Board of Directors, and we are all in 100% agreement this is critical for the stability of Houston Methodist going forward.

So now let me give you the more detailed version. The Methodist Hospital now called Houston Methodist was founded in 1919 as a ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church. We've had a vibrant 103-year history now and we've grown to where we are privileged to serve about 2 million people a year. We employ 30,000 individuals and an additional 4,000 affiliated physicians. We consider every one of those individuals a person of sacred worth and value and we care for and employ individuals who meet literally every definition of diversity.

This is a fundamental part of our culture, and it will never change. The relationship of Houston Methodist with the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church as well as with the individual churches that are members of the United Methodist Church or members of the Texas Annual Conference at the present time is critically important to the success of our institution and in carrying out our mission and I'm going to read that to you:

It's to provide high-quality, cost-effective health care that delivers the best value to the patients we serve in a spiritual environment of caring, in association with internationally recognized teaching and research.

I can't ever emphasize how important that spiritual environment is to the patients and to the communities we serve and to the people who work at Houston Methodist. And a close and stable relationship with the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church as well as with all of the individual churches represented here today is of utmost importance. In fact, when people ask me why is it that over 103 years Houston Methodist has been so successful, I tell them two things: First, I repeat three times it's so important -- culture, culture, culture. The culture begins with faith, and it begins with our foundation in spiritual care. Of the top 20 hospitals on the U.S. News & World Report honor role, of which we are one, we have by far the strongest connection to our church. This is manifested in our I-CARE values -- integrity, compassion, accountability, respect and excellence.

And the second key success factor is a relentlessly consistent and sustained focus. Part of that consistency that we treasure is stability that we just heard about. We have employees with tenure as long as 55 plus years. Most physicians who work with us come to us and they spend their careers with us. Our board and our leadership team - critically importantly - have a very long tenure and a great deal of stability.

Unfortunately, the issues within the church threaten that stability of governance. The issues have created a need for our Board of Directors to act now to ensure predictability and stability for the future of Houston Methodist.

It's very important to notice the issues you're discussing today that led to today are not Houston Methodist issues, they are church issues. We do not perform marriage. We do not ordain ministers. We provide health care, and we have the sacred obligation to care for all human beings. Nonetheless, the changes in the church have potential significant disruptive impact on our institution. Therefore, our Board of Directors has unanimously approved a set of changes to our bylaws and Articles of Incorporation.

The goals of those changes are threefold:

Number one, to perpetuate Houston Methodist's role of leading medicine.

Number two, to perpetuate our long tradition of faith-based physical and spiritual healing for all of our patients, respecting all of them, as well as all of our physicians and employees as unique children of God.

And number three, to perpetuate a broad Methodist-based governing body for our faith based Methodist-rooted system.

Therefore, in order to accomplish this, we would like to make two changes to our bylaws. First, currently 60% of our board members are required to be ministers or laypersons of United Methodist Churches in the Texas Annual Conference. Going forward, the definition would be broadened to require that still 60% of our board members must be ministers or laypersons of any Methodist churches that are descending from the 18th century Methodist revival. This would include churches that are disaffiliating today, plus it would include churches that are part of the AME, AME Zion, and CME.

Second, acknowledging that going forward there may be more than one conference of Methodist Churches and that further change is unpredictable, the Board of Directors of Houston Methodist

should be given the final authority to elect its board members consistent with the 60% requirement.

Our board has worked very hard to make the minimum number of changes to the bylaws necessary to fully respond to changes in the Texas Annual Conference occurring this year as well as to provide stability in the future in the case of additional changes. As such, the vast majority of the bylaws do not change. Flip through it and there's only a couple of pages with red lines.

Specifically, the vast majority of church-related elements do not change:

- Number one, what does not change -- the resident Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church will continue to serve as a voting director.
- Number two does not change. The resident Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church will continue to work with the governance committee of our board to identify other potential Methodists to serve on the board.
- Number three, our spiritual care committee of the board, standing committee of our board, will continue completely unchanged.
- Number four, the assistant to the Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church will continue to serve as an ex-officio advisory director on our board, an advisory director without voting rights. Completely unchanged.
- Number five, the Chief Executive Officer, after consultation with the Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, will recommend for approval of the board the appointment of a vice-president of spiritual care.
- And finally, the following reserve powers of the Texas Annual Conference do not change: Changes to the size of the board, changes to the purpose clauses of the Articles of Incorporation, and changes to the dissolution clause of the Articles of Incorporation.

I'd like to make a moment to clarify a couple of questions that have come up and a couple of misconceptions I hear a number of times as I answer a lot of questions.

First, I'm often asked why now? And the straightforward, simple answer is that the changes within the Texas Annual Conference necessitate immediate action in order to preserve the stability and success of Houston Methodist.

Secondly, a number of people who I think have misunderstood the proposal have asked me, "Why is Houston Methodist asking to disaffiliate?" Let me be crystal clear, these bylaws and changes do not in any way disaffiliate Houston Methodist from the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. They maintain critically important connections with The United Methodist Church while enabling connections with all of the churches represented here today. They insulate Houston Methodist from any further instability and enable us to keep our relentless focus on providing care for all God's children.

Third, we will continue to proudly display the cross and flame on all of our major buildings. In fact, we just put one up about a month ago that has it. We also have a beautiful statue of Jesus

the Great Physician as well as the outstanding arms of Christ mosaic at every one of our hospitals.

Fourth, many of the clergy have asked me if Houston Methodist will continue to provide the same health plan benefits that we have. The short answer is yes. For those with The United Methodist Church, nothing changes. For those who will become Global Methodist, we've reached out, we've already been working with the Global Methodist Church to create that same structure.

And last, when people ask me what happens if these bylaws do not get approved, I tell them honestly that I can't even fathom that happening because this is so critically important to maintaining our stability and success.

So, in conclusion, as I stated before, the relationships of Houston Methodist with The United Methodist Church, the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, and with all of the individual churches here that represent -- that are represented today are critically important. Our Board of Directors unanimously recommends the approval of these bylaws changes so those relationships will remain strong into the future so that our institution, our physicians, our nurses, and our employees can continue to provide superb medical care in a faith based environment for all of God's children. Thank you very much.

Greg Nelson: I'm Greg Nelson, Chairman of the Board of Directors of Houston Methodist. I think Marc has laid the case out for approval of our bylaw's amendments very well. I would just like to emphasize one point.

And that is - and this actually came up yesterday as I was interviewing a candidate for one of our subsidiary boards - And that is when the governance committee looks for someone to be - to take one of the positions on our 25 member Board of Directors or a member of a Board of Directors of one of our subsidiaries, one, they ask two questions: The governance committee asks two questions: First and foremost, does the candidate have the deep personal faith basis necessary to carry forward the Houston Methodist faith-based mission of providing high quality care -- high quality health care in a spiritual environment of caring?

And the candidate – we believe the candidate's faith is very important to Houston Methodist to carry that culture forward. We also believe that culture begins at the board level.

And then second, and only if the first requirement is satisfied, we then look, does the candidate have the interests, skills, the energy to give oversight to Houston Methodist, to give strategic recommendations to our very large Houston Methodist health care system, to help drive our leading medicine mission forward?

So, it's the intersection of those two requirements that really are the basis for these bylaws amendment changes. And it gives us the largest possible talent pool so that we can continue to satisfy those two board member requirements and drive our leading medicine mission forward. So, thank you for your consideration. I'm now going to bring my friend and Houston Methodist colleague, Tom Pace, to the podium.

Rev. Tom Pace: Thank you. It's my honor, Bishop, to move acceptance of the amendments to the bylaws and Articles of Incorporation for Houston Methodist Hospital and if possible, I'd like to speak to that.

Bishop Jones: Do I have a second. It's seconded, you may speak to it, Tom.

Rev. Tom Pace: You know as we have faced this list of disaffiliations, one of the things over the last months that has been on my heart has been the impact it would have on our institutions. Whether those be schools like Lydia Patterson Institute, whether that would be something like UMCOR, whether it be our traditionally black colleges and universities, whether it be any of our institutions, and Houston Methodist is no different. Each of our institutions needs the broadest support to accomplish their missions. Whether it's for fundraising, as in some of these, or whether it's in building influence in the community, we can't afford to narrow that scope of their impact, of their connection.

And that's why this is so vitally important for us as the Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church to invest in this.

At the risk of repeating what Dr. Boom has said so well, I think it's important and necessary for a number of reasons. It ensures the ability to maintain a stable and supportive board in volatile times. It maintains the essential accountability and unique relationship with the Annual Conference without interfering with governance. And it is the leadership of this board that will -- of Houston Methodist -- that will report to this Annual Conference every year because Houston Methodist is part of this Annual Conference.

Our Bishop will continue to be on the board. All of the bylaws that are a part of the reserve powers will remain in force. And this isn't a separation, a weakening of that relationship. In fact, the change is so important because it strengthens that relationship. I'll go on. It retains that special relationship with the Bishop, encourages a more diverse board by including AME, AME Zion, and CME. It allows the hospital to move forward with its inclusive ministry without being drawn into our theological differences.

And, you know, just as an aside, I'll have to say that as a pastor of a church, what I longed for during this struggle was to not have to say I want to take a side. To be able to say, hey, we're all in this together. And that's what Houston Methodist is wanting to do, is to say, you know what, we want to be here for everybody, and to build that big tent.

And, most importantly, our affirmative vote sends a message, the vote of confidence and support in the incredible leadership of our hospital. And so, we entrust to our directors and our trustees the important decisions with all of our institutions and that's what we're trying to do today. I suspect that most of you, if not all of you, would applaud the decisions that the leadership of Houston Methodist Hospital has made for the last few years, if not for the last 100 years. And we just want to keep sending a message of support and trust and encouragement and strengthen that relationship by expressing our support to Houston Methodist Hospital. Thank you.

Bishop Jones: I'm going to ask the presenters to remain on the podium in case they have a role in the conversation. This matter is now appropriately before you. Does anybody wish to speak to it? Microphone No. 1, tell us who you are and your status, please.

Bill Koerner: Good morning, Bishop, my name is Bill Koerner, I'm from the Central North District, a lay delegate. I would move to amend the resolution to strike the changes to the section entitled "the conference elects..." and related changes to that.

I believe it's important that a body of faith continue to ratify the board members of the Methodist Hospital system. While this is often a formality and it has been because of the excellent alignment that we've had in recent years, there is no guarantee of that over time and I would hate to see this important link to a body of faith severed in this difficult time for the Methodist Church. Thank you.

Bishop Jones: You've both made a motion and spoken for it. So, is there a second? It's seconded. Does anybody else wish to speak to the amendment in favor or opposed? I see people standing at the microphones. No. 3, do you wish to speak to the amendment?

Rev. Trey Comstock: Yes, to speak in favor of the amendment. Trey Comstock, clergy, Servants of Christ United Methodist parish. Trust is great, but rules exist for when we do not trust each other. I have no qualms with there being much a broader Methodist representation on the board of Methodist Hospitals.

In these divisive times it is important to have a unified board. I have no issue with the first aspect of this resolution, but what the amendment that my friend has proposed gets to my actual issue with this thing that is before us. And that is it lowers our ability to hold Methodist Hospital accountable.

Now this does not mean I wish there to be accountability of anything that's happening right now. It's clearly a wonderful board and a wonderful CEO and wonderful hospital, but as we have seen time and time again, in the life of our denomination, in the life of our nation, rules exist for the times when we do not trust each other, and to lower our ability to hold the Methodist Hospital system accountable for the values that we founded for, to me, is a step away from what we should be doing rather than a step towards what we should be doing. A diverse board, yes, absolutely. A less accountable board, no, I cannot be in favor of that and so I am in favor of this amendment.

Bishop Jones: That's the second speech in favor of the amendment. Does anybody wish to speak against it? I will call on that in a minute. All right, Dr. Boom, you wish to respond to this?

Dr. Marc Boom: I'll make a couple of comments. We are looking for predictability and stability. As we've talked about, we run a very complex, sophisticated organization that cares for 2 million people, employs 30,000 people. What we faced this entire year is issues completely outside of our institution, completely outside of our board room, threatening the stability of the governance, the leadership, decision-making, and the care of those individuals. As we look to a future where there will continue to be instability, I predict, as issues are debated, we are looking for that ability

and that stability. As was commented on, those appointments have been kind of ratified, you know, every time; but we cannot have a situation where we get into disputes around that and have that come into our board.

The other piece on a practical nature, Bishop, I will state is that in order to amend the bylaws, actually, the Board of Directors would need to amend them and bring back bylaws to this body.

Bishop Jones: That is my understanding also, Dr. Boom, that if this conference chose to try to amend the bylaws, it would require ratification for the same amendment from the Houston Methodist Board of Directors.

Does anybody else wish to speak for this amendment? All right, I'm going to put it to you for a vote. The amendment is to change part of the articles of incorporation so that the election or ratification of the board is a vote by the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. I'm going ask for a show of hands. If you'll approve this amendment, would you raise the hand. Down. If you're opposed to the amendment, raise the hand. The amendment does not carry. Microphone No. 1.

Rev. Stephen Rhoads: Yes, Stephen Rhoads, Bay Harbour, clergy. I want to commend the board on inclusion – I think with more expressions of Methodism that is a noble -- a good, something that should be done and long overdue. My concern, however, is timing. The Methodist Hospital board bylaws state that an amendment -- there is 30 days' notice that should be given to your members and employees impacted by that. 15 days ago, we received an E-mail with a link to this proposal. Included in that were hundreds of disaffiliation resolutions. Ten and a half days ago we met and had a pre-conference meeting to receive a brief description of this proposal. Many folks here received information about that this very week.

My concern is that in this current state where to use our own Bishop's words, we are heartbroken, we are emotionally elevated, not only leading our churches through discernment; but grieving and saying goodbye to long time colleagues, and there are a lot of questions and proper due diligence cannot be done in that amount of time.

There are questions -- I want to hear from the board as to how you define churches descending from the 18th century Methodist revival. We're talking about those here which we agree with, but what about the Nazarenes, the Pentecostals, the Assemblies of God, the Salvation Army? I want to know from our Chancellors and trustees what the implications are if we vote for or against and what unintended consequences that hopefully we can alleviate to try to figure out the best decision. I'd like to know from conference nominations what they think about handing over their calling to pray over and vet a panel that they can offer to you for your board. I'd also like to know how this impacts health and benefits. I want to know also from the leaders in the Global Methodist Church what they think about this proposal?

Not simply the inclusion, I can assume that all of us want to be included, but that little bit of accountability that occurs through the nomination process. In this day and age, I think organizations need more accountability, not less. And so, therefore, I want to move to table this proposal, send it to committee until the next session. Thank you.

Bishop Jones: I'm sorry, the motion to table is not in order because you made a speech against the proposal before your motion. The proper way is to make your motion and then to move forward. So that's not going to be a motion in order at this time. Thank you very much. Microphone No. 3.

Betty Owens Geary: Thank you. Is it on? Betty Owens Geary, I'm a lay delegate from St. Luke's United Methodist in Houston, and I have a question. As I read the proposed amended bylaws, 60% of the board will be comprised of members from the Methodist tradition as you've defined it.

The way I understand that the only requirement for a United Methodist member of the board is the Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference; theoretically, the remaining 59%, or whatever the math is, could be from some other denomination in the tradition. And there is no guarantee that that won't happen. I wonder whether any thought was given to, say, 40% United Methodist, 20% other Wesleyan traditions. Because as it's written, the way I read it is theoretically, we could end up with only one United Methodist member on the board.

Bishop Jones: That's a question. Dr. Boom, would you respond, please?

Dr. Marc Boom: That's a very valid question, one we debated actively as a board from the start. We considered different structures: one could look at a structure as you suggested where perhaps there are percentages coming from different bodies. We wanted to look at a lower threshold, perhaps, et cetera.

The challenge really comes down to that stability, that predictability, and that unity in the board room. The last thing we should ever have in a board room is a type of representational governance where issues from outside of the fiduciary responsibilities for Houston Methodist creep into that. And as we would tackle that, we would sit there and say we don't really understand which churches are going where, which are staying, how many are going, how many are not going. You know, which conference may be here in the future.

We were working hard to create a flexible structure going forward. I have the utmost of confidence that with the Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, with that individual involved in our governance committee and the selection process, I have the utmost of confidence, as Mr. Nelson talked about, that as we look at individuals, we look at individuals who bring that faith basis and sometimes that's also the 40% of people who are not Methodists, where we look for a deep faith — maybe they are a different faith, but a deep faith that people bring to the board and expectation a recognition that faith is important for the life of our institution. I have the utmost of confidence in that committee's ability to make recommendations to our Board of Directors and to always consider, as was referred to, a big tent approach that connects us to all of the churches in the greater Houston and in the southeast Texas region here and enables our institution to propel forward.

Bishop Jones: I think the question has been answered. Thank you. Microphone No. 2, are you speaking for or against the motion?

Rev. Allison Cambre: Basically, against the motion. I'm Allison Cambre, I'm an elder of the Northwest District. It isn't -- you don't have to read far to understand that part of the motion that was presented is an attempt to reduce the number of United Methodists serving on the board, both by number and percentage. I believe that this board will continue to be stable whether or not this motion passes today. The Methodist Hospital will still continue to provide the very best in research, education, and palliative care for all that enter its portals.

But to put it in different words, to not pass this motion in no way erodes the mission of the Methodist Hospital. To put it in even different words, the Texas Annual Conference today is on a precipice of sustaining a major black eye and I think that this particular motion coming at this particular time isn't well advised from what we are truly facing, whether or not the Board of Trustees report is accepted or rejected.

I have enough confidence to believe that the board members are able to find, for example, people of color and financial substantial means in The United Methodist Church to further diversify the board and should they have a need to include AME, AME Zion, and CME, there is nothing to prevent them from going that direction.

But having an over 100-year history with our Annual Conference, it sounds like – it feels like – there is a lack of confidence in where The United Methodist Church is going to be beginning in June. That's how I read some of what is coming before us.

Bishop Jones: We have now had two speeches against the motion and one in favor. Microphone No. 3, are you speaking for or against?

Gary Scoggin: I would like to move to table the motion until the next Annual Conference.

Bishop Jones: All right, what is your name and status, please.

Gary Scoggin: My name is Gary Scoggin, I'm a lay delegate from St. John's United Methodist Church in Texas City.

Bishop Jones: Now let me help with you the parliamentary rules. Tabling the motion means it can be picked up again later this morning. If you are seeking to postpone consideration, would you please name a time when you expect this to be considered?

Gary Scoggin: Okay, yeah, that would be the --

Bishop Jones: Regular session of Annual Conference next May?

Gary Scoggin: Regular session of Annual Conference in May of 2023.

Bishop Jones: All right, is there a second to this? I hear a second. If the motion before us is to postpone consideration of this until regular session next May; it is debatable. You may speak to it

Gary Scoggin: Thank you, I'll just reiterate and just build on what the gentleman over at microphone 1 said earlier and talk about the timing of this, and the fact that this really calls for deliberation and probably more awareness and a chance to study and understand the impact that what's going to happen here later today will have on Houston Methodist which is an amazing institution, I agree with you on that.

But it seems like that a lot of us here have more confidence in the board than you have in yourselves perhaps. And I know there is going to be — it's going to be maybe a tumultuous transition — but a good cohesive board like you have should be able to ride through that and help us fully understand the impact so we can, with a bit more transparency and a bit more understanding, to be able to act on this in May. Thank you.

Bishop Jones: Is there a speech against postponing the consideration? Microphone No. 1.

Rev. Mike McVey: Mike McVey, Northwest District, elder. First of all, I'd like to say my wife delivered our first baby girl at Houston Methodist. So, thank you for that fine work. She's doing great. She's 18 months.

So, I just want to say a little bit of why I think we need to deal with this right now. And simply because there is a lot of frustration when two individuals are arguing amongst each other, and as any pastor knows, part of that is trying to make sure that individuals who are certainly -- not necessarily involved with that conflict, do not get caught up.

The hospital -- yes, it says Houston Methodist, but I would also say that if we try to treat this as an ownership, are we trying to treat this as if we can put a brand on the type of assistance and medical assistance that we're offering.

We have individuals who work every single day in this medical system coming to us. They come from a broad spectrum of views, a broad spectrum of positions, and they've reached this conclusion -- and as someone who has benefited from this system, I would recommend we make the decision today so they can get back to work and do the job of their ministry, which is caring for all God's people and children. That's why I think we need to vote for this now.

Bishop Jones: Does anybody wish to speak for postponement of consideration? Yes, microphone No. 3.

Rev. Randy Smith: Randy Smith, elder, retired elder, in the southwest district. No one is questioning the integrity of Houston Methodist Hospital and its ability to serve everyone who comes through its doors. Whether they be Christian, Muslim, Jewish, Hindu, no religion whatsoever. That's your job. And we're not questioning that.

What I think we are questioning is, the necessity of having this change made in the midst of an Annual Conference in which we are grieving. Deeply grieving. And this is not the appropriate time for this to come. You may bring back the same report at Annual Conference in May, and we can deal with it. We'll have more time to look at it and to discuss it, to think about it. We haven't had the time that is necessary to do this for this kind of a change. And in the midst of this kind of

grieving that we're going through, there is going to be distrust. I'm sorry, that's the way the world works.

And you don't need to be worried about whether or not we're going to interfere in the ongoing work of Methodist Hospital. We're not. We never have. But it is not the time for us to consider this motion in the midst of this very tragic and challenging time for the Texas Annual Conference. And, therefore, I say this is not the time. Let's delay it until Annual Conference when we have plenty of time to discuss it and look at it.

Bishop Jones: Does anybody wish to speak against the motion to postpone? Microphone No. 1.

Rev. Sterling Allen: Sterling Allen, central north district, clergy. In 2018, in June, I was delivered by ambulance to Methodist West and I was laying in the hospital and the doctor began telling me about the infection I had and the course of treatment he was going to give me. I didn't ask him to wait until this next Annual Conference to make the decision of what medication to give me. I trusted the doctors that were taking care of me in the room. When I was told to put medication in me to keep me to keep me from getting COVID on three occasions, I trusted Houston Methodist.

We have said as a body we trust Houston Methodist. Why would we question that now? So, I believe that we should not table the motion. We should consider it now. Thank you so much, Bishop.

Bishop Jones: Does anybody else wish the speak in favor of postponement? Yes? Microphone No. 3. Can we help get the person a microphone. Yeah, thank you.

Rev. Richard Hume: This is not an issue of trust of Methodist Hospital to do their due diligence in treating patients. That is not the issue. They will continue to do that because that's their calling. This is the issue that is about the trust of our Annual Conference to make decisions about Methodist Hospital as they have done for 100 years. And I think that we should table this until June so we can duly consider all of this as it matters to the conference. Thank you.

Bishop Jones: Does anybody wish to speak against the motion?

Rev. Tim Turner: [INAUDIBLE].

Bishop Jones: I'm sorry?

Rev. Tim Turner: I was going to speak against.

Bishop Jones: The man before us -- your name.

Rev. Richard Hume: My name is Richard Hume. I am a retired Elder and been a member -- I have been a Methodist preacher for over 54 years. And I'm from the Central South District.

Bishop Jones: Anybody wish to speak against postponement? Microphone No. 1?

Rev. Tim Turner: Bishop, I would like to call the question.

Bishop Jones: I'm getting ready to put the question before you. We'll take that as a formal motion, but I think the body is ready to vote.

I'm going to put this to you. The question before you is to postpone consideration of this proposal from Houston Methodist Hospital until the regular session of Annual Conference at the end of May of next year. If you will support postponement, would you raise the hand. Down. If you oppose the postponement, would you raise the hand. The motion fails.

The motion is before you again, microphone No. 3, you've been waiting to speak. What is your concern?

Rev. David Lieberman: I would like to speak for the recommendation. My name is David Lieberman, I'm a provisional deacon from the south direct and I serve as a chaplain at the Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital.

There is an issue of geography, location, and towns that hasn't been discussed when we talk about this before. When we talk outside of this hospital, we talk about three locations that are having all of the churches currently disaffiliate in regions where there is either currently a hospital or there will be a hospital -- Baytown, The Woodlands, and the future Cypress location of Houston Methodist. It will be difficult for the board to find members only looking from the new church plants in these areas and would mean that they would possibly have to pull members from outside of these areas.

I serve in Baytown, and I know my board. I have seen them a lot. I have seen them in the nurses' break room delivering donuts, I have seen them at many family functions, I have seen them all across the hospital because they don't just love Houston Methodist, they love Baytown.

It matters to them that that is the flagship hospital in Baytown for them. That they give great care. For our board members, their family is born there, they get cancer treatment there, and they die there. It matters to them really a lot that they get good care in Baytown, and they go the extra mile because they are people from Baytown.

I think we should be in favor of this motion so we can continue to have the hospitals be well integrated into their local communities just like our churches are supposed to be integrated into theirs.

Bishop Jones: Microphone No. 3. You wish to speak to the Houston Methodist motion?

Rev. Lataya Simpson: Good morning, everyone. My name is Lataya Simpson, I am an elder in The United Methodist Church and I serve at Bellaire United Methodist Church. I have also served as a CPE chaplain resident at Methodist Hospital and the I C.A.R.E. values of Methodist are of great value to me. Integrity, compassion, accountability, respect, excellence.

None of those involve rushing, none of those involve anxiety and I believe that to rush to this -- even though I think it's a great proposal, I think that there are many here who would like to offer amendments and that does not involve rushing.

In six months, I trust that if we were to bring this to the table again at the Texas Annual Conference, that we would be able to have more clear definitions in relation to the Methodist tradition coming out of the 18th century, so that we better understand the ramifications of that decision.

I don't think that using the idea of trust as a threat is a good thing to do. We trust the Methodist Hospital. I've had three babies there. I've had surgeries there. I've worked there. I trust The United Methodist Church and the Methodist Hospital. And I don't think trust is an issue here. I think time is an issue, and that tabling it should not be a source of anxiety for us. I support tabling this until the next Annual Conference.

Bishop Jones: Lataya, let me interrupt you. The motion to table or postpone consideration failed. It's no longer before us. So far, I've taken your speech as a speech against the proposals that we should defeat them.

Rev. Lataya Simpson: Yes. Although I do support this, I don't think it's right to vote on it at this time.

Bishop Jones: Your speech is in favor of defeating the proposal at this time. Thank you. Microphone No. 3, you wish to speak for or against it?

Rev. Mike Tyson: Bishop, I ask to call the question, please. Mike Tyson, Central North, clergy.

Bishop Jones: There's nobody else at the microphone, so I'm assuming the body is ready to vote and rather than put the formal motion before you, I'm going to seek to help y'all do your will. Except I see somebody moving to microphone No. 1. So, I'm going to put the motion to you after all. If you will move to close debate on this matter, would you raise the hand. Down. If you are in favor of continuing debate, raise the hand. It reaches the necessary two-thirds. We're not going to be discussing that anymore.

I'm ready to put the motion to you for a vote. The motion is the one Dr. Pace made to approve these proposed revisions to the Houston Methodist Hospital Articles of Incorporation and bylaws.

If you will approve this motion, would you raise the hand. Down. If you are opposed, raise the hand. The motion carries. We have now approved those bylaws. God bless you all. Thank you, Methodist Hospital. I take that applause for the appreciation of Houston Methodist Hospital and the incredible work they're doing.

As a personal word, I will say that in my 18 and a half years as Bishop, I have served on 20 different Board of Directors for nonprofit organizations by ex-officio status. Of those 20, the Houston Methodist Hospital board is the highest quality, best run, best organization I've ever

been a part of. And I just want you to know that I've been honored and privileged to be one of those board members for the last six and a half years. Obviously with all these boards that I serve on, I'm not as engaged in all of them, but I really did engage with the Houston Methodist board because of its importance in healthcare for an important part of our Annual Conference.

Motion from the TAC Board of Trustees to Approve Local Church Disaffiliations

Bishop Jones: Okay, a reminder that we have three action items on our agenda, and three items that do not require action. The third action item is a motion from the Texas Annual Conference Board of Trustees. Hal Sharp, chair of this board, comes now to make the recommendation. I'm asking Reverend Carol Bruse and our controller Mark Hellums to accompany Hal to the podium. We've always given Mark Hellums privilege of the floor because when it comes to the numbers and finances of our Annual Conference, he's the most knowledgeable person on our team. And so, without objection, he will be able to speak as well.

These people have worked diligently with the whole Board of Trustees to ensure that all the churches being considered in this recommendation have met all the requirements of the principles regarding local church disaffiliation that our Annual Conference approved over two years ago. Welcome, friends.

Hal Sharp: Thank you, Bishop. My name is Hal Sharp. I'm a layperson at the Bellaire United Methodist Church in Bellaire. And it is my privilege to chair the conference Board of Trustees. I report to you on behalf of the entire board. You'll find our report on Pages 46 through 49 of the Pre-Conference Journal. We are recommending 294 churches for disaffiliation. But first, a word about the process.

As many of you will recall, the principles regarding local church requests for disaffiliation were approved by the Texas Annual Conference in 2020 and are still in effect.

They detail what our conference requires for a local church to be considered for disaffiliation, and they are part of our report on Page 45 of the Pre-Conference Journal. All the churches before you today have met these requirements. And each of them has completed a period of discernment to the satisfaction of their District Superintendent.

Because disciplinary paragraph 2548.2 can no longer be used for disaffiliation, each church before you followed the disciplinary paragraph 2553. Working with their District Superintendent, they called a church conference, and professing members voted to disaffiliate by a two-thirds majority. By November the 14th, church leaders of all 294 churches included in our report signed a disaffiliation agreement which is an agreement between the Texas Annual Conference and the church seeking disaffiliation. Attached to each of these agreements is a copy of these three documents: Minutes from their church conference documenting the ballot count and signed by the elected church secretary and presiding elder, a list of any debts they promise to take with them, and a list of properties with property descriptions.

On November the 15th, the Board of Trustees reviewed their paperwork and agreed that these churches have followed the principles and have met all requirements to be approved for

disaffiliation. The board voted unanimously to recommend these 294 churches for disaffiliation, pending 100% payment of the 2021 and 2022 apportionments. All churches before you have paid 100% of their 2021 and 2022 conference and district apportionments. All conference and district balances are paid in full.

A spreadsheet listing all 294 churches is included in our report beginning on Page 46 of the Preconference Journal. I invite you to turn to those pages now. You'll see churches are listed alphabetically on the spreadsheet. First by district, then by city, and then by church name. Key information from thousands of pages of agreements have been summarized on this spreadsheet for your convenience and include the following: The date of each church disaffiliation church conference, the fact that each church voted to disaffiliate by a two-thirds majority, the total number of votes, votes for disaffiliation, votes against disaffiliation, and the percentage of votes for disaffiliation.

You'll see that every church completed their required documentation by November 14th and the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to recommend these churches on November the 15th. The last three columns include dollar amounts. The balance of 2021 conference apportionments due, all of 2022 conference apportionments due, and the total of those two amounts – the total that has been paid by each church in the year 2022. Again, all churches have paid in full. We are incredibly sad that these churches have chosen to break connection with us. However, we have confirmed that they have met the requirements for disaffiliation and are properly before you today.

Bishop Jones, the Texas Annual Conference Board of Trustees moves approval for disaffiliation of all churches listed in Exhibit B on Pages 46 through 49 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Bishop Jones: Thank you to the Board of Trustees for the careful work. This motion is now properly before you, but friends, I have to give the microphone to Kip Gilts for a procedural matter that will interrupt the consideration of this for one brief moment. Kip.

Rev. Kip Gilts: I know the people of First Church were very excited when they arrived here to discover the parking lot was full. They were not as excited when they discovered there was not going to be an offering. However, if you are like me and arrived a little bit later than Bishop Jones did today, you might have had trouble finding a parking spot and discovered a nice little complex across Westcenter, where 3663, which is one of the annexed properties of this church.

Unfortunately, they share a parking lot with their neighbor to the south of them. That is not 3663, and they are doing COVID testing this morning. And they need those spots. So, if you are parked in a little bitty parking lot over by 3663, and you're not parked against the building that belongs to the First United Methodist Church, which is on the north side of 3663, then you need to move your car. Thank you.

Bishop Jones: All right, friends. We've made that announcement. I don't know if being towed is a threat, but I assure as a good neighbor we want to be sure to take care of our neighbors in that way.

This matter is properly before you. If anybody wishes to speak to it, you may move to a microphone at this time. Microphone No. 1.

Rev. Pat Sparks: Pat Sparks, clergy, St. Peter's United Methodist Church. Bishop, I would like for us to have a standing vote on this very historic matter that we're about to decide.

I know that the process is traditionally been you would make a ruling based on show of hands or, yes... I think we ought to respect the fact that each of our churches, as was just stated in the disaffiliation process, that they counted the "yeses" and the "no's" and I think we ought to do the same for this because it will allow history to be shown in our journal and therefore for years to come people will be able to know this many people voted "yes," this many people voted "no," and this many people abstained. I think that would be appropriate for our records and good for good faith for all of those local churches, whether they are staying UMC or moving on, that they have the opportunity to know how this body voted. I say a standing vote. I have a special needs daughter, so I'll make that clear. We would stand for those wanting to say yes, stand for those wanting to say no, stand for those who want to abstain, and if you are unable to stand, you would just let the teller know how you choose to vote.

Bishop Jones: I take that as a motion for the procedure of voting. As your chair, my job is to help the body make up its mind, but if you wish to consider a standing vote that would provide a precise count, that certainly within the body's ability to decide how we go ahead and make up our minds as an Annual Conference. Is there a second to Pat's motion? I hear a second. Interestingly enough, I'm going to take a show of hands as to whether or not you want to have a count for this motion. If you will approve the motion for a standing count vote, would you raise the hand. Down. If you oppose, would you raise the hand. Oh my gosh.

Rev. Pat Sparks I make a motion we have a standing vote count for this motion. With the tellers then giving us the results.

Bishop Jones: It is close enough that I think on a matter like this, having a standing vote -- I'm going to rule that it was a vote that the motion passed and we will do a vote by standing when the time comes, noting that those who are unable to stand will find a way of telling the teller -- in case this is your first Annual Conference, the way we do that, I will call for those in favor to stand and you will stay standing until a teller points at you and you know that you've been counted. We have tellers who will be ready to do that. Are there others who wish to speak for or against the motion? Microphone No. 3.

Rev. Trey Comstock: Trey Comstock, clergy, Central South District. I just have a question. One of the major provisions of paragraph 2553 of the *Discipline* is to make sure that all unfunded pension liability is covered. At the 2022 Texas Annual Conference, the regularly scheduled one, we did pass that the pension reserve would be used to pay a percentage of the unfunded pension liability.

In the spreadsheet talking about district apportionments, I appreciate that that is also a provision of 2553, but can you speak to how much unfunded pension liability there was, and how that

exact amount was covered, whether by the local churches themselves or by the pension reserves of the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church?

Bishop Jones: Mark and Carol, I'll turn to you for the answer to that question.

Mark Hellums: Yes, I'll actually give you the figures. There were two measurement periods. The first one was July 1st. So, churches disaffiliating after July 1st, the funded status was a negative \$30 million. The pension reserve was \$37 million. So, there was a surplus of 7 million.

As of July 1st, the funded status was a negative \$38 million. The pension reserve was 39 and a half million, so a surplus of \$6.3 million.

Rev. Carol Bruse: In English, without the numbers, what I think Mark was trying to say is, yes, we did in that resolution, Trey, it wasn't to reduce it by a percentage, although that may have happened and may happen in future; it was to allow our in-house pension reserves to help cover the market liability that we have in our unfunded pension liability as a conference, the number we get from Wespath, calculated from Wespath.

As it turns out in this odd economic environment – even though our in-house pension reserves have gone down some because the stock market has gone down, right? – incredibly enough with interest rates going up, our unfunded pension liability went down even lower. So, our pension reserves in this odd economic time more than cover the market liability, unfunded pension liability from Wespath. So, in essence our liability as a conference is zero and that is what we're required to share with these disaffiliating churches.

So, although the five previous churches that disaffiliated did pay a portion, and perhaps if churches disaffiliate next year, they may need to pay a portion, their portion for all of these churches we're recommending is zero.

Bishop Jones: I am not seeing anybody moving -- somebody at microphone No. 3.

Bill Scheel: Bishop Jones, I'm Bill Scheel, lay delegate from First Methodist, and I call the question.

Bishop Jones: Thank you. I'm not seeing anybody who moves to a microphone and so I take it that the body is ready to vote. You may move to the microphone, but if you're moving to the microphone, I'm going to put the question to the body. If you will end debate, would you lift the hand? Down. If you're opposed to ending debate, would you lift the hand. And I'm sorry, Carol, the motion to end debate was made first. What do you wish to ask microphone No. 1?

Rev. Carol Turner: There are still people that are moving their cars that would like to vote. Can you just wait just a few minutes? Or not?

Bishop Jones: Well, let me try something else in the meantime. I'm looking for Lance Richards, the pastor of our host church, but also, he leads our tellers at Annual Conference and been doing

that for several years. Lance, are our tellers all organized and ready? You may go to the podium, Lance.

Rev. Lance Richards: I have every section covered except one and I need two additional tellers to meet me by the Christmas tree to get your assignment and then we're ready to roll.

Bishop Jones: And so, for procedural reasons, ma'am, we'll wait for a few minutes to vote, and I hope whoever is moving their car can get back quickly. And the tellers need to be moving into place to get ready to count this.

[The Conference was in informal recess for 1 minute and 23 seconds]

Bishop Jones: If the body would be in order, please.

Rev. Richard Hume: I am --

Bishop Jones: If the body would be in order, please. I wear hearing aids and I can't hear the person speaking over your chatter. So yes, microphone No. 3. Do you have a question?

Rev. Richard Hume: I have a statement if I can make it, please.

Bishop Jones: I'm sorry.

Rev. Richard Hume: I have a statement. If I can make it, please.

Bishop Jones: No, we voted to end debate.

Rev. Richard Hume: This is not debate.

Bishop Jones: It's not clear to me what kind of statement at this part of our...

Rev. Richard Hume: It is matter of personal privilege.

Bishop Jones: All right, I will try that, but if it goes very far into debate, I'll cut you off. What is your matter of personal privilege.

Rev. Richard Hume: First of all, I'm not going to vote against this, but I would like to express the sense of broken heartedness that we're at this point in our history. I have been a United Methodist pastor as I said earlier for 54 years and in that time, I have been devoted to The United Methodist Church.

My first response to the fact that people were going to disaffiliate was to say in my heart, okay, that's their privilege. And I am glad to see them do that if they are not United Methodist. But then I looked at the list of disaffiliating churches and among those churches I found churches that I have pastored and people that I have loved on that list. And then I look closer, and I saw

churches that family members belong to or were attending. And as I looked at that list, my heart was broken.

I have been a hard-core United Methodist, but in that process, I have come to understand that these churches are disaffiliating for their own reasons. And I know some of them. I have been attending what used to be Bering United Methodist Church and now is Bering. United Church of Christ because that's where my wife joined and has ministered with that congregation to the LGBTQ people of Montrose. I see that as a very inclusive church, and my call to both The United Methodist Church and the Global Methodist Church is that they pray about what- where they are going, and I pray that they choose inclusiveness. Being in the light of God's grace —

Bishop Jones: Friend, I think you've made your statement and are veering into debate at this point. And I'm going to end your speech and thank you for the expressions of heartbreak.

Friends, I'm told we are ready to vote. I am going to ask for the three different votes on this matter. The recommendation is from the Board of Trustees to approve all 294 churches on the list for disaffiliation.

The first vote will be to support that recommendation. The second will be to oppose it. At the request of some members of the conference I'm going to invite people to abstain. Now, let me explain what happens in an abstention. The vote and whether it passes or not is determined by the for and against. Let me give you an extreme illustration. If ten people vote for it. And five vote against it and twenty abstain, the motion passes. 10-5. Abstention votes are simply a way of saying I was present and chose not to participate in that decision.

And yet, there are people for whom this is such a difficult matter that while they don't want to block it from happening, they also cannot bring themselves to support it. And so, I will invite those three votes -- tellers, I'm sorry to complicate your work in that way, but that's part of your service to the Texas Annual Conference.

I'm going to pray. Would you join with me in a spirit of prayer. God, our hearts are heavy that we've come to this place in the life of our conference and yet we understand the long journey it's taken us to get here. As we make this decision, we pray your blessing on all involved, that indeed each church that is disaffiliating might find a way to move forward in their service to Christ, that the Texas Annual Conference might continue its incredible service for The United Methodist Church in these 58 counties and that you would indeed guide and direct all of us that we might love each other well through this difficult process. All these things we ask in Jesus' name and all God's people said, amen.

All standing delegates at the back need to find a chair since you're going to be seated, unless you're standing in the back you're going to vote twice and that seems to be rather a problem in Texas. There are chairs in the aisles here. We don't want you voting twice. And like most Methodist churches there are some pews down front where people can sit as well.

I assume the people who are standing are now tellers. So, we will proceed with the vote. If you are going to support the recommendation of the Board of Trustees for these churches to disaffiliate, would you please stand. Remain standing until you are counted.

[Tellers counted the affirmative votes]

Bishop Jones: If you are opposed to the recommendation of the Board of Trustees for disaffiliation, would you please stand.

[Tellers counted the opposing votes]

Bishop Jones: If you vote to abstain on this matter, would you please stand.

[Tellers counted the abstentions]

RESULTS OF STANDING VOTE #1

In favor: 1,164 Opposed: 33 Abstentions: 48

Bishop Jones: The vote is 1,164 in favor, 33 opposed, and 48 abstaining. The motion carries. Friends, I'm going to ask John Esquivel, our Conference Lay Leader to come to the podium. This is not an easy decision for any church nor for this Annual Conference It's a sort of Mizpah moment for Jacob and Laban shared in their parting in Genesis 31. John, would you please offer a prayer of blessing on all congregations in the Texas Annual Conference, those who are staying and those who are leaving.

John Esquivel: Thank you, Bishop, for that privilege. Please join me in prayer. Lord, God, Father Almighty, we praise your mighty name and give thanks for all the blessings you have bestowed upon us. We give you thanks for the blessing of all the churches represented here and the multitude of souls impacted by their ministries. Some of these churches have a ministry measured by a few years, others measured by decades, and several in ministry for well over a century. The line is long of people arriving at heaven's gate, giving thanks for the saving ministries of the churches represented here. The line is also long on earth of people giving thanks for hearing the good news of Jesus Christ, as well as being cared for, comforted, and lifted up by these churches.

Only you, dear Lord, know the full impact of the churches represented here. There are many great legacies, but more importantly, there is a great future for every church represented here. Lord, this has been a difficult time for many of us. We perhaps have experienced all human emotions over these last several months. Some may still be experiencing a sense of grief, a sense of loss, perhaps a broken personal relationship or broken heart.

Lord, we ask that your Holy Spirit cover each and every one of us with your healing balm so we may overcome any sense of grief, loss or brokenness. Let us work through these internal emotions and refocus on the external world that is in need of your word and ministries. Let us all

have a sense of newness; let us all have a sense of a fresh start. Let us all be revitalized in our ministries. Let us all seek out new and innovative ways to reach out to a hurting world.

Lord, at times this feels as if we've reached a fork in the road that we have traveled with family and friends for a long time. Some may travel a new road, while others may continue on the road they have traveled. Regardless of which road we take, may we continue to share the good news of Jesus Christ with whomever we encounter. Regardless of which road we take, may we be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ as we care for, comfort, and lift up those in need that we encounter. Regardless of which road we take, may you bless our ministries as we seek to make disciples for Jesus Christ. Regardless of what road we take, remind us that we will meet at the feet of Jesus. I pray from time to time our paths may cross as we minister to a hurting world.

In this time of Advent, let us be reminded that we are people of hope, love, joy, and peace. Let us all be filled with hope as we envision our new future. Let us all be filled with love for one another. Let us all be filled with joy knowing you are with us, and Lord, let us all be at peace. When we leave from here, let us be a shining example to the world that even when we may have differences of opinion, we can still lift each other's hope. We can still love one another, and we can be filled with joy and peace.

May we borrow the words from a great hymn and say to each other: Till we meet, till we meet, God be with you till we meet again. In his Holy name I pray. Amen.

Bishop Jones: Thank you, John, for that powerful prayer and for the spirit it represents. Friends, as I've said on many occasions over the last several years my heart is breaking in this process. I'm grateful to the leaders of a group in our conference called That We May Be One that they are proposing a time of prayer and worship that will be held in this sanctuary upon adjournment here today. When we adjourn at whatever time that is, we'll have a 15-minute break and then the That We May Be One group will lead in a time of prayer and scripture reading. I've agreed to offer the final benediction for that service. It's not required. It's not a part of our Annual Conference session but it's an opportunity for people to have a spiritual focus on how to begin anew upon the adjournment of this session here today.

You're standing at microphone No. 2. Is there a matter you wish to address?

Rev. George Hudspeth: Yes.

Bishop Jones: Would you speak and tell us who you are.

Rev. George Hudspeth: I'm George Robert Hudspeth, ordained Deacon in 1959 at this Annual Conference. Elder in 1961. I have served in this conference for all those years in many different capacities, and I come here to lament the death of my birthright.

I hold in my hand two documents, one from the Texas Conference of 1841. The other a document from 1845 conducted in St. Augustine, Texas.

The elder's -- the deacon's and elder's orders for one Henderson Palmer who served in northeast section of this conference, serving my families, families who came from Tennessee and established the Methodist colony in the northeast section of Upshur County.

It is with great remorse that I see that history and that birthright deceased this day. And I ask this conference to please understand what is being rejected by this disassociation. One, it is a denial of a creation of God. You, Bishop –

Bishop Jones: Reverend Hudspeth, I appreciate your sentiments here and a number would like to speak as well, but I think that we do not have the time for each person present to make the kind of speech that you're giving to make, and fairness requires that I bring your speech to an end and move on to the next item of business for our conference.

Rev. George Hudspeth: We need to understand that we have rejected God's creation of all human beings –

Bishop Jones: Reverend Hudspeth, thank you for what you have said so far but I'm going to close your speech at this time. Thank you. You may be seated.

CF&A Presentation on Financial Impact of Disaffiliations

Bishop Jones: We have a number of presentations -- three of them in specific that need to share information with the Conference. Clearly the disaffiliation of 294 churches represents a fixed 46% of the financial strength of our conference. It will have significant impact on our cash flow, on our United Methodist witness and our United Methodist clergy. We want to address these issues. The leadership teams of the conference have in fact been at work developing contingency plans in case this was to be approved.

These proposals that are going to be presented do not require a conference approval or action today, but we think in the name of transparency you all need to understand how the conference will be addressing these issues.

First is a presentation from the Council on Finance & Administration regarding the finances of the Texas Annual Conference. Carol and Mark, would you come and support Don Morriss, the Chair of the CF&A. How will the disaffiliation of TAC churches impact the spending plan for 2023?

Don Morriss: Bishop, I appreciate your introductory remarks because we need the assistance of Carol and Mark as we are going to have to make significant changes. However, as your Council on Finance & Administration, as my senior partner in my business at home used to say, I remain forever hopeful.

So, by way of introduction, my name again is Don Morriss, chairman of the Council on Finance & Administration. I am a layperson from Williams Memorial United Methodist Church from Texarkana and it's my privilege to chair this Council on Finance & Administration. I present to

you on behalf of the entire council. Our presentation begins on Page 51 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

First, let me present where we are financially as of September 30, 2022, at the end of the third quarter. First of all, we are grateful for your faithfulness. Although we're experiencing negative investment earnings and we'll be facing significant reductions in apportionment income next year, conference apportionment receipts have returned to pre-pandemic levels.

The Texas Annual Conference is financially stable with sufficient reserves at this time. As of September 30, 2022, the end of the third quarter, conference apportionment receipts have actually increased two percentage points over this same period of 2021.

During this extraordinary year we have also received more apportionment income than usual from disaffiliating churches as you just heard from Hal and Carol and Mark. Most of these receipts will be reflected in the fourth quarter which we will submit to you at the regular session of the Annual Conference in May of 2023.

As of September 30, 2022, expenses exceeded receipts by just over \$3 million. However, this is not surprising as conference events and ministries have returned to pre-pandemic levels. A lot of those were put on hold obviously due to COVID.

Bishop Jones: Don, let me interrupt you for a minute to say, friends, the conference is still in session. We encourage you and hope that you will stay. On the other hand, those who are leaving need to do so quietly so the people who are participating in the rest of the conference session will be able to on focus on what's being said. Those who are leaving, we ask that you turn in your lanyards so we can recycle them in the future. We turn you back now to Don Morriss.

Don Morriss: Thank you, our job is not yet complete, right, Bishop?

Expenses did exceed receipts during the first part of the year by approximately \$3 million. This is not surprising as I said as a lot of events have returned to in person meetings such as today and therefore our expenses have gone up. And also, as you know in your local church, we received a lot of our apportionments at the end of the financial year. So, we hope that that will catch up by the end of the calendar year.

Unfortunately, our investment returns are lower than we experienced since 2008. We had fiscal investments loss of about 19% which related to three-and-a-half to \$3.7 million. There has been some relief since September 30 – if you look in the newspaper every day and decide how much relief we've received since September 30, but we hope that's temporary, and we'll see the investment results recover.

On the next slide, because of the combination of increased expenses and negative investment returns, our available unrestricted operating reserves dropped from 11 million to approximately \$4 million. However, the good news is we fully expect our reserves to be increased by the end of the 2022 year. Again, because of our higher fourth quarter receipts.

However, even this reduced level of fiscal reserves totals 40% of our \$9.79 million conference budget.

Just so you'll know, some of the side funds, or other funds, Group Health Benefits and pension reserves declined also for negative investment returnings. However, if you notice in the Preconference Journal, those reserve levels continue to be sufficient to meet the needs for pensions and health benefits.

So, that quickly summarizes where we are as of September 30th at the end of the third quarter. Now if we can go to the future, we'll go to the next slide.

Because of 294 church disaffiliations we anticipate the 2023 conference budget and income to be reduced by 45.9%. As you can imagine, this is a moving target. You can see these projections are page 62 of your Pre-Conference Journal.

So how do we support a budget in light of these disaffiliations? As we bridge this gap, we plan to implement three strategies for 2023.

First, we will continue to ask all conference staff to limit budget spending to 70% if at all possible.

Secondly, we plan to implement new targeted reductions in budget spending which will allow all vital conference ministries to continue, some of those fundings might be coming from reserve funds. You can see a list of the targeted reductions on Page 67 of the Pre-Conference Journal. Spending less than what we budgeted does not take conference action and that's why this is not an action item. However, we want to be transparent and let you know that we are watching every dollar and watching every ministry so we can keep those ministries going without sacrificing reserves and the financial stability of the conference.

Those targeted reductions I mentioned only total 21.4% of the conference budget. And we said we're going to experience a negative receipt next year due to apportionment income. We do anticipate we'll absorb some of the differences with fiscal reserves. Again, although we have experienced negative investment returns, we believe we have sufficient reserves to cross this bridge to 2024.

Finally, as we go into 2023, we are already working on a 2024 conference budget; a CF&A budget task force will be created, with staff, and we are already running some draft reports for a 2024 budget. As you can imagine with all the ministries we have to talk to and all the areas, it takes all that time to get ready for a Pre-Conference Journal in March, so we'll be able to look at it and approve it in May.

We ask for your prayers as we commit ourselves to this task. Bishop, this completes our report. Be glad to answer any questions and go from there.

Bishop Jones: We are committed to full transparency and want the conference to be aware of how we are planning to bridge through 2023. As Don said this is not an action item because to

amend the budget would bind the flexibility we need because this is still a moving target. Any questions? Well, Don, thank you to CF&A for the hard work. I want to take a moment of personal privilege to give a shout out to Carol Bruse. Carol, stay up here a minute.

She would be the first to say that she leads an incredible team, and I would agree. The people who work in your connectional resources office are incredible, but Carol, thank you for your faithful service as a pastor, as a leader in the Annual Conference, and most recently as treasurer. I asked you to work with me in that area. You have done so exceptionally well, and I am just deeply grateful. We wish you well in your retirement. Thank you.

Report on New Faith Communities

We know that as these churches disaffiliate, the need for The United Methodist Church to work hard at creating new congregations and new faith communities is absolutely crucial. While Morris Matthis is the acting District Superintendent for the Central North District, and soon to be the regular District Superintendent there, he retains his title as director of new faith communities. I invite him to come -- he's already there. I have such a great team that I work with, they usually anticipate my requests even before I ask them.

Okay, Morris, here is the question: How will the disaffiliation of TAC churches impact the United Methodist witness in the Texas Annual Conference mission field?

Rev. Morris Matthis: Thank you, Bishop. My presentation begins on Page 70 of our Preconference Journal. We've never done it this way before. How many times, in how many different contexts, have we used this phrase over these past few years. Everything from how we do worship services, Bible studies, meetings, even Annual Conferences. Well, now we can add new church starts to that list.

I mean, historically, we've utilized a number of different strategies for starting new churches. Back in the day, we did parachute drops. We'd find pastor and give the pastor some money, put them in a community, and we'd say start a church! Good luck! Go get 'em!

Well, hardly anybody does that anymore. Today, it's more mother-daughter or perhaps multi-site starts. These are new church starts in which a large church with people and resources and healthy DNA partner with the Annual Conference to identify a mission field that needs a United Methodist church. Oftentimes the people that help launch that new church are people who are already members of the church and live in the area they hope to reach.

We also start new churches by bringing two or more churches together and by combining them we create something that did not exist before. And we also start churches by restarting or giving new birth to existing churches that come to the end of their ministry.

But in the environment in which we find ourselves today, we have the challenge and the opportunity to start new churches in a way that includes some elements of these models, and yet is a little different from all of them.

Over these past weeks, I've been meeting with each District Superintendent to ascertain several important pieces of information about their districts. First, I wanted to get clear about where what I call the newly created United Methodist deserts are. And in conjunction with that, I wanted to have an understanding of what churches are in the area of disaffiliating churches that might continue to provide for those who choose to remain in our denomination and keep the United Methodist voice alive and well in that mission field.

Secondly, I wanted to have an understanding of where the population centers are. Particularly in our rural districts. If we're going to start new churches, it needs to be places where there is potential to reach new people for Christ.

And thirdly, I wanted to know where the groups are. Where were there people who were members of disaffiliated churches that had come together and wanted to do the work that needed to be done to create something new that would keep the cross and flame in that community?

Over these past weeks I want you to know that such groups have come together, and that God is doing amazing things through them. Does it match the number of churches that are leaving? No, not by a mile.

But friends, we're only weeks into this. This is only the beginning of a story that is just unfolding before us. Some might call it a reset. Some might call it a restart. I choose, friends, to call it a revival. I've seen men and women who deeply love God, love their church, and are committed to doing what it takes to continue its presence in their neighborhood and communities.

So far, we have groups that have sprung up in the 249/290 area northwest of Houston, Bryan, Baytown, Jasper, 288 south in Houston, Woodville, Jacksonville, Tyler, some of these groups may be as few as 15 or 20. One of these groups it seems like in a matter of days exceeded 150 people.

As I said before, I have full expectation that more groups will be emerging in the coming days, but I want you to know that in three cases, pastors have already been appointed to serve those new churches. And at this time, I would like to invite them to come down just so you can greet them and Bishop, if you'd say a prayer over them.

So, I'd like to invite Shuler Sitsch, who will be serving a new church in the northwest part of Houston, 249/290. Come on down, Shuler. Jennifer Webber in Bryan and Luis Ramirez in Baytown. Come on up and we want to greet you. Stand up here, let them get a good look at you.

So, I'm very excited about the work that these three will be doing. I want to believe this is the first of many to come. Bishop, would you offer a word of prayer.

Bishop Jones: Let's pray together. God, we thank you for the opportunities we have to expand United Methodist witness into new places. We know that you called us to make disciples. We know that the task involves gathering people into worshiping communities. We thank you for these three clergies who have offered themselves and are willing to begin that process of creating

a new faith community of starting new churches and of building your witness for The United Methodist Church in these communities.

God, give them wisdom. This is not easy work. Give them courage. This will require going into interesting places that are not always easily accessible. And God, most of all, give them a clarity about the gospel that they might be a vehicle you use to bring people to saving faith in Christ and to form new congregations.

We thank you for their willingness to serve and ask your incredible blessing upon them in all that they do. All these things we ask in Jesus' name and all God's people said, amen.

Rev. Morris Matthis: Friends, I just want to say that I love this Conference. We are the Texas Annual Conference. I want to say that again. We are the Texas Annual Conference. For many years we have been a strong voice for the gospel in all of our 58 counties. By the grace of God and with your prayers and your support, we'll continue to be for many years to come. Thank you, Bishop.

Report from the Board of Ordained Ministry

Bishop Jones: Amen. Thank you, Morris. I want to invite Linda Christians, the chair of our Board of Ordained Ministry and ask the question, Linda, how will the disaffiliation of TAC churches impact the United Methodist clergy of the Texas Annual Conference?

Rev. Linda Christians: Thank you, Bishop. My presentation can be found on Page 72 of the Preconference Journal.

During this difficult season of change, the clergy of the Texas Annual Conference have experienced heartbreaking pain affiliated with separation and loss. While once they had been peers in a covenant relationship, they now find themselves at odds with some of their peers, friendships are strained. In addition, many of the clergy have had the additional challenge and stress of leading their congregations while the laity considered their denominational affiliation going forward.

As dedicated pastors, they have continued to comfort the broken-hearted, worked to calm the anxious, proclaimed the good news of Jesus Christ of our faith, and have provided hope while moving their congregations forward into an uncertain future. And they have done this even in the midst of feeling their own uncertainty about their own future. The Board of Ordained Ministry worked to help answer the questions of our candidates for ministry at all levels on how to best move forward, whether they wanted to remain UMC after their church disaffiliated or move to a new denomination with their church.

The Board of Ordained Ministry worked to clarify the process for all candidates by publishing and distributing to candidates and mentors an FAQ page to help answer common questions. Our candidacy assistant and board registrar communicated with candidates to answer questions and make every attempt to make sure every single candidate who wanted to remain in the UMC candidacy track had been cared for, while also giving clarity to those leaving our connection. The board has – and continues – to manage the number of clergy who are seeking to change their

status with the Texas Conference through retirement, withdrawal, and leave of absence. Because no clear timeline exists for clergy wishing to change their status, our tracking and caring for such clergy is an ever-moving target.

Later this month, our executive committee is working, or will be working, in between the regular sessions of Annual Conference to approve status changes. A full report will be presented to the clergy session at our next regular gathering of Annual Conference.

Our board has been in prayer for clergy across the connection. Those who have left and will be leaving and those remaining in the Texas conference. Bishop, this concludes my report.

Bishop Jones: Thank you, Linda. Would you please now offer a prayer for all the clergy of our Annual Conference.

Rev. Linda Christians: Yes. Could I get all the clergy in this room to please stand? Would you extend, those of you who are sitting, if you'll extend your hands toward the nearest clergy towards you and pray with me.

Holy God, we are blessed, so very blessed because of your constant love and your attentive care. And we are blessed because of your faithfulness to us in all circumstances, in all times. God, we are blessed because you know our thoughts and our feelings. You know our needs before we even articulate them or lift them up to you in prayer.

And God, we trust that you meet us right where we are. And right now, in this very place, we are a mix of a wide array of emotions. For the most part, God, you know it is with sadness and grief.

For we know that we will not conference together as one body of clergy united together again. So, God, we ask that you would meet us here in this place, and we ask that you would send your Holy Spirit anew into this very room. Send your Holy Spirit within each and every one of your servants who you have called into vocational ministry.

Encourage our hearts, strengthen our sense of purpose for your mission, inspire us with your vision of a new creation where faith, hope, peace, and love abide.

Oh God, continue your work in all of your clergy. Bless them in all the ways, and as we serve, as we work toward bringing the reign of heaven down to earth.

Bless all of our families and the churches we serve. May all that we do bring glory and honor to you. We pray this in the name of your son Jesus Christ, our risen Lord and savior, and all God's people said, amen.

Bishop, may I – please be seated. I just want to say thank you to Deborah Hawboldt, Bishop, to you, Kip, to you, and to all the conference staff for -- and the executive committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the extended executive committee, and the board for all the support given during this time. Thank you.

Closing Business

Bishop Jones: Thank you, Linda, for that beautiful prayer. Friends, we've dealt with very serious matters today. I want to remind you that we will adjourn in a few minutes and then there will be a 15-minute break. Following that break, you're invited to remain for a worship service entitled A Service of Making Peace and Starting Again, designed by leaders of the group That We May Be One. You're welcome to stay and I encourage you to move toward the front of the sanctuary to fill in the seats that will be left vacant.

My presiding here is bringing to an end my work as your Bishop. It's been a privilege. I have worked with incredible District Superintendents, directors, conference staff, conference committees. I've loved the Texas Annual Conference. As I transition to a new phase of my life, I am going to remember with great gratitude the love, the faithfulness, the sacrificial work of the Texas Annual Conference.

God has used us in some amazing ways these last six years. I'm also realizing that there some of that work that is undone. And so, when Morris Matthis says we are the Texas Annual Conference, that's really true. You all are a great conference.

I wish you the very best. For those churches that are disaffiliating I wish you the best as well. This is a very difficult time, but I'm proud that our conference has handled this with grace, with mutual respect, and with love.

With that, it's been a blessing to be your Bishop. God bless you.

And now let me adjourn this meeting with the benediction I learned in MYF. May the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you. May the Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace.

Opening and Welcome

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: Welcome to this evening's special session of the Texas Annual Conference. I know that many of us have had a full day, so I'm just grateful that you've made time for this important this evening. I'd just like to start with a few words, and then we'll move into the work that is before us this evening.

Today is another heartbreaking day in the Texas Annual Conference. We have grieved the departure of every church that has chosen to leave and today we grieve the disaffiliation of 20 more churches who have chosen to sever their connection with The United Methodist Church and the Texas Annual Conference.

These are not just buildings that we're talking about tonight, but they represent people—people who have given of themselves to the life and work of Jesus. They represent faithful United Methodist laity and clergy who have dedicated themselves to serve God and their neighbor. People were baptized, confirmed, married, and buried in these churches. Lives were celebrated, tears were shed, and lives were transformed. Laughter filled the hallways, the joy of children filled the playgrounds. In these moments, we grieve still and in between our tears we pray—we pray for these churches and their people as they navigate ministry in a new season and I pray for God's blessings upon them and upon us.

But tonight, I'd to take a moment to also thank those churches who have decided to remain United Methodist. I recognize that these are challenging times for you as you recapture a spirit of faithful discipleship and a renewed sense of purpose. I thank God for you and your extraordinary faithfulness to your call and covenant all while leading your churches in a most difficult season. This has been an especially difficult season for the cabinet and staff of the Texas Annual Conference. So I want to thank you, to all who have given so much of yourselves in this process.

Now I realize, also, that there are many of you who may be in search of a new church home. And we have a way for you and those whose churches disaffiliated last December and have yet to find a place to call their place of worship. We are offering you membership into the General Membership of The United Methodist Church, where you can place your membership in this inbetween time until you find a new church home. You can see information about that on your screen right now. You can go to our website at txcumc.org and you can read steps we are offering and a form for you to complete so that we can secure your place in The United Methodist Church. I invite you to do that today and pass the word on to your friends, your family, and neighbors who may still be in search of a church home. We have a place in The United Methodist Church for all who seek to continue to uphold it with their prayers, their presence, presence, their gifts, their service, and their witness. This is also a way for you to reach out to anyone who seeks a place to grow closer to God, those who are still exploring, who still have questions. Let them know that The United Methodist Church is a place where you can ask

questions. It's a place for all of God's children. So I invite you to invite someone else to join you, either on a Sunday morning at a church or why don't you lead them to this website and make sure that they register.

Now In these days I also remind you that there are so many signs of hope in the Texas Annual Conference. I pray that you're going to take notice of that and that you're going to make a phone call or write a note or send a text, just something to encourage a friend.

Friends, this is a new day in the Texas Annual Conference. We're gathering together in just two weeks to revive, to renew, to reinvigorate, and reimagine. We will celebrate all that is happening in the Conference, ordain a new class of elders, license local pastors, we'll commission some folks; we're going to hear about our new faith communities and most importantly we will reclaim, reclaim our connection as United Methodists. I cannot wait to see each of you as together we cast again a future filled with the love of God, love for one another, and the extraordinary hope that comes when the Spirit stirs in our midst.

I cannot wait—I cannot wait—to imagine with you all that God has in store for all of us.

So as these words come to a close, I'm going to share, for all of us, a word of hope, for all of us this day:

My response is to get down on my knees before the Father, this magnificent Father who parcels out all heaven and earth. I ask him to strengthen you by his Spirit—not a brute strength but a glorious inner strength—that Christ will live in you as you open the door and invite him in. And I ask him that with both feet planted firmly on love, you'll be able to take in with all followers of Jesus the extravagant dimensions of Christ's love. Reach out and experience the breadth! Test its lengths! Plumb the depths! Rise to the heights! Live full lives, full in the fullness of God.

God can do anything you know—far more than you could ever guess or imagine or request in your wildest dreams! He does it not by pushing us around but by working within us, his Spirit deeply and gently within us.

So glory to God in the church! Glory to God in the Messiah, in Jesus! Glory to down all generations! Glory through all millennia! Let us say, "Oh yes! Oh yes!" Amen. Amen.

So again I thank you. Thank you for indulging me those moments, and I can't wait to share those kinds of words with you in person in just two weeks. Now friends, all our work I consider worshipful work, but there are rules that guide our conferencing. So I'm now going to call on our Conference Secretary, Trey Burns, that will remind us of what the bar is in this virtual place where we are and will make our opening motion for us. So Trey, if you will lead us through that.

Trey Burns, elder, St. Paul's United Methodist Church: Thank you very much, Bishop and members of the Texas Annual Conference. Section 5.3.F of our Conference Rules and Structures states, "A Session of the Texas Annual Conference may be held by remote communication

technology by means of a conference telephone or an electronic communications system, including videoconferencing technology or the Internet. Remote communication technology may be used only if the system permits each person participating in the meeting to communicate with all other persons participating in the meeting and if voting is to take place at the meeting, reasonable measures must be implemented to verify that every person voting at the meeting by means of remote communication is sufficiently identified and a record must be kept of any vote or other action taken." With this in mind, I move that the bar of the Conference be established as those registered delegates who have been certified by the Assistant to the Bishop's office and are in attendance tonight using the Zoom polling feature, private chat feature, or email vote as outlined by the presiding bishop. Thank you, Bishop Harvey.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Rev. Burns. So I'm going to... the motion is before us, and I'm to invite, I believe Colly you have our poll, that we might take action on this motion.

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: I have that poll, Bishop, I'm ready to launch that when you're ready.

Bishop Harvey: You're not Colly, you're Kip!

Rev. Gilts: I'm not, but I work for her.

Bishop Harvey: If you'll launch that poll. The ballot is now open.

Rev. Gilts: We have more than 95% who have voted, 97% have voted.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, the ballot is now closed and the motion passes. You see the results. Thank you

Board of Trustees—Recommendation Regarding the Disaffiliation of Local Congregations

Bishop Harvey: Now I invite Mark Kidd, who is a member of the Board of Trustees who is filling in for Hal Sharp, the chair, who is unable to be with us today. So Mr. Kidd, if you will walk us through this next portion.

Mark Kidd, laity: Thank you, Bishop. By way of introduction, I'm a lay person...

Rev. Gilts: I'm sorry, Mark, could I get you to go ahead and start your video? We'd like to see you, I know it was disabled earlier and I've enabled it now.

Mark Kidd: How's that?

Rev. Gilts: There you go. Thank you.

Mark Kidd: So by way of introduction, I'm a lay person from Houston, St. Luke's United Methodist Church. It is my privilege to be the secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees and as mentioned I'm filling in for Mr. Hal Sharp, our chair, who is unable to be here tonight. I report

to you on behalf of the entire board. You'll find our report on page 6 of your Pre-Conference Journal.

We are recommending 20 churches for disaffiliation. But first, a word about the process.

As many of you will recall, "The Local Church Disaffiliation in the Texas Conference Outline of Principles and Process" was approved by the Texas Annual Conference in 2020 and is still in effect. They detail what our Conference requires for a local church to be considered for disaffiliation, and they are part of our report, Exhibit A, on page 7 in the Pre-Conference Journal.

All churches before you today met these requirements and each of them have completed a period of discernment to the satisfaction of their District Superintendent. Because Disciplinary paragraph 2548.2 can no longer be used for disaffiliation, each church before you followed Disciplinary paragraph 2553. Working with their District Superintendent, they called a church conference and professing members voted to disaffiliate by at least a 2/3 majority.

By April 21, 2023, church leaders of all 20 of the churches included in our report signed a disaffiliation agreement, an agreement between the Texas Annual Conference and the church seeking disaffiliation. Attached to each of these agreements is a copy of these three documents: First are minutes from their church conference documenting the ballot count and signed by their elected church secretary and the presiding elder. Second, a list of any debts they promise to take with them, and third, a list of properties with property descriptions.

On April 27, the Board of Trustees reviewed their paperwork and agreed that these churches have followed the principles and have met all requirements to be approved for disaffiliation. The Board voted unanimously to recommend these 20 for disaffiliation, pending 100% payment of 2022 and 2023 apportionments. All the churches before you have paid 100% of their 2022 and 2023 conference and district apportionments as of last Friday, May 5.

A spreadsheet listing all 20 churches is included in our report, Exhibit B, on page 8 in the Pre-Conference Journal. I invite you to turn to this page now.

You'll see the churches are listed alphabetically on the spreadsheet: First, by district, then by city name, and then by church name.

Key information from hundreds of pages of agreements have been summarized on this spreadsheet and for your convenience are included in the following: First, the date of each church's disaffiliation church conference, next the fact that each church voted to disaffiliate by at least a 2/3 majority, the total votes, the number of votes for disaffiliation, the number of votes against disaffiliation, the percentage of votes for disaffiliation You'll see that every church completed the required documents by April 21, and that the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to recommend these churches on April 27.

The last two columns include dollar amounts: First is the 2022 General, Jurisdictional, and Conference apportionments paid, and then the 2023 total General, Jurisdictional, and Conference apportionments paid. Again, all churches have paid in full.

We are incredibly sad that these churches have chosen to break connection with us. However, we have confirmed that they have met the requirements for disaffiliation and now are properly before you today. Bishop Harvey, the Texas Annual Conference Board of Trustees moves for approval for disaffiliation of all churches listed in Exhibit B, page 8 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Questions

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you, Mark, for that. I am going to... Now this motion is properly before us, I am also looking at the questions in the Q&A, and I am open for your questions. If you would prefer to ask your question in person, I would ask you to make yourself known in the Q&A, and then after you do, after you are recognized, only then will we give you the floor. So if you could do that, I'll give you a few minutes to digest this a little bit, to go to your Pre-Conference Journal, take a look at those twenty churches and see if you have any further questions.

I know that some of you, by the way, did have some issues getting into the system, so I'm going to make sure—I really don't know what the hiccup was or is—but I will do my best to address it here as we move forward, and I apologize for any problems that you might have had entering into the webinar.

Are there any questions? So, J.T. LaRue, Kip Gilts has tried to answer your question, but Kip, could you answer that live please?

Rev. Gilts: Yeah, thank you, Bishop. I was just on the phone with the District Superintendent who presided over that church conference. He did not have a copy on hand of the resolution that was presented. We will locate that and distribute that as an addendum to this. I regret that, that was our oversight, J.T. He assures me that the resolution was in order, that the ballots were similar to those included, but the ones that we have in the packet are not the ones that were used at the church conference. So we are looking at that as quickly as we can.

Bishop Harvey: But they all follow the same pattern, so there wouldn't be any really distinctively different things in that resolution than in the others, correct?

Rev. Gilts: Correct.

Bishop Harvey: And, then to Jim about the abstentions: actually, technically in *Robert's Rules* we don't have to count abstentions, but a non-vote is really an abstention, and I hope that we can address that, that that's clear for you, and I apologize for not having an abstention button for you. We're going to assume that a non-vote in an abstention.

Are there any other questions? Those of you monitoring the questions, have I missed anything?

Rev. Gilts: I don't know if you want to have Robert or Mark Hellums speak to the unfunded pension liability. There's a couple of questions related to that.

Bishop Harvey: And just so you know, it does not require a second becomes it comes from a committee of the Conference. It does not require a second, Mr. Floyd, who asked the question. So Robert, would you like to address the unfunded pension liability question?

Robert Besser, elder, Interim Conference Treasurer: Yeah. Kip, I'm not sure my video is allowing to come up on the screen. No church... all the unfunded pension liabilities are below what our value is, so that means that we have the reserves already funded for the unfunded portion of the liability, so there's no church that needed to pay the unfunded liability since our reserves cover that.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you for that Robert. I'm looking at T.J. Gabelman's question, "I notice that in the Pre-Conference Journal there are some resolutions that make no reference to ¶2553 as a reason to why they are leaving. Should that be a part of the resolution?" That has been the work of the District Superintendents, so they don't even enter into this conversation or into the process without stating that it based on 2553. We can certainly make sure that that is clarified in the minutes when you receive those from this session.

Mr. Eschelman, you cannot see the questions. The questions are really... we have some folks that are addressing the questions, so I'm going to try to ask the question out loud as we go.

"Deborah Evans is not able to get in and vote so she's listening with me, how will she vote? Linda Humbert." If you could, Linda, there is a way for you to let us know of your vote. You could do one of two things, or actually this is probably the safest way and you will know that your vote will be private: You can email your vote to Colly at cenochs@txcumc.org. Shannon Martin has put that in the chat, I believe, for you. And we will make sure that your vote is cast and that it, in fact, remains private.

Markley Rogers, I am not sure what you are referring to. "Being that we lacked a resolution and that the vote passed the 2/3 majority by one vote, is it appropriate to include them in the vote?" Who's the "them?" If you could but that back in the chat. "Greggton from Longview"—thank you.

"Do these churches have voting rights at the regular session?" The effective date for these disaffiliations is June 31, I think it is, the end of June, so they are eligible to attend the regular session of the Annual Conference.

Are there any other questions, and those of you helping me monitor, have I missed anything?

Ms. Kaiser, I believe your question about unfunded pension amounts was addressed by Robert Besser a few moments ago. If that wasn't a sufficient answer, if you could restate your question and we'll make sure we get back to it.

Sandra Smith, I understand you also are having that issue: remember, you can email your vote to cenochs@txcumc.org and you can east your vote that way.

I want to make sure that we answer all your questions. Are there any others? Kip or Morris, do you see any others that I have missed?

Morris Matthis, elder, Center for Leadership Development and Superintendent of the Central North District: Great job, Bishop, I think they're all covered.

Rev. Gilts: I will say, we've got a couple of people who have a raised hand icon, they've clicked those, again, reminder, that if you want to submit a question or even wish to speak you'll need to submit that through Q&A and then when the bishop recognizes you, that's when you use the raised hand icon. Sometimes that inadvertently done, but just and FYI.

Bishop Harvey: And I'm not sure that I can see your raised hand. Let's see here... "Can pastors that have moved to the GMC attend the Texas Annual Conference?" Pastors who have moved to the GMC, I suppose, could attend the Annual Conference. They would have no voting rights. They could come as observers, and they would have to register as observers.

The question has been called, so we're going to move to the vote. That is non-debatable. So before we take that vote, Mr. Kidd, could you repeat your motion so that we remember what we're voting on?

Rev. Gilts: And Bishop, before we move to Mr. Kidd, so just to be clear about where we're going, are you at a place where you think we've exhausted the conversation at this point, we don't need to vote on the question that's been called? You're moving forward with the vote of the Board of Trustees resolution, is that correct?

Bishop Harvey: That's how I see it, but I think we do need to take a vote on calling the question. So if we could—I'm just making sure that I'm on track here—

Rev. Gilts: I'm going to ask if Colly can create one more question in our poll about the... regarding the call of the question. So if we can have just couple minutes to do that, and while that's happening, I think it would be appropriate for Mark Kidd to restate the motion. But we'll vote first on the question, correct?

Bishop Harvey: Yes, we're going to vote on the question. And I know that we...that it's non-debatable and the question has been called. Calling the question means we end and we go to the vote. That's what "calling the question" means.

We will not... we will not handle any disaffiliations, we will not consider any disaffiliations at Annual Conference this year.

"How is it ethical for churches that we vote on disaffiliation..." Sam Cutrone has asked that question and it's non-debatable and I'm answering your questions just because I want to make sure that your questions are answered. Just so you know I don't have to answer your questions at this point, but I want to make sure that, as we go to vote, we know what we're voting on. So the question is, Sam Cutrone has asked, "How is it ethical for churches that we vote on disaffiliation to participate in the future business of the Annual Conference?" I believe we will leave that up to

each individual person—they don't have to attend Annual Conference and that is really at their discretion.

Are we ready for that poll for calling the question?

Rev. Gilts: We are.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. So if we could put the poll up. Vote yes if you want to go ahead and go to the vote, vote no if you want to continue to ask questions.

Rev. Gilts: We have 86% participating... 90% already, the vote is highly in favor of ending discussion and moving forward.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you.

Rev. Gilts: I'll wait, for you to end the poll before I share them.

Bishop Harvey: And I didn't even launch the poll, so we'll end it.

Rev. Gilts: Oh, did you not launch it? Oh I'm sorry, I launched the poll, you didn't!

Bishop Harvey: That's okay! That's alright, we're all here together. So the poll is now closed and you can see there the responses, and it passes.

So we're going to the vote and I'm going to ask now Mark Kidd to come back and restate the motion.

Mark Kidd: Thank you, Bishop. Let me go back to... The Texas Annual Conference Board of Trustees moves for the approval for disaffiliation of all churches listed on Exhibit B, page 8 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, it is properly before us. Give you a moment to breath, and I'm going to offer a word of prayer before we launch this poll to vote, if you'll allow me.

Gracious God, we come again with heavy hearts but we know that you hold us in the palm of your hand, and we pray for those churches that have chosen to sever their relationship with The United Methodist Church and with the Texas Annual Conference. We just ask you to continue to bless them in their ministry, in their discipleship, in their evangelism, and we know that, again, God, this represents more than just feelings, but this is about people. So we just want to send these your servants forth with our blessing. And be with us who remain in The United Methodist Church. Continue to give us courage and wisdom for the facing of this hour. Stir in our midst, make yourself known to all of us. For all of this we pray in your name. Amen.

So Kip, if we could launch the poll. The poll is now open. The ballot is now open.

Rev. Gilts: We're at 100% of those that have logged on voted.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, so the ballot is now closed. You can see that it has passed, and you see the results. Thank you. Thank you to the Board of Trustees for their hard work. I am praying that we can now maybe turn a page in our work as we all move forward, both those who have decided to separate from The United Methodist Church and those of us who remain.

There's a question: "Just curious, how many are here voting." You know, Renee Teal, I just closed the poll...

Rev. Gilts: We had—I'm sorry, Bishop—we had, we have 502 in attendance, 475 actually cast a vote on that, and so, actually 488 of the 502 cast a vote. From those that voted this is what we have, you can see that on the screen, correct?

Bishop Harvey: I can see it, can everyone else see it?

Rev. Gilts: I think so. 449 in favor, 26... We did have a process set up, Bishop, for those wanted to email, as you mentioned as well as panelists who are not able to vote through this feature and they were able to submit through chat their vote. Those have not been added to this yet, but with that kind of differential I think you can rule on the will of the body.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, thank you. Thank you. Alright my friends, there's another question here: "Will there be any other opportunity for churches to disaffiliate this year or are we done?" 2553 sunsets on December 31, 2023, and should there be a request for additional churches wishing to disaffiliate, we may need to do the same again, but I would have to call a special session at that point and I will do that at the appropriate time, a time that would give us plenty of time to be prepared for that special session. But no special session has yet been called.

"I look forward to our new UMC," says Donna, "moving forward as courageous without the weight..." I'm not going to read the rest. I promised not to disparage, so I appreciate your comment, thank you.

"Will the recording of tonight's session be made generally available?" I'm going to leave that to those of you who are much more technical than I. Will this be recorded and put on the website, or can people go back and visit it?

Rev. Gilts: It is recorded, Bishop, it is your call whether or not that's on our Conference webpage. We do have a webpage for the special session, it can certainly be placed there.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. And also, you will have minutes from this session that are recorded, so you will have those.

And there is hope for tomorrow, hope for tomorrow, bright hope for tomorrow, and for that I give thanks. I'm going to ask now, Kip Gilts, would you be willing to just give us a brief, 30,000 foot view of what's coming in a couple of weeks?

Look Ahead at Regular Session.

Rev. Gilts: I will, Bishop. I know this is a heavy-hearted evening, there's nothing celebratory about this—it's hard for the churches who have left, it's hard for those of us staying, it's difficult—but it's not the end.

Bishop Harvey, we are so grateful to have you back in the Texas Annual Conference with a new first name and new role—our presiding bishop. You bring a breadth of experience and a depth of empathy for a Conference that is much different than when you left ten years ago. Friends, all I have to say about 2023 session of the Texas Annual Conference is that you will want to be present at the Hilton-Americas in downtown Houston from Sunday evening, May 28 to Wednesday noon, May 31. We will be revived by the Holy Spirit, reunited with friends, we'll remember who we are and whose we are. There's a lot of the other "Rs" that we've heard: renewing our connection, reinvigorating in terms of our Conference, reimagining where we're being called to go For more information, you'll go to our webpage, txcumc.org, there's a button right on the top that says "TAC 2023," it'll give you all the information, all the registrations that are there. So I want to welcome you to that. Although this is a very somber evening, that will be a very celebrative gathering, and I'm grateful for it. Thank you, Bishop.

CLOSING PRAYER

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, and thank you for all the work that you have done in this time. You know, it's occurred to me, friends, that this is Morris Mathis's last Annual Conference. He will not be present with us in a couple weeks at the Hilton-Americas because he will literally be biking across America, raising funds for the Fuller Center. He asked me this, I think, the day I arrived, "Can I please be excused so that I can do this race?" So of course I granted that—how can you say "no" to someone who's wanting to raise money for such a great cause? So I said yes and Morris will not be with us, but I just wanted to take this and say thank you to Morris for his love and dedication to The United Methodist Church, especially every place you have, Morris, you have left a giant footprint on the hearts of a lot of people. So I'm just grateful for you, grateful for your ministry, and you're not going to get away with this too easily, we're going to find a way to celebrate you, maybe not this year because you're going to be biking across America, but I think you ought to call in from wherever you are on the trail, on the bike trail, and just check in with us. We'd love to put you on the big screen so you can say "hello" to the Annual Conference, wherever you are if you've got service, we're going to do that.

But I'm thankful and I asked Morris if tonight I would—this is dangerous, I know, when you give Morris Matthis the final word—but I want to give you, Morris Matthis, the final word tonight, to bless us with a prayer and to send us on our way and to know that you are blessed by all the people that know you, have had the privilege of sharing life and work with you, and we're just thankful for you. So I'm just going to let you have the last word.

Rev. Matthis: Amen. Well thank you, Bishop, and I'm humbled at the opportunity just to have a word to share with the Conference, and really humbled by your words—pretty sure I don't deserve it—but I'm grateful for it. And I just want to say how grateful I am to the Annual Conference for all the opportunities I've had to serve, and just the love I have for all of you, and just the deep sense of appreciation for the privilege of doing ministry with you—for those who have been around a long time, you'll know what I mean when I say I'm still aware I'm still no

Leon Matthis—but I'm grateful for all the ways that I've been able to be in ministry with you. And if I can, I'd love to report in during Conference. The ride starts in Georgia and it ends in Maine and it's 1,500 miles, 13 states, and I've dreamed of doing a ride like this for years and I wanted to go ahead and do it this year because who know if I'll be physically able to a year from now. So anyway, thank you again, Bishop and let's have a word of prayer together.

Loving God, I give you thanks for this Conference. For its pastors and leaders. Every member of every church. For their devotion to the gospel and their love for you. Pre-service Announcements

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: Good evening, Texas Annual Conference. It is great to see all of you. I'm Kip Gilts, the Assistant to the Bishop, and I want to give you a few ground rules before we get started in worship, because once we get started in worship, we're not going to stop, okay? First of all, you'll notice we're sitting around tables. These tables are open for everyone. Everyone has a place at the table.

So, find your way around those and I will tell you when we enter into business session tomorrow at three o'clock, then we will need to kind of have that a little more credentialed in there and we'll need to restrict the tables to the voting members of the Annual Conference, but any worship experience we have, these tables are for everyone. So, I want you to feel free to fill them in and gather around. There is going to be some amazing time spent around here.

I want to give you a couple of important announcements, especially for the lay members of our Annual Conference. As you know, a Judicial Council came down a while ago that allows for the election of vacancies in the General Conference delegation. The Texas Annual Conference has two vacancies on the lay side of delegates for General Conference for next April. There will be elections. There are 27 I believe people who have lifted their names up. Debbie Moffett has asked to be taken off that list and has withdrawn her interest in that. But you'll be gathered tomorrow to vote on those at the lay session at ten o'clock. It might be a good time for me to tell the clergy that your session is at eight o'clock... At eight o'clock... that's in the morning.

It wasn't my idea, but I'm going to be here, okay? Some of you know morning is not my best time, but I'm going to be here, I'm going to be excited, it's going to be a good time! But the lay session will be at ten o'clock. And laity, you need make sure that you've checked in and you have your badge there to vote because the tellers are going to need to see that as they distribute the ballots for tomorrow. So, make sure that you've already checked in. Registration is open until 8 but it might be a little too late tonight because worship starts in two minutes. The second thing is that after tonight's worship service, if you go to the southeast corner of this building, across the street is a place called The Rustic. The Texas Annual Conference group, That We May Be One, is sponsoring an evening of meet and greet of those delegates who have lifted their name up for election to General Conference as lay delegates. So, there will be time to meet them after the worship service at The Rustic. So, we wanted to let you know about that.

I think that's all of our announcements as we prepare for Texas Annual Conference 2023. Take full advantage of the next 90 seconds to visit with those around you, because at seven o'clock we get started with Pentecost.

Okay, I was just kidding about saying goodbye! So, if you are commuting and not staying at the hotel, we have parking stickers at our information booth. You're going to want to get that because those parking stickers will reduce your parking costs considerably. They will reduce it to ten dollars. You might think that's a lot but if you don't have the sticker, you find out just how much it could have been. So, make sure you do that. Now with that being said, enjoy the next 15 seconds!

Michael Vaughan, laity, Director of Worship: Good evening, friends, and welcome to the 2023 Texas Annual Conference. My name is Michael Vaughn, I am your director of worship for the conference. This is my tenth conference. And at my first conference I didn't know the song that we're getting ready to sing. I knew the tune, and some of you are here for the first time and you are listening to this song. It sounds like Blessed Be the Tie That Binds. Some of you have probably been here for 40 or 50 years singing this opening song. Every Annual Conference opens with this song And Are We Yet Alive. Will you please stand and join as we all sing together this wonderful hymn by Charles Wesley. Please join.

Worship services and morning devotionals will not be reproduced in the proceedings, with the exception of the Episcopal Address, which served as the sermon for this opening worship service. Episcopal Address

The Episcopal Address followed a reading of Mark 12:28-31.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: Amen. Thank you for the amazing music. Some of these folks were with us this morning at St. John's for Rudy and Juanita Rasmus' last Sunday. They have been working hard all day, so thank you, thank you, thank you.

You have heard it over and over again. "It's all about love"—I'm not the singer—or "all you need is love," or in the immortal words, to answer Tina Turner's question, "what's love got to do with it?" Everything. Everything. Because love is patient. Love is kind. Love is not envious. Love is not boastful, arrogant, or rude. Love does not insist on its own way. It is not irritable. Love keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth. Love bears all things. Believes all things, hopes all things and -- help me here -- love never ends.

And in Mark's Gospel, we hear a command to focus on love. We must love the Lord our God with everything that we've got. And then come these emphatic words: you will love your neighbor as yourself. No other commandment is greater. No other commandment is greater than love of God and love of neighbor.

Friends, tonight we gather as a people commanded—commanded to love. As a people whose primary proclamation is that love became flesh and—as Eugene Peterson says—moved into the neighborhood. Love has moved in tonight, into this place.

Could you feel the love as you walked in? As you saw one another in the lobby, and in the elevator, and you had the opportunity to chat while were you waiting to register? Could you feel the love? And as you settled into your seat, could you take in the breadth of the love that is in this place? Did you feel the love as you heard your voices in harmony together asking one another, "Are we yet alive?" It is because of love in the flesh, right here, right now in this place that we can say that there is revival in this place today.

You know last week this space held people for some ordinary convention or meeting or luncheon, but this week this space has already been made sacred and holy by your presence and the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. This space has been set aside for holy conferencing, for love-made-flesh, for revival. Love-made-flesh in the reality of life, love in the messiness of life, love in the midst of change. For much has changed since you last gathered. There are people missing. People we loved, people that loved us, people we called family. And like family, people we disagreed with, sometimes strongly, sometimes to the point of much anxiety and tension. Frankly, I hope that a little of that tension is gone.

My prayer is that animosity is gone, and it's been replaced with understanding and harmony. I pray that fear is gone, and that it's been replaced by an undaunted Pentecost-like, Holy Spiritinfused courage. I pray that the Spirit of God in this place permeates every fiber of our being, of our being together. I pray that the Spirit helps us reclaim our connection, our identity, our love for one another and for the world. You know, revival is possible because the Spirit is stirring in us. Right in this moment, in this place, revival is possible because the primary manifestation of the Spirit's outpouring is love. All things hinge on love. Love of God, love of neighbor, love of one another, nothing—nothing is greater.

This week we will focus on our future together. Yes, we lament the past: the difficult meetings, the profoundly difficult questions, the agonizing votes, the sense of betrayal—overwhelming at times—the toxic and manipulative misinformation, the moments when we were utterly numb with pain. Friends, I've heard you, I continue to hear you, and I acknowledge and intimately share in that pain with you.

We must not forget it, and... and let's take what we have learned, leverage it. And let's square our shoulders to a future that's filled with possibility, a future that has already been laid out for us, a future rooted in our revived, love-filled spirit as God's people. A future rooted in love known in every corner of the places that we get to live, that we get to work, and that we get to play. And because of that spirit, we can face the future unafraid. Because, as we know, best of all, God is with us.

So, I've got a couple of questions for you. Are you in?

Congregation: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Are you game?

Congregation: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Are you ready?

Congregation: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: So, let us focus on what we're for, not what we're against. I'll say that again. Let us focus on what we're for, not what we are against.

Let us prepare for the sacred surprises of the Spirit. Now if I'm going to be real, I have to stop here for a minute. Because the reality is those of you who know me, family, know that I don't really lean into surprises very much. I really don't like surprises. I always say that the best surprise is no surprise. I like a good plan, a solid itinerary, a good map. But sacred surprises—y'all, that's a whole different ball game! I've come to realize that sacred surprises—surprises that are infused with the Holy Spirit—are a holy exception.

Because unlike worldly surprises that bring uncertainty and anxiety, sacred surprises carry the profound assurance of divine guidance and love. Because these surprises, they're guided by the Holy Spirit. They are filled with purpose, with meaning, and a whole new sense of call. They lead to transformation. Sometimes not quite the transformation that we were anticipating, but transformation, nonetheless. So, I welcome sacred surprises, and frankly, in this place, this week, I expect them. I expect them.

They are opportunities for spiritual awakening, alignment, abundant blessings, there are opportunities for revival. So let us prepare for revival. Let us take our lead from the small group of 25 persons in Chester, Texas. They organized themselves. They elected their officers. They registered with the Secretary of State. They opened a bank account. They found a place to worship, and then they lined up pastors to preach. Then they realized, "Oh, we might need a pastor semi-permanent," so they reached out to a retired pastor not far, and then pulled him out of retirement, and frankly, out of a major health crisis. And they named themselves Hope United Methodist Church.

Hope United Methodist Church. This small but mighty group of 25 have been meeting Sunday after Sunday and on one Sunday, not long ago, they gifted the Conference with a check for \$1,500 for a Bishop's Initiative and challenged other churches that if the smallest church in the conference could give \$1,500, so could other churches. So, they challenged everybody. So, I'm happy to report to you tonight that individuals and churches have risen to the challenge. And that \$1,500 has been multiplied over and over again and is now a tad over \$160,000.

I call that a sacred surprise. And it is how a movement starts, 25 people. Oh, how love works. How hope emerges. 25 people are truly living up to their name: Hope United Methodist Church. And by the way, there is still room for more sacred surprises in that challenge.

On that same day that I was in Chester, Rev. Kip Gilts was in Jasper. He was there to charter the faithful, who again, led by laity said, "Heck, no, we won't go, we love this church too much." And they found a pastor—again, pulled somebody out of retirement who had also had some very difficult health challenges. They opened a sizable bank account, found a place to worship, and is now Church of the Pines United Methodist Church in Jasper, Texas. 67 people joined the church that day, and they are making a difference in their community.

A few weeks before that, I was in Baytown, and received—hear this—115 persons into the general membership of the Conference. We will hold that membership and once the church charters, those members will transfer to the new church.

Last week, we chartered Mosaic United Methodist Church. Mosaic was the first of the new faith communities in this time period. From day one they have averaged 240 people in worship—averaged 240 people in worship. They've taken the broken pieces and they shaped a beautiful mosaic. Y'all, it was a glorious day. I cannot even begin to tell you what it feels like—it's like Holy Spirit kind of feeling when 246 persons stood to join the church. It was Pentecost all over again.

There is a group in Conroe who—led, again, by a lay person—established Water's Edge. There is a group in Bryan/College Station, they call themselves Bryan Community Church and continues to shape a new worshiping community. Fairview opened their doors to the diaspora from the Tyler area almost immediately after all the disaffiliations and a new African American faith community is now gathering, capturing the displaced from the 288 corridor and beyond, and they will have their first public worship service this coming Sunday. There is a flurry of activity up in Henderson, aided by the leaders of First United Methodist Church in Longview. St. Matthew in Jacksonville has captured a willing and faithful group of United Methodists, and they are meeting in this beautiful little chapel just outside of Jacksonville, so imagine—just hear this name and you'll imagine the chapel: the Chapel at Teaberry Farm. They are a small yet committed group of United Methodists. Redwater in the Texarkana area is feeling the love, too, and the Spirit is moving to shape a new faith community there. Friends, there is a lot of love happening all around our Conference, and there is a revival going on, and we are in a season, truly, of Pentecost.

Many of you have opened your doors and your heart to those who suddenly found themselves without a church home. And I'm so thankful for you. You've provided a safe and welcoming space for deeply connected United Methodists who have needed to find solace and support. With your unwavering commitment to being the church and exemplifying the love of neighbor fills my heart with deep, deep, deep gratitude. This is what I like to call sacred hospitality. And it continues to make a tangible difference in the lives of those in the Texas Conference. Friends, you're being the church. You're being the church. So, thank you. Thank you for loving your neighbor.

So, love, love, love, love of God, and love of one another... You know what's happened in the last year has been terrible. It's broken my heart and I know it has broken yours. And yet, we've learned a lot about ourselves, about each other, and about our life together. We've learned that all

things work together for good. Sometimes we can't see it, but we do know that best of all God is with us.

Now, Adam Bucko has been a committed voice in the movement for renewal of the Christian contemplative spirituality community. In his book, *Let Your Heartbreak Be Your Guide*, he says this:

God has invited each and every one of us to the great feast that can be our life. It is a feast where joy overshadows our normal worries and pains, and where the smallness of our lives is transformed into the largeness of God's dream. It is a feast where each of us has a place to sit, eat, drink, talk, and even dance—and where our wounds are transformed into gifts. It's a feast that changes us into the likeness of Christ, God's very heart. And where our lives begin to echo the holy energies of God's compassion, which our world needs so much right now.

My friends, we have a feast before us, where the largeness of God's dream is happening in real time. It's a feast where everyone has a place to sit, to eat, to drink, to talk, and even dance.

So, I remind you that God is the God of reversals. Dark turns to light, night today. The lame walk. The blind see. The wounded are made whole. The hungry are fed. The thirsty find drink. Y'all, that's our work. Let's not let fear get in the way. Let's not let fear guide us. Let's allow the Spirit of love to lead us into an uncertain yet hopeful future. We have a choice to make. And I sure hope we choose hope. Because in God's immeasurable imagination, God sees hope right here, right now in the Texas Annual Conference.

It is time. It is time for us to reclaim who we are as United Methodists. Revive our identity and renew our connection.

I've held on to this piece of paper, and I wasn't sure why, but tonight I know why. It's a piece of paper with these words from a group called Ma Muse. They are a folk group that uses their music to bring spiritual uplift and healing and blessing. I want you to hear these words:

We shall be known by the company we keep, by the ones who circle 'round to tend these fires.

We shall be known by the ones who sow and reap seeds of change alive from deep within the earth.

It is time now

It is time now that we thrive

It is time we lead ourselves into the well

It is time now and what a time to be alive

In this great turning we shall learn to lead in love

In this great turning we shall learn to lead in love.

In this great turning we shall learn to lead in love.

In this great turning we shall learn to lead in love

The time is now. The time is now to lead in love.

So, what if—what if we said we welcome everyone, not just any kind of welcome, but we welcome with a love that welcomes everyone. What if our mission included a love that births communities into being that then make disciples for the transformation of the world. What if we set love in motion in a way that fuels our praying, our dreaming, and our imagining for revival. What about a love that leads us into a more loving and kinder future, a future where we do less harm to one another, a future where we do less harm to our witness for the kingdom of God.

Friends, we're in this thin place right now, where heaven and earth are almost touching. We are at a place where we can revive the church through relationship, through connection, one to the other.

There are no forsaken places. There are no forsaken places. There are people and places all around us that need to know the love of Jesus. Let us not squander this opportunity. We're at a critical juncture, and Father Rohr reminds us that the word for liminal in Latin means threshold. When we stand in a threshold we are betwixt and between, we are in transition, we are in the process of leaving one room, but not yet having quite left the other. And these kinds of transitions are always, always both/and. There is fluidity in these kinds of transitions. There is messiness in these transitions, and there must be resilience in these kinds of transitions.

For there are new frontiers ahead—some may be familiar while others... yeah, are yet to be discovered.

Liminal space, Rohr says, allows for vulnerability and openness as we wait for something new to happen. Something new to emerge. We don't -- we typically like to avoid these spaces. We don't like them much. But much of our work is to get ourselves and others to this place and stay a while. Long enough to learn something—Rohr says something essential, something new. This is where transformation happens. And as uncomfortable as it is, this is the place that propels us to our next "next." So, I want you to just put your listening ears—as your first grade teachers always reminded us—put your listening ears on for just a minute. I want you to hear the wisdom of Rohr:

Christ isn't showing up to see our perfect selves. Instead, we are invited into a real, deep, transformative conversation, there on the threshold between who we are and who we can become, if we are willing to let go of what holds us back.

Often our scarcity mindset, our fear, our sadness causes us to think of all the things that we lack to help us move forward, to help us live into the promise. Can we let go of this mindset, and let God make something of us—and this conference—that eyes have never seen, and ears have never heard? Can we simply love? Can we embrace the sacred surprises of the Spirit? I'm so ready. The landscape is very different and will continue to be different as we take the next faithful step.

And while I would love to catapult or do the *I Dream of Jeannie* thing and blink us into the future, I remind myself that all we can do is take the next faithful step. The next faithful step might actually be to sit and listen and not take a step at all.

One of the most important things that we can do is listen for one another's deepest yearnings, and the yearnings of the people we have the privilege of leading. It's okay not to have all the answers, to not have it all figured out. And it's even okay to admit that we could be wrong. We don't have to pretend to have our stuff together. We're all broken. We're all people in search of something bigger than us. We're people longing for peace, not like the Miss America world peace kind of peace, but peace, shalom, completeness, healing, peace in our world, peace in our families, peace in our churches. Peace.

And by the power of the Holy Spirit, I am more than certain that together we will guide the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church to a new future that is filled with hope and promise and new possibilities that we cannot even begin to fathom. For though smaller, our vision is big. Our reliance on the movement of the Spirit is huge. And I pray that our love for one another is greater than it's ever been.

We have an opportunity here to create a renewed sense of unity in this Conference, and in our churches, and in our United Methodist connection. We have a remarkable opportunity to write a new story, craft a fresh and vibrant narrative, that redefines the essence of being connected, of being in covenant, of being The United Methodist Church.

So let us embrace these awe-inspiring and transformative sacred surprises that the Spirit has in store for us. Together... together we can embrace the exhilarating adventure of shaping the United Methodist community that radiates hope, inclusivity, and boundless love.

Let's set the tone for the rest of the connection. Let's model what it means to be a United Methodist. Let's set a table that is large enough for everyone. Don't live into the narrative that says there is no room for those with differing thoughts, opinions, or interpretations. And instead... instead let's use our energy to make room. Let's use our energy to make something of this moment, something holy, something sacred that's a catalyst for change. Let us base every decision we make on love. We don't have to understand. We don't have to agree. We just have to love one another.

And it's going to require not just us here in this room, but all who are in our churches, because the mission of the church is to be carried out by everyone who is called to discipleship,—says the Our Theological Task in the *United Methodist Book of Discipline*. To be persons of faith is to hunger and to understand the truth given to us by Jesus Christ. And we cannot do this in isolation. It must be done in communion, in conversation, and in love.

We have spent way too long in this quagmire. It is time for us to return to the basics of our calling. We are called to lead people to Jesus. There are people who have been shut out by the church, made to feel less than, not good enough, because they don't look like us, they don't talk like us, they're not the same color as us, they don't smell like us, nor do they love to like us. They've not been given a place at our tables. This must stop. Enough is enough. Let us beg for forgiveness, turn from our ways, and live the life that was intended for us. When we love like Jesus loves, there is always room -- there is always enough love to go around.

People are watching us. People are watching the Texas Annual Conference. They always have. This time, they're watching to see how we recover. They are watching to see how we treat each other. How we encourage one another, how we love each other, and how we love our neighbor.

So, friends, let's make sure that hungry children are fed, are safe, educated, and cared for. Let's care for those suffering from mental illness, addiction, homelessness, a broken immigration system and make sure they find help in our United Methodist churches. Let's be bold and courageous like never before as we address racism, climate justice, social justice. Let's help disaster survivors rebuild their homes, their lives, and their communities. Let's give people something to really talk about.

With grit, determination, love, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, let's outdo one another in uniting this Conference and The United Methodist Church and our work for justice and full inclusion. Inclusion means inclusion. It means everyone. Everyone. And, yes, inclusion includes LGBTQ persons, and... and it includes everyone. Inclusion means inclusion. Traditionalists and progressives, left and right, black, brown, Asian, native, and white, gay and straight, rich and poor, this is not an either/or connection. It never has been. It's a yes/and connection. And some would say it even includes Longhorns and Aggies.

We are a connectional church. We need one another. We're not just a denomination. We're a connection that ought never be severed.

My friend Dr. Ashley Boggan from the United Methodist Archives and History is with us tonight. She'll be with the clergy tomorrow morning and on a panel with the laity, but I was recently at the United Methodist Archives at Drew and while some might think of the Archives as a bunch of old papers and dusty books, I had a holy and sacred experience as I wandered the six miles of stacks that reminded me of our connection. Six miles of stacks.

So, as I was walking, I found a box of photos from UMCOR, with the date from when I was at UMCOR. On the shelf next to it, or not far from it, were Bishop McKendree's papers. And as I held letters written by John Wesley, and Francis Asbury's unfinished sermon prepared for the 1816 general conference which he was never able to deliver because he died just 14 miles from the site of the conference... in that moment, I learned that we're all a vital part of something and someone else.

So, I did a little experiment. I decided to use ChatGPT. You know what that is? It's an artificial intelligence app, and I asked Chat GPT to write a poem about the spirit of United Methodist connectionalism. Ashley, you can put this in the archives. Here is what the AI wrote:

The United Methodist connection, a network of faith and love, bound together in devotion to the grace of God above.

From cities to rural towns, from shores to mountain peaks, the connection spans the earth, a web of faith that never sleeps.

Each heart a vital part in the body of Christ we share, a family of diverse souls with a common bond of prayer.

We strive to live with open hearts, to serve and love our neighbors near, to offer hope and healing light and conquer hate and fear.

The United Methodist connection, a vibrant force for good, uniting hearts and hands and minds in a mission understood.

So let us go and spread the love that Christ has given to us all and build a world of peace and hope where every heart can stand tall.

Hmm... friends, even the robots know the importance of our connection. Faith and love bound together in devotion, a web of faith that never sleeps, a family of diverse souls with a common bond of prayer. We love our neighbors. We conquer hate and fear. We are a force for good, building a world of peace and hope.

So here is how I see it: we have some decisions to make. We have some decisions to make. We can stay here, or we can revive, renew, reinvigorate, and reimagine a new way to be church. A new way to do church. A new way to love.

All things are possible through God who gives us strength and courage and boldness and vision. All the things we need when we need it most. Everything we need is right here in this room.

So, my prayer has been that in these three days we can make a shift—we can pivot, to borrow a word from my good friend Bishop Tom Bickerton—and these three days, we can experience one another anew. We can experience the stirring of the Spirit anew. We can be revived, renewed, reinvigorated and together—together we can reimagine a new future. A future that's filled with the hope that the gospel is proclaimed and lived out through love of God and love of neighbor. No other commandment is greater than this.

So, I remind you of these words from Let Your Heartbreak Be Your Guide from earlier, which I've adapted and I offer it as a prayer for us tonight, as we prepare to come to the table.

Let us pray: God, you invited each and every one of us to the great feast that can be our life. You tell us, oh God, that it is a feast where joy overshadows our normal worries and pains, and where the smallness of our lives is transformed into the largeness of your dream. So, thank you, God, for reminding us that this feast that we call life is a feast where each of us has a place to sit, a place to eat, a place to drink, a place to talk, and a place to even dance. and where our wounds are transformed into gifts. Help us, help us to set our tables for the feast that is before us as the Texas Annual Conference. A feast that will change us more into you, where our lives will begin to echo the holy energies of your compassion, which our world needs so much right now. Amen and amen.

Following the Episcopal Address, the Conference joined together in Holy Communion, Bishops Bickerton and Harvey leading the congregation in the liturgy.

Clergy Session

Monday, May 29, 8:00 A.M.

The clergy members of the Conference met in closed executive session. The results of this session can be found in the Business of the Annual Conference report, which forms Section G of this Journal.

Laity Session

Monday, May 29, 10:00 A.M.

The lay members of the Conference met in open session, in part to elect two delegates to fill vacancies in the General Conference delegation. In between ballots, the session heard from a panel of United Methodist leaders, composed of Bishop Harvey, Bishop Tom Bickerton, Dr. Ashley Boggan, Roland Fernandes, and John Esquivel. These minutes do note reproduce the portions of the session devoted solely to the panel discussion. The laity session was called to order at 10:00 a.m.

John Esquivel, laity, Conference Lay Leader: I see that it is ten o'clock. So let me first, again, welcome you to the laity session of the Texas Annual Conference. And please join me in prayer.

Lord, we give thanks and praise for the blessings of this day. We give you thanks for all the communities of faith that are represented in the Texas Annual Conference. May we be good stewards of what you have entrusted to us. Let us be revived, renewed, reinvigorated, and let us reimagine how can we be in service to you, dear Lord. Be with us, these next several days. Guide us. Let us feel your Holy Spirit. And on this Memorial Day, may we remember and give thanks for those that have given their lives in service to our country. O God, you yourself have taught us that no love is greater than that which gives itself for another. These honored dead gave the most precious gift they have, life itself. For loved ones and neighbors, for this country, and for us. Help us to honor their memory by caring for the family members that have been left behind, by ensuring that their wounded comrades are properly cared for, and by being watchful caretakers of the freedoms for which they have given their lives. Though names may fade with the passing of generations, may we never forget what they have done. Help us to be worthy of their sacrifice. O God, help us to be worthy. In your name we pray. Amen.

Well, thank you. This laity session is different. You're at chairs and we will be having a panel discussion as previously announced on connectionalism. What is it? How does impact the local church? What changes do we see in the future? And how can it help unify and strengthen us as a denomination?

Also, you know that we will be electing two delegates to general conference. So, we'll be having some discussion up here, take a ballot. Let the proctors take—to tally the votes, but we'll be

weaving that in and out. So that's why I encourage you to take out that pen or pencil and hopefully you have previously reviewed those that have put their name forward for consideration as delegates to the General Conference.

Bishop Harvey will preside over the election of those delegates. And I'm looking for Lance—I assume you're ready to pass out those ballots. But let me turn this over to Bishop Harvey.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: I see folks standing in the back of the room. If there are clergy, maybe sit over here in the wings. And if there is a seat next to you, raise your hand and we'll expand the tables if you need a seat. If there is somebody who wants to come sit over here with my spouse and my daughter, they will—I'm sure they'll make a space for you at the table. They are really nice people.

Are we handing out the ballots yet? So, in a moment, we're going to hand out the ballots. And while you all are handing out the ballots, John is going to introduce the panel so that we can use our time wisely here. You have 27 people to vote for so that is quite a few, and we're going try to make this as swiftly as possible, so I don't want to rush you, so we're going to move swiftly, but not rush. I think we can do that.

So, if I now will open the voting, if you would pass out the ballots and I'll turn it to John.

John Esquivel: Thank you, Bishop. And as the ballots are being handed out, I'd like to introduce the panel that we've assembled for discussion on connectionalism.

John Esquivel introduced the panel members while ballots were passed out. Following this, Bishop Harvey opened the first ballot.

Bishop Harvey: So, I'm going to declare that this ballot is now open. If you will vote now and then once you have voted, if you will hold -- you are voting for two persons. You are voting for two persons. Once you have completed that, hold your ballot. Take the first question while collecting those. We'll take the first question as the ballots are being collected. Once they have been tallied and we have the results of that, we'll find and appropriate time to pause during our discussion.

The first ballot was declared open at 10:12 a.m. A panel discussion ensued.

At 10:57 a.m., John Esquivel checked to see if the results of the first ballot were ready. *John Esquivel*: Amen. Let's see, do we have the results? I'm going to pause in this question and allow Bishop Harvey to preside over the election.

Bishop Harvey: There is no election. And here are the results on the screen. There were 430 valid ballots. 216 needed to elect. And you can see the list here:

Bishop Harvey: We had about five ballots that did not have enough votes or too many votes. There were several invalid ballots. Either you didn't vote for enough people or you voted for too many people. So, remember we were voting for two persons. Not one, not three -- two. So how do you want to proceed?

John Esquivel: Bishop, may I move that—well, first of all, I want to thank everyone who has put their name up for consideration as a delegate. We have 26 I believe there. Bishop, if I may move that we consider half of those in the next ballot. Again, thankful for everyone who has put their name up, but to move to be able to move forward efficiently -- and I'll also note that it won't be long before we will be electing delegates for future conference.

Bishop Harvey: So, your motion is to how many? What do you want to put on the ballot?

John Esquivel: Half that number.

Bishop Harvey: Half the number which would be the...

John Esquivel: The left column [of the results as shown on the conference screens].

Bishop Harvey: There is more.

John Esquivel: I'm sorry. Maybe the top ten.

Bishop Harvey: So, there is a motion. Is there a second?

Mark Hager, laity, Central South District: Second.

Bishop Harvey: What's your motion again, John

John Esquivel: That the voting would be limited to the top ten recipients.

Bishop Harvey: So, if you are in favor of limiting the election results to the top 10, so if you would give us the top ten now, right, Stacy Stepler? if you would agree to that, raise your hand. Is there anybody opposed? So, there is only going to be on the ballot -- they don't have ballots yet.

John Esquivel: They will be distributing.

Bishop Harvey: You're going to vote for two persons.

John Esquivel: The ballots will be ready to be passed out.

Bishop Harvey: They are ready to be passed out. As soon as you receive your ballot, the ballot is open. We're going to do this in one fell swoop.

The second ballot was declared open at 11:00 a.m.

John Esquivel: And again, I give thanks to everyone who put their name forward and as I said in the not too distant future, there will be further opportunities and I encourage you to continue having your interest in serving the church in that manner.

Bishop Harvey: These are the ten people that will be on your ballot. This is going to get much more complicated. So please we'll leave these on the screen. You're going to be voting for two people from this group that's on the screen. Are we clear? So, if they are not on the screen, don't check their name. And we're going to leave this up until I close the ballot. If you've voted, hold your paper up.

John Esquivel: Bishop, I believe I overheard there is a question.

Bishop Harvey: Yes, sir?

Unidentifiable speaker: [INAUDIBLE].

Bishop Harvey: We will just keep going until we have two. Take the top ten each time and vote for two. Or one or maybe elect somebody. Does that help? Is that clear? Okay.

Unidentifiable speaker: [INAUDIBLE].

Bishop Harvey: We've got it. I think you'll vote for these—from this group you'll vote for two. And we'll always go with the top ten.

Panel discussion ensued.

Bishop Harvey: I don't want to interrupt, but the ballot is now closed. If for whatever reason you're still holding on to a ballot, why don't you stand up. Ballot is now closed.

The second ballot was declared closed at 11:04 a.m.

Panel discussion ensued.

The results of the second ballot were reported at 11:26 a.m.

Bishop Harvey: We have no election. Just stand by. We have no election. And I think we've got the results to go on the screen. Getting closer. There were 449 valid ballots. We need 225 to elect.

Bill Avera, laity, St, Matthew UMC Jacksonville: Bill Avera, St. Matthew Jacksonville. I would like to move that we go to the top 5 vote getters.

Bishop Harvey: Is there a second? Ok. All of those in favor raise your hand. Anyone opposed? Okay so you'll vote for the top five. There they are. If you had already voted and you voted for somebody in that second column, stand up and ask for another ballot, okay?

All right, your ballot is open. Raise your hand... Raise your ballot and we will receive it. No pressure, but lunch is at 11:45.

John Esquivel: Bishop, just as a reminder, I believe that if anyone votes for—on their ballot—for someone who is not on that list, that would be invalid.

Bishop Harvey: It would be invalid. Right. That's why I said, if you had already voted and voted for somebody in another column, stand up and get another ballot, we'll let you, so that we don't count your ballot invalid.

John Esquivel: And while those are being collected, I believe if there are any further questions from the laity regarding our panel discussion...

Panel discussion ensued.

Bishop Harvey: Let me just say—a technicality, but I have to say this: The ballot is now closed.

The third ballot was closed at 11:34 a.m.

Panel discussion ensued.

The results of the third ballot were reported at 11:46 a.m.

Bishop Harvey: Well, you've probably already figured out because all the tellers have gone.

John Esquivel: The Vatican has a puff of smoke now.

Bishop Harvey: We have two elections. You did it.

For those who have purchased tickets, the laity luncheon will start at noon which is on the second floor of the hotel in Ballroom of the Americas D and E. If you go out down the escalators, the room will be there. The luncheon is sold out, so we will not have any tickets there. But after our lunch break, the Conference will reconvene at 1:30 with a memorial service. And Bishop Harvey, would you close us with a blessing? If Bishop will close us with a blessing.

Bishop Harvey: Gracious God, for these your servants I give thanks. I give thanks for their willing spirit and their willingness to give of themselves to the work of your kingdom. I just ask you to continue to bless and guide them in all that they do as they lead our churches into a new future. And we will give you all praise and all glory for all things. Amen.

John Esquivel: Amen.

The Conference was called to order at 3:04 p.m.

Opening and Welcome

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: Friends, if I could invite you to take your seats. We've got a full rest of the afternoon and I know there are dinners that are planned. So, I want to make sure that I can get you to your dinner on time. So, thank you, thank you for already what is the start of a fantastic Annual Conference. I do have to tell you... you want me to switch? Okay, great. If I could ask those of you speaking this afternoon, I'm just going to put you on deck as they say in baseball. Hey, Kip, I just used a baseball metaphor.

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: Nice.

Bishop Harvey: So, if I could get you to be close by and just be ready to come up. I think I need to clear something up. As we were talking last night as a family, my daughter says you probably ought to explain something about your eye. And I want to tell you that you might be thinking that Kip Gilts socked me in the face because I had him go to a meeting at 7:15 this morning. Or I used a bad baseball metaphor. But on Tuesday in God's—I don't know, timing, I don't know. I don't think this was God's timing—I woke up with a stye in my eye. And I don't know if you have ever had one of those, it's just more annoying. This is a first world problem and not a big deal, but it is annoying at best. So, I feel like I look like Quasimodo, that cartoon character. And I've tried—if you've got something other than wash your eye out with baby shampoo, chamomile tea bags, black tea, hot compresses, cold compresses—if you have anything other than that, let me know, but I've tried all of those already and it still looks like this. I have been told that sleep and less stress would help. I retire in 2028. So, I will hold off for less stress and sleep by then.

Bishop Thomas Bickerton: Can I just say you look marvelous.

Bishop Harvey: Oh, yeah, thank you. Thank you. You're sweet. That's why you are here. Anyway, greetings to all of you and if you could just fill in the tables. We've set the bar here—we'll just let you then, Trey, kind of take over from here. Just get us started.

Organizing Business

Trey Burns, elder, St. Paul's UMC Houston & Conference Secretary: Good afternoon, Bishop and members of the Texas Annual Conference. I rise to bring three matters of organizing business. Our organizing business allows conference perhaps to be a little bit less stressful so we'll do our best to help you out there, Bishop.

Our first organizing motion is the establishment of the roll of the conference. Having an official roll allows us to know who is permitted to speak on matters during debate and vote during the conference. The proposed roll of the 2023 regular session of the Texas Annual Conference is composed of all clergy members of the Texas Annual Conference, all duly elected lay members from charges and districts, and all lay members granted ex-officio membership by Article I,

section 6 of the Constitution of the United Methodist Church—all of those who receive their credentials and are properly identified through the badges at check in.

Our second organizing motion is the establishment of bar of the conference. Having a bar for the conference provides a clear rule for where debate and voting may occur with the expectation that during business sessions, only voting members will be inside the bar. The proposed bar for the conference is all of the area in the ballroom containing tables as well as this raised dais.

So, to clarify, the sections of chairs and rows along the sides of the room are not within the bar of the conference. If you are a voting member of this conference, and wish to vote or speak, we ask that you move to a table further in towards the middle. If you are not a voting member of the Annual Conference, we ask that you move from the tables to the sections on the side around the room.

Our final matter is to elect assistant secretaries who will assist me over the course of our sessions. This year I have lifted up four persons to serve as assistant secretaries so they can rotate throughout the week so they can continue to participate in discussions and table fellowship during the Conference.

I lift up as assistant secretaries Rev. Johnnie Simpson, Jr, pastor of Faith United Methodist Church in Dickinson, Rev. Jordan Czichos, appointed to St. Luke's UMC, Houston and Houston ReVision, Rev. Markley Rogers, associate pastor at Clear Lake United Methodist Church, and Ms. Colleen Russell, at-large delegate from the North District and member of Williams Memorial United Methodist Church in Texarkana. Bishop I move the adoption of our organizing business as presented.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, thank you Trey, for that. So, I hope that's clear for all of you. If you are a voting delegate, you need to be at a table. If you are an observer you need to be in a chair and if you're in the wrong spot we'll give you some time here to switch places. This is properly before you. So, if you accept the three items that Trey has brought forward, if you would, raise your hand. If anyone is opposed, raise your hand. Thank you. Thank you so much.

Now I'm going to ask chaplain Rev. Michael McVey, if you would come forward and open us in a word of prayer. Thank you so much for your service. Appreciate you. Thank you.

Memorial Day Observance

Michael McVey, elder, Fairfield UMC: Good afternoon, brothers and sisters of the Texas Annual Conference. I would like to thank you for allowing me to speak and pray with you today regarding the significant fact that it is indeed Memorial Day. This is a day in which we honor and mourn the United States military personnel who have died while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

The first national observance of Memorial Day occurred on May 30th, 1868. Then known as Decoration Day, the holiday was proclaimed to honor the Union soldiers who had died in the American Civil War. Today it now encompasses all those who have passed in our nation's military and to date over 1,354,664 men and women have lost their lives in our nation's wars.

All of us who work in parish ministry have veterans and service members within our congregations. And unfortunately, they are often overlooked. Sure, we recognize them on certain days of the year. We casually say thank you for your service, but in truth, we often regard them in passing. Some of these are men and women who feel isolated from a society that they believe cannot understand what they have been through or experienced in the service to our country or in combat, or that others are unwilling to try and understand and minister to them.

I have seen firsthand the results of this isolation. In my first six months, serving with the U.S. Coast Guard on the individual base in Galveston, I was called upon to directly care in the aftermath of two suicides and two suicide attempts. This is a real and present danger that I have seen and witnessed firsthand. More than 20 veterans die by their own hand each day, and that number is going up.

It is not enough that we stand and honor our veterans or give them special days or kind words. It is our country that sent them to war, to face evils so that we may not be subjected to them. It is then the church's job to embrace, assist, listen, and love them and their families when they return.

We as pastors, churches, and Methodists must be willing to stop this rising suicide rate. Our veterans stood on the front lines of combat and the horrors of battle alone. Let us as Christians stand alongside them in the frontline battle of mental and spiritual health, to remind them they are never alone. The church, and more importantly, Christ Jesus are always by their sides.

John 15:13 states: Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends. Our veterans laid down their lives for us, brothers and sisters, and on this Memorial Day, let us show them who laid down his life for them, Christ Jesus.

Let us pray: Oh, merciful God, creator of all things, we come before you today humbly and with reverent hearts. On this day we acknowledge the men and women of our military who have gone on to your glorious kingdom. We regret to say that their sacrifices and loss are a result of our inability as humans to resolve our conflicts with peace or coexist with your creation without conflict. Forgive us, we pray, and let us embody the words of peace and love of your Son, Jesus. May you comfort the families of those who mourn this day, be with the widow and the orphan. Speak your voice of comfort and solitude to those veterans and personnel who are struggling with the aftermath of war and trauma. Mobilize your church, Almighty God, that we may be your forces of perfect love and care within the veteran community. Let our churches be beacons upon hills, guiding these wayward vessels of humanity home to safe harbor. May we as Methodists do no harm through ignorance of neglect of our veterans and seek to heal the harm done unto others through the ministry of the gospel. We thank you that through the sure and certain knowledge of your resurrection that there will be a day of no war and infinite peace, but until that day, may our churches be those glimpses of divine peace, that others may experience and heal. We thank you and praise you, Christ Jesus, ultimate defender, healer, and protector, and divine Savior of all peoples. Amen.

Recognitions for Excellence in Christian Education Ministry

Bishop Harvey: I'm going to now invite Deborah Vaughn, who is representing the Committee on Episcopacy, and while she's coming up, I want to let you know that the Christian Educator Fellowship Group met today and they recognized four churches for excellence in Christian education ministry: Wildwood United Methodist Church, Chapelwood (Houston) United Methodist Church, St. Stephens United Methodist Church, and A&M United Methodist Church. And they also honored Ms. Juanita Jackson, recipient of the Dick Murray Award for Christian Education. So, congratulations to all of these churches as well as to Juanita Jackson. I say the name Dick Murray and I see smiles across some of us who remember Dick Murray. So, Dr. Vaughn.

Report of the Committee on Episcopacy

Deborah Vaughn, elder, Abiding Faith UMC, Houston: Greetings, sisters and brothers of the Texas Annual Conference. I have the privilege of serving as the Chair of the Committee on Episcopacy. Our report is found on Page 174 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

As noted, we are grateful for the support and participation received from across our Conference during this time of transition in our episcopal leadership. However, this afternoon as she presides over the first session, we wanted to take this moment to celebrate the return of Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey to the Texas Annual Conference and, again, to welcome her home.

Bishop, would you come forward. Dean and Elizabeth, would you join us. Bishop, on behalf of the Committee on Episcopacy—Jeff you would come forward, please—we just want to take this moment again to say welcome. We are glad you're here. Would you stand and join me in a brief word of prayer:

Gracious Lord our God, as we stand before you this afternoon, we humble ourselves in your presence. God, we are so mindful that every moment in Bishop Harvey's life, in the life of her husband Dean, and the life of her daughter, Elizabeth, every moment has led to this moment. And for that, we are grateful. Lord, we lift up our Bishop before you now and we ask that you continue to bless her with everything that she needs to accomplish everything that you desire as she leads us in this time of healing and renewal. And, Lord, we ask that you shower this family, that you would shower them with sacred surprises, often, in the matchless name of Jesus the risen Savior who promised us Pentecost. Amen.

Thank you, Conference.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Bishop Bickerton, you are on deck, but you're here all two days. So, can I hold on you—hold on to your—and then invite some of these others?

Bishop Bickerton: Whatever you say, Bishop, I'm your servant this week.

Rev. Gilts: We're live streaming this, as well, Bishop. We've got video record of Bishop Bickerton being your servant.

Bishop Harvey: It has been noted in the minutes.

So, I'm going to invite the next persons. Roland Fernandes of Global Ministries and UMCOR, Trip Lowery, you're after him from GBHEM, there's a video. Ashley Boggan if you're in the space comes after that. So those are the next two or three. So, Roland Fernandes.

Rev. Gilts: He has a video presentation.

Report from the General Board of Global Ministries and UMCOR

Roland Fernandes, General Secretary of Global Ministries and UMCOR (video): There has never been a greater need for mission in such a time as this with natural and human-made disasters, a pandemic, loneliness, sadness, strife, and uncertainty. People need to hear the good news of Jesus Christ. God is calling us, every one of us, to mission.

Mission is at the heart of The United Methodist Church—Everything we say, everything we do, and everything we believe. The General Board of Global Ministries, which includes the United Methodist Community on Relief, UMCOR, is the mission and humanitarian relief agency of The United Methodist Church.

Global Ministries connects the church in mission through programs in four priority areas: missionary service, evangelism and church revitalization, humanitarian relief and recovery, and global health. In each of these areas, people are responding to God's call to mission.

Hello, my name is Roland Fernandes and I serve as General Secretary of Global Ministries and UMCOR.

Bishop Harvey: We have got something better than the video. We have the real deal, the real person here. Roland Fernandes.

Roland Fernandes: Thank you, Bishop Harvey and members of the Texas Annual Conference and guests and it's great to be here with you for a few moments to greet you. It was also good to be this morning as part of the panel in the laity session, so thank you for that opportunity.

As you saw there from the video, Global Ministries and UMCOR helps connects the church in mission through four areas and so I won't repeat them. One of the advantages that the connectional church has given is the ability for us to respond in so many ways which would not have been possible without the connection. In the United States and through Annual Conferences and internationally, working with The United Methodist Church and ecumenical partners, UMCOR helps build communities and provides hope and healing.

And thanks to your support and other United Methodists, UMCOR responded to 97 natural and human-made disasters in 2022, awarding 29.1 million to 196 grants. And Bishop Bickerton is the president of UMCOR as well. And as of April, this year, we were also—we had more than 27.5 million donated by aid for the people in Ukraine and responded with more than \$18 million in grants. Again, at a time when there is so much not going well, there is also a lot going well. And this is really the power of the connection at work.

Locally, we continue to work with the Texas Annual Conference through responses to the various tornadoes and other storms that have affected this area, or through our work with the multi-ethnic ministries as well as our work with through the Mustard Seed program for immigration ministries. I would like to recognize our mission advocates for this Jurisdiction David and Elizabeth McCormick—David is here—and also to your conference secretary of Global Ministries, Christine Riggle, and Rev. Godfrey Hubert is a Disaster Response Coordinator.

Our statement of mission theology at Global Ministries ends with the affirmation that God is always moving the church into a new mission age. My prayer is that in this transitional moment we can be truly transformative for each of us as you a united in mission to move the church into a new mission age. Thank you for this brief moment and I look forward to our continual ministry together with the Texas Annual Conference.

Bishop Harvey: Roland and I had a great time work together at Global Ministries and he has become a dear, dear friend. Trip Lowry, are you in the room? Here he comes. If you don't mind coming on up. This also starts with a video. All right.

Report from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry

Trip Lowery, Assistant General Secretary of the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry (video): We exist to bring people together. To make progress, to collaborate, to innovative toward our shared mission, to serve our constituents.

Providing scholarships to help students follow their college dreams, delivering hundreds of grants for international educational projects, supporting a global network of more than 1,000 Methodist-related schools, colleges. and universities, delivering critical funding for our historically black colleges and universities, developing clergy through training, candidacy programs to follow their call—the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, helping build the church of tomorrow every day.

Rev. Lowery: Hello, the video was great. As far as walk-up music goes, I would probably have picked something different, but it was very informative and we appreciated the people that put that together.

Bishop Harvey: We're glad you're here in person, too.

Rev. Lowery: It is good to be here. So just a quick poll, around GBHEM'S work, I want to see how well you know what we do at the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. So, there is a quick little quiz that we're going put up on the screen. So, raise your hand if you think GBHEM only does higher education? Raise your hand if we only do ministry? Raise your hand if you think the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry does higher education and ministry? How many of you missed this whole thing and think we do HVAC installation? Some of our staff might try to do that—they are not qualified to do that.

It is a worldwide agency—GBHEM works with partners and churches and institutions in Africa, Asian, Europe, Latin America, the Caribbean, and North America to offer connectional, contextual, and collaborative programs that support the church and the academy across the

world. Because GBHEM works in all these diverse contexts, collaboration with ministry partners like you at the Texas Annual Conference is absolutely necessary for our work.

So, Paul... Paul wanted to be all things to all people and we all know how it worked out for Paul. So instead of trying to do all the things, GBHEM is focused on just a few things over the next few years and we're going to touch on how those few things can play out in the Texas Annual Conference, how we can partner together in meaningful ways.

So, one of our priorities is the relationship between the church and the academy. It's called a value proposition, which is a real nerdy way of talking about the value of preparing our ministry leaders to serve where they serve well.

One way we collaborate together with GBHEM and Texas Annual Conference is by funding university chaplains. We have more than 1,000 schools, colleges and universities—several of which are right here in Texas. And university chaplains are in those spaces strengthening the relationship between the church and the academy. And they need help.

Another one of our priorities is—and I don't know how many of you have ever experienced the ordination process, but if you have, we have not reached the mountain top, there is a lot of work that can be done to improve this thing to reimagine and revise and this work can only be done in partnership with folks like you and district superintendents and dCOM and BOOMs and your beloved Bishop. I'm glad you're here. Some ways we can collaborate together around this through Exploration. Exploration is a gathering of young adults discerning a call to ministry through the church, and we would love to reimagine a regional expression of Exploration in this area of the country. And also, the Young Clergy Initiative is being reimagined in a way that would make seed grants available for vocational discernment work in Texas helping you share with the denomination how you help young people discern God's call in their life.

Another one of our priorities are licensing schools and the Course of Study. And those... they help prepare local pastors to serve in local settings. And these settings have become more and more and more diverse and we need to reimagine local pastor preparation and formation in ways that makes sense for the church that we live in today. Because just between you and me, the clergy doing the work of licensed local pastors are the future of the denomination. But this isn't recorded so I can say that.

But some examples of how we can work together at Texas and GBHEM are through discovery conversations with your district superintendents, associate members, local pastors, and hear their experience with course of study, what works, what doesn't, where we can be better together. And also learning from each other to create new learning objectives for licensing school and the Course of Study.

We can also work together to make the amazing—I'm serious—amazing English and Spanish language Course of Study courses that you're offering in Texas, how we can make those more accessible for the entire denomination and not just the people in this area.

Another initiative we have in serving the church today is—honestly it's rewarding but it is rough; it is rough and this is hard work, but it's the hard that makes it great, right? Jesus said that or Tom Hanks... I think it was Tom Hanks—But clergy and lay need support to be effective, to be healthy, to be whole and some ways we collaborate together here are connecting with your Advanced Pastoral Leadership participants and find out what changes in the system need to be made to focus on clergy well-being. Also working with your delegation at General Conference to make sure there is a focus there on clergy well-being as well as making grants and scholarships available for Texas to co-fund and pilot different initiatives that would support young clergy candidates and candidates of color.

The last initiative I want to touch on is how the general church is changing and how we work there. The church is changing and how we work together is changing. As resources shift, we need to collaborate more with other general agencies. We need to share more. We need to, honestly, just generally play nice together more, as general agencies, so creative thinking needs to happen around what work we do and who we do that work with, and GBHEM is partnering with other general agencies right now in new ways that will fundamentally shift the way agencies relate to each other and to the church.

So, Bishop Harvey, just before I step off, can I grab one brief moment of personal privilege? Okay, great. This is totally unrelated to what I just said. But we're in the process of moving right now. My family we're moving from our house to a different house and while I'm here doing this, my wife is at home packing up all of our stuff, our two teenage daughters are home complaining about how they are super bored every 17 seconds. Our dog is nuts. He is a puppy. She's not very bright and she's always in the way.

And today is Memorial Day, and it's a holiday. My wife who loves me and trusts me absolutely had lots of curious questions as to where I was going on a holiday, while chaos is absolutely reigning back home: "Is there really an Annual Conference in Texas right now? Are you sneaking off to go surfing somewhere? Are you sneaking off to go to a silent retreat?" A little context: My wife, my daughters, and my dog are all extroverts, I'm very much not that. So silent retreats are awesome. If I could grab a quick selfie with you in the background to send to her. That would be totally awesome. Get the bishops in there. All right. Everybody can wave.

All right. I thank you. GBHEM thanks you. We are looking forward to reimagining a creative future together because these are exciting, exciting times. Appreciate it. Thanks.

Bishop Harvey: You know, people always wonder, "Why Memorial Day?" Not next year, not next year, but the years to come. We have a video that we're going to roll now from Susan Henry-Crowe who just recently retired from the General Board of Church and Society.

Report from the General Board of Church and Society

GBCS Video Participant 1: (video): One thing I love about The United Methodist Church is that we really like to put our words to action. We're not only in the pews, but also out in the streets and that's true all across the world.

Rev. Dr. Susan Henry-Crowe, former General Secretary of the General Board of Church and Society: Engaging in the wider world is in our DNA as Methodists. The history of The United Methodist Church has been one that has stood for justice from the time of John Wesley and his commitment to prison reform, to young people not having to work, and many of the issues that faced the church in England—it's that history out of which we grew. And as people of faith who believe that humankind and individuals move on to perfection, that we are always moving in God's grace, being perfected by God, not only for ourselves, but for the society, makes us a church that is unique in many ways. Our personal piety is not separated from our social commitments and it is lived out and has been lived out for 250 years in a way that connects faith and life, connects church and society, connects justice and peace. And it's the thing that makes me most proud of being United Methodist.

Whether it is educating people about the Social Principles or organizing communities to create positive change or advocating with decision makers, we work to make disciples for the transformation of the world. United Methodists around the world are continuing this tradition of living faith, seeking justice, pursuing peace.

Bishop Harvey: We were just saying we are already missing Susan Henry-Crowe and just the short time we've been working together how many giants have retired that have been leading us. She is one of them.

I meant to mention this when Trip was up, but Gail Ford Smith, are you in the building still? Gail Ford Smith over there in the corner. We all know who she is. She is one of us but does some work with the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and Gail, I wanted to make sure we recognized and thanked you for what you do there as well. Thank you.

We've got Dr. Boggan, Dr. Blair Thompson, and then we have the team from Lydia Patterson, Dr. Cardoza. I love saying Dr. Cardoza. So, Ashley, are you with us? Where are you? Ok, she is in the way, way back. Ok. So, Ashley—oh she's got her Starbucks. You want to make your way to—you can do it from the floor if you want. Just do a greeting from Archives and History. You've got a video. We'll run the video while you're making your way up.

Rev. Gilts: We'll run that video.

Report from the General Commission on Archives and History

John Wesley (video): Hey brother, let's see how our legacy is. The archive has new programming so let's get caught up. Susanna, tell me about the Commission on Archives and History.

Susannah software (video): The General Commission on Archives and History has six miles of records and about 50,000 volumes of Methodist history.

Charles Wesley (video): Nice. Susanna, do they have any artifacts or ephemera?

Susannah software (video): Saddle bags, Bibles, John's death mask, and even Whitfield's tongue.

John Wesley (video): That's a bit disturbing. Susannah, how does one engage with Archives and History?

Susannah software (video): They now have a monthly podcast called *Untied* Methodist, and more recently they've begun producing online courses for laity, clergy, seminarians, and small groups. They even sell history-themed T-shirts.

Charles Wesley (video): Ooh, I'll have to get one. Susanna, can I visit the archive?

Susannah software (video): Located on the campus of Drew University in Madison, New Jersey, the archives is open for tours and to researchers.

Charles Wesley (video): Is this strangely warming your heart, John?

Susannah software (video): An archive must never be strangely warm.

John Wesley (video) How can I learn more about the General Commission on Archives and History, Charles?

Susannah software (video): That's easy, visit resourceumc.org/archivesandhistory.

Bishop Harvey: Alright, Dr. Boggan, I don't know what number that microphone is. It's 3, so make sure it's on. You are on. Hang on, you're not quite on yet. Microphone No. 3. Try again.

Dr. Ashley Boggan, General Secretary of the Commission on Archives and History: Hello.

Bishop Harvey: Yes.

Dr. Boggan: All right, good afternoon—I think it's afternoon at this point. Everybody, I am Ashley Boggan from Archives and History. It's been an honor and a privilege to be with you not only this morning in the talk at the clergy session but also in the panel in the laity session.

Archives and History is open for business. We are producing new resources for you. I highly encourage you all to check out our podcast *Untied Methodism* where we unravel the past to make sense of today. I think in a week or so we have an episode with Bishop Bickerton coming out. We are also producing online courses that are designed for small groups or for individual study. We have one on splits, separations, and reconciliations in our past. Might be kind of useful for some of us in this room. We also have a local church historian school that teaches persons in your congregations how to identify, preserve, care, and promote for your local church histories. We are doing all sorts of new things and producing all of these for you. So please use them.

This fall, we are very excited to partner with Discipleship Ministries and we'll be offering a track on—in the certified lay ministry on the ministry of memory. And with that we'll be producing a deep dive into Methodist history as well as a shorter Methodist history refresher. And the Methodist history refresher will be great for new member classes. It will also be great for some of our United Methodist congregations that might need a reminder about what it means to be

United Methodists. So please check us out. You can find us at resourceumc.org/archivesandhistory. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Dr. Boggan. Also, to let you know—probably comes as no surprise to you—that Dr. Ted Campbell also serves on the Commission of Archives and History. He is sitting here up front and it's a very great group of people. In the few short weeks that I've been a part of that, I have learned a lot and certainly learn a lot from Ashley every time I am in her midst.

I'm going to invite—or there she is, Blair Thompson from the Texas Methodist Foundation.

Report from the Texas Methodist Foundation

Rev. Dr. Blair Thompson-White, Chief Learning and Innovation Officer at Texas Methodist Foundation: Hello, Texas Annual Conference. My name is—how about that? All right! My name is Blair Thompson-White and I am Chief Learning and Innovation Officer at Texas Methodist Foundation. On behalf of our President, Rev. Lisa Greenwood, our faithful and dedicated board, many of whom are here today as members of this Annual Conference, and our whole team at Texas Methodist Foundation, we are humbled, grateful, and excited to be a part of the Spirit-led movement to strengthen the church by creating cultures of purpose, generosity, and courage in order to bring about the loving world that God imagines.

What I want to say clearly is we are all-in with the church, y'all, and we have been for 85 years. I love telling the history of Texas Methodist Foundation because it's a story that is rooted in the generosity and grit of faithful Texas Methodists.

Here is the story. In the 1930's, Texas families and congregations were reeling from the Great Depression. And there was a real question about the viability of the Methodist witness in Texas. Would there even be a Methodist Church in Texas? And there really needed to be. There needed to be a viable and vital church because there were growing social and spiritual needs of individuals and communities. And Methodists could be, needed to be, the answer to prayers, the means of grace for people. Are you with me?

And so, a group of faithful clergy and laity got together and said we've got to look beyond the dust bowl and bread lines and plant seeds for a future with hope. And so, in 1938, they chartered the Texas Methodist Foundation to—and I'm quoting the 1938 charter: Promote the Christian doctrine of stewardship and aid our Methodist institutions in the achievement of their Godappointed missions.

Now, 85 years later, we are still stewarding potential. We are still strengthening the church in each context to achieve its God-appointed missions and what I want you to hear is the larger point from this story that feels timely for all of us who have been called to lead in this time: We've got to dream God-sized dreams that go beyond just surviving the current times we're living in. We've got to dream God-size dreams that lead to thriving—thriving congregations and thriving communities that lead to a better, more loving world. The Texas Methodist Foundation is your partner in bringing God-sized dreams to fruition through our financial services and leadership ministry.

I want to take a minute to share how TMF works. You probably know that we make loans for churches. These dollars that we lend come from individuals, congregations, conferences, other agencies who invest in our loan fund. For as little as \$1,000, you or your church can have something that resembles a CD that earns interest and goes to empower ministry. It's really impact investing because every dollar you invest, we turn around and put to work for the church's mission.

Another thing that's worth noting is that every cent of our income from interest received on loans and fees goes back into the church's mission as we invest in staffing, programs, grants, and the interests we pay out. Just to give you a picture of what it looks like, in the last five years, we have invested \$130 million into the church's mission. So when your congregation takes out a loan from the Texas Methodist Foundation to build or repair a building or fund a creative new project or when you begin an endowment with us to ensure a future funding stream for your congregation, you're not just supporting the local church in bringing God's dreams to reality in your mission field—you are also supporting the larger work of strengthening the Methodist witness across the spiritual landscape today. This is impact investing for the Wesleyan way.

So, to highlight a few stories from the Texas Conference: A&M United Methodist Church has built a thriving, multi-generational congregation. Their creative use of space allows members to experience God in more places beyond Sunday morning. They converted an adjacent building's old sanctuary into a coffee shop to create a unique space where students can come throughout the week to study and connect with friends. They've also created spaces for the arts, hosting shows and live performances by artists from across the community, rethinking spaces for reaching new faces. Thanks to Pastor Greenwaldt, Preston Greenwaldt, who is one of our Courageous Leadership cohorts, and to all the courageous leaders of A&M UMC for their Spirit-inspired vision and faithful leadership.

Grace Church in Palestine is reaching new people who have never felt at home in church. Among their endeavors: purchasing a golf course. Yes, Grace UMC partnered with the local school district and purchased a nine-hole golf course that hadn't been used or cared for in years. Grace UMC converted the restaurant into a place of worship and the bar into a coffee bar and gave the schools a learning lab to teach students business, marketing, and golf course management for college credit. This is the only partnership of its kind involving a religious organization, a public school, and a golf course in the nation. I mean, how cool is that, right? So, a beautiful example of what partnership makes possible, and thanks to Pastor Jimmy Calvert and all the inspired leaders at Grace Church.

Now turning to our leadership ministry: Twenty years ago, this year in 2003 the Texas Methodist Foundation started leadership ministry. We realized that the culture was changing and it was no longer pushing people towards the church, and the landscape was shifting. It continues to shift as we've seen most recently earlier this month in a survey that showed again less people are affiliated with religious institutions. This photo is a helpful analogy. This is a picture of a bridge in Honduras, it was an engineering masterpiece. This photo was taken after Hurricane Mitch, in 1998. The hurricane moved the river. The very landscape in which the bridge was built shifted.

The landscape in which our current church was built has shifted. People are still seeking meaning and purpose in their lives, but what's changed is they are no longer seeking meaning and purpose inside the walls of a church. The landscape in which our current church was built has shifted. Therefore, we need to shift as leaders of congregations. We need adaptive leadership today to help the church lean into its God-appointed mission today. So, over the past 20 years, we have been deeply committed to helping leaders to lean into the adaptive leadership with courage and collaboration for such a time as this, so that the church can be a strong means of grace for communities. We've done this primarily through cohorts of clergy and laity where conversations can spur on new ways of thinking and doing, and by sharing our conversations and learnings broadly.

We've been doing this through our podcast, *Igniting Imagination*. We've had guests like renowned church leadership consultant and author Susan Beaumont who shared this about the shifting season that we are in in the church. She says, "Our rational decision-making models may be too limiting for this season. We need processes that engage the Holy Spirit as a decision partner because what needs to happen next may be larger than the limits of human imaginings. We need to be led by the future itself. Relying on past patterns of success willing not serve us well."

Now, a few things about this quote that really hit me—I'll start with a confession, I love rational decision-making models and as a church we are totally into rational decision-making. We Methodists are very methodological after all and Susan is inviting us into engagement with the Holy Spirit during this time to ignite our imaginations for what's possible, to new processes that will lead us into a future with hope.

So, we have identified five processes, if you will, that we call the five adaptive muscles. And we believe and have worked through the five muscles with enough clergy and congregations in the past three years to say congregations who are exercising these five muscles regularly are more likely to be thriving and by that we mean they are living out the God-appointed mission in their context. And the way we exercise the five muscles is through conversation. So here are each of the five muscles and some conversations you can start having right now with your churches' leadership teams.

The first muscle is grieving well. What is our shared narrative of grief and how are we creating space for people to name their grief and share their emotions, and how is grief impacting us in our decision-making today?

Discerning purpose: are we living out of our self-appointed preferences or God's purposes for us? And what is the difference, the impact, God is calling us to make in this coming season?

Walking alongside: What are the gifts and talents in our neighborhood? And what's God already doing in our neighborhood? How can we join in the work that God is doing?

Distributing power: where is the power in our congregation, our community, and how is that impacting our decision-making? What happens if somebody says I have a dream for ministry?

Expanding imagination: who can teach us what we don't know? Who can open up a new part of the world to us? And what questions do we need to reframe?

Now we work with congregations through a six-month cohort experience to exercise each of the five muscles. So, if it feels like a lot, it is. And the invitation is to simply start with one conversation you feel led to have as a leadership team right now. Right now. We believe conversation is the currency of change. These are some of the meaningful conversations we believe congregations must have right now.

So, I want to end with a personal sharing. My "why" for doing this work. I come from a family of rural farmers and I wouldn't be if it wasn't for my great-grandmother stepping in to raise my mom and doing two things: She taught my mom the value of education and she took my mom to church every Sunday. My mom became a teacher she taught me the value of an education and she took me to church every Sunday and one of the earliest memories I have is standing in the pew watching my mom write a check every week and handing it to me to put in the offering plate, and she taught me how to be generous. She modeled humility and faithfulness for me—and still does—and now I have a daughter and she's almost two. And here is the thing y'all, I want the church to be strong for her and her generation. I want her to know the Wesleyan way. I want her to know the love and grace and mercy of God, to know she has purpose and that she is part of something bigger than herself, and I want her to experience all the goodness of church.

And the way I experienced church is not going to be the same as the way she experiences church. It just isn't. It will be physical and it will be digital and Sundays and on screens and in small groups and in the streets and through AI and who knows what else. I want the church to adapt to reach her generation so that we have a chance at influencing her life for the good. So that she can be a faithful follower of Jesus Christ in this volatile and uncertain world and make a difference in his name.

So, if there are ways that I, that we, at Texas Methodist Foundation can support you in your adaptive leadership and your church's ministry for a future with hope, whether through financial services or a leadership ministry, contact me—my contact information is on the screen. Bishop Harvey: Dr. Cardoza, Carla Cardoza, President and CEO of Lydia Patterson Institute is on her way up and then Bishop McKee. I just have to say: Lydia Patterson Institute is a place that is incredibly close to mine and Dean's heart. And I always describe this place as a place where students not only are educated about... in books, but they are educated about the world and beyond. I am one generation away from having been a student at Lydia Patterson Institute.

El Paso was a place where my grandparents came to the U.S. when the borders were porous and they came to the U.S. to make a better life for our family. My grandfather worked for the Texas Pacific Railroad building the railroads. Had he not done that, I might have been one of your students at Lydia Patterson Institute. And I would have been blessed by being there so the best thing that I can do is to share our blessing with LPI and La Lydia. So, gracias por todo lo que hacendo.

Report from the Lydia Patterson Institute

Dr. Carla Cardoza, CEO of the Lydia Patterson Institute: Thank you, Bishop. And I need to take a picture, too, for my husband. He was wondering if I was just trying to get out of my promise that I was going to finish my graduate studies and help with the kids.

So good afternoon, buenas tardes, saludos desde La Lydia—Lydia Patterson Institute. My name is Carla Cardoza and I'm the president of this amazing educational ministry in the Mexico/U.S. border. You know, I want to thank you for having us here and I wanted to talk to you about what we have been doing at La Lydia, the progress we made, but first I wanted to thank you for—humbly thank you for your help, the Texas Conference, for all the support you give us and especially to Bishop Fierro Harvey and Mr. Harvey for believing in our ministry so deeply. Thank you so much.

In the spring of 2022, God's calling guided me to LPI. What an adventure I have had. I have been doing a lot of things and a lot of thinking and God guided me to LPI with a purpose. But more, what an honor and privilege to represent the students in the binational region, my home. God called me in ministry and I believe that's where I need to be.

For 110 years, LPI has been an institution where international students, students who are underprivileged and disadvantaged thrive at learning English as a second language. And I can tell you I'm an ESL student who just recently got my doctorate, and if you told me this a decade ago, I wouldn't have believed it. 100% of our student's complete secondary school. This is major for us. In Mexico, only 50% of students attend secondary school. And only 30% finish secondary school. So, I'm a true testament and our kids, too.

As the newly elected president, my top priority has been to reimagine, renew, and reenergize our ministry at La Lydia. Also, my priority has been to reinforce college and career readiness and in the fall of 2022, 121 seniors and juniors participated in college essays, writing workshops, financial literacy workshops, stuff that we had not done before. 140 students tested to enroll in the dual credit course and now we have four times the students in dual credit classes which we know will help them get ahead. Last Monday, we celebrated our senior graduation. It was a proud moment. My first graduating class. And we are proud to announce that 100% of our students will be going to college. Our top senior was the recipient of the University of Texas at El Paso Presidential Award and... but more so incredibly we're proud that six of our students will be going to school to Methodist universities on scholarships. So, we want to thank the Board of Higher Education and Ministry. We've been working very closely with them and we hope to get more scholarships for our students.

Every day we contend with the adversity of the violent and hostile situation of our neighboring city, Ciudad Juarez, when the international border crossing closed, the LPI team continued to strive to produce the safest learning environment for the students we serve. We have also experienced the refugee immigrant crisis and we continue to work and pray together with the brothers and sisters every day. So, at the start of 2023, students were welcomed back to classes with a closed campus equipped with security gates and cameras for our entry system. Present day, to remain faithful to the legacy of the great Lydia Patterson, every student will receive a tuition subsidy with additional full scholarships awarded. We will continue to seek out resources to provide the courageous educators and staff of our institution a livable wage, while remaining affordable for the students who, without LPI, would lack fair access to education.

Partnership takes many forms, and we love to play nice. And we like partnerships. From giving through our advanced number—which my development director will kill me if I didn't say the number—531523—to bringing out mission groups to better understand the challenges our students on the border face, to creating opportunities for your network circles to provide meaningful opportunities from abroad.

My commitment to all of you, our supporters, is to live true to the mission and to offer transparency every step of the way. Education unites us and education really is the key and as we continue this journey, we humbly ask you for your continued partnership to improve the lives of the leaders of tomorrow. Now more than ever we need your support, but also, now more than ever, you have our 1,000% commitment to the ministry. Thank you so very much and God bless you all.

Bishop Harvey: Gracias. When Dr. Cardoza came to Louisiana last year, someone asked me if this was my daughter, and I said yes, I would just be honored. I was honored that somebody would think that Dr. Cardoza was my daughter—thank you—and she worked on her doctorate in the time of transition from the last CEO to this point. So that "doctor" in front of her name means an awful lot. And so, thank you for what you're doing and we'll continue -- so I think I know the answer, but I want you to tell me, what does it cost to scholarship one student at Lydia Patterson Institute?

Dr. Cardoza: \$7,000.

Bishop Harvey: \$7,000 a year. \$7,500 a year. Full everything. 100% of a student. So just put that in the back of your mind.

Rev. Gilts: And your checkbook.

Bishop Harvey: And your checkbook, that's right. I'm now going to invite Bishop Dean Mike McKee, Dean Mike—I don't know what we call you anymore—Bishop McKee. And I also want to say that Bishop McKee is serving as the Dean at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University and he is also... all of us have more than one job these days. He is also the president of GCFA, the General Commission on Finance and Administration, and I am just thankful that you continue to do that. Reggie Clemons in the room. Reggie also serves as the Secretary of GCFA and thankful for your ministry there as well. So, Bishop McKee.

Report from Perkins School of Theology

Bishop Mike McKee, Interim Dean of Perkins School of Theology: Thank you, Bishop Harvey. I can tell you this time last year when I was planning my retirement, what I planned to do was to go to Perkins School of Theology and be the Bishop-in-Residence which means I could do anything I wanted, which sounded really good to me I have to admit, but as the year progressed, and President Gerald Turner invited me after some other people had spoken to him about being the interim Dean at Perkins School of Theology for a period of time, rather than choosing a Dean at Perkins after Craig Hill's retirement.

So, I bring you greetings today from Perkins School of Theology and Southern Methodist University. Reminding you that SMU and Perkins are the most significant, the largest United Methodist institution in the state of Texas, but it's not just the state of Texas, it's throughout the Southwest.

I want to say a special word of thanks, of gratitude to you, the members of the Texas Annual Conference, Methodist Hospital, Charles Milliken, where I think is one of the significant things happening in theological education today in The United Methodist Church for the hybrid extension program that is available here in Houston—known as the Houston Galveston program—that is housed primarily at Texas Methodist Hospital. So being a native of Fort Worth and a recent resident of the city of Dallas, I was most familiar with Perkins rather than the hybrid program. And so shortly after I moved into this role, I said I want to go to school in Houston at Texas Methodist Hospital. Which meant I wanted to spend one night with the students, the faculty, listening and engaging with what was happening there. What I do want to say that I haven't seen that much energy in a theology school anywhere in this country as I did that night in Houston. So, thank you again for that.

That is a place where students come from all over this country. And when I was engaging with students, one of the things I discovered is we had some people from California and we had somebody from Delaware. And I asked them, "Why are you here?" I always want to know why. And they said, "Because this is a very effective way for me to complete an M.Div.— a masters of divinity program—in a way that I can do in this kind of time and be engaged with students from all over the country." And I began to think about the way in which they talked about that. And I think if there is anything that probably talks or speaks of connection better than that, they somehow are engaging in a cohort that they will know those people and engage with those people no matter where they live throughout their ministry.

It reminds me of every time in which I find somebody somewhere else in the country and we find that we know each other through The United Methodist Church, that we are able because of either the education that we have or the work that we do in the church is to continue to revitalize this connection. So, I want to thank you for that. I also want to say that Perkins is already engaging strategically perhaps in doing that in other places. And by that I even said being in Dallas, you know, we can put one over in Fort Worth and it's really close for the faculty, and it's just my way of saying that I think that the formation that Perkins does of clergy throughout the jurisdiction is exceptional.

Earlier we were talking about how the church is changing. And I should have kept a log of the conversations or the telephone conversations I had with former classmates at Perkins, some of whom I have not spoken with since I graduated in 1978, we just did not run into each other. I have never gotten more advice in my whole life than from my former classmates that told me what I should do at Perkins immediately. What I want to say to you, they really were on top of the game if you were talking about the 1970's and the 1980's.

But what I want to say about Perkins School of Theology and our other brother and sister schools throughout the United States, is that we really know that the development and the theological formation of persons for ministry in The United Methodist Church is continually evolving. And Perkins intends to be at the forefront of that in several different areas.

What I want to say to you is I want to say thank you. Thank you for your continued support of the Ministerial Education Fund. And I want to say to those of you who are considering ministry, you know persons in your church are considering ministry, there are significant funds—I will not tell you the numbers—significant funds available for scholarships and tuition grants for Texas Annual Conference students. I'm talking about significant amounts of money here. And so, we want to make those available to any student from the Texas Annual Conference that chooses Perkins for the place in which to form themselves for ministry.

But yours is not the only Conference in the State of Texas like that. There are many others as well. And so, whether they study here in a hybrid, or come to Dallas, and what may be a hybrid or the regular path for theological formation, we continue and we'll continue to do the work well. Thank you for your support. God bless you. Bye-bye.

Bishop Harvey: Another place near and dear to my heart is the Houston-Galveston program. It was me, Deborah Hawboldt, there was a group of us that were in the first class of the Houston-Galveston program, and I'm thankful to Charles Millikan and just the foresight that you had, Charles, to make sure that some of us who might not be here today had it not been for that. So, thank you. Thank you.

And Bishop McKee didn't tell you this, but I'm going to tell you. There are more students—can I tell them that? There are a lot of students in the Houston-Galveston program. Let me just say that. There are a lot of students in the Houston-Galveston program and I'm thankful.

So now we've done this sort of speed thing, going through of these people and places where we are connected. Today's theme was "renew." We wanted to talk about renewal of our connection. So, I hope that as you listened to all of these persons, you are starting to get a sense of how important this connection is to our life and our work. And we cannot... we cannot survive and continue ministry without them and they without us. So, this is all a "we." This is not the royal "we," this is really the "we" "we." This is us. This is who we are.

Rev. Gilts: I'm sure that will make the Cross Connection.

Bishop Bickerton: I'm glad that's going to be on a livestream.

Bishop Harvey: Yeah, it's on the livestream. We are the "we" "we." It is all of us. It is who we are. It is who we are. And I just don't want us to lose sight of that. Don't want us to lose sight of how important this connection is. So, with that, I'm going to turn to Kip Gilts.

Rev. Gilts: Thank you, Bishop. I do thank you for renewing our connection with our relational partners in the bigger connection of the church. So, thank you and thank you for the parade of stars that we've had today. It's been great. You know that's been rapid pace, but wait until you see this, on Page 26 and 27 of your preconference agenda is our consent calendar. What that means is you have the opportunity to approve dozens of reports and not have—not get to hear them.

So, there are a number of reports that will be lifted out of that. That is a preliminary consent calendar. You'll find the full agenda on the Guidebook which is real-time. We put things on there and you'll see the flow of everything that's going to be presented. But a number of our reports have been submitted with the understanding that they would be a part of our consent calendar. So those can be found on Pages 26 and 27. With the exception of those that you'll find in the full agenda in the Guidebook. So, Bishop, I move the acceptance of these reports through the approval of the consent calendar.

Bishop Harvey: Great. That is before us. So, if you would approve, please raise your hand. Anyone against? Raise your hand. Thank you. I'm sure everybody wants to speed through the day.

I'm now going to call on Don Morriss who is the chairperson for CFA. Here you are. Thank you.

Election of Conference Treasurer

Mr. Don Morris, laity, Williams Memorial UMC, Texarkana: Thank you, Bishop. Bishop Harvey, members of the Texas Annual Conference, last December when we met, the council recommended and I moved the election of Rev. Robert Besser to be our interim Conference Treasurer effective January 1st, 2023, and the Conference elected him as such. Today I can tell you that he likes us and we like him. It's been a great deal so far. So today as chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration, in accordance with paragraph—make sure I read the right—612 and 619 of the Book of Discipline, the Council on Finance and Administration nominates Rev. Robert Besser as our Conference Treasurer, removing interim from his title. Bishop, on behalf of the Council on Finance and Administration, I move his election.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. So, it is properly before us from CFA. Any questions? Ok. So, if you are in support of the election of Robert Besser to serve as the treasurer, the Conference Treasurer, please raise your hand. Anyone opposed? Thank you. Thank you.

Don Morriss: Before I go... Before I go, I'd ask Robert to stand up and greet us for anyone who doesn't already know Robert.

Bishop Harvey: I'm going to go over here because I can only see half the room when I sit down. I will say... I will say that Robert Besser explains things slowly, methodically, and sometimes I'll

say, "Can you explain it to me like a fifth grader?" And he does. And I get it. So, he's done that with our CLT and other groups and he is just a calming presence and I'm thankful for you, Robert, and for that. I now want to invite Mary Daffin and Frank Jones. I know they don't want to do this, but I'm going to invite you, Mary Daffin and Frank Jones, if you would come forward to the stage. Mary Daffin and Frank... Frank is making his way.

Recognition of Outgoing Conference Co-Chancellors

And as they make their way, let me just say a little bit about these two. About ten years ago, this Conference was shocked by the sudden death of our Chancellor Gib Walton. Many of you know Gib Walton died at his desk, after having left a meeting I understand. He had been serving this Conference with excellence and so of course, you know, what do you do then? And it was at that time that an invitation was extended to two persons, to Mary Daffin and to Frank Jones, to serve as co-chancellors, and they accepted the role. Together they've guided this Conference through some very turbulent waters. But they've decided that ten years is just about right.

So, Mary and Frank, words cannot even begin to express the depth of our gratitude and the breadth of our love for the two of you and the gift that you have been to the this Annual Conference. And while we have few words, we do have some tokens of appreciation for you. And so, these are heavy. So, this says, "Bishop's award, Mary Daffin, co-chancellor, thank you for ten years of faithful service to the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church." Please accept this as just a tiny token of our appreciation.

And Frank, yours says, "Frank Jones, co-Chancellor, thank you for ten years of faithful service to the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church." We thank you and please accept this small token of our appreciation.

Frank Jones, Co-Chancellor: I think we usually just say there are no litigation pending.

Mary Daffin, Co-Chancellor: Against the Texas Annual Conference. Conference, it has been a distinct honor to serve the Texas Annual Conference. I am so grateful. I've been privileged to have this honor. Thank you so much.

Frank Jones: And I would say the same thing and I'm particularly privileged to have had the ten years with Mary.

Rev. Gilts: They can't hear you.

Frank Jones: I'm particularly privileged to have been with Mary for these ten years. We've had a great team. Thank you.

Election of Conference Chancellor

Bishop Harvey: So, in the first five months of my time here, a lot has been before us. So, like ten years ago, after Gib Walton's death, I was informed when I was here doing some onboarding in December that we had no Chancellors. Mary and Frank agreed to stay through this Annual Conference, which then set in motion the search for who our next Chancellor might be and that is the work of my office.

So, I did what I knew to do. I sat down with Kip, first thing, and we started contacting people around the Conference asking for some recommendations. And I quickly discovered that the Texas Annual Conference is blessed with a whole lot of gifted people. We conducted interviews. We didn't have one bad interview—actually made the decision really hard. And so, as we went through this process, there was one person that was lifted up. His name is Bill Kroger and he is my nominee to you, today, to this Annual Conference, to be our next Conference Chancellor according to paragraph 603.8 of the *United Methodist Book of Discipline*. Let me tell you a little bit about Bill Kroger.

Bill and his wife are members of Chapelwood United Methodist Church. Like a lot of other happy couples, they met on the campus of the University of Texas. That's where I met my spouse, so we share that. Bill received his bachelor's degree in accounting, masters in finance, and his Juris Doctor at the University of Texas. All of his degrees have come from University of Texas. He is a partner of 25 years at Baker-Botts, known widely for its commitment to serving the community. Bill has served as the president of Houston Bar Association. He's been active with Communities In Schools for over 30 years. He's been a recognized leader in the Houston Voluntary Lawyers Association leading the Baker-Botts pro bono practice group for over ten years. Is Ashley still in the room? Bill is the firm historian where he gets to work closely with his friend and mentor, Secretary Jim Baker. Bill is deeply, deeply a Methodist, with generations of Methodists going all the way back to the Civil War years. He and Elizabeth have three children and are eagerly expecting their first grandchild. And quite frankly, he blew us away in his interview with his wealth of experience, his strength of commitment to this community, the depth of connection to the church, and mostly the love of what he is doing. So, it is therefore my privilege to put before you Bill Kroger as my nominee for Conference Chancellor.

So, I'm going to place that before you. And Bishop Bickerton, because this is my nominee, can you conduct this vote? I just think that—if you'll come forward, Bill.

Rev. Gilts: Bill and Elizabeth are here.

Bishop Harvey: If you'll stand by while we take this election, as we take this vote.

Bishop Bickerton: So, friends, the nomination of Bill Kroger is before you as the Conference Chancellor. Any questions? You ready to vote? If you'll support this nominee, will you show the hand? Opposed, like sign? And you have elected a new Conference Chancellor.

Bill Kroger, Conference Chancellor: Well, thank you very much. I have absolutely huge shoes to fill with my two predecessors. I knew all of the people who have served as Chancellors, all of the great lawyers going back to Judge Ewing Werlein and I know how much they loved the church, how much they loved being Methodist, and what fine lawyers they are. It is the greatest honor of my legal career today to be able to serve the church, represent this Conference and work with you for hopefully a decade or more going forward. So thank you very much for your trust in me.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Dr. Christians, the next portion of this report from the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry

Linda Christians, elder, West University UMC: Good afternoon. Bishop and members of the Texas Annual Conference, it is my honor to serve as the Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, and to work alongside the Board to fulfill our vision of faithful, ministerial leaders in every charge of the Texas Annual Conference. Our work includes recruiting, discerning, and guiding individuals who feel called to ministerial leadership, and credentialing fruitful leaders. Our report is found beginning on Page 67 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

I am thankful for the members of the district committees who serve on front line. They are the first to hear a person's call to ministry and to approve that person as a certified candidate for ministry and I am thankful to the other members of the Board for their gift of time and for the dedication they have to our work. At this time, I'd like to ask the members of the Board of Ordained Ministry to stand and be recognized for their hard work and dedication.

I also want to express my gratitude to Rev. Deborah Hawboldt and Ivana Wilson in the Center for Leadership Formation. Their wise, experienced guidance and incredible support have been key to the effectiveness of our work.

The Board of Ordained Ministry also continues our work in the mission field in Laos, through the Laos Mission Initiative. In August of last year, Jeff McDonald, Romonica Malone-Wardley, Daniel Irving, and I traveled to Laos. It is a full day's journey to travel there, but we did so for the purpose of encouraging, teaching, supporting, and interviewing candidates for ministry. I hope, with the photos, you can get a glimpse of the people whose lives are being changed by Jesus Christ, and who feel their calling to help change their part of the world called Laos. I want you to pay close attention during the ordination service tomorrow night as these are the red stoles that will be given to them. They were made in Laos. We'll continue on there to pray for and support these pastors and their churches and we encourage you to do the same.

In clergy session this morning, we approved for commissioning and provisional membership the following elders: David Lee, William Murphree, Ellen Thornberg, and Kyle Tremblay. We want to recognize you and applaud you for making this step in your journey.

We also approved for full conference membership and ordination the following individuals: Deacons: David Lieberman and Becca Newcomb. Elders: Thea Curry-Fuson, Jordan Czichos, Madison Garcia-Tabor, Amy Peters, Quinn Peters. Bishop, I think you have some questions to ask these individuals.

Bishop Harvey: They answered them correctly in the clergy session but I always like to ask these questions in this session because laypeople you don't get to hear them answer these questions. So, I will tell you that I have met with those to be commissioned, with these to be ordained, and also the licensed local pastors, and I can assure you that the church is in great hands for the future. So, I'm going to ask again these historic questions have been asked for people long, long, long -- a long time.

Daily Proceedings

So: have you faith in Christ?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Are you going on to perfection?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Do you expect to be made perfect in love in this life?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Are you earnestly striving after it?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: I always say the second question, the question that follows is a lot harder. So, thank you for saying yes. Are you resolved to devote yourself wholly do God and to God's work?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Do you know the general rules of our church?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Harder one, will you keep them?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Have you studied the doctrines of The United Methodist Church?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: After full examination, do you believe that our doctrines are in harmony with the holy Scriptures?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Will you preach and maintain them? The harder question.

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Have you studied our form of church discipline and polity?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Do you approve our church government and polity?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: And the harder one, will you support and maintain them?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Will you diligently instruct the children in every place?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Will you visit from house to house?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: And I asked you this because house to house—we had just heard Dr. Boggan in the clergy session as she talked about new ways of doing things, so house to house, yard to yard, pub theology, so it might be a bar to bar, or anyplace?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Where the people are. Okay, will you recommend fasting or abstinence both by precept and example?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Are you determined to employ all your time in the work of God?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Are you in debt as so to embarrass yourself in your work?

Ordinands: No.

Bishop Harvey: She was quick to say no! Will you observe the following directions: be diligent, never be unemployed, never be triflingly employed, never trifle away time, neither spend any more time in anyone place than is strictly necessary?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Say that one more time.

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, thank you. Be punctual. I reminded you this morning that I was ordained by Bishop Norris who told me if I wasn't 15 minutes early I would be late when he asked me this question, so be punctual. Do everything exactly at the time and do not mend our rules but keep them not for wrath, but for conscious sake?

Ordinands: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you for saying yes and I remind you that they've said yes and they know what they are saying yes to. They know our current condition, and they have said yes. When the words disaffiliation and withdrawal and separation, when some of us were ordained, those words were not even in our lexicon. They know the meaning to these questions. They know and understand what they are getting themselves into. Many of these—all of these—many of these actually had to go to a new appointment, because the churches where they were disaffiliated. And they still said yes. We even have a clergy couple who were each serving churches—these two—who went through the discernment and the disaffiliation process and ended up in new appointments. So, I thank you—the two of you especially—for saying yes and for going through that process and that time of discernment with grace. So, thank you.

So, this is your ordination class for tomorrow night. I know you'll want to be there to celebrate at First Church tomorrow evening at 7 o'clock.. So, congratulations. Thank you.

Rev. Dr. Christians: Bishop, before I close I'd like to take a moment of executive privilege to recognize Ivana Wilson for the wonderful ways that she has served and helped the Board of Ordained Ministry in supporting the candidates for ministry, in supporting the BOM and especially me in my role as the Chair. Ivana, where are you? And if you would please stand so we can recognize you. Did she skip out?

Rev. Gilts: She's gone.

Rev. Dr. Christians: When you see her, applaud her. Ben Burnside, are you in the room? Back there in the back. Ben will be assuming the role of managing the candidacy process along with his other duties in the Center for Leadership Formation. Thank you, Ben, for taking on this charge. And thank you, Bishop Harvey and the Texas Annual Conference, this concludes my report.

Bishop Harvey: In a moment we're going to hear from John Esquivel, but first we have a retirement video. John, I'll give you a moment to breathe here.

Rev. Gilts: We moved that to tomorrow.

Bishop Harvey: You did, and you didn't tell me. Okay. So, we'll see it tomorrow. So, John Esquivel, it's all yours.

John Esquivel, Conference Lay Leader: I haven't retired already, but I do have—seems like a full-time job with the Conference. Thank you, Bishop, for this opportunity. Beloved brothers

and sisters, thank you for allowing me to serve as Conference Lay Leader. This has truly been one of the highlights of my life.

Perhaps as the understatement of the year, this has been a difficult season for many of us. With many of our dear friends and churches choosing to go in different directions, we find ourselves a smaller conference at least when measured in the number of churches and budgets. Many of the faces that we have grown accustomed to seeing every Annual Conference may not be here. The reality of their departure may be sinking in for the first time for many of us. Some of us may be still grieving over the loss. Some may be disheartened or disappointed. If you are feeling those emotions, please know that it's okay. Everyone processes loss in different ways and over different timelines.

My prayer, however, is that in your time of lament, you hold in your heart a sense of hope. A hope for a new beginning. A hope for a new future. A hope for the great things the Lord has in store for us. In your time of lament, please know that your church, your Conference, and more importantly, your Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, are with you. We are all here ready to join you as we look to the future of our ministry together.

Clearly, our Conference has been pruned in the number of churches that make up our Conference. However, as any gardener will tell you, pruning prepares the vine for even greater fruitfulness. Pruning forces the vine to put out new branches and thus produce abundant fruit. Pruning forces a vine to focus on its purpose.

I'm reminded of a story told to me of an acquaintance about her lemon tree here in the Houston area. Now, lemon trees are not in abundance here mainly because the climate is not conducive to growing lemons. Now, this tree struggled to produce lemons. Sometimes it produced fruit, sometimes it didn't. For the most part, it was a pretty straggly tree. After one of our particularly brutal freezes, this tree was severely pruned back to where it looked more like a stick in the ground than a tree. Often it was debated whether just to pull it up and to move on to something different. Having been pruned back, I believe this little lemon tree focused all of its efforts on its purpose in life: to produce lemons. Having been pruned back, it could start anew. Instead of supporting old branches, merely because they were there, the tree could decide on new places to grow. As new growth pushed out, the tree made sure it was aligned with its purpose. All of its nutrients and energy became refocused on and aligned with that purpose.

Because it was pruned back it was no longer defined by its past—a straggly tree—but rather could be defined by its future. What new shape will it take? It could have new branches fully aligned for fruitfulness. It could bear fruit that is not limited to past expectations but rather holds open the possibility of fruitfulness beyond anyone's hopes or expectations. Sisters and brothers, I believe that as a result of pruning, this lemon tree was able to revive what it means to be a lemon tree, but not one defined by its limits of its past, but rather defined by the possibilities of its future. It was able to renew its purpose, to bear much fruit and align everything with that purpose. It was able to reinvigorate new growth in new places, and it was able to reimagine what it meant to be fruitful. For when this lemon tree revived, renewed, reinvigorated, and reimagined, it bore fruit beyond anyone's expectation. Here is a photo from this lemon tree which had been

pruned back to its core. As you can see that lemon is beyond anyone's expectation. Let us never underestimate the great things that can be done with our Lord.

I believe that is where the local church and the Texas Annual Conference is today. We do have the opportunity to revive, renew, reinvigorate, and reimagine the local church and our Conference. Let us reclaim what we have always been: a church with an evangelical mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Let us be focused on what it means to be the Church—let us be the Church to a hurting world that is in need to hear the good news of Jesus Christ. Let us focus on what it means to be the Church to a world that seeks to see his love through our actions, such that when we see hunger, we give food, when we see thirst, we give drink, when we see a stranger, we welcome them, and then when we see sickness, we comfort. When we see the unhoused, the underserved or those that down in their spirit, we show God's love through our words and action. Let those outside of our church walls want to know more about these people called United Methodists. Wanting them to know more about these people called United Methodists because of how we share the good news of Jesus Christ through our words and deeds. Let us revive our church with new energy that comes from a fresh start.

Whether you are a new faith community that has blossomed from former members of a disaffiliated church or a 100-plus year-old church that remained United Methodist, let the Holy Spirit breathe fresh air into all of us. I believe there is great opportunity in change. There is excitement and new energy from a fresh start. May we receive a fresh outpouring of God's lifegiving Spirit on his people and his Church. Let him make a new thing out of our fresh start as a Conference and local church. And let us renew our love and commitment to Jesus Christ.

Brothers and sisters, we may have been pruned back as a Conference when measured in number of churches, but let there be no doubt—no doubt whatsoever brothers and sisters—that we have not pruned back our spirit, nor have we pruned back our belief in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ his only Son and Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontus Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried. Brothers and sisters, we have not pruned back whatsoever our belief that the third day he rose from the dead, he ascended into heaven and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father Almighty. From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead. We steadfastly believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life of everlasting. Amen.

Yes, brothers and sisters, our Conference may have been pruned back as measured by the number of churches, however, let there be no doubt whatsoever that we have not pruned back our beliefs as contained in the Apostles' Creed or our Articles of Religion found in the *Book of Discipline*. In fact, our belief is the nourishment that flows through the vines of Jesus Christ to the branches of the local church and the Conference. These beliefs will propel us to new and greater fruitfulness. These beliefs will guide us as we seek to revive, renew, reinvigorate, and reimagine our Conference and local church.

This is an exciting time of a fresh start for all of us. Let us be like that lemon tree. Let us revive what it means to be the Church, not defined by the limits of our past, but rather defined by the possibilities of the future. Let us renew our purpose to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world and align our resources and ministries to that end. Let us reinvigorate new growth in new places, in new ways, and lets us reimagine what it means to be fruitful. Let us not under estimate what God has in store for us, but let us be amazed at the great things he will do through us. Certainly, there will be bumps in the road as we move into our new future and I'm sure there will be unexpected twists and turns. However, let us keep our eye on Jesus Christ and we will be amazed at the great things he will do.

I'm honored to be on this journey with you. May God continue to bless you and your ministry.

Bishop Harvey: It's a privilege to share this journey with you, John.

I'm now going to invite members of the CLT who will come forward for round one of a proposal that they have before us.

Rev. Gilts: Bishop, we've got Cindy Doran and Andrew Hook, I believe, they are coming and will introduce us to the proposal that we'll be considering on Wednesday for a vote, but they are going to introduce that proposal to us. They have asked that all the members of the Conference Leadership Team come and stand behind them. So, District Superintendents, you are part of the Conference Leadership Team. Center Directors you are part of the leadership team. District Leadership Team Chairpersons, you're part of the Conference Leadership Team. We've got a couple of at large folks out there as well. You know who you are. Come on up. Cindy, Andrew, thanks.

<u>Presentation of District Realignment Proposal from Conference Leadership Team</u>

<u>Cindy Doran, elder, Keltys UMC & McMahan Chapel UMC</u>: I'm Cindy Doran and I pastor at Keltys United Methodist Church and McMahan Chapel United Methodist Church and I'm the East District Leadership Team Chairperson.

Andrew Hook, elder, Magnolia UMC: And I'm Andrew Hook, pastor of Magnolia United Methodist Church, and the Central North District Leadership Team Chair. We have our members of our Conference Leadership Team before you. We think it is important that you know who we are so that you can reach out and talk with us. Because we are inviting you into conversations over the next couple of days about the proposal that we are introducing you to today.

Rev. Doran: We have seen a lot of changes in the last few years and even more in these last few weeks. We are just not the same Annual Conference that we were this time last year. We're made up of fewer churches and fewer pastors, but the mission field has not changed. We are still surrounded by persons longing for the grace of Christ to transform their lives, even if they are not conscious of the longing yet.

Rev. Hook: We are aware that almost overnight that we needed to begin right-sizing our Conference to reflect who we are today. You will hear reports from CF&A to that effect in the next day, and Bishop Harvey has already appointed five district superintendents to serve our

entire Annual Conference. As we seek to be good stewards of the resources that we have been entrusted with, we believe there have to be some changes, including a reduction in the number of districts. The Conference Leadership Team—which is comprised of all nine District Superintendents, the nine District Leadership Team chairs, our Bishop, and a few at large members—as we have prayed and wrestled with what is the next faithful step about what is to come, we believe that reducing our Conference from nine districts to five districts—working 9 to 5, the Dolly Parton strategy... Nathan Bledsoe, that was a bad joke just for you—we believe that going from nine districts to five districts is that next faithful step.

Rev. Doran: We believe that it is the connection that makes us stronger together. We know that when we collaborate, God multiplies what we have. We know that when we communicate together, we can find a way. We know that we are at a crossroads in presenting this proposal moving from nine to five districts. That is why this afternoon we are introducing this proposal to this session of the Texas Annual Conference and requesting that you read it carefully. Study the Q&A that has been uploaded to the Guidebook and placed on our Conference web page. Talk with us, any of us—we want to hear from you we want to address your questions to the best of our ability. We want to move forward together.

Rev. Hook: We know that this will change some of what we have done and some of what we will do. We are committed to making sure that no church, no pastor, and no layperson, no lay leader feels left behind. We are committing to connecting, to collaborating, and to communicating as we find these next faithful steps.

The apostle Paul writing to the people of the church of Corinth wrote how church is filled with different people with different gifts, but it is only when we come together that we are truly the body of Christ.

We introduce this proposal to move from nine districts to five because we think this aligns well with who we are at this time. You will find the CLT propose and the FAQs associated in the Guidebook app and on our conference session web page.

Rev. Doran: We look forward to healthy conversation between now and Wednesday morning when we hope to move the adoption of this proposal. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Cindy, Andrew, and members of the Conference Leadership Team. I want you to take a good look. They invite you to go to the Guidebook, to go to all the printed material, but they are also here to answer any questions that you might have. So, I invite you to take them up on that offer and visit with them today and tomorrow. That's why we are introducing it today, reminding you of where you can go for the information. And then on Wednesday we'll bring it back to the Conference, to you, for questions that you might have and hopefully for, as they have said, their hope is that you would in fact consider this and adopt it at this time.

It has been rapid, fast paced afternoon and I thank you for hanging in there with us to the presenters, thank you for sticking to your time. Most of you, anyway, and...

Rev. Gilts: We do have a couple of minutes if you want to introduce the man next to you.

Bishop Harvey: The man next to me. The tall guy next to me. This is Bishop Tom Bickerton. Tom Bickerton is currently the resident Bishop in New York, and he is also—like a lot of us—he has two and three jobs. You've already heard he is the head of UMCOR at this moment. He is on the commission or the Committee on Central Conference Matters. And I think that's it. And he is also at the same time—save the best for last—he is the President of the Council of Bishops. And it's a two-year term and I held the term before he did. So, we worked side-by-side for the last—a long time—certainly the last two years—and Bishop Bickerton assumed this responsibility in April. And we have just been—it's been an interesting time—we were the virtual committee, the virtual Council of Bishops. I was the virtual Council of Bishops President for two years, holding every meeting that we ever had virtually. Our first in-person meeting was held just a few weeks ago in Chicago. We had not met in person since 2019. That's a long time. So, Bishop Bickerton now is at the helm, leading us at another incredible juncture in The United Methodist Church. We keep running into these thresholds and finding that we are living in a between time. We haven't quite left one room and our foot is in the other. So, Bishop Bickerton, here is your five minutes back if you'd like to offer anything. There will be other times when we can certainly share some time together, and you might be able to address the Conference. We also call ourselves the long and the short of it as I am –

Rev. Gilts: Why is that, Bishop?

Bishop Harvey: Stand up.

Rev. Gilts: Oh, I get it.

Bishop Harvey: This is why. I am four foot nine and I think he's six foot nine. I don't know.

Bishop Bickerton: Not far off.

Bishop Harvey: Not far off. And we've worked together for a very long time. We've worked at UMCOM together, we did Nothing But Nets, Imagine No Malaria together, and we always seem to end up side-by-side as a duo along the way. He was my backup at the 2019 General Conference when I was in that infamous chair at the 2019 special session and he was behind me guiding me throughout that time. So, I invited him to do the same here today.

Bishop Bickerton: Thanks. Hi, everybody. It's been a great day. It's just great to be with you.

Bishop Harvey said she was my predecessor in the role of the Council of Bishops so it really is the past president and the current president to be able to say—I don't think either one of us, I don't think we made too much of the role of being the President of the Council, but we also haven't lessened it, either. And so, I think that both of us can say on behalf of the 13 million United Methodists in the Philippines, on the continent of Africa, and all throughout Europe, and in all the 50 states of the United States, we bring greetings to you from The United Methodist Church.

And I think it's safe to say that there have been times over the course of the last couple of years when the Texas Annual Conference came to our mind, and we prayed. And there have been times over the last year in particular that in very intentional times, we've been in meetings where we've prayed for the Texas Annual Conference. We stand with you, and I can't tell you what a joy it is to be in the same room with an Annual Conference of United Methodists that want to be United Methodists.

Just in 24 hours, you have captured my heart. You've evoked deep emotion within me. And I am just... just so, so, so honored to be sitting here with you during this Annual Conference. I congratulate you. I am proud of you. I am blessed by you.

Now, the final thing that I would say today is what Bishop Harvey has said about us, means the world to me. For some reason, on this journey of ministry, God has put us on the same path for a couple of decades together.

And I would just say one final thing to you, or two final things to you. Number one, I believe that God has sent you the right leader for the right time in the right place to do the right thing. And secondly, she has become my dear, dear friend. And so, I would simply say to you, "Please take care of her." She will give you everything she has. Make sure that you take good care of her. And I know that together God will be glorified here in the Texas Annual Conference. It's a pleasure to be with you. Amen.

Rev. Gilts: Bishops, I'm surprised that neither one of you mentions that Bishop Bickerton is a Pirates fan—which has already doubled the fan base in the room. So, Jay Jackson, you have company.

Bishop Bickerton: That wasn't very nice.

Rev. Gilts: I think that concludes our business for today, Bishop.

Bishop Harvey: I was going to ask if you have any announcements before we take off here?

Rev. Gilts: I do, hold on, they're telling me what it is. Oh, parking. So, we do have parking stickers. If you are not staying in the hotel, if you're staying in the hotel, your room key will get you in and out. At least we hope it will because we've had about four sets of room keys so far for my room, but that's a whole different story. But if you're commuting, when you came into to the garage, you got a parking ticket. We've got a sticker that affixes on that ticket that will reduce your parking to ten dollars for the day. And you think, "Ten dollars is a lot!" If you don't have that sticker, you'll discover how much parking really is. So, you'll want to get that sticker at the information desk, which is right out there on what they call the northeast corner of this floor.

I believe that's all we have; we'll resume at nine o'clock. I think we have a prayer here ready to go.

Bishop Harvey: Right. Tony Vinson, I'll call you forward. There are some dinners tonight. I'll remind those who are in the ordination service that there is a rehearsal at First United Methodist

Church—I was going say downtown, but we are downtown—just down the street at seven o'clock. That will give you time to have some dinner and then meet there. We have done a prerehearsal to the rehearsal. Carrie Leader will be leading us and hopefully we won't keep you there for very long. We're just going to walk you through tomorrow night's ordination service. So Tony Vinson, will you pray us home.

Tony Vinson, elder, Superintendent of the Southwest District: Let's pray: Open my eyes that I might see glimpses of truth thou hast for me. Oh, gracious God, in the good work that is so well begun here in this Conference day, we give you thanks. May we clearly see your Spirit moving in our midst, in the reports and decisions that have taken place. May we see that your hand is moving across our congregations as you call persons from the pews to be set aside for ministry. May we see that it's your Spirit that is moving and that these persons have responded to your call upon their lives and have done the hard work that prepares them now for commissioning and ordination.

May we see that it's your Spirit that is moving through the whole church. As we've heard these wonderful and amazing reports from our boards and agencies, may we see that your Spirit is moving in such a profound way that these are not simply bureaucratic, ivory tower, somehow detached from our local church ministries, putting a drag on our budgets, but rather, O God, they are partners in ministry who stand alongside us to empower and enlarge our ministry and our witness, around the world and around the corner.

May we clearly see, O God, that you are moving in our midst as we prepare for a new day in our Annual Conference and in our local churches. As we prepare to make the decisions that await us in the days ahead at this Annual Conference, and as we prepare to do the work in ministry to which are you calling us in the years ahead for each of us, may we be quick to give you our hearts in grateful praise for the ways in which you clearly are moving in our midst. We pray these things in Jesus' name. Amen.

Business Session II

Tuesday, May 30, 9:00 a.m.

The Conference was called to order at 9:03 a.m.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: We've got a lot of business today and we've got a lot of great table work this afternoon that I don't want to cut short. So, I'm going to try to push us this morning to get through the more businessy things. We've got some wonderful awards to present, but I want to make sure that we move swiftly so that we can get to our table conversations and give that the time that is deserving this afternoon.

I will say—just remind you of where we've been. We started on Sunday—I hope you agree that it was a time of revival. Yesterday, was all about renewing and renewing our connection and hearing from our partners around The United Methodist Church. So, I hope you got that sense of how important our connection is.

Today is all about reinvigorate. And so that is why we are doing a lot of our awards today and the highlight of this day is ordination this evening, and it's at seven o'clock at First Church and I know it's going to be a beautiful service as it always is. And so today is the day to focus on what it means to be a reinvigorated Texas Annual Conference. So, I hope you'll be attentive to that and attentive to one another.

And I'm going to now invite Deborah Hawboldt to come forward and start us off this morning. We'll take their report and then do a moment or a time of worship and we'll return back to some of our other reports. So, Deborah Hawboldt.

Report of the Center for Leadership Formation

Deborah Hawboldt, elder, Director of the Center for Leadership Development: Good morning. My name is Deborah Hawboldt and I'm pleased to now serve as the Director for the Center for Leadership Formation. The various reports from our center begin on Page 66 of the Pre-Conference Journal. Our Center has experienced a few changes since last Annual Conference when we were gathered and will experience a couple more changes immediately after this conference. Nancy Slade, our long-time administrative assistant retired this past year. Morris Matthis, our Center Director, was tapped to lead the Central North District as Superintendent and continue as New Faith Communities last November and is now entering retired status and is probably somewhere on his bike right now over on the East coast. Robert Besser, the Assistant Director for Church Leadership, as you know, became the Treasurer and Benefits Officer for the Conference. I want to thank all three of those for their service to the clergy and the congregations in the Conference through our Center.

And effective May 31st, we also say goodbye to both Dayimi Pimentel as the Racial and Ethnic Ministry Coordinator, and to Ivana Wilson our Candidacy Manager. Again, I want to say a great thank you for their ministry to the clergy and to the congregations, for their work in our Center.

I have up here with me this morning the current staff of our Center, and I want you to know each one. Bonnie Osteen remains the Coordinator for the Intentional Interim Ministries and has added

responsibilities for the Ministry Specialist Program, as well as pastoring a new faith community in Jacksonville. Ana Robles continues in the Center with the responsibility of being the Administrative Assistant for the Center, aka she runs our Center. And I'd like to introduce to you—you met him yesterday—Ben Burnside, who joins our Center officially on June 1st with the responsibility for clergy recruitment and development and a part of his duties also include managing the candidacy process for the Board of Ordained Ministry. I'm excited to work with these three as we continue the purpose of our Center, which is to recruit, develop, and support clergy leaders and to equip and empower the lay and clergy leaders of the Texas Annual Conference.

Another change in the leadership for a program that reports through our Center is the Conference Coordinator for Certified Lay Ministers and Lay Servants. Dr. Joan Appleton from Wildwood United Methodist Church will be working in that role now and I'd like to introduce her. Joan, will you stand? Joan brings a deep love of lay leadership to that role and I thank Joan for taking on this holy responsibility.

Bonnie Osteen is going to now give an update on the Ministry Specialist Program.

Bonnie Osteen, elder, Center for Leadership Development: Thank you, Deborah. So, the Ministry Specialist Initiative is a gift to your congregation. You may remember from last year that Robert Besser worked tirelessly to offer this resource to you. His leadership and organization enabled this ministry to be launched in January of 2022 with over 60 topics to choose from. As you're looking at this slide, you will see many of the categories, and be thinking about which one of these may be helpful for your congregation. I can imagine that every church may find something on this list that will be a great resource for you.

Since the program has launched, we have had pastors and churches who have utilized this invaluable resource, and I want to encourage you to be added to the list. Why? One reason is because ministry can be challenging—right? —and having someone who can walk with you in a particular area that they have experience and maybe success in is a win-win. The benefits are that you may then grow your congregation in ministry in your next steps.

Another reason, we heard from Dr. Ashley Boggan yesterday, spoke to us about our history of connectionalism, and the importance of this continuing into the future. The Ministry Specialist Initiative is a great example of how we are connected to each other, laity and clergy offering their services in the areas of their experience and benefit from sharing as the body of Christ. For example, perhaps your congregation would like to offer information on care for those with dementia and their caregivers, and how to relate them with the church. We have a ministry specialist who has experience in this very area. Or perhaps you are interested in working with those in your congregation on how to share a faith story with others. We have ministry specialist who will walk alongside you in the storytelling process.

As you have seen, perhaps, the list goes on and on. The process is easy. First, you can go to the website and look at the topics that are available. We have this at our table with the—or you just go to our Texas Annual Conference website and find it there. Complete the online application on the website in the ministry specialist area. I will then be in contact with you and we can

determine which ministry specialist to join in partnership with you and get you started. The report is found on Page 69 and I look forward to matching your congregation with a ministry specialist in the near future. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: All right, thank you for part 1. There is a video now that comes from United Women in Faith. If you could pull up that video for us. Thank you.

UWF Video: Sometimes we all need time and space to recenter and restore, to enrich our spirit and take care of our souls, to energize our relationship with God, and collectively discover how we're called to respond to suffering with compassion, to connect with the community where we'll be nurtured and encouraged to grow.

Welcome to Mission U, a transformative experience designed to recharge and refocus your faith. Gain confidence in your interpretation of Scripture with a justice lens that connects to today's world. Connect across generations and develop the confidence to speak about social issues as a person of faith. It's time to come together and work on meaningful transformation. It's time to recharge with mission U.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. We were just saying how great these videos have been that United Women in Faith have been producing. I know that we have some leaders here in this room that are part of United Women in Faith. If you are in the space, if you don't mind standing so that we can recognize you. Are you here? Okay, thank you. There is a whole table of people back there. Thank you. Thank you for that.

We also now have a retirement video, and this is one that we moved from yesterday to today. So, let's roll that video.

<u>Retirement Video 1 – When I Received My Call</u>

Patricia Parrish Ricks, diaconal minister (video): My call to ministry probably began at a very young age. My mother at one point had wanted to be a Christian educator, and I had always said I wasn't going to be a teacher, and I wasn't going to marry a minister. Which both things did happen in my life, but I had a wonderful Christian Ed director in Nacogdoches and she thought I should be a Christian Ed person, so I was already working with youth and children. I was teaching school and she just called and said they need a Christian Educator in Gladewater, Texas and I want you to go check on it.

So, I did. I interviewed. I said I'm not married. I'm single, let's see how this goes. And so, from there I loved it. I did certification and then five years later I went to Garrett to graduate school and became a diaconal minister in the United Methodist Church in Christian education.

Ricky Ricks, elder, Greggton UMC, Longview (video): I wanted to be a lawyer. And I was working for this company delivering furniture, and we were at this particular house and there was a kid there that was matted with dirt and he just wasn't getting the care—it was pretty obvious he wasn't getting care. And it really troubled my soul and I thought and prayed and I just thought, "Is the law the answer? Is it?" And over a period of time, I just talked with some people

and they just showed to me—it just came to me that, you know—it was really about sharing the hope and grace of God and that's what I've tried to do, is to share that hope and grace of God.

Rudy Rasmus, local pastor, St. John's UMC, Houston (video): You know I started at a Methodist Church, my journey in the faith, 1985. I sat on a pew for five years as a nonbeliever. But along the way, met some of the most contagiously loving people that I could ever have imagined encountering. It was my encounter with Christians at Windsor Village in '92 that actually began my journey towards Christianity. I didn't really believe in any of the principles of the faith, the tenets of the faith. But as a result of my encounter with unconditional love, and even with a pastor who really acknowledged me, he acknowledged my humanity in spite of me not being a part—or a person of the fold per se—gave me an opportunity to look at Christianity in a way that I probably would never have had I not encountered Windsor Village.

Dick White, elder, Superintendent of the East and North Districts (video): I was raised in church—when the doors were open, we were always there. In fact, we had Sunday night worship and I never got to see all of the Wizard of Oz until I went off to college because it always came on once a year on Sunday night. We had church.

And one day in the fall, I just heard my name being called and it wasn't my parents. And so I started praying about it and felt called, and then I had a minister suggest in case it hasn't been a call, for the experience to major in something besides religion in college. So I have a teaching degree in history and political science. But as soon as I graduated, I had a student appointment. for seminary.

Morris Matthis, elder, Superintendent of the Central North District (video): So I grew up a preacher's kid and, you know, loved the church and all that, but itwasn't until college I became a follower of Jesus. It was after that I began to wonder if I was called into the ministry, but I struggled a lot with what it means to be called and became convinced that calling is less about figuring out a path and more about having a deep understanding of how God made you and then asking God, "How can I best be used for the kingdom?" And it was out of that that I became convinced that being pastor of churches in the United Methodist connection was how I could best serve the kingdom. So I did.

Carolyn McCall-Livingston, elder, Mission Bend UMC, Houston (video): Well, I'm second career. I was 42 years of age, divorced in a state of what's next, a depression thing—at least that's what I called it, depression—and I had been actively involved with United Methodist Women ever since I joined the Methodist Church after I got married.

And my mother-in-law, deceased now, used to always say, "Come on, go to Lakeview. Go to Lakeview with me." I started going. Got totally involved with the United Methodist Women. Became speaker, teacher, and people used to walk by and say, "You sure you're not a preacher?" And I said, "Oh, no, absolutely not," you know. And so that carried on and then it was October 1995. I had been going to our senior pastor, deceased Rev. Samuel Jenkins, and I said tell me about ministry. What does that mean? Because I had already been a liturgist in the church, I was in the choir, I worshiped, I grew up in the church, my father was a Baptist minister.

And we had the usual church charge conference. And so he stood up and said, "I'm pleased to announce I have two persons going into ministry." And I'm just looking all around like, "who are these people? I didn't know we had anybody." When he called my name, I heard this real soft voice say, "Here is your sign." And I literally started crying and I could hear people around me asking, "Why is she crying? Why is she crying?" But I couldn't respond in any way. I just felt encapsulated with the Holy Spirit, sort of affirming and saying, "this is it, and the journey is going to be okay." It was so many emotions going that all I could do was cry.

Bishop Harvey: I love the stories. I love the stories. I want you to help me welcome Rev. Cindy Doran. This morning she will lead us in our morning devotional and I've gotten to know Cindy throughout these last five months. And every time I am with her, I am inspired by her leadership, her love for the church and her own story. So thank you for leading us this morning.

Cindy Doran led the Conference in a morning devotional on Ephesians 2:14-22

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Cindy, for that wonderful word and DeAndre and team over here for leading us in a hymn. I have to confess, I've never sang—I mean, I feel kind of embarrassed to say that I've never sang that hymn, but I'm really glad to sing it this morning. So thank you.

We're going to take just a few minutes of a break. We're doing great on time. So what I will ask you is to take a ten-minute break and come back. It is 9:37. And so at 9:47, if you could be back in your seat. We'll just keep going. Thanks.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: Dr. Millikan, Dr. Schwartz, welcome to the Texas Annual Conference. We are so glad to have you and certainly appreciate Houston Methodist Hospital for all that you do. Thank you. Thank you.

Report from the Houston Methodist Hospital System

Charles Millikan, elder (retired), Houston Methodist Hospital: Bishop Harvey, a moment of personal privilege, if you would, please. I just want to say a special word of appreciation for you. You and I have known each other for years, and it's just so good to have a United Methodist Bishop. It's my pleasure to serve as your Vice-President for Spiritual Care and Values Integration for Houston Methodist. As you will quickly learn, your hospital is United Methodist. We are invested in diversity, equity, and inclusion and you will find our symbol of the cross and flame fully visible at all of our hospitals. We're proud to host Perkins School of Theology's Houston-Galveston campus as well as being one of the largest centers of Clinical Pastoral Education in the nation. We also work closely with Weill Cornell, New York Presbyterian, and Baylor College of Medicine in having one of the most robust clinical consult services in biomedical ethics in the nation.

But it's now my pleasure to introduce to you the Rev. Stacy Auld who serves as our system Director for Spiritual Care for Houston Methodist. In addition to being an elder in our own Annual Conference, she also serves on the national board for the Association of Professional Chaplains and serves as the Chair of the Accreditation Committee for the Association nationally.

Stacy Auld, elder, Houston Methodist Hospital: Thank you, Charles. Good morning, Bishop, and members of the Texas Annual Conference. It's an honor to share a brief report on spiritual care across the Houston Methodist system. While this report is not comprehensive of all the ministry and impact our chaplains make, I hope this gives you a little insight into the work being done as an extension of our church here in the Texas Annual Conference.

I'll start by giving you a high level view of our team. Across the system we have 120 employees in spiritual care. There are 61 chaplains when you combine our full time with the part time and PRN, and we have a robust clinical pastoral education program with 32 students and five educators. Most of our chaplain staff is deployed to our eight hospitals across Houston, but one thing to note is that in the last three years, we have expanded by dedicating a chaplain to the corporate employees, to the physicians' organization, and I'm in the final interview stages of hiring a chaplain to serve the scientists, researchers, and employees in our academic and research institute. This will round out our support, if you will, so that every single entity within Houston Methodist has dedicated chaplain support, which will fulfill part of our Houston Methodist mission, which states we seek to provide a spiritual environment of caring. We want that not only for our patients, but for our staff and our providers.

Now that we've seen a little bit who we are and where we are, let's turn to some of what we do. As chaplains, we frame our ministry through the categories of patient care, staff care, values integration, and community involvement.

Here is a quick look at our stats for 2022. Now I know we're about halfway through 2023, but this gives you an idea of some annual numbers. On the left side you see numbers related to patient care. Over 183,000 documented patient visits by our chaplains. And then you see spiritual care made by our volunteers who add an additional 40,000 plus visits. We could never reach as many patients as we do without our dedicated volunteers. And then you see we've helped educate and execute over 7,000 advanced directives for our patients as they are making decisions related to their medical care.

Now on the right-hand side you see some stats related to our staff care. The one-on-one is obviously some individual, personalized ministry that is happening one to one, but both the group support and prayer huddle number that you see there is only the number of gatherings, so you can imagine the number of staff impacted in those moments. To have a hospital culture where prayer huddles are happening every single day is a beautiful testament to who we are.

Regarding values integration, these are a couple of pictures from events that we did all over the system in March called our I CARE Recharge. Many of you know that our values at Houston Methodist are integrity, compassion, accountability, respect, and excellence. And while we do things every day to help nurture and integrate these values into our culture, every year we have a week dedicated to recommit to them. This year, every department throughout our hospitals, our corporate buildings, our clinics created a display board to illustrate how their team lived out the I CARE values in the last year. This picture on your left is of our big lobby down in the Med Center, and for a week there were over 150 department posters on display for employees and guests to view and to be inspired.

Now the next few slides touch on our community involvement, and I've highlighted some of the ways in which we are connecting specifically with our Texas Annual Conference community. The first one is something that I have personally loved doing over the years. Offering my gifts as a professional chaplain to train lay members who join the pastors in making hospital visits has brought me so much joy. Most recently I've trained a group at First Methodist and this coming weekend I'll be training a group from the new Mosaic UMC in Cypress.

Last year at Annual Conference we recognized 10 UMC churches who had adopted a clinical unit at the Medical Center location. These were such thoughtful and sweet partnerships where the churches dropped off notes of encouragement, decorations for the break room and snacks every month for either six to twelve month during 2022. The picture on the left are nurses who received snacks in a cute box decorated by the Vacation Bible School kids at Seabrook UMC last summer.

The picture on the right is one of our own clergy, Lindsay Kirkpatrick, and her sister who is a labor and delivery nurse at Methodist—many of you may have seen the article run in the Cross Connection: They partnered together and with the grant money from the Texas Annual Conference, nurses were sent to a bereavement training course and supplies were purchased that

provided additional comfort when families experienced the loss of a baby in our hospital. This gift made such an impact that now additional funds have been dedicated for L&D nurses from each of our hospitals across Houston to receive the same bereavement training so they can better care for families from these difficult times.

Turning to our Cypress area, many of you know that Houston Methodist is building a new hospital off of 290. Partnerships are forming in that area so when the doors open in early 2025, we'll have strong UMC connections and trained volunteers to support the patient needs as the professional chaplains build their team.

And the last thing I want to highlight is a new monthly email that will be hitting clergy in-boxes in July. I've been working with the Conference office to establish a way to provide some video-based resources for the clergy. During the pandemic, Houston Methodist created so many new things in an effort to care for our frontline clinicians. Everyone from wellness, spiritual care, HR, our music therapy team, we all created content hoping that something would resonate with an employee on any given day. So I've been given permission to share some of this content with our clergy as a way to extend this same kind of care to you. Thanks to Bishop Harvey for providing the platform and the sincerity behind this new You Matter initiative.

With that I had like to turn things over to Roberta Schwartz. She is someone that I have learned so much from her over the years I've been at Houston Methodist about leadership and she's here to provide a general Houston Methodist report in Dr. Marc Boom's absence as he is traveling with his family this Memorial Day week. So we're happy for him, but we'll look forward to having him back next year. Roberta Schwartz is the Executive Vice-President and Chief Innovation Officer for Houston Methodist Hospital. She's responsible for overseeing all operations at our 946-bed hospital which has been named by U.S. News & World report as the No. 1 hospital in Texas for 11 straight years and has also been named to the publication's prestigious honor roll of America's 20 best hospitals six times. In her role as Chief Innovation Officer, Roberta is responsible for advancing and expanding Houston Methodist's digital innovation platforms including telemedicine, artificial intelligence, and big data.

Roberta Schwartz, Houston Methodist Hospital: It is my honor to actually provide this report on behalf of our Board of Directors, on behalf of Marc Boom, and my first time to address the Conference. So thank you for having me.

So obviously you all have been following our vision for the second century as we really look at now past-100 years of existence of Houston Methodist, now sandwiched in between two pandemics, and really what I'm here to show you is that when we focus on those fundamentals that are happening within the hospital, kind of accolades and awards that you just heard about, they follow, but they are all based in really what we deem as the quality of the organization. And I'm going to show that to you in three different ways.

The first of which is Vizient, and Vizient is an organization that sheerly tracks quality. The number at the bottom is the number of hospitals in each one of the cohorts that we measure our quality against. For example, the academic facility that would be 107. And for our community hospitals, sometimes that's 145 or 125. But as we look at each one of the hospitals, they are

measured on their quality, on their safety, on their service, on their equity, each one of those metrics are measured.

And when we look at that, when you look across to that blue... that blue and green color, you are looking at every single one of our hospitals, not one, not the academic facility, not the main hospital, but every single one of our hospitals now having achieved top awards in each one of their categories in terms of quality. No, not every hospital is rated in terms of U.S. News & World Report. When we look at each one of these hospitals in U.S. News, they each rank differently because they rank all of the different specialties and the depth of the specialty that you're going to have the academic medical center here in the Texas Medical Center campus.

When we look at that, you can see each year improvement. This is not only going to measure quality, but it's also going to measure reputation. And quite honestly, we should be in the top five if you look at just the quality. And we really are, but when they add in that reputation, some hospitals have a very, very long history and it will take us just a few more years to exceed them. But I'm not worried about that. We'll get into that top ten here shortly. It's one of those things we're very proud about.

Leapfrog, which is a survey that is measured mainly by the payer community, is something that's very important for our managed care contracts and you can see again that depth that's happening at each one of our different hospitals in each one of your communities. So something to be exceedingly proud of when we look at this.

Stacy spoke about our innovation side, and what's happening on our innovation side? One of the things you should know is one of the most popular programs in our hospital right now is adding virtual nursing. And can you say, "what is a virtual nurse? Nurses are at the bedside"—which I'm going to show you how well they do at the bedside—but when we look at smart hospitals or more importantly right now, the world's most innovative companies (this is not hospitals, this is not specific, this is America's companies, so you're talking everything from Apple to Google to everything) we are now rated No. 40 in terms of the nation's most innovative companies. We added virtual nursing to support our nurses doing their paperwork so they could spend more time at the bedside. We're looking at installing bio buttons on our patients to measure all of their vital signs so we can measure them minute to minute and no longer have to wake patients up. That one gets the clapping because you. all know that's pretty miserable. When we look at ambient intelligence, it's warning us that people are going to fall or things are going to happen in advance of them happening. That's why we're on this list of most innovative companies for really doing all of this exciting work.

But it's not just there. As Charles said, it's a diversity, equity, inclusion initiatives that has ranked us up on top of the hospitals. You can see where we are ranked in terms of all the hospitals across the country in terms of our DEI initiatives. This is on the, again, all employers, not just hospitals. You can see right up top of the hospitals is where we stand.

Speaking about our nurses, when we look at Magnet, Magnet is that organization, they are named Magnet because the idea is you magnetize those nurses to stay at your hospital. If you have particular initiatives that are supportive of your nursing structure, we are one of the only

hospitals in the country that have every single one of our hospitals that is recognized by Magnet. Which is real incredible.

We celebrated 10,000 transplants here a few weeks ago—10,000 people—who have achieved the gift of life. And with every one of those patients who has gotten a transplant, there is a donor family behind, that we celebrate and we are thankful to for the gift they have given to our patients. And let us not forget all of those patients we treated with COVID and those that did and did not survive, many of who came through our hospital. We treated an extraordinary number of COVID patients and our caregivers did an extraordinary amount to take care of those patients.

This slide—it would take me hours to go through the importance of each number on this slide—of our academic initiatives, but let me just point to a few. Look at the size of the grant portfolio that started at zero and is now amassed as to one of the largest independent research facilities in the country. Again, not being a medical school, this looks a little bit different so we rank ourselves on independent medical schools.

And again, from a time where we had a separation from Baylor in terms of our residency programs and built back from zero, you are now looking at over 65 programs that are graduating people. We graduated our first medical school class, the engineers, engineering and medicine, last week actually from our Texas A&M partners that are here rotating with us at the hospital and that program is growing. But also on June 19th we'll graduate this next class of residents and it's very exciting to have that.

We are growing, and we continue to grow. Your hospitals are not done. Most of them having doubled and tripled in size from where they originally started. New buildings have been built to provide better facilities for our patients, almost all of our beds now being private as no one likes to share a bed with everybody. And as Charles mentioned, each one of these buildings having the flame and cross proudly affixed as we are a part of the Texas Annual Conference.

So with that, I close my report to you. I am so very thankful to each and every one of you and the church and the Bishop who guides us each day in the values that we have created at the hospital, in the way that these values are firmly affixed in our employees and everything that we do each day. We hold them very close and very dearly. While not everyone can repeat our mission and vision statement, believe the one thing they can repeat is the I CARE values every single moment of every single day, and everything that we do I often say we'll hire and fire for our I CARE values, because they're the things we hold the dearest to our hearts. So on behalf of Houston Methodist Hospital, again, Marc Boom and our Board, thank you for all you do and thank you for the honor of being part of the Texas Annual Conference.

Bishop Harvey: I hope are you reinvigorated. Are you going to be super reinvigorated by the end of the day today. I now will invite Josh Pulver and give us a report on Lakeview.

Report from Lakeview Methodist Conference Center

Josh Pulver, President & CEO of Lakeview Methodist Conference Center: Thank you, Bishop. Thank you members of the Annual Conference. I realize like this is weird for some of y'all to be seeing me in a tie. Some of you this might be the only place you see me. So it may not be

weird. But normally, at least in Lakeview, you see me in shorts and T-shirts or boots and jeans—I've been doing some work lately, especially. But it truly is an honor to be here with you all this week. It truly is an honor to celebrate moving forward in Christ, and as a community of faith.

I bring you greetings from Lakeview. As you know... I know it's been an eventful 12 months for you all and as I spoke with you last year, it's been a challenging 12 months for Lakeview as well. While it's not been a popular decision, Lakeview has maintained a position of neutrality during this difficult time. Each decision we've made, trying to balance the demand from now two denominations that have called Lakeview their home for 76 years. This position has proven to be a difficult place to stand as people in both denominations have expected Lakeview to choose a side and expressed their frustration through communication or pulling their support when we did not. Our prayer is we can all take a lead from our youth and continue working together in the future. Lakeview is your home. It is our priority for all Methodists—United Methodists—to know that Lakeview is your place, it is your thin place, and we want you to come and experience God in the natural setting that we have there on our property.

As a lifelong United Methodist, this has been a painful year for me, personally. I have brothers and sisters in Christ here in this room and the other denomination that I love dearly. Like you, my family members in Oklahoma have been forced to make life-altering and ministry-altering decisions that they never thought they'd have to make. My constant prayer is for God to guide myself, our staff, and our board in the path that he wants Lakeview to move forward. That path seems to have been made clear for us from day one and has provided the strength for us to continue working with both denominations as we move forward.

So let's have some fun. [Lakeview promotional video played] Who is ready to shine with us this summer? If you are my era or older, you know the Newsboys and that's actually one of my ring tones and has been for a long time. So when we were looking for themes and everything, God really placed Shine big on my heart this past year. It is time for us to shine. It's time for us to shine God's love and grace to all that we encounter. And that's what we want to be at Lakeview, a place for everyone to come and feel loved, to feel inspired, to learn more about God and God's love for them, and to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ.

As you can see, we do have three sessions of resident camp this year—we combined it down to three weeks this year. As I mentioned last year, we were forced to increase the cost of camp for this summer. This increase will truly be shown in the improvement in the experience for our campers and the adults. We are blessed to be adding quality staff this year that will be in addition to leaders in our cabins. In the past, we have experienced challenges in recruitment of quality leaders and the occasional situation of adults leaving even without notice during camp for various reasons. I hear your response, and trust me, it's worse in the moment. We know this will create a more consistent and positive experience for our campers and our volunteer leaders as well.

Earlier this spring, our staff hosted a retreat for our age level directors and went over the curriculum and discussed ideas for camp. One area of focus is workshops. It is important to Lakeview we provide quality workshops for our campers that will help them grow in their faith journey. As we reallocate some of our resources to focus on the spiritual experience of our

campers, another change is the hiring of one single worship team for each session of camp. For session A and C, we have a worship team from Oklahoma coming down that led worship in Midwinter this year and did a phenomenal job leading a wonderful worship experience. In session B, for all of you Aggies in the room, you'll appreciate the Breakaway ministry worship team will be there leading session B. All of our campers will be combined for a time of praise and then they will separate out to their separate age levels for a time of message from the preachers.

We did have a combination of curriculum this year, and I know that's been a point of tension for some people. In trying to work with both denominations, it was important that we tried to give a centralized curriculum that was acceptable to both, so did have someone involved with the Global Methodist Church help write the curriculum, with input from United Methodist clergy and other leaders in The United Methodist Church. So I want to assure you that we have gone through steps to try to make sure it was acceptable to both denominations.

Over the years, we have had many fun attractions. And we're excited to bring back a Lakeview favorite this year, the Wet Willie will return this summer after an eight-year hibernation. I say hibernation because it has been locked up in a closet for eight years. An additional level of insurance is necessary to operate this. We're spending—I'm serious—It's \$11,000 just to bring this item back. But we decided that it, along with other possible mobile activities, is worth the investment.

We're also making some additions to Lakeview. This summer you will see some new poles installed on the bank of Lake Lemmons. At Midwinter 2024, Campers will have the first opportunity to zipline across the lake and back. We showed this last year as part of the Lakeview plan. Our board agreed that it was time to take that first step, and we are thrilled to add these four lines with lighting also for night ziplining. We are building this to be accessible for people of all abilities so there is nothing to keep you from this exhilarating ride.

Rev. Gilts: But fear itself.

Josh Pulver: And we do mean that. The ziplines along with a challenge course that's coming with it will be completely accessible.

While new and exciting activities is important, it is important for us to continue upgrading our lodging and meeting spaces. We recently invested over \$83,000 in upgrades to our hotel and family-style lodging. We replaced each full-size bed with a brand new queen-size bed. That was a lot of work this past week for our staff. We have added new covers, linens, and four pillows for each bed. You'll also find new luggage racks, mini refrigerators, and hair dryers in each room. That's important. The photo you see was taken before the changes. To see our upgrades you can come visit us. Or you can check out our 360 tour which will be on our new updated website soon. These changes, along with other capital improvements, are crucial to Lakeview's future. Fire pits like the one shown in the picture, and other gathering spaces will be added around the facilities.

If you feel led to help make an impact at Lakeview through donating funds to help with these spaces, please contact me and I'll be sure to help make that happen. When the Conference ended financial support of Lakeview, it became difficult for us to make improvements to our facilities. Our lower rates, historically, have not provided us the revenue to continue upgrades, and therefore, we have many facilities that are outdated. This must change and we want to do this without making drastic increases in our rates. It takes a lot of money to operate, maintain, and update Lakeview. We need your help by attending camps, retreats, and supporting Lakeview financially, and spreading the word that Lakeview will always be your place, a place for you, your congregation, your and family and friends to call home. This summer, as you come to Lakeview for camp or other reasons, you'll see banners that welcome you home as you come onto the property.

Last year we had a wonderful golf tournament. We were able to raise over \$10,000 for scholarships and capital maintenance. With the drop in fair share goal funds, we are increasing our efforts to build our scholarship funds to help kids come to camp. Each year that becomes a bigger necessity for us. This year's tournament will be held on November 6th at The Tour 18 course in Humble, Texas. Registration will open soon and we hope you'll come join us for a great day on the links. If you don't play golf, there is still ways to support the golf tournament. We're always looking for sponsors, and other gifts are very nice.

As always, we continue creating new opportunities for you to experience God at Lakeview. Family camp has been a popular event and we are reorganizing it for a return to Lakeview in 2024. We want families to come and enjoy all that Lakeview has to offer including the ziplines. Midwinter continues to be a wonderful experience, and this year's was packed with powerful worship, workshops, fellowship, and fun. It also showed that youth from both denominations can come together at Lakeview and focus on what we all have in common. After receiving several requests, we are adjusting the time and it will be moved to February of 2024.

I mentioned our updated website earlier. IheartLakeview.org will be your new source for information at Lakeview, whether registering an event, booking a retreat, making an impact through donation, praying, or mission work, or simply gathering more information, we think you'll find IheartLakeview.org easy to navigate. Now more than ever it is vital for us to market Lakeview to new people and new geographic areas.

The recent denomination changes, along with Texas A&M announcing that they are relocating Fish Camp closer to College Station, has created the need for us to refocus and continue developing Lakeview to attract new groups in the future. Some of you may have heard when the announcement came out that Fish Camp was leaving, that they were leaving immediately. We still... We know they are going to be around for a few more years. There are also concerns mentioned of safety concerns and other things like that, and I want to you assure you that there were no safety concerns of Lakeview being an unsafe place. There were just concerns with our proximity to level 1 trauma care, as well as they have many people that travel to and from Lakeview each day for presentations, and the time of travel was just a major concern. So they are looking to locate to a new facility there, near closer to College Station.

My contact information is on the screen. And I would love to talk with you or come speak with you and your congregation about ways we can be in ministry with you. Whether hosting your groups or bringing programs to your congregations, Lakeview is a ministry resource that continues to be underutilized. Thank you to those of you that continue to make Lakeview your thin place. The Lakeview experience is powerful for all people, young and not so young. We plan to continue making it a better experience for each person that visits holy grounds. I pray you will give us a chance to continue being that place for you and your congregations. We are excited to continue working with you in the transformation of the world and strengthening God's kingdom. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Josh. Thank you. I now invite Alan Brown to give us a report from our Methodist Retirement Communities.

Report from Methodist Retirement Communities

Alan Brown, President & CEO of Methodist Retirement Communities: Thank you, Bishop. It is good to be with you today. And after that Lakeview presentation, I can tell you we have some residents that will be the first ones on the zipline. We may need to work that out. So we look forward to that.

Bishop Harvey: Work on that insurance policy.

Alan Brown: That's right, that's right. It is a pleasure to be with you today and to be a part of the Texas Annual Conference. On behalf of our MRC Board of Directors, our residents, our employees, I'm grateful to be here today and share our report with you. I want to begin with our mission statement: Our mission at MRC is to honor and serve older adults as an expression of Christ's love. Our board reaffirmed that mission statement a couple of years ago at a strategic planning retreat and everything that we do at MRC is about honoring and serving those that choose to live with us and then also that we serve in the community, but most of all, we're committed to sharing the love of Christ with them.

Let me give you an overview of MRC. We now have 13 locations across Texas. If you go up the I-35 corridor, we have one campus in Fort Worth—=it's just west of I-35—but everything else is I-35 and east. We serve over 2,000 residents every day. We have over 1,000 employees and we're developing opportunities to serve elders apart from our campus locations.

One thing I'm excited about is in the fall we'll be launching a new ministry in the Huntsville area, partnering with local churches—one of those being First United Methodist Church of Huntsville—to serve those in the community that are living with forgetfulness, to provide respite care to them and their caregivers. So we're excited to begin that in Huntsville And we look forward to continuing that across the state.

Now let me share some things that have happened since I saw you last year. We celebrated MRC's 60th anniversary last year of serving older adults. If you remember back, we shared with you that in 1958 a group within the Texas Annual Conference had a vision for a retirement center. And what became MRC was incorporated in 1958. We opened our first campus in 1962 in Galveston. And we have been serving elders ever since.

In the last year, we have experienced occupancy growth, which is a big deal—we want our buildings and our properties to be full. COVID was a difficult time, the three years of COVID, as we had admission restrictions in a lot of areas, we had lockdowns, we had all kinds of challenges, but since we've been able to return to some type of normalcy, people have been coming back in droves and we're grateful for that. Last summer we opened our new campus in Fort Worth, Stevenson Oaks, and we want to invite you to come and tour that and be a part of that. We continue to achieve the highest rating in quality from our annual reviews, both from the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare, as well as we compare ourselves to others, our peer group, and we consistently serve—achieve five-star ratings and above.

I'm very proud of the fact that through our Covenant Fund we provided 3.4 million in benevolence assistance. I'm thankful to Bishop Harvey for her continued support of our Mother's Day offering. Thank you to churches that give to that. If you don't, let me encourage you to do that. And then, also, let me remind you, a lot of times there is the impression that folks can't afford to live on our campuses. We are committed to admitting people that don't have the funds. The only limit that we have is the amount of money we can raise to give away. The more money we raise, the more money we can give away. If you have someone who has a need, if you retired clergy think you can't afford what we do, please reach out to us. It's campus-specific, if we're in your area, please reach out to use and let us see if we can help.

We initiated a highly successful social media campaign. You may think that's a little odd, but as a part of our strategic plan, we are committed to being an advocate for older adults and successful aging. So you may ask why are we getting into social media? Well, the dilemma is ageism and the perception of older adults. You know in our life we go through a lot of chapters. We have the chapter of being a child. We have the chapter of being a pre-teen. We have the chapter of the teenage years. We get our driver's license and all those things and we're always looking forward to the next chapter. Young adulthood, marriage life, career, middle age, all of those things and then we begin to get 65-plus and we think, wait a minute, I'm not sure about these chapters. And those folks that are coming behind us, sometimes they tell older people to sit down, go retire, and be quiet. That's not the perception of aging that we want to have.

It also impacts our workforce. Going into COVID, a lot of retirement communities had the negative perception of the workforce of saying I would never want to work there. COVID did not help any, but we want to proclaim the message that you can find purpose-driven work serving older adults and we also want to show the world a new view of aging full of life, meaning, and engagement. Older adulthood is just the next chapter in your book of life that you are writing before you get to the eternal chapter, but those chapters that you are writing until you take your last breath, life can be full of meaning and engagement. And that's the message that we share. I'm going to show you examples of what we're doing on social media. And the point is we're not promoting MRC, we're just telling the stories of our residents and our employees. And the stories lead people to say, "Wait a minute, I can be engaged and successful in aging," and. "That is purpose-driven work where I may want to be a part of that."

So let me show you some examples of what we're doing. I'm sorry, before we get to that, let me give you some numbers. We launched our social media campaign in August 2022. Since that

time, on Facebook, we have reached 21,000 people. On TikTok, we now have over 18,000 followers—and there may be a few of those in China, we're not sure—but we have over 18,000 followers. We have millions of video views, 755,000 people have viewed our videos in the last 60 days. Several videos have gone viral, over 12,000 shares of content. On Instagram, we have reached over a million people. In the last 90 days, we reached over 90,000 people in the 65+ age group, and over 190,000 if you include the 55 plus age group. So imagine filling NRG Stadium two and a half times over the last 90 days and they are just sitting there looking at the MRC content we put out. It's huge. And if you look at those numbers and say older adults aren't on social media, you're wrong. Let's look at examples of what we're doing.

MRC video participant 1: I'm 29. Every time anybody asked me how old you are—29. And they say, "No." A long time ago, I got a birthday card from Snoopy, and he said, "The way to keep from getting older is to pick an age you like and stick with it." And so I did.

MRC video participant 2: My brother Anthony, along with two ladies from the church, came to Cornerstone. They were inquiring about him having a new residence. This is amazing, what you're doing for him and you're not even related to him. However I can help, I told them we would help because that's part of our mission. I went to my Executive Director and I'm like, "We have to do this." And I found the perfect apartment.

MRC video participant 3: They are the ones that put me in here. They've been doing that for a year trying, trying to me over here. To get away from that woman I was with—she was supposed to be my caregiver, but she's stealing all my money, taking everything away from me. I didn't have nothing. I'm proud I'm here.

MRC video participant 2: We furnished his whole apartment, everything he needed, and he spent his first night with us the very first day.

MRC video participant 3: That is God's will, that I moved in here.

MRC video participant 2: Those ladies, they literally worked a miracle for him. I had to be a part of the story. I'm like, "This is exactly what we're here for." This is better than my paycheck—the reward, seeing him every day. He's thriving, just living his best life. It's what he deserves. He's a veteran. He deserves to live his best life.

MRC video participant 4: Have you heard the conspiracy theory? You're smiling, it makes me think you might have heard this. There's people who say man didn't really land on the moon, that it was manufactured.

MRC video participant 5: Yeah.

MRC video participant 4: What do you have to say to that?

MRC video participant 5: Well, I was out at the Space Center in 2015 for the 50th anniversary of the EVA. A gentleman from England walked up to me, said, "Tell me the truth, we didn't really land on the moon, it was done in a movie studio." And I said, "Come here, I'll show you a few

things that came back from the moon and you tell me that's not the case." We all puckered up like a prune worrying about that flight. Don't tell me we didn't land on the moon. I worked on the spacesuit and saw the footprint we designed on the moon. So I know we were there.

MRC video participant 6: My parents were racist. I didn't catch on to it until I was in college. But they were raised that way. My husband's parents were racist, but they were raised that way. They never saw how evil it was. I remember grade school, I went to a water fountain and it was for the whites and the blacks. Why didn't I know then that it was wrong? The water is the same for everybody. Why was it like that? I was so stupid not to realize that that's wrong. Wrong, wrong, wrong, wrong, wrong, wrong.

MRC video participant 7: As far back as I can remember, I always wanted to be a gangster.

MRC video participant 8: I had a flower shop for about 20 years. This one guy came in. I knew him as our local plumber. "Miss Curry, I have a really special request. I want a dozen red roses. And I want this ring up in the very top rose." I said, "Okay. We can do that." "Let's just do a real small vase with one flower in it." "Who is this going to?" "My wife." "And who do I deliver the roses to?" His girlfriend. He filled out two cards. The card for his wife just had his name on it. So I took the order. He paid for it. I hate to tell you what I did next. I kept thinking, "This little wife deserves roses and a ring no matter what." Much more. So I switched the cards. I didn't feel a bit guilty about it. And the next day, here comes a red pickup. He's driving and the wife is sitting way over close to him.

MRC video participant 9: He was the best man at my wedding.

MRC video participant 10: She married one of my friends of where we went to school.

MRC video participant 9: 1947, but I ran across him and I saw him for the first time in a long time.

MRC video participant 10: I wasn't very convinced until I found out that Rena was here. They brought me up to meet her. To see her again.

MRC video participant 9: Oh, I was so shocked. But I was so proud to see him again after all those years. And to know that I had someone I could go see and talk to about old times.

MRC video participant 10: And she's been with me every day since I've been here.

MRC video participant 11: And how does that make you feel?

MRC video participant 10: Good. Yeah. And I hope it does her.

MRC video participant 9: Yeah, I tell him enough.

MRC video participant 11: What do you love most about her?

MRC video participant 10: Everything. She's perfect for me.

MRC video participant 9: Same way I feel about him.

Alan Brown: A couple of things about those videos, the lady who said she was 29 is 96. The couple at the end, Mr. C.B. is 100. He was in her wedding 76 years ago as the best man—so you never know when love is going to come around again. And for the employee Dee Dee that helped the veteran, 15 years ago Dee Dee as a single mother, was struggling with her kids and that church that brought the gentleman had a Food Bank. And that Food Bank helped her with food. And then 15 years ago they are back and Dee is able to help them and to show them the love of Christ. How those things work.

So we just want to tell the stories and change the world of aging. So we're so grateful for the Texas Annual Conference, for your continued support. You are vital to what we do, to starting us over 60 years ago, to our continued support, our continued relationship. We ask you to join us on social media. If we can ever help your churches or any of you, we can come out and provide information. We don't have to have a campus near you, but we just want to be a facilitator of successful aging. And follow us on social media. Let's make Texas the best place in the country to grow old. Thank you very much.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Before you go, Bishop Bickerton and I both have the same retirement date: 2028. Can we make a reservation now?

Alan Brown: We can. But we need to put you on social media.

Bishop Harvey: Oh, we can make TikTok videos. We can do it and our spouses would love it, too, I'm sure. I can see us in one of those TikTok videos, Tom.

Bishop Bickerton: Let's do it now.

Bishop Harvey: Yeah, Friends... we could do the Friends theme. But we need the fountain. That would be fun. Thank you. I do hope that Texas is the best place to grow old. I'm going to invite now a video. I think we have a retirement video to play. And Deborah, if you and your team could get ready.

<u>Retirement Video #2 – Retirement or Rewirement?</u>

Juanita Rasmus, local pastor, St. John's UMC, Houston (video): Well, I'm not using that word "retirement." I'm using "rewirement." My therapist asked me once in one of our sessions, "Where does the shepherd go to retire?" And I thought, "You know, this shepherd isn't retiring, just rewiring." Standing at microphones and other places, standing in front of cameras and other places, sharing the good news of the power of transformation and what abundant life looks like in an anxious society, in a place, in a world that's always shifting and changing. Who is God inviting us to be now? And so my work will be that work along the lines of what I've always done. Part spiritual director, part transformational coach. Totally, believer in the kingdom of God.

Rev. Charles Anderson, elder, Superintendent of the Northwest District (video): Well, I've been preaching some—since 1994, summer at the Estes Park Center in the Rockies, and I have several invitations over the next year to preach there. So I'm looking forward to that. Looking forward to enjoying living in the Hill Country where we have a home in Boerne. Looking forward to exploring some of my Texas roots. One thing I've begun recently, about six or seven months ago, is volunteering at the Kendall County Animal Shelter working with the cats and dogs there. So when Riley said after an entire career of having rabid people bark at me, snap at me, messing with me, and me having to keep them on a short leash, this seems like a natural transition for those gifts and graces at that point. I'm really looking forward to doing that.

Andy Noel, elder, Chapelwood UMC, retired (video): I'm living into retirement right now with lots of different volunteer activities. I love to teach, so I'm teaching a couple of Bible studies. I love to serve, particularly prison ministry, so I'm a chaplain up at the Walls Unit in Huntsville for the Kairos prison ministry. I love to serve at our food pantry over at the Fairhaven campus and I'm playing as much golf as possible. So that's two to three times a week. My wife and I also are really looking forward to some extended travel. So we've blocked out the summer to travel and looking forward to seeing our granddaughter in Pennsylvania. And just really enjoying a slower pace, but most of all, I love to volunteer. So I'm looking forward to those activities.

David Henry, deacon (video): As my wife and I move together into retirement, I'll be staying in the Bryan/College Station area, and I hope to have a part-time job lined up sometime around September or October with Methodist Retirement Communities, just to keep my fingers in the ministry area. I've been affiliated with them for quite awhile through volunteerism, going and doing hymn sings and leading Bible studies and things like that, and they have a chaplaincy opening I believe and so I hope to do that. I also hope to travel a bit with my wife and write music and read. Writing music has been a passion of mine for quite a while. Writing for adults and children and I hope to be able to do that a lot more. It's also a goal of mine—I'm a pianist—I want to learn all 32 Beethoven piano sonatas.

Bishop Harvey: Great. So I now invite Deborah Hawboldt to come forward. Bishop Bickerton, as I was thinking about making the TikTok videos, both of our spouses are introverts. I think they would just sit back and just watch us do those things. I don't know that they would be equal participants, let's say.

Bishop Bickerton: Let's just say pray for those two people every day.

Bishop Harvey: Indeed.

Thank you. Each year the General Board of Discipleship awards one church that is nominated by each of the Annual Conferences across our connection for the One Matters Award. It's awarded for a church that has gone from zero in one year to at least one profession of faith. And I'd like to invite Patricia Peña, the Director of Diversity and Innovative Community Engagement for the General Board of Discipleship to be on the floor along with Bishop Harvey for the presentation of this award.

This year's award goes to a local church that with great intentionality set out to involve themselves in the life of their community, to be intentional in living and inviting that community to participate in the life of the church, and they had four professions of faith in 2022. This church worked to develop a clear discipleship path for all ages in the church, table groups were formed to help families learn talking points for their spiritual growth. Life groups were started and then multiplied starting with two life groups and now with nine such groups. It's a church that stresses the weekly ABC's—I loved this—always be in worship, be from a life group, and commit to no less than one hour of service a week. I'm sure they'd let you steal that if you wanted. They have great outreach to and with the community. It's become a hallmark for this church including a back-to-school festival, haircuts for children, school supplies and a feeding ministry.

The pastor describes the goal of creating an environment where people, all people, are accepted. And this award comes with a plague from the General Board of Discipleship and a \$1,000 check to the church and I am excited to announce that Angleton First United Methodist Church, pastored by Joel McKinnon, was nominated for our Conference and today receives this award. It was so exciting to get to talk to Joel to talk to him about what was happening at this church and it was just a blessing to get to hear all that you're doing and we're so grateful on behalf of the Conference.

And the final award today is the Eric Anderson Award. An award in honor of the Rev. Eric Anderson from Houston First United Methodist Church and I'd like to invite Kurt Nondorf, the Ad Board chair, and Amanda Davis, the Executive Pastor, from First Methodist to join me to present this award and a generous check from First United Methodist Church. Kurt.

Kurt Nondorf, laity, First UMC, Houston: Thank you, I'm subbing today for my pastor, Lance Richards, because his wife is undergoing surgery, so I'd ask that you keep Lance and Rachel in your prayers. Rev. Eric Anderson was a gifted young pastor who lost his life in service to Christ while serving as an associate pastor at First United Methodist in Houston Since his passing in 1986 the congregation at First Church has been honored to present the Eric Anderson Evangelism Award at Annual Conference each year to an outstanding young pastor who is recognized by the Cabinet as excelling in the practice of evangelism in his or her mission field.

Specifically, the Eric Anderson Award goes to a young clergyperson who meets these criteria: A person of highest moral character, whose integrity and commitment to the Christian faith impresses others to do likewise. A man or a woman who has been endowed with extraordinary gifts and displays a magnanimous spirit. A leader in the church, clergy or lay, who is committed to serving the people of God without regard to socioeconomic status, religion, race, or creed. One who has been an evangelist, winning people to Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, a person who is a good team player and works well with others whether in the role of leader or follower.

Amanda Davis, elder, First United Methodist Church, Houston: This award is presented with a copy of the pastoral prayer that Rev. Anderson prayed in worship the Sunday before he died. This prayer also hangs in our pastoral office suite as a reminder of Eric's faithful service and fruitful ministry. First United Methodist of Houston proudly presents this award with prayers for God's continued blessings on the ministry of the recipient. This award also comes with a check for the clergyperson selected.

Rev. Hawboldt: I'm going to invite them to go to the floor to join Bishop Harvey in presenting this. And this year's Eric Anderson Award goes to a clergyperson who meets all the criteria and many more, as she leads with integrity in the local church and in the Conference. It is my pleasure to announce Lindsay Kirkpatrick from Pasadena, Asbury.

Bishop Harvey and delegates, we have so many stories of faithfulness and fruitfulness all around our Conference. And I want to thank you for allowing me to share some of those stories with you this morning.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you, Deborah. Congratulations to all of you. We are, I think at the point where we're getting ready to move into our retirement service.

Let me just.. I'm going to do something since we've been talking about retiring people for a while. I have met lots of young delegates, both clergy and lay, since I got here. And I'm going to ask if you are under the age of—I'm going to go 20. Would you please stand up that we might recognize you. So we've got somebody way over here as well. Can you see them? All right. Thank you for being here. Some of these people have to be here. You chose to be here when you accepted to be here as a delegate, a young delegate. So I want to say thank you to you. This is such an important time in the life of the church, and if we are really building the church—not for us, but for you, and you will build it for the future that comes after you. So I'm just so excited that you are here and that you're participating. I asked them to sit in front because I think they need to be seen as the leaders right now—not of the future, but the leaders right now of this Annual Conference. So thank you.

Kip, do you have any announcements? Parking. Right? Something about parking, I'm sure.

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: Parking... Something... Colly, do we have parking stickers? Are those available? Yes, we do have that. Bishop, we are running a little bit ahead of schedule which is terrible problem to have. So I think if it's your will that we move into that a

little quicker—I also know that at some point we have a Council of Bishops video. Is that correct? Do you know anything about this, Bishop Bickerton?

Bishop Bickerton: Maybe. I don't know. I think I do.

Rev. Gilts: I think we have that. And if we want to—I'm in touch with my communications people to make sure we have it. Where is my computer? We got it. So if we want to do that and talk a little bit about that.

Bishop Harvey: Sure. This is the inaugural view. Nobody has seen this. This is premier.

Rev. Gilts: Well, they'll welcome feedback. This is a first draft, and it will be perfected after this I'm quite sure. We are—one of the reasons why I thought we'd have a chance to do this at this time, I know that every retired clergy and active clergy of the Texas Annual Conference is required to come to Conference unless they receive permission from you, Bishop, to miss it. I also know that a number of retirees arrived shortly before the lunch on this day. And I'd hate for them to miss their incoming class of retirees. So I'd like to give them a little bit more time to get their parking sticker validated and get in here for that. What do we have about this video? Who is the President of this Council?

Bishop Bickerton: Well...

Bishop Harvey: You are now.

Bishop Bickerton: Me. I think... I think this is the inaugural video of—I think this is going to most Annual Conferences. It's the latest video on reclaim, revive, and renew that's designed to motivate the connection to find its way into its new expression. I think that's it.

Bishop Harvey: We don't know. We'll see.

Bishop Bickerton: We'll see. I think I know what it is, but I'll be curious to see if I'm right.

Rev. Gilts: Well, Robbie, let's see.

Bishop Harvey: If you start it and it's not and we'll stop you.

Rev. Gilts: Looks great so far.

Bishop Bickerton: Yeah, it's wonderful.

Rev. Gilts: It's what happens when I surprise the support crew as well. So apparently not only have you not seen it, our communications team has not yet seen it. So we'll...

Bishop Harvey: Your bishops haven't seen it—the finished product anyway.

Rev. Gilts: Why don't you guys act out—no, we'll move on.

Bishop Harvey: We always act out.

Rev. Gilts: We are ready to move into our Service of Retirement.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, sounds great. So you've got a little extra break. At what point—do you want to move right into it or give them a break in between?

Rev. Gilts: A standing break would be fine, but don't leave. Unless you have to leave, then hurry back.

Bishop Harvey: What about we say... it's 11 o'clock—let's give you five minutes. Okay?

Rev. Gilts: We'll start in five minutes, that will give our team some time.

Business Session III went into recess at 11:00 a.m. Rather than moving into the retirement service, the Conference was called back to order at 11:08 a.m. in a continuation of Business Session III, handling some of the business scheduled for Business Session IV.

Bishop Harvey: Friends, if I could invite you to take your seats. We're going to—we've some musicians making their way here with an expectation of an 11:30 retirement service. So we're going to continue and pick up some of this afternoon's reports so that we can have more time at table for our conversations towards the end of the day. So I've invited Part 3 of Deborah Hawboldt and team, Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and Adam Muckleroy, Intentional Interim Ministries, Bonnie Osteen, and just if you would stand by, Melinda Owens, and we're going try to squeeze in Equitable Comp. Not sure we'll get there but we'll give it a shot.

Rev. Hawboldt: Hello again, Texas Conference. Right now I want to invite Ben Burnside to share with you some of the highlights from the Center for Leadership Formation and the Clergy Leadership Area of our center. Let me say once again, that the various reports from our Center begin on Page 66 of the Pre-Conference Journal and they continue to page 86.

Recognition of Clergy Ministry-Tenue Milestones

Ben Burnside, elder, Center for Leadership Development: Hello. One thing that is not in our report in the Preconference Journal but is an exciting benefit to our clergy comes with a partnership with Houston Methodist Hospital which we heard earlier this morning from Stacy Auld. Watch for the inaugural e-mail, e-newsletter, in the next few weeks and let us know how you like it. I think you'll find lots of great ideas for whole-person health for our clergy.

Last year, we began offering intentional leadership coaching to clergy who made a shift in their leadership. For example, from associate to solo pastor, from solo pastor to senior pastor. We also trained an additional 14 coaches with the Cast Coaching Group. We're pleased to continue to offer coaches to clergy that are making significant appointment changes this appointment year.

In 2022, at the fall Clergy Gathering, we were joined by Dr. Tod Bolsinger for an outstanding leadership program and great worship. In February 2023, earlier this year, the Clergy Leadership Team held a Clergy Reconnect short retreat at Lakeview in order to celebrate being together and meet our new Bishop. This coming September, please save the date for September 25th through September 27th for our next Clergy Gathering at Lakeview. It promises to be great mixture of content around adaptive leadership and wonderful unstructured time with our clergy colleagues. Put the date on your calendar and watch for registration information this summer. I think we all know now better than ever before that clergy time apart is not a luxury, but a necessity for us to flourish in our ministry setting.

As has been our tradition for the last ten years, we want to honor the clergy who are hitting the five-year milestones in their ministry. Five-year increments since full ordination or continuous years of service for full-time licensed local pastors. As the slides for each increment appears, please take note of your colleagues. Be sure to congratulate them on this milestone. We'll be offering the Refresh retreat in the fall to these clergy for a wonderful time of renewal, reflection, and resetting in ministry.

Rev. Hawboldt: So you see the five-year milestones in front of you. If those pastors are present, if you would stand and be recognized.

Very good. And the ten year. If you are here, if you would stand, our ten year pastors.

Then we have our 15 year. We jumped over those and jumped right to the 20 and 25 year pastors. But if you're 15 years you can stand up even if you're not on the screen. Oh, there they are. There is our 15 and if you'd go to our 20 to 25.

And then our 30 to 35 year pastors.

What an accomplishment and we hope to see you at Refresh this fall and then again I'm not yet seeing Adam, and so we're going to see how flexible our video people are and moving to Bonnie Osteen who is coming back again now to talk about—to put on the hat of transitional interims.

Report from the Intentional Interim Ministry Program

Bonnie Osteen, elder, Center for Leadership Development: So since 2015 I have served as the coordinator for transitional, intentional interim ministry specialist. And this is a time for congregations to be provided with an amazing interim. You can see in these pictures a few of the pastors who are certified to serve as interims in our Conference who have served this past year.

There are many different transitional needs for a congregation to have a transitional intentional interim minister. Sabbaticals, maternity, paternity leaves, health issues, death of a pastor or a pastor's family member, the time between appointed pastors and even occasionally for the topic of conflict. Our transitional intentional interim ministry specialists are certified in this ministry to assist congregations with conflict, grief, family systems, and walking alongside you during a particular liminal season. And in the last six years, we have provided interim ministers to over 80 churches in this vital ministry. If you are one of the churches that have received a transitional

intentional interim minister, please stand up. And if you look around, perhaps others will visit with you about your experience. Thank you very much.

We offer a seminar yearly to those pastors who may be interested in serving as an interim in the future or perhaps just working on those skill sets for the current appointment where they serve. either now or in the future. And there is information on our website and at our booth. As I mentioned, the Texas Annual Conference offers to pastors who qualify a time set apart for sabbath renewal. The sabbatical is life-giving to both pastors and congregations. As a District Superintendent stated to an SPRC meeting, this is a way for both the congregation and the pastor to invest in your future. Taking sabbath may remind all of us of the trust and reliance that we crave in God our Creator. The Conference provides an interim minister to the church during the time a pastor is away for sabbatical. at no expense to the church. And the interim is intentional with the caring of the church during the appointed pastor's time away, so that she or he may return with a transformed vibrancy. And it is truly a time in which healing takes place for the soul.

This office is pleased to be able to offer this to pastors and congregations. So please let me know if I may answer any questions you have or stop by, as I said, the Center for Leadership Formation booth for more information and our full report is on Page 68. Thank you.

Rev. Hawboldt: And Adam Muckleroy is making his way to the stage. And so we will then move into our BHECM, our Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry report.

Report from the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry *Adam Muckelroy, elder, First UMC, Canton*: Thank you, Deborah, and excuse me, Bishop.

Bishop Harvey: No worries. We sprung it on everybody.

Rev. Muckelroy: The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry provides oversight and support to eight Wesley Foundations throughout our Annual Conference, some of which are funded and supported through our Conference apportionments. Our campus ministries have a strong history of transforming lives and making disciples of Jesus Christ in our colleges and to our college students.

This year, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry is recognizing and celebrating the appointment of two new campus ministers and so we welcome the Rev. Kyle Tremblay as the campus minister of Lamar Wesley Foundation in Beaumont, and we welcome back the Rev. Tabitha Mock Rankin to a campus ministry role as a campus minister, now with Texas Southern University's Wesley Foundation. I invite you if you are part of a church that's near one of those campuses, that you would reach out to Kyle or Tabitha and consider asking them how you might—and your church—could be of support in their new appointment.

In this new season of the Annual Conference, the task of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry has been to rethink how Wesley Foundations are funded. The decrease in Conference giving is a significant concern to our campus ministries. And moving forward we'll need a three-pronged approach to funding our campus ministries moving forward: The

continued support through Annual Conference apportioned funds, the fundraising efforts of each local Wesley Foundation, and finally and critically, the direct contributions from local churches to our campus ministries.

I want to encourage you to go back to your home churches and have discussions about how you might partner with a campus ministry, one or more of our campus ministries. Perhaps you have one that's in proximity to your church location. Perhaps you have students—former students or alumni who attended a campus ministry. Or perhaps you have a particular affinity for one or more of our Wesley Foundations. We'd ask that you might consider gathering as leaders in your local church and considering ways you might support our Wesley Foundations as an extension of the support of your missional giving.

Our Wesley Foundation pastors are also very willing to come to your church and share about the amazing opportunities and ministries they are doing. All you have to do is call and invite them. Just outside the meeting hall here, you can meet with some of our campus ministers. They have that table set up and I encourage you to stop by and offer a time—suggest a time where they might come and visit and share about the incredible ways they are transforming the lives of college students.

It is a joy for me to come on board as the Chair of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. My life has been impacted through my time in a Wesley Foundation in college and I know there are many here as well. If you are one of those who are—whose life has been transformed in your life, in your college time, would you stand and we can see just the effect they have here. These represent just a few of the many throughout our Conference, laity and clergy who have been impacted by our Wesley Foundations. Thank you.

When you support campus ministries, are you making a difference in the life of a college student. These are challenging times and yet we have a critically important work to be done to help college students grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ at a pivotal moment in their life. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Deborah. And thank you for your adaptability and nimbleness in this time. We are now preparing to move into our retirement service. When we return after lunch we'll go from here to lunch and then we will start with the Equitable Comp report and then we'll move through the afternoon. So I now will turn us to worship. Just a stand up break as we transition the band and everyone else.

Retirement Service

Tuesday, May 30, 1:30 p.m.

The Scripture reading for this service was Isaiah 42:1-10. The list of the clergy retiring in 2023 can be found in the Business of the Annual Conference Report, which forms Section G of this Journal.

Business Session IV

Tuesday, May 30, 1:45 p.m.

The Conference was called to order at 1:53 p.m. Please note that some of the business on the agenda for Session IV was handled in the extension of Session III, found above.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: So friends, I'm inviting Deborah Hawboldt and Melinda Owens to come forward. We are going to pick up where we left off right before we went to the Retiree Service. So we're picking up at Equitable Comp.

Report from the Equitable Compensation Committee

Deborah Hawboldt, elder, Director of the Center for Leadership Development: Hello again. I'm pleased to have Melinda Owens, our Chair of Equitable Comp, come give that report.

Melinda Owens, elder, St. Paul's UMC, Houston: Thank you, Deborah. I am Melinda Owens, Chair of the Commission on Equitable Compensation. The Equitable Compensation report is found on Page 73 in the Pre-Conference Journal. The new piece to the Equitable Compensation report will be a change in our clergy move policy. The proposed change to our clergy move policy is found on Page 79 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

With a diminished Conference budget and a review of how other Conferences reimburse clergy for clergy moves, we want to take care of our clergy and we want to be good stewards of Conference funds. Therefore, the Equitable Compensation Committee is recommending a change to our clergy move policy. Here are the highlights. First, clergy are no longer restricted to use moving companies we have found. As a matter of fact, they are encouraged to obtain competitive bids for their area on their moves. Second, the total amount that the Conference will provide for a move is capped at \$4,000. We still only pay for the move. We do not pay for packing. We looked at past moves and noted the average cost of moves was approximately \$4,000. Yes, we know that there will be some moves that will cost more than \$4,000, and in those instances, we are encouraging the receiving church to assist the clergy person with those costs. And remember, since 2018 any money paid to a clergy for moves is now taxable income. That will not change. We do think that a more competitive process may actually lower the cost of clergy moves.

So Bishop Harvey, on behalf of the Equitable Compensation Committee, I am moving the adoption of our report including the new clergy move policy.

Bishop Harvey: So this is properly before you. It does not require a second because it comes from a committee. Are there any questions? Microphone No. 1.

Brian Brooks, elder, First UMC, Dickinson: Brian Brooks, clergy, Dickinson First. I move to speak against this motion. Do we think that \$4,000 is sufficient to support a clergy family move? A family that is made up of all sizes? Do we really think that every clergy family will be as inclined as they were to move before, knowing that now not only will they be responsible for the tax bill with the move as they have been since 2018, but now they will also be responsible for picking up the difference if their incoming church doesn't do so. Do we not believe that we are putting the relocating clergy family or new church into a more complicated place with this new policy? Will the relocating clergy family have the guts in this new relationship to ask for the difference? Will the new church have the guts in the new relationship to admit whether they can or cannot pay the difference? And if the new church can pay the difference, will they not make other decisions that affect the local church or relocating church family in order to do so? For instance, if the church has a parsonage that they may choose to do maintenance, they otherwise will not do if they have to pay the difference in the move.

I know that we heard on the Preconference meetings that the average move over the last number of years, the cost the Conference paid was \$4,000 and that is how they came up with this amount. I don't know about you, clergy families, but for my family of five, my 2010 move to go two and a half hours was a little over \$3,000. My 2015 move to go an hour and a half was a little over \$4,000. And my most recent move in 2022 to go four hours was \$7,500 with the Conference paying a little over \$6,000 of that. None of these moves included the stuff in the storage room or the attic or the yard. The total charges I just told you about also didn't include all the boxes or the storage fees or the hotel charges that went into the move either.

I hope and pray that we will seriously consider this policy change and how it affects clergy families and how it affects our local churches, too.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. That has been a speech against this motion. Is there a speech for?

Kimberly Carney, elder, Fairwood UMC, Tyler: I have a clarification question. I just have a question.

Bishop Harvey: I don't know where you are. Microphone No. 4. Tell us who you are.

Rev. Carney: Rev. Kimberly Carney, Fairwood Tyler, clergy. I guess it's like a procedure. Let's say that I get a quote. It's over the \$4,000. My receiving church is not able to pay for it, I am not able to pay for it right then, will the Conference cover that and then like allow me a payment plan so that I can go ahead and start on my appointed day?

Bishop Harvey: That's a question. Would either of you want to address that question?

Rev. Owens: As I stated earlier, we know that there will be some cases where the move costs will be over 4,000 and that receiving churches will not be able to assist. Again, we care about our clergy, so in those instances, the clergy can always come back to the Conference and we will work something out to make sure that clergy will be able to move and be prepared for their effective date of serving at whatever local church they have been appointed to.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Any other clarifying questions? Seeing none, I'm going to assume you are prepared to vote. A little head nod or something would help. Okay, so the motion is before us. Could you just repeat what you moved so that they know what they are voting on?

Rev. Owens: Bishop Harvey, on behalf of the Equitable Compensation Committee, I am moving the adoption of our report including the new clergy move policy.

Bishop Harvey: So that is what is before you. So if you are in favor of this motion, please raise your hand. Anyone opposed, same sign. I know I only have one good eye right now—I'm going to have you stand. And I'm going to stand.

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: We do have our tellers available.

Bishop Harvey: So I can see you.

Rev. Gilts: Do you want to go by your eyesight or a teller?

Bishop Harvey: I think I'd depend on some tellers to help me do some counting. How about that? Are we prepared to do that?

Rev. Gilts: Amanda Davis, she's here. Amanda, do you have your tellers ready to go? Alright, we're ready.

Bishop Harvey: So if you support this motion and—I'm going to separate a couple of things here. You heard their report. It includes the motion regarding the move. So I'm going to assume that you... we're just voting only on the move piece. Is that fair? Okay. Got that? So if you are in favor of the motion that is before us, please stand and wait until you are counted to be seated.

Tellers counted affirmative votes.

So if you'll tell me when you are ready for the next group. Okay, you ready? If you are opposed to the motion, please stand.

Tellers counted the opposing votes.

Bishop Harvey: Friends, the motion passes. The vote was 262 to 231.

Rev. Owens: Thank you all very much. And we will definitely be here to help you all live into this new clergy move policy.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. And thank you, Deborah, for your team and doing that homework.

Rev. Hawboldt: And we are done from our Center.

Bishop Harvey: Yes, thank you. I now am going to ask Robert Besser and his team—you're up here for a little while, Robert, so I'm just going to give it to you for the next several minutes.

Robert Besser, elder, Treasurer and Director of the Center for Connectional Resources: I want to invite our friends from the Center for Connectional Resources, beginning with the Group Health Committee, Rev. Seann Duffin the Chair of that to come forward first.

Report from the Group Health Benefits Committee

Seann Duffin, elder, Bellaire UMC: Good afternoon everyone, my name is Seann Duffin, I'm honored to serve as the Chair of the Group Health Benefits Committee. And on behalf of the entire committee I'd like to express our gratitude to the entire Center for Connectional Resources staff, particularly to the Rev. Robert Besser, who has jumped in head first to the exhilarating work of health benefits, to Mr. Mark Hellums, who not only crunches numbers with the best of them but also helps us to think strategically and be continually better stewards of this program, and especially to Mrs. Barbara Kilby who manages our plan, who knows all the answers, who is a genuinely...who is a genuinely good human being, who plays piano at the Conference Office chapel and is—very unfortunately for us—retiring after 15 years of service in the Texas Annual Conference.

Many of you already know that if you have a question about the plan, about whether a procedure is covered or just plain what to do when it comes to health insurance, that Barbara is the one to call. And Barbara, what a gift you have been to us. Because no matter the question we had, you never made us feel silly or short-sighted. You were always compassionate and kind as you helped us find the answer or fill out the form. And we will miss not just your wisdom, but also your presence because—and I mean this very sincerely—you are one of the most spiritually mature people I've ever known. And I know that if you said you were praying for us, you really were praying for us.

And I could go on and on and on, but suffice it to say that we love you. We will miss you. And we are oh so grateful for you. So Barbara, we have a small gift on behalf of the Group Health Benefits Committee. And members of the Texas Annual Conference, would you please join me in giving thanks to God for Barbara Kilby.

And now we can begin the fun part. The Group Health Benefits report begins on Page 143 in the Pre-Conference Journal. Fasten your seatbelts, put your helmets on, this is going to be a wild ride. The Group Health Benefits Committee has made the following four recommendations to changes to our group health benefits plan. Each recommendation requires a vote. And for full details regarding the recommendations, you can refer to your Group Health Benefits report beginning on Page 143 in the Pre-Conference Journal.

The four recommendations are as follows: First, adding a marriage and family counseling as a covered benefit under both TAC medical plans. By both plans, I mean the PPO plan and the

High Deductible Plan. The second recommendation is including hearing aids as a covered benefit under both TAC medical plans. The third recommendation is to adjust billing rates to ensure future sustainability of the group health plan. And the fourth recommendation is approving a settlement payout for eligible active group health participants in lieu of the Texas Annual Conference retiree medical subsidy benefit. Recommendations 1 and 2 require approval, though I suspect not much explanation. They reflect the addition of specific benefits to our Group Health Plan that contribute to clergy and family flourishing. I do however think it's important to provide context and background for recommendations No. 3 and 4.

First, regarding recommendation No. 3, adjusting billing rates to ensure future sustainability of the Group Health Plan. Clergy disaffiliation and withdrawal in 2022 has resulted in a decline in the total number of covered plan participants as of January 1st of this year. Specifically, plan participation has declined from 524 clergy and lay employees to 317. These numbers do not include covered dependents. This reduction in the plan population will reduce both plan costs and plan receipts. However, as we have experienced over the past several years, expenses in the plan are expected to continue to outpace receipts this year and beyond. Of course, this is unsustainable as no change to billing rates will result in projected operating deficits of around \$800,000 this year. \$1.5 million in 2024, and \$1.5 million in 2025.

In order to ensure the long-term sustainability of our health insurance program for clergy and their families, the Group Health Benefits Committee considered several options this year. Including moving from a self-insured plan that we currently have to a fully insured plan operated by third party insurers. Based on careful analysis and study of proposals from these third-party insurers, the Group Health Benefits Committee recommends continuing to operate the Group Health Plan through the existing self-insured model. And we're recommending a two-step plan to eliminate the health benefits operating deficit and thus ensure our plan's long-term sustainability.

Step 1 is to align receipts with plan expenses. With a multi-year decline in group health benefits reserves, it's no longer feasible for reserves to be a major component of plan funding in future years. Accordingly, clergy and lay employee-paid premiums will increase in 2024, followed by an increase in the church billing rate in 2025. Historically, we have heavily subsidized our coverage of dependents by charging far less for dependent coverage than the actual cost. So beginning January 1, 2024, clergy billing rates will be adjusted upward so that a greater proportion of dependent claims expense is covered.

In addition, direct bill rates for laity, early retirees, surviving spouses, dependents of Medicareeligible participants and long-term disabled participants will also be adjusted up accordingly. You can find these proposed rates in the Pre-Conference Journal on Page 159 and 160. And if you need assistance in understanding which plan is best for you or your family, please call Barbara before June 15th to get the wisdom that you need there.

Then beginning in January 1, 2025, the church billing rate will increase from 12.5% to 14.5%. These rate adjustments are expected to recover the projected operating deficits for next year and 2025. Going forward, participant-paid premiums and church billing rates be reviewed annually to ensure plan receipts remain on par with plan disbursements. The goal by the close of 2025 is

to no longer be dependent on the use of plan reserves and investment returns to close operating deficits that have been common in this plan. With these changes, operating deficits are projected to move from 1.4 million in 2023 to 500,000 in 2024, to zero in 2025.

The second step of the plan is to control expenses within the program. To begin, the Group Health Benefits Committee has already directed the Center for Connectional Resources staff, in conjunction with our benefits consultants, the Alera Group, to research and present proposals for alternatives to Boon-Chapman, our current group health benefits plan third-party administrator, or TPA. We believe a change in TPA may provide both a higher level of customer service and lower administrative costs. So that's the context for recommendation No. 3. Adjusting billing rates to ensure future sustainability of our Group Health Plan.

Now regarding recommendation No. 4 and the retiree medical plan. Overall, the retiree medical plan is expected to remain in a surplus position through 2025. The surplus is expected to grow from 7.7 million last year, to 9.9 million in 2025. With annual investment returns expected to provide sufficient resources to meet the annual funding of the retiree HRA accounts over the foreseeable future.

In order to offer flexibility to future retirees and to limit the term of our Conference's liability, moving forward, the group health benefits committee is recommending a settlement plan whereby active clergy and spouses who are currently eligible for the TAC retiree medical subsidy would receive a lump sum payment in lieu of receiving the TAC retiree medical subsidy upon retirement. The payment would be made to eligible individuals on January 1, 2024.

Here are details. There are currently 56 active clergy and spouse dependents in the group health benefits plan who would be eligible for the retiree medical program under—upon entering retirement. In lieu of receiving the annual subsidy in retirement, these 56 active clergy and 38 spouse dependents would receive a lump sum payment from the retiree medical reserve. Under this recommendation, each eligible individual will receive a one-time payment of \$24,000 with the caveat that the lump-sum payment will be reduced by service percentage for those whose first appointment was on or after July 1, 2005. Importantly, all TAC retirees, spouses, and surviving spouses who currently receive the retiree medical subsidy through Via Benefits will continue to receive their retiree medical subsidy. Let me say that again: All TAC retirees, spouses, and surviving spouses who currently receive the retiree medical subsidy will continue to receive the retiree medical subsidy and will not be eligible for or affected by the settlement payout to eligible active TAC clergy and spouses. Once the lump sum distributions are made to the eligible actives and spouse dependents, the retiree medical benefit, that is the annual contribution to an HRA account would be closed to new participants.

These then are the four recommendations of the Group Health Benefits Committee. And with gratitude to this team and to the Conference staff who support our health benefits program, Bishop Harvey, I submit the Group Health Benefits Committee report for acceptance by this Annual Conference.

Bishop Harvey: This is properly before you. Any clarifying questions? Microphone No. 2.

Julie Floyd, laity, South District: Julie Floyd, Lake Jackson laity. I move to divide the question.

Mark Hager, laity, Central South District: Second.

Bishop Harvey: I couldn't hear the first part.

Julie Floyd: I move to divide the question.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. I heard a second. Can you explain how you want to divide the question?

Julie Floyd: I believe Mr. Duffin has it nicely divided up into four there and I would like to divide it into those four to consider four separate motions.

Bishop Harvey: So that is properly before you. Any questions? Are you going to a microphone? This is a debatable question. Microphone No. 4.

Mark Hager: Seann and Robert... Mark Hagar, Saint Paul's United Methodist Church. Can you kind of walk through: is the \$24,000 payment voluntary to opt in or will all recipients receive that \$24,000 and then it's closed?

Bishop Harvey: We have a motion on the floor.

Mark Hager: Sorry.

Bishop Harvey: I was asking if there was any question on this motion. Let's go ahead and take this, dividing the question. You wanted to vote on each of those four individually. Correct?

Julie Floyd: Yes, ma'am.

Bishop Harvey: I want to make sure we know what we're voting on. If you support dividing the question, please raise your hand. If you are opposed, raise your hand. Okay, I think it passes. All right, so Seann, you're going to need to go one at a time. The person with the question, when we get to that one, come back to the microphone.

Rev. Duffin: I believe that the slide that's on the screen will be most helpful for this. So Bishop I move that this Annual Conference adopt recommendation No. 1, marriage and family counseling added as a covered benefit under did Group Health Plan.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. So that is properly before you. Any questions on that one? Seeing none, I'm assuming you are prepared to vote. If are you in support, raise your hand. Anyone opposed, raise your. Okay that, passes. So check that one off. Number two.

Rev. Duffin: Number two, Bishop, I move that this Annual Conference adopt the second recommendation including hearing aids as a covered benefit under both TAC medical plans.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, that one is properly before you. Any questions? Clarifying questions on this motion? Seeing none, assuming you are prepared to vote. Raise your hand if you are in support. Same sign if you are against. Okay, check.

Rev. Duffin: Third, Bishop, I move that this Annual Conference accept and approve recommendation No. 3, adjusting billing rates to ensure future sustainability of the Group Health Plan, specifics beginning on Page 155 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Bishop Harvey: Okay that, is before you. Any clarifying questions on that matter? Seeing none, assuming you are prepared to vote. If you are in support... microphone No. 2.

Julie Floyd: I have a speech against. Would that be in order?

Bishop Harvey: Yes. Okay you are speaking against.

Julie Floyd: Yes, ma'am.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, go ahead.

Julie Floyd: My name is Julie Floyd, I am laity from Lake Jackson. I am also a clergy spouse, and I simply want it to be known that this will deeply impact the young clergy in our Conference. And I know that the committee is aware of that. And I know that they have taken that into consideration.

My daughter is three years old and if this motion were to pass, by the time she is 18 this increase will cost our family in the ballpark of \$130,000—just the increase. And the significance of that hits me really hard. I would love to see this moved to where it's a little bit more equitable. That's not a motion, but that is my purpose in speaking against this, is that I would like to see the percentages of this moved to a place where it is—the increase over the percentages are more evenly distributed between the parties that are going to be affected by it. The increase for families with young children are the ones who are going to bear the brunt of this incredible increase in our costs for health insurance. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. That was a speech against this motion. Is there a speech for? David Horton, microphone No. 4.

David Horton, elder, Faith UMC Spring: Hello, Bishop. My name is David Horton, senior pastor at Faith UMC in Spring. I rise to speak for motion No. 3. Friends, I serve... I'm honored to serve on the Group Health Benefits Committee. I also have two young children and I'm quite concerned about the rising cost of health care. I speak both in favor for the motion because the restructuring of the plan will incentivize the High Deductible Plan. And I wonder if any of our staff or Rev. Duffin could speak to how we're restructuring the plan to actually help people make the more fiscally responsible choice for their families.

Bishop Harvey: So it's a speech for but you have also attached to it a clarifying question.

Rev. Horton: Yes, Bishop.

Bishop Harvey: Could you repeat the question? I don't normally let you do this but I'm going to because you're already at microphone No. 4.

Rev. Horton: Thanks, Bishop. A point of clarification. How are we going restructure our group health benefits plan to incentivize the High Deductible Plan?

Mark Hellums, Statistician: Say again, David?

Rev. Horton: How are we going to restructure our plan to incentivize the High Deductible Plan?

Bishop Harvey: We do have some backup slides. There was a PowerPoint deck of about 21 pages if we could possibly turn do slide 14 in that deck. Do you have that available?

Bishop Harvey: I don't know.

Mark Hellums: See if we can't find this. I think this will add some clarification to what David is bringing up. We recognize the higher costs that families will be having to pay with these changes in rates, but we've actually structured the plan so that there is a good option for families to move to the High Deductible Plan, and in most cases we'll be paying the same premium per month or actually less under the High Deductible Plan. So if we can get this PowerPoint slide up here I think a visual will help bring some clarity to it.

Bishop Harvey: This is like when an overhead projector would be a good thing, right?

Mark Hellums: Okay, just to boil it down without the slide, the change in the premium for the standard PPO which most of our folks participate in for a family is going to be moving, or increasing, about \$515 per month. We realize that's a huge increase on anyone's monthly budget. The High Deductible Plan in 2024 would allow a family to pay on average the same 740 per month, which would change to about 770. So you'd only have a \$30 increase if the option or the consideration by the family was to move to the High Deductible Plan as opposed to the standard PPO, okay? So there is an alternative out there for folks who have their dependents on this plan. We just urge you to look at the High Deductible Plan as an alternative because, as I stated, you'd be liable to maintain those same monthly premiums under the High Deductible Plan.

Bishop Harvey: Kip, can they get to that slide?

Rev. Gilts: We need to know what the slide deck is called.

Mark Hellums: It's called "District Meetings."

Bishop Harvey: Let me ask the person who asked the clarifying question, David Horton, does that answer your question?

Rev. Horton: Yes.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. Microphone No. 4.

T.J. Gabelman, elder, First UMC Rusk: Yes, T. J. Gableman, clergy from Rusk First United Methodist Church. I understand the push towards maybe a High Deductible Plan, but for those of us who have children that have special needs, medications, multiple medications, preexisting conditions, a high deductible, it saves in one sense, but then having a high deductible makes it that much more that we have to put out-of-pocket.

I know, for example, my wife had—with an MRI and hadn't reached our deductible. To do that we would have to pay 3,000-4,000 out-of-pocket to meet the deductible. Thankfully the place said we can do a cash payment of \$450 so it was much cheaper, but we didn't have \$4,000 to just put out-of-pocket. And so if we did a high deductible, that saves, but then in the end if there is something that we need done, we have to pay more to that high deductible and for some of us, that smaller churches, rural churches, that kind of puts some young families in a bind.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. I'm going assume that was a speech against.

Rev. Gabelman: Sorry, that was a speech against.

Bishop Harvey: Great. If you will get the microphone that will also help us up here to keep track. Again, microphone No. 4.

Emily Chapman, elder, St. Mark's UMC Houston, Pecore: Emily Chapman, clergy. I have what I believe is a clarifying question. We are here, as I understand it, because our current plan is not sustainable. And I wonder as we're debating this it would help me to understand if we changed nothing now. Like at what point, what would be the cost to the Annual Conference, to churches, the future of the plan? We're here, I assume, for a reason, and so if you could give me a deeper sense of the need, that would be helpful. Sorry.

Bishop Harvey: I get it.

Rev. Chapman: Was that clear? I'm sorry.

Bishop Harvey: I'm sitting on a pillow if you're wondering. I just got taller.

Bishop Thomas Bickerton: I'm not.

Rev. Gilts: Bishop, I hate to be the... well, I don't hate to be the comedic relief, but I did want to mention as we begin floor conversation that these microphones, all four of them—2023 is a great year because this is the first year I have over discovered these kind of adjustments. There is a handle on them. Now we go back to Emily.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. So can somebody address Emily Chapman's question?

Rev. Duffin: Emily, I think I have the beginning of an answer, and Mark can fill any pieces that I miss. So a reality of our health benefits program is that for the past seven years at least we've operated in a deficit because we as a plan have been subsidizing particular—have been heavily subsidizing portions of the plan, particularly the PPO coverage as in the non-high deductible plan. Because those plan costs are simply higher than the high deductible plan costs to the plan as a whole.

So we've been fortunate for those past seven or so years to also have had investment returns on our reserves that either made up for or came close to making up for the deficit in the operating plan. So we were able to operate at a significant 1 million or more dollars-per-year deficit and make up those returns—or make up that deficit through investment returns on our health benefits reserves. One of the realities of the past handful of years, let's say three years, is that those investment returns have not been as healthy and thus we've been... but we have not closed the gap on the deficit. So, we've been spending the same amount or more, but making less in investment income and thus are spending out of reserves.

So if we continue on that trajectory, next year the plan will operate, the year after that the plan will operate, and very shortly after 2025, the plan reserves will be depleted to the point where we are unable to operate as a self-insured plan. And the option then would be to go to a fully insured plan where some other third-party company administers the program. They tell us it was going to X million dollars a year for your conference's health coverage and then we raise the rates then. That's the reality. We figure out... but at that point would have no reserves to cushion the blow. Does that answer your question? I don't know where you went Emily, does that answer? Yep.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, Microphone No. 3.

John Eshelman, laity, Central North District: Hi, Bishop, my name is John Eshelman. I'm a district delegate from District Central North, Mosaic United Methodist Church. I also have the pleasure of serving on the Group Health Benefits Committee and I'll make a speech in favor of the change.

So in my day job I'm a benefits professional for a large Houston corporation. So as painful as this recommendation is to our clergy, as Seann said, it's necessary to keep the sustainability of this plan. The dependent costs have been well under the costs of what dependents costs our plan today. And so we're trying to make that a little bit more equitable in terms of all participants in the plan. I understand there are some losers in this, some winners in this, but what we're trying to do as a connectional system is support each other in this process.

I'm not happy that we have to make a change, a recommendation of increasing the premiums. We're continuing to look at other ways to lower expenses as Seann mentioned with the change of Boon-Chapman, but this is a necessary step. So I would ask that everyone support this change.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Microphone No. 2.

Jeremy Wester, elder, First UMC Rosenberg: Jeremy Wester from Rosenberg FUMC—just a clarifying question. I believe as it currently stands if you're on the high deductible plan you can't take advantage of the relationship with Methodist Hospitals and get the deductibles and things waived for those costs. Is that true? And if that is true in switching to the high deductible plan, will we lose that benefit or is there other considerations being made to help continue some sort of benefit there with the Methodist system? Thank you.

Mark Hellums: Yes, you are correct. If you're in the High Deductible Plan, you do not have the ability to take advantage of the Methodist deductible write off or coinsurance waiver. That's correct.

I do want to point out -- someone brought up the question about the High Deductible Plan about out-of-pocket costs. Under the High Deductible Plan it's 1,850 per individual, but caps out at \$3,700 for family. So someone was asking the question about what the costs would be for family before they met the high deductible requirement, that would be \$3,700.

The total out-of-pocket costs maximum that you would have to pay in a year would be \$10,000. It's capped at 10,000. Compare that to the standard PPO, the cap is 14,000. So the ceiling on what the out-of-pocket costs are in the High Deductible Plan is actually \$4,000 lower than the standard PPO.

Bishop Harvey: Any other questions? Microphone No. 4.

Lindsay Kirkpatrick, elder, Asbury UMC, Pasadena: Thank you, Bishop. Lindsay Kirkpatrick, pastor, Asbury. Rev. Duffin, I have a clarifying question. And I believe that we just voted to add marriage and family counseling and hearing aids to our plan. I imagine that that will increase costs to our plan. So if we're already functioning at a deficit, and we don't find a way to address that deficit, did we not just make a decision then to increase our deficit?

Mark Hellums: We did the calculations on those two added benefits and they are very small. The number of people that do the hearing aids—we have a hearing aid program right now, it's an out an out-of-pocket reimbursement—the number of individuals that take that benefit is very small. We don't anticipate that having incremental expense to the plan. And in terms of the mental health benefits, we would be replacing the supplemental plan that already offers right now just bringing that in-house to part of the PPO plan. So we don't anticipate incremental costs with that either.

Rev. Kirkpatrick: Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Microphone No. 2 and then I'm going to take a test of the house to see if you're ready to vote.

Joy Johnston, elder, Chapelwood UMC Houston: Joy Johnston, clergy, Chapelwood. I would like a clarifying question. What would be, or have you estimated what the different premiums would be if we don't adopt this and we have to go to a fully funded third-party program? I think that would help us compare the current costs with what the future might hold.

Mark Hellums: Right, we did extensive study looking at moving to a fully-insured product with a third-party insurer. We also received a quote from Wespath health flex benefit. In both cases we were talking about quotes that were about a million dollars higher if we were to opt out of the self-insured arrangement. That's why we're recommending to stay with the self-insured at least for the time being because it is a less expensive option than going to a fully outsourced model with a third party.

Rev. Johnston: I'm sorry, that didn't fully answer my question. I was wondering like for a family, what we pay now versus what we could pay.

Mark Hellums: Okay, given so much to talk about family coverage, right now what it costs the plan right now to insure a family is about \$3,000 a month. So on an annual basis we're paying \$36,000 to ensure a family. Right now, that is subsidized at a rate of 70%. So out of every ten dollars, the plan reserves and the church are covering seven out of ten dollars. Three dollars is to be paid by the participant. What we're recommending is we bump that up to a 50/50 share. Right now, on an average compensation of a participant in the plan, they are paying \$740 per month. With the new rate, they will be paying 1,255 a month. An increase of \$515 per month for a family under what we're recommending.

Rev. Gilts: Mark, I think she was asking about the difference between that and a fully-funded plan.

Mark Hellums: Oh, if we going to a fully -unded arrangement, they would issue us a quote based on \$36,000 a year. So it would be more expensive and the chances are what we would have to charge individuals in the plan would be more than what we're recommending here under option 3.

Rev. Johnston: Okay, thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Is there somebody else coming—if somebody can give them hand with the microphone there. Thank you.

E.B. Beasley, clergy, retired: Thank you, Bishop. E.B. Beasley, I'm a retired dinosaur. I'm covered under the retired plan so this doesn't exactly affect me but there is a principle here. I'm old enough to remember when we switched to the policies that we've got now, the plans we've got now, and one of the problems was the arrangements we had at that time, the young clergy, the small churches could not fund it. The big churches could.

And so I think if we remember the covenant between the clergy, the covenant between all of us, one of the things we said back then was we have to take care of it and be fair to everybody at our different levels. And I think what we need to do at this point now—I would propose that somehow the question be asked as a covenant between clergy, are we being fair to our young clergy and to our smaller church clergy to do the things that we're doing, or is there a way where we can share the responsibilities? That was a part of the issue back when we went to the current plan and I think it was a very solid principle. And I would lift it up today. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Go ahead. Alright, go ahead If it will help the body make the best decision they know how to make.

Mark Hellums: We're going to pull up some slides that were a part of the district meetings we held back in early May. Hopefully a lot of you folks were able to participate in those meetings. And there was a taped version of this presentation that goes into greater detail in terms of our costs and where our plan stands now. Let's turn to page...

Rev. Gilts: You were asking for slide 14 earlier, is that what you want?

Mark Hellums: Yes, but I want to show something to E. B.'s question here. Turn to page 6. Slide 6.

Rev. Gilts: You said slide 6.

Mark Hellums: Slide 6. Are we getting there? No, that's 14. I need slide 6.

Bishop Harvey: That's 14. So you need to go back to slide No. 6.

Mark Hellums: Okay, this gives a little background on the plan going back to 2013. So this is the plan over the past ten years. All of the red numbers are operating deficits. Starting in 2015, for the last eight consecutive years we've been operating in a deficit position. Simply meaning what we're bringing in receipts had been way less than what we're spending in terms of claims. You can see for the ten-year period we've spent \$14.5 million more than we brought in or what we've charged individuals and churches for the premiums to participate in the plan. Now, 14.5 million of that was offset by 10.1 million dollars in investment gains. But we're at a point now with the reserve that we can no longer count on investment performance, the reserve covering the amount of subsidies we've been giving to individuals, particularly for dependent coverage. If we can pass up to slide 14.

Bishop Harvey: I think that's where we were. This should be it, right?

Mark Hellums: What we're showing here is, we recognize there is major concern in terms of what people will have to pay out-of-pocket to have clergy and spouse and particularly family coverage. The top half of the slide shows the standard PPO in 2024 under our new recommendations, compared to the standard PPO in 2023. You can see with the higher rates that's being recommended for participant plus spouse, participant plus child, and family, those rates are quite a bit higher than 2023. The average increase per month is shown in the red column on the far right. So a family will be paying \$515 per month more on average if there is no change made to what they elect in terms of coverage.

But what we have constructed is an option, and again that's the High Deductible Plan. That's in the bottom half of the schedule. So if you look at the bottom half, the first column is the high deductible plan and can you see the corresponding rates associated with each level of coverage.

If we focus on the family, the family will be paying 770 per month, which is a \$30 increase from the existing standard PPO plan.

So as you contemplate the decision, please understand that the high deductible plan is a very viable option. As I mentioned, the out-of-pocket costs are not greater under the high deductible plan, and when you set aside money into an HSA, those contributions of 1850 per person or 3700 for family, all that is tax-deductible money. You can take a tax break when you fill out your income taxes, okay? So there is definitely an option here that will allow an individual to maintain their same monthly premiums that they've been paying under the standard PPO plan.

Bishop Harvey: Alright, microphone No. 4.

Jennifer Simmons, laity, St. Mark's UMC Houston, Pecore: I would give a speech for. My name is Jennifer Simons, I'm laity at St. Marks on Pecore, here in Houston and I'm speaking as a person who has been in the rooms making these decisions for companies over the last six or seven years. And I've seen this exact outcome. Where we choose the best outcome for the most people is to offer this high deductible option to reduce the overall cost to the plan and to most participants.

Now, for people like me, who have special needs children, we might choose to pick the lower deductible plan, which is more expensive on a monthly basis but helps us to cover those costs.

So I would just offer that, that for-profit companies that are very profitable in the communities where we live and serve are making these exact same decisions for the sustainability of their health care plans. And, also, I would just point out that many of your parishioners at your churches are dealing with these same things, they're facing these same struggles, and it's just something we're all facing together in this country where medical care is expensive. It's wonderful that we have so many options but it's expensive. And so I applaud the team that has done the really laborious work, the boring work, and the frustrating work, and in my experience in companies, the employees don't really get a say, they don't really get to speak up, and they don't really get to share how it's going to impact their families. And this is a special occasion for us to be able to do this, but the fact is the math doesn't work for us to do things the way we've always done them and so that's why I would vote in favor.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Any other—are you coming to the microphone No. 4?

Preston Morgan, elder, Clear Lake UMC: Preston Morgan, clergy. I come, one, thanking the dialogue and the sincerity with which the body is responding and conversing. I move to call the question.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Are you prepared to move the question? You need to vote on that. So if you support moving the question, raise your hand. That means we end debate. Anybody opposed? So we're going to go back now and vote on item No. 3.

We've had two speeches for, three speeches against, and a bunch of questions, and I know this is highly technical stuff and is very personal. And I think it is a reality of where we are right now

unfortunately. So this is before you. If are you in favor of item No. 3, please raise your hand. Anyone opposed? Thank you. It passes.

And I just want to thank you for that honest dialogue and conversation and this is how we move forward and we understand the sensitivity of it. And I know that this team will take that under consideration in all that we do in making this accessible and working toward equity for all people involved. Thank you.

Rev. Duffin: Thank you, Bishop. One final motion, that this Annual Conference approve a settlement payout for eligible group... active group health participants in lieu of the retiree medical subsidy benefit. This is recommendation No. 4.

Bishop Harvey: This is before you. Now is the time to ask your question. You've been very patient. Thank you, Mark. Right? Am I close there?

Mark Hager: Thank you, Bishop. My question again --

Bishop Harvey: Tell us who you are.

Mark Hager: Mark Hager, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, district delegate, Central South. I appreciate the forbearance on holding my question until now. I think that my question was, is this a mandatory \$24,000 payout or is it optional for clergy to pick whether or not they want that payout or not? And then because I know... I think you're going to gross up for taxes in this, but if someone has... is getting a \$24,000 check in the mail, they want to make sure they are visiting with their financial advisor. But is this... can they opt in or opt out, or is this to pay out and then close the account?

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. That's a question. Mark.

Mark Hellums: Right, the lump sum payout of \$24,000 is in lieu of future participation in the \$190 per month contribution to the HRA account. So the answer is, there is no opt out, but again this is only being sent... the lump-sum payment will only be sent to those actives in the group health plan right now who have qualified for the benefit in retirement, but who have not yet entered retirement

So this does not affect individuals who are in retirement receiving the 2,280 per year. This \$24,000 will be sent to those who have qualified, but have not yet entered retirement. Now, understand once you receive the \$24,000 lump sum payment you will not receive this benefit in retirement.

Bishop Harvey: Does that answer your question? Thumb's up? Okay, great. Great, great. Any other clarifying questions? Okay, seeing none, I'm going to move to a vote. If you support item No. 4, please raise your hand. Anyone opposed, same sign. Thank you. It passes.

Wonderful. Again, thank you for your hard work. I'm going to call an—another sports analogy—I'm going to call an audible, and I'm going to pause us here because I want to honor

the table conversation that is on the agenda for this afternoon. Are we amenable to coming back first thing in the morning and we start here? Are we all here tomorrow and that works? I'll take the five minutes and it will take you three minutes? I'm going to hold you to it. This is just informational. Okay great. Thank you.

Report from the Board of Pensions

Greg Williams, laity, Chapelwood UMC, Houston: Okay, I'm Greg Williams, lay from Chapelwood. I'll do this quickly. The good news is, after the last session, is that there are really no changes except one on slide 2 on the '82 plan. The rate is going from 1% and we are getting a 3% increase. So there is more money put in the plan from 939 to 912. The surviving spouse rate is 75%. And by the way, this is the third highest rate in the denomination. So we're doing really good.

Okay, the billing rate for the clergy retirement security program, CRPS, remains at 13.8% as it has been since 2013. No change there, next slide. Okay, the sustentation fund will continue to be used to provide a group health subsidy for clergy on medical leave covering 60% of the cost, and the personal investment plan contribution is 3% for 2024. It's no change. And the funding source remains unchanged, 2% from pension reserves, and 1% from the church contribution.

There is no extension of the 3% commitment beyond 2024. And the reason that is, is because the Conference was supposed to be implemented in 2024 and now been delayed to 2026. However, I'm sure that this will be revisited again next year to see if wouldn't to do it again.

Okay go back to the reserve. There you go. Okay, the good news is on our pension reserve—even though we've had as we mentioned earlier, we had a rough couple of years in the market—we're still in pretty good shape. So at the close of '22 we ended the reserve balance at \$39.3 million.

And doing—taking the things out of reserve that we're going to do and have been doing, we still show a deficit in '23 and '24 that's about \$2 million and we expect that we will end reserve in 2023 still at 9 million, and 38.6 in '24. Bishop Harvey, I submit the Board of Pensions committee report for acceptance by this Annual Conference.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, it is properly before you. Any clarifying questions? If you will accept this report, please raise your hand. Anyone opposed, like sign. Thank you. Thank you. Okay, come on. Mr. Sharp, thank you.

Report from the Conference Board of Trustees

Hal Sharp, laity, Bellaire UMC: Bishop, members of the Annual Conference, and guests, my name is Hal sharp. I'm layperson at Bellaire United Methodist here in Bellaire, and it is my privilege to chair the Conference Board of Trustees. Today, I report to you on behalf of the entire board, which is a group of hard-working pastors and laity for which we are very grateful. You'll find our complete and detailed report on Pages 121 through 126 of the Pre-Conference Journal. And on Page 86 of the Pre-Conference Journal addendum II. And in the interest of time, I'll refer you to those and suggest to Bishop Harvey that our entire report is before you and I recommend it for approval.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you. So it is before you. Any clarifying questions? Any questions for Hal sharp at this time? Seeing none, if you support this report, raise your hand. Anyone opposed? Same sign. Thank you. It passes. Thank you.

Thank you all. We'll come back to CFA in the morning. I just want to point out, wasn't it nice not to talk about—in the Trustee report—disaffiliations?

Thank you, Robert, again, for being flexible in that. I just want to make sure we give this the time that we said that we would give it. We're going take just a couple of minutes of a break, and what I'd like for you to do is to come back to your seat. Let's say at 3:10 was the original time. I think we can stick to that. And this is what I'm going to invite you to do. If you are sitting in the chairs—if you are an observer, if you're comfortable, you are invited to the tables. Because I would like for everyone to be a part of this conversation. So if we could do that, and then I'm going to ask you something really uncomfortable. And this is like church on Sunday morning. I'm going to ask you to sit next to somebody that you might not know. That means you might have to give up your seat on the lectern side on the second row on the end. But if we're going to have really, really good conferencing, holy conferencing and good conversation, you might need to switch seats. So I'll see you back at 3:10.

Business Session V

Tuesday, May 30, 3:10 p.m.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: I'm going to invite Kip Gilts now to lead us in this next portion. If you could make your way to a table and a chair.

Consideration of Resolution 1

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: All right, folks, I'm going to go ahead and begin. I am, in addition to being the—

Bishop Harvey: Stand up here so they can see you.

Rev. Gilts: No, they know what I look like. Look at that, I'm on the big screen. I'm right over there. In addition to being the comedian of the Cabinet, I also convene the CLT and I do one as well as the other, probably. But we'd have a great CLT which exceeds the material that I generally have. So I would say, you know, I exceed in that because of the team.

One of the things that the Conference Leadership Team is responsible for is receiving, reviewing, and providing feedback to those who would submit resolutions to our Annual Conference. We had five resolutions submitted to our Annual Conference this year, the CLT had a chance to review those and provided feedback to those who have submitted it. Four of those have been withdrawn in anticipation of having some fruitful conversation around these tables. I certainly want to applaud the authors of that, all those who participated. These are heartfelt resolutions. Any time someone puts pen to paper or fingers to a keyboard it's serious business. They are

things that they feel deeply about, and to be able to say, you know, "What would it look like if we had conversations rather than the age-old pattern of legislation?" Especially around the table, especially as family.

And so that's what we're going to do. There was one resolution that kind of sets the stage a little bit for our conversation. And that comes to us by the group That We May Be One. And Seann Duffin has that. It's on Page 30 of your Pre-Conference Journal. But Seann, I believe you're going to present that on behalf of the group That We May Be One.

Seann Duffin, elder, Bellaire UMC: The group health benefits report begins on page... Sorry, wrong one.

Rev. Gilts: This is a softer, kinder Seann Duffin now.

Rev. Duffin: Friends, my name is Sean Duffin, an elder in the Texas Annual Conference, and I serve as the pastor at Bellaire United Methodist Church. It's my privilege along with several other colleagues to present for your consideration a resolution for our new life together in the Texas Annual Conference.

The text of that resolution is on Page 30 in your Pre-Conference Journal. I'll read it now: Whereas, the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church voted to allow 294 local churches to disaffiliate from the TAC in 2022;

Whereas, the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church is recovering from a season of conflict, division, power politics, and competition;

Whereas, though this kind of culture might have benefited a few, it has not served us well as a whole and left us divided, fractured, and dismayed rather than united, focused, and hopeful;

Whereas, those remaining in the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church affirm our faith in Jesus Christ who gives us hope of resurrection and is always making things new;

Whereas, we renew our commitment to the Scriptures and the historic creeds of the church which remind us not to lose heart because the Spirit is moving

Whereas, it is a new day in the Texas Annual Conference with the opportunity before us to shed our old ways of being, to repent of our sins, and to embrace the revival that the Spirit is stirring in our midst;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Texas Annual Conference moves forward in a spirit of hope and embraces a season of reformation for making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Be it further resolved that in this season of reformation, we commit to the revitalization of The United Methodist Church through planting new ministries and through structural reform and to the revitalization of our relationships with one another as a connectional people.

Be it further resolved that the Texas Annual Conference works for a culture marked by compassion, courage, and companionship, such that the following measures are true in our life together:

Annual Conference is an occasion of reunion, marked with joy and hospitality,

Districts are strengthened by the sharing of knowledge and resources between congregations,

Clergy health is improved because of deep meaningful friendships,

Young clergy, and candidates for ministry find and connect with mentors who equip them for a life of friendship.

Bishop, with your permission, I'll speak to this resolution.

We, as part of the group called That We May Be One, offer this resolution with two broad hopes: First, that we as an Annual Conference will commit to leaving behind any patterns of behavior that are not conducive to a faithful, hopeful life together. And second, that we will all take care to build and nurture a Conference culture marked by compassion, courage, and companionship.

We're all well aware of the difficult, challenging season we've been through, saying goodbye to friends and churches that have been part of our lives for a long time. It's been a season of conflict, division, and competition. More broadly, though, I think we can truthfully say that conflict, division, and competition have permeated many aspects of our Conference culture and life together for decades. Whether we like it or not, we've been formed to see our common life through these lenses.

This, however, can be a new season. Our resolution calls on each of us and all of us together to choose a new way of being together, knowing that if we don't intentionally choose to do so, our formation will kick in and we may easily slip back into old patterns like conflict, division, competition.

This morning, at the TWMBO breakfast, Bishop Bickerton suggested that it is not time to be at one another, it is time to be with one another. In that same spirit, this resolution offers an opportunity to commit to renewal, to revitalization, and to building a new way of life together. One that prioritizes companionship over conflict. And that word companionship means something like "together with bread." Companions don't always agree. They don't always see eye to eye or want the same things. But they do sit together at the same table. They do nurture one another with their presence. They do trust that God is made known in the breaking of the bread.

We believe that there is value in walking alongside one another, that there is value in hearing and learning from one another, respecting and encouraging one another. Committing to creating a culture of companionship here in the Texas Annual Conference means moving forward together with one another, trusting that there are great things to come, both for our Annual Conference and for The United Methodist Church. It means embracing and encouraging one another in a season of transformation and reimagination. It means building bridges by breaking bread together.

So thank you for your consideration of this resolution for our new life together in the Texas Annual Conference. Let us be companions at the table of our Lord. Together with the bread of heaven, joining God in the work of making all things new.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you, Seann. I'm going to open the floor to anyone who would like to ask a clarifying question. You're not interested in more questions. He's answered a lot of questions already, poor guy. Any speeches for, against? Not having seen any, I usually allow the maker of the resolution to say one final word. Do you have any final word?

Rev. Duffin: Thank you.

Rev. Gilts: That was two words.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you. So if you support this resolution, raise your hand. Anybody opposed? It passes. Thank you.

Rev. Gilts: Seann, I think you should have led with that. Friends—

Bishop Harvey: I've got to get myself together here for a minute.

Rev. Gilts: I am moved at a time like this. You know those moments in life where you feel the needle really is turning? That presentation, that vote just feels like the needle is turning. Around our tables we have these beautiful centerpieces. Again, we're so grateful to have our worship team that creates so much for us including the centerpieces. Somebody asked me earlier what they were. And thought maybe there was some hand sanitizer there. It's not hand sanitizer. We have, really, four elements there I believe in addition to the light. And we have water there to remind you of your baptism.

That's what joins us. Bishop, I tell people I was baptized twice. I've been all over the map in Christianity, but I was baptized as an 8-month-old baby, and then I was baptized as a 14-year-old teenager in a Pentecostal church. So I get a little confused when I offer the words remember your baptism, or at least I used to, but now the baptism I remember is the baptism I don't remember. It was when the Spirit of God came upon my life and claimed me. So there is water at your table to remind you of that. Reminds you that God has claimed you. That God is the main actor in that baptism and has called you his daughter, his son, God's people.

The oil is there to remind you of the anointing of the Holy Spirit upon you. As a Pentecostal, I was drawn to The United Methodist Church because of the flame in the cross and flame.

Seemed just right to me in all those years, but truly is a church that has proclaimed, embraced, and relied upon the Holy Spirit. And that oil reminds you of the Holy Spirit's anointing on your life. It also invokes the presence of the Holy Spirit when we take it and we apply it to one another and pray for one another. You may come upon on that occasion today in your table conversation. People may be so real with one another that you feel drawn to dipping your thumb in that oil and placing it on them and praying for them. It would be good to ask them before you start doing that, but it still—might come upon you.

And there is a familiar elements of bread and juice.

This morning, Bishop Bickerton did speak to the group that just presented the resolution to us, and Bishop, I appreciated your words. It said... I'm paraphrasing—It's going to get me in trouble because you're going to hear what I heard rather than what you said—and that you prefer simple truths and the simple truths found in Acts 2 of the early church, how they taught and fellowshipped, broke bread, and prayed with one another. We'll have an opportunity to do some of that here today. In the breaking of the bread of course when the people of God came together in that early church and they broke bread, they did it in a way that reminded them in this—what's called "anamnesis," you know, just kind of reexperiencing this body and blood of Christ in communion. Bishop Bickerton asked the group this morning, "When was the last time that Jesus was more than just a word to you?" I hope when we leave this place this afternoon, your response to that will be, "Just now."

So before we begin the table conversation, we're going to share in this bread and juice together. I'm going to invite you that after I pray over those elements, that you—one of you will just start itwith the bread. Take a piece off that loaf that you've got there. Place it in the cupped hands of the person next to you who is receiving, "the body of Christ given for you," and then the cup and you'll dip the bread in the cup and you'll hear the words, "the blood of Christ shed for you." And in that moment, may Jesus become more than a word for you. But a living experience. Let us pray:

Eternal God, I do pray that you would pour out your Holy Spirit on us, on the gifts before us, the bread, the cup, that they may be the body of Christ given for us, the blood of Christ shed for us. I do pray, dear God, that you would make us one with you, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world, to all the world until Christ comes in final victory. These things we pray in Jesus' name, praying together the prayer he taught us as the children of God:

Our father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

I'm going to invite you to share in the sacrament of Communion with each other at this time. When we're finished, we'll close this part in prayer and begin our conversation with one another as the body of Christ.

I've discovered that the power of prayer is enough to go through two false walls, all the way here on the east side where the gluten-free bread is, and they will be bringing that in in a bit. Forgive me, folks, for that. I just kind of moved in and I saw the grape juice and the bread there and thought we ought to do that. There we go. We do have it there. So there is some gluten-free. Elizabeth and Seann Duffin at their table for two has that. So if you want to make your way there for that.

The Conference shared in Holy Communion

Rev. Gilts: Let us pray: Eternal God, we give you thanks for this holy mystery which you have given yourself to us. This moment, Lord Jesus, has become much more than a word to us, a real living experience shared with one another. Grant that we may indeed move forward in these conversations in the strength of your Spirit, that we might be open to one another as sisters and brothers in Christ. These things we ask in Jesus' name. Amen.

A Time of Table Conversations

Friends, as mentioned, earlier the CLT, the Conference Leadership Team, expressed a desire to change the conversation. This past week Tod Bolsinger sat down with the *Pod Have Mercy* team and talked about how to do that, how to have some meaningful conversations with others. To set the stage for that, I want you to watch the video and then Andrew Hook, a member of our Conference Leadership Team, will guide us through some of that conversation. Watch this video and let it kind of begin to set the stage.

Tod Bolsinger (video): I always think of it -- the goal is, this is not me, it's Chris Voss, who's interesting guy, because he was a hostage negotiator.

Matt Russell, elder, Chapelwood UMC, Houston (video): We need more of those in The United Methodist Church.

John Stephens, elder, Chapelwood UMC, Houston (video): Well, we're joined today by Tod Bolsinger and we're doing this podcast, a little bit of a special pop-up podcast with our friend Tod Bolsinger, who I'll tell you more about in a minute, because this is actually going to lead into and frame the conversation that we're going to have at our Annual Conference, the Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church. And I'll give a little bit more detail and background on that. But most people probably know who Tod Bolsinger is. He's our friend and worked a lot with us at Chapelwood and Matt and I have become friends with him. He has 30 years of leadership experience. But I do, too, and I don't know why you are so much more famous than I am.

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): Because he's written some good books, John.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): For those of you who may not know, Tod has written a bunch of really excellent books, and Canoeing the Mountains has been a popular book that's helped frame things. Tempered Resilience was very helpful to me during the pandemic. I've read that actually a few times. And you actually wrote a specific book on leadership for a time of pandemic and it's interesting that you wrote that. Like before the pandemic came, right?

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): That was written right in the middle of the pandemic is what it was.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): But you are with AE Sloan Leadership now, which is a company that you helped form that does a lot of consulting and leadership work with churches and organizations and of course you have been on staff at Fuller Theological Seminary for many years. And so, welcome Tod Bolsinger to Pod Have Mercy and thank you for helping lead all of us in the Texas Conference.

Let me give you a sense of the framework. When we were coming into this, Bishop Harvey and our Conference Leadership Team, we wanted this Conference to be a little different. We have been through a season—and you're very familiar with all this, Tod knows all the ins and outs of all of this because I've called him and lamented before on this. So you're familiar that about 50% of the churches in our Conference disaffiliated. We were hit really hard. We had a Bishop last year that was really working for the other team. Didn't make it really easy for us, but you know, where we are now is in a new space, and the leadership of the Conference was thinking rather than have a bunch of legislation and resolutions and debates and speech for, speech against, speech for and speech against, and have a vote which—votes tend to divide us and cause us to pit against—we wanted to have conversations around the table, dialogue instead of just this percussive discussion.

And so you've taught us a lot at Chapelwood about "how might we?" questions? And I'm thinking if you were going to give a word of advice to this large group of folks, clergy and lay, they're going to be having conversations about the future and dreams and how do you frame that for most people that you work with about how to ask the right kinds of questions and learn things?

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): Yeah. Thank you, guys. It's nice to be with you. When I was pastoring, I had a guy in my church who was a consultant with like a Fortune 100 company, like way up there, and he used to say—Every now and then we'd get in the middle of an argument in the middle of our council or our board or something—and he would pause and say, "You know there is great question in here. I just don't know what it is." And it would remind us that until we got clear on the question, we're often talking past each other. And so what we've done with our company is we've spent a lot of time trying to get people to the right question which starts in a couple of places.

So I would say really quickly, think about it this way, try to get people saying out loud "I wonder" and "I worry." I wonder about this. I worry about this. If you say those things out loud—I wonder about this, I worry about this—and then what you do is people can put on the table what they are most curious about, and what they are most concerned about. And now we know. Then make sure that nobody gives advice. Like the rule has to be when people talk about I wonder and I worry, you don't give advice. Somebody said to me, "I think ,it's really unsolicited advice is experienced as a kind of violence," like you experience it like violence. And you know this, even well-meaning unsolicited advice, people who love you who tell you things that they think they need to tell you, right? So I wonder, I worry, no advice. That's the first rule.

The second one, then, is to have people then say back what they heard. Your goal is to say back to someone what they heard so that they say to you, "Yes, that's right. You understand me. That's right." Again, the goal is not to get to, "You're right. Oh, yep, you're right." It's to get to "that's right." So I might say, "Hey I wonder if anybody in the next generation is ever going to want to be a United Methodist? I worry about whether we are actually now a dying denomination." And instead of going, "hey, hey, hey, we're great.," say, "No, no, no, what I hear is you are saying that you really are worried about the next generation because it sounds like you really love this." "That's right." Boom.

If you take those two steps, then the "how might we" questions become exploratory. And that's what you're trying to get to. A "how might we" question is how to explore the possibility, not because we're trying to get rid of the anxiety, but because we're trying to acknowledge that it's coming out of our—the things we care about and the things we're concerned about.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): That's interesting to always talk about active listening. That's why I always heard that term.

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): It helps us not move right into strategy out of our own anxiety. What it does is it opens up space for, kind of, the Spirit and that imaginative space just to breathe for a while. And to breathe in that, then I feel like the Spirit can move, but we're not, if we're not then just saying, "We have a problem and we have to move now." We can say, "Wait, let's let the Spirit collectively help us."

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): Yeah. Matt, you know this. When people respond with a suggestion, it's always about getting rid of their anxiety. Right? And so what you're trying to do is actually by starting with, "Hey I wonder about this, I worry about this," and nobody is going to solve it for you. You're going to disrupt the default to solve by saying, "okay, say back to you what you heard. Say back what you heard." That's the active listening. The goal is—and this is not me, this is Chris Voss, an interesting guy because he was a hostage negotiator.

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): We need more of those at The United Methodist Church.

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): This is what he said: When you are a hostage negotiator you can't just come to a win-win solution. If someone says, "Hey, I just took four people hostage and I'm going to shoot four people unless you give me a million bucks," you can't say, "Hey, shoot two and we'll get out of here." You have to do what you have to do to get everybody out and so what you have to do, actually the way to get everyone out is identifying with the hostage taker. It's weird. So even if I don't agree with what you wonder about or worry about, if I can make you feel felt, that attunement accelerates change.

Getting people to say that's right, that's my concern. Great. Pause. Pause. Pause. Now what could we explore together? How might we learn what the younger generation thinks of us? How might we ask questions about the kind of church they want to be in rather than worrying about us? How might we like I'm making these right off the top of my head. What do I want to learn—"how might we" questions are about learning, not "will it work," but "what will I learn?" So you

go from wonder and worry to deep attunement and connection to learning and it changes the whole conversation at that moment.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): That's really helpful. I think, too, when you come to the table and we're having conversations, part of this—you know the legislative process with resolutions is... it's a percussive thing. They talk about discussion, my statement, your statement, my statement, your statement and it really focuses on the differences, but also you're not listening to the other person. You're listening so you can prepare what your rebuttal is going to be. And I think we're trying to do something different, that the results of the conversations from the table become visions or hoped-for outcomes that maybe we can entertain experiments with.

You've talked a lot with us about taking these learnings, these things we hear from each other and engaging in experiments. I don't know if that relates directly to the "how might we" questions, but talk about that a little bit so when we think about what comes next after the conversation? Or are we just having conversation walking away and nothing happens?

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): Yeah, so we talk about this a lot and I did this with you guys so it's really fun to look at. Experiments... What happens with most of us is... what we've done with experiments is we use the word experiment to mean we're going to do something and if it goes bad don't be mad at us.

In other words, we're asking the question, "Is this going to work or not?" I want to change the question. The question isn't, "Does it work?" The question is, "What do we want to learn? What do we want to learn?" So if I don't know something, then that becomes gold. What do I want to learn? So here is a question I would say, which is, "What do we want to learn about the thing we're anxious about?" Wow. One of the things I want to learn is I'm very curious why everybody stayed. Why did we stay? And I want to learn what would make us start getting energized toward our mission and get over our hurt? What would help?

I don't know those answers, but because I don't know and because I'm not caught up in them, I get really curious about those. And when you start getting... then you can make experiments. An experiment is about figuring out what do we want to learn. And I think a lot of times what we do is we talk at people and try to solve things and call them experiments but what we really mean is we're going to try this thing we want and we hope you're not mad at us if you don't like it.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): As this intro part winds down so the table discussions can happen here at Annual Conference, I did want to share with you and just get your thought—these are the questions that a group of people wrestled with to think about as starting points for the tables to talk about. I'd just love your input on these and maybe ways to improve the conversation around the table as we're thinking about this—and this came from a lot of interests from different people in different parts of our church.

The first one—and we used a lot of "how might we" because I think that's great way to start—How might we grow from our trust together after so much conflict and division? And what does

integrity mean to you? That's really kind of the combo is how might we grow in our trust together after so much conflict and division? What do you think of that question?

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): Well, I think it's great question if it's genuinely curious. Like, "So how might we grow in our trust together?" In other words, "What do we need to try to grow in our trust together? How might we actually grow in our trust together?"

That's a good question. Because I'm not sure we know how to grow in that. I can tell you this being a part of the Presbyterian denomination that had three splits in a generation, we're still pretty mad at the other denominations that left us. We're in full communion with the people that we broke with during the reformation and not in full communion with our other Presbyterian sisters and brothers who broke with us in the last generation. So how might we grow in our trust together is really an important question to me.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): We can relate to that. I don't hate anybody, but those people can pound sand. I mean, I don't hate them, but—

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): Just, you know...

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): The second question is, "How might we live together as a church in our differing understanding of human fulfillment?" That may be a loaded term there. I think they were trying to find the diversity of ways we think about living in the world together and the church, especially some of those that tend to be stressors, how might we live together as a church in the midst of our differing understandings?

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): And really what I won't to get to is really concrete things. How might we discover the things that will help us live together? Like we might discover that having one... a meeting like this where we're talking about our worries helps us a lot. Or we might discover that what we need to do is have more projects we do together and less talking. Like I don't know, what could we experiment with? How might we learn together with our differences?

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): And then the third one is—it's not a "how might we," but I guess you could just help us think about this—"How important do you feel the values of diversity, unity, and integrity, transparency and trust are we as move forward and what types of things should we do to make sure we instill and maintain these values?"

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): I think one of the things is how might we clarify our values, understanding that today we absolutely value diversity, equity, and inclusion? How might we clarify how we talk about them? Some of us are going to need help. Right? We get triggered. How might we clarify what is valuable to us? "How might we" is one of the questions and when you ask "How," what you're actually trying to get people to do is figure out how to operationalize something, what's the way we're going to get to it. It's not... "how might we" questions are not rhetorical, they should build something.

I'll close with a little story doing stuff with the Texas Conference. I met with a great group of clergy. I think about them a lot, they were mostly on the younger side, 30 and 40's, and you

know I'm close to 60 so they're young to me, and we spent a whole evening talking and what we started talking about is they said, like, "Where do we go from here?" And I said, "Remember your job is to make great wine, not have the best wine bottle factory." Right? Like, "How might we recover what the world is thirsty for?" How might we recover the wine that makes the world glad rather than worrying about—worrying less about the bottles and corks and labels right now?

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): Yeah. It seems to me that one of the things we have to recover because—I think we let it either lie dormant or we didn't know how to do this in the last season really well is really vulnerability and curiosity as a community. Because I think that we had to—at least I think I had to learn how to be invulnerable because of, kind of just bracing for impact. And I really think that in this next season we have to recover our own sense of collective vulnerability and curiosity towards each other.

Rev. Dr. Bolsinger (video): So I love you said it that way because that's what I think about when I think about "I wonder" and "I worry" questions. When I tell what you I wonder about, I start telling you what I'm curious about. When I tell you what I worry about, I'm actually taking the risk to be a bit vulnerable. I get around people my age and I say stuff like, "I wonder if there is going to be a church for my grandchildren. I worry that it's going to die on my watch." Right, that I'm going to be the denomination where it went down on. I worry about that. And somebody is going to say, "oh, no, no, God is good." No, stop. Stop. Stop, right? Sit there and then "I wonder" and "I worry." "Okay, so come back to me." "That's right." And then, "How might we explore?" It gets me thinking, "How might we explore the kind of church my kids want so that we might think about what my grandkids might get?"

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): I love that.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): That is good. Make sure if you like the podcast, or even if you don't, subscribe. Smash the like button. And send along to a friend. So all those things help if you leave a five star rating or good rating or if you subscribe or if you like, all those things like they are helpful in the algorithm in the cloud. Right, Jeff?

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): He will come mow your lawn for you.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): Yes, I will do that. I will send someone to mow your lawn. Well, I'm John Stephens.

Rev. Dr. Russell (video): I'm Matt Russell.

Rev. Dr. Stephens (video): And this is Pod Have Mercy.

Andrew Hook, elder, Magnolia UMC: Good afternoon, friends and family of the Texas Annual Conference. I have shared several times this week with people that its good to be in the same room with people who want to be United Methodists. John, if you're in the room I believe you said this podcast will be available later this week, sometime soon?

Rev. Dr. Stephens: Yeah. It'll be available Friday.

Rev. Hook: It will be available Friday with extended conversations, on wherever you find your podcasts.

Bishop Harvey, I want to thank you for the image that you shared with us about the table that you grew up at that always had room for more, room for more, and always exuded hospitality and welcome. And so we gathered at tables today. Tables instead of rows, tables to talk instead of rows to argue.

I want to invite us to shift our minds from "all in favor say aye and all opposed the same sign," to genuine table conversations, sharing wonders and worries with each other. Now I have three children and it's my task to try to keep y'all on task on the questions when I can't even keep my own kids focused. So I'll do my best here.

You should have been handed a card that has three questions. Two on the front, one on the back with space for notes.

I'm going to lead us through these questions and we invite you to wonder and worry on the one question and not wander to the next. I try. But these cards are important. We want to gather these cards. We want to receive these cards at the end of the time in a basket in the back or leave them on tables and we'll gather them. We want to hear as your Conference Leadership Team, we want to read these responses, to help shape and help guide our Conference forward.

So let's start. I'm going the read the question and give one minute for silent reflection and then invite you to take two minutes then to write some answers down. And then after that, about ten minutes to wonder and worry together at your tables, and to share together on our conversation. So let's begin.

How might we grow in our trust together after so much conflict and division? And what does integrity mean to you?

Take one moment of silent reflection.

Silent reflection

Take about two minutes and jot some thoughts down. Please write legibly, we have to read them. But please jot some thoughts down.

Time for writing responses

Now if you turn to your neighbors that you're seated with and to wonder and worry together, to share wonders, to share your worries, to not try to solve the problem, but just to share and to listen.

Table Conversations

If I can invite you to wrap up, on our first question. Let us move to our second question this afternoon. To invite you to spend a few moments in silence thinking, not writing, but thinking and pondering this question: How might we live together—together as a church in the midst of our differing understandings of human fulfillment?

Silent Reflection

Take about a minute-and-a-half or two minutes and begin writing your wonders, writing your answers to this question: How might we live together as a church in the midst of our differing understandings of human fulfillment?

Time for Writing Responses

Again, let us turn to our neighbors at our tables and share our wonders about this question.

Table Conversations

If I can call us back together one last time. I was remarking to the Bishop just now about how wonderful it is to hear conversations and laughter as we talk together. How nice it is to see each other's face around the table instead of just the backs of people's heads as we talk.

I just want to remind y'all that we are asking that these cards will be turned in. You can either turn them into a basket in the back or leave them on your table. We are going to gather these and they are going to be offered as an act of worship at our closing Sending Forth service tomorrow. But then after that the CLT will be gathering and going through these; we will be looking for common threads, surprising insights, things that will help shape our strategies as a Conference moving forward. And all of that will be shared with churches, with districts, with pastors, and lay leaders and will be readily available for anyone and everyone to see.

So with that let us turn to our third question. Spend a moment in silence and reflect on: How might we instill and maintain the values of diversity, unity, integrity, and transparency as we move forward? And if I may have the boldness, I'd like to invite you down in the notes write why did you stay? Why did you stay UMC.

Silent Reflection

Let us begin writing our answers. Two minutes of silent writing. How might we instill and maintain the values of diversity, unity, integrity, and transparency as we move forward together?

Time for Writing Responses

Let us begin turning to our neighbors one last time and sharing our wonders about this final question.

Table Conversations

Friends, if we can come back together one last time for some final instructions. There are baskets at the center door and east doors. If you want to take your cards and place them in the basket. And if otherwise you can leave them on the table and we would like to invite all the CLT members, if you hang back and help gather anything that's been scribbled on, written on, any card left on the table, if we can help gather those up.

I do want to share that Kip pointed out that we hear a lot in the news about DEI, diversity, equity, and inclusion. And Kip pointed out that it says diversity, unity and integrity. So instead of DEI we have DUI. So if you include the T you get "DU IT," so I'll let you choose which one's better.

I want to you for this time of conversation. Thank you for your honesty, for your vulnerability, for your transparency. Thank you. I hope that we found this time—the CLT and on our Conference—I hope that we found this time edifying. I hope we found this time useful and informative in that we are looking forward to what is to come instead of backwards at what has been done. Let us look forward to what is coming. Anything, Bishop?

Bishop Harvey: No, thank you. Let me ask this question, if people have additional thoughts that they want to bring back at some point, the baskets are going to be out there in the morning, right? To collect cards?

Rev. Hook: They'll be back there for right now. They are on their way out.

Bishop Harvey: Or you can leave them on the table. What if I have a thought overnight and I want to add it to a card?

Rev. Hook: Can we get something on the website?

Bishop Harvey: We'll have extra cards.

Rev. Hook: We'll have extra cards for the worship service tomorrow on tables.

Bishop Harvey: I just think that some of us are processors.

Rev. Hook: Creating more work for CLT.

Bishop Harvey: Great. Thank you, Andrew. Thank you all of you, as music to our ears for your conversation. So thank you. I think you need to give yourselves a hand. In a moment, I'm going to ask Kip to do his parking sticker routine again. But before I do, I want to introduce you to someone that will be with us tonight. Bishop Rinehart. Bishop Rinehart, why don't you come up here so we can see you.

Rev. Gilts: Come into the light, Bishop.

Bishop Harvey: Come into the light. Bishop Rinehart, this is Bishop Tom Bickerton. Bishop Rinehart is the resident Bishop for the ELCA. And... You may or may not know that we are in full communion with the Evangelical Lutherans—and actually in Louisiana because Bishop

Rinehart has this area that goes down toward Baton Rouge and New Orleans, so we've worked together for more than maybe 15 years. My first time here and then me couldn't get rid of me. Another ten in Louisiana. And we actually had pastors in Louisiana that served the ELCA church. Had a two-point charge. One charge was a United Methodist Church, and the other charge was a ELCA church across the parking lot, just about. So we share one another's clergy, that is what it means to be in full communion and full recognition. And I remember Bishop Rinehart, the service that we had after that vote took place at St. Paul's was with you and Bishop Huie leading us in that worship service, and it was a beautiful moment. We're glad you're going to be with us at ordination tonight and participate in ordaining our elders and deacons this evening. So thank you for being with us. You want to say anything to this group?

Bishop Michael Rinehart: So I was married at North Broadway United Methodist Church in Columbus, Ohio in 1988. And so my wife and I have been in full communion for 35 years. Proof that Lutherans and Methodists can be strangely warm together and it's a good thing. So thank you for the warm invitation to be with you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you. Another comedian in chief right here. Kip. Speaking of

Rev. Gilts: That puts a whole new meaning on hearts strangely warm. So we do have—I don't know if you've heard—but we've reduced parking rates here if you're commuting. You can get a sticker out there. Has anybody used those? Do they work? Oh, good. Whew! I don't know. I have not left the building since we got here, Bishop. So I'm glad to know they work.

We do have the art project back there. Some of you have participated in it and I hope all of you will before it's done. I see Vanna White back there, Brian Jody, pointing out where the cross is and how it looks, and if you buy a vowel you can put something up there. Go ahead and do that. You've already heard from Andrew that the baskets are out there if you drop your cards out there or leave them at the table, the CLT members are going out and getting those. Bishop, tonight our ordination service is where I was ordained 31...

Bishop Harvey: I was ordained there, too. A Deacon.

Rev. Gilts: There we go.

Bishop Harvey: And an elder at the west campus.

Rev. Gilts: It's going to be nice to be back. I went there Sunday to make sure everything was all right. Looks like they've cleaned the place up for us. So they are expecting us.

I know Guidebook has been helpful to you throughout this week. And there is all kinds of instructions there. And also use your map app and put it on walking, because it's about half a mile. So it's a nice walk. You can drive over there. It's a short drive. And they've got parking designated in our Guidebook I think we've got that push notification from Troy who has been keeping up with our Guidebook. So if you want to look at notifications on your Guidebook you'll be able to see exactly how to get there if you have not been there. Service starts at 7.

Good news, if you want to get a good seat you want to be there at 6:30. Isn't that wonderful. It's a wonderful feeling. So, Bishop, I think that's all I've got except for what I forgot.

Bishop Harvey: Okay. So we begin at nine o'clock in the morning. And just to remind you that we're going start with the CF&A report and then move into what was on the agenda to begin with for tomorrow. I keep wanting to say it's Friday. But it's not. It's Wednesday. So tomorrow we'll begin at nine o'clock and we will do as we did today, we'll have a brief session. We'll do a devotion and come back and finish up and then I'll do wrap up for us before we leave tomorrow.

It has been a blessed day. A blessed day. You have really set the tone for our future just in these last few hours for sure, but certainly from beginning when you walked into this space. If you remember my prayer is that your presence in this space would make it sacred and holy, and by the power of the Holy Spirit that we would in fact be of one mind, one spirit—maybe not one mind, let me just back that up—one spirit. And that we would welcome one another at the table where we can talk, eat, drink, and even dance. I think we danced this afternoon. I think we danced this afternoon. So I'm grateful for you. And we will see you at ordination and then again tomorrow morning at 9. And we've got Charles Anderson.

Rev. Gilts: Charles Anderson is coming forward to do the closing prayer. I did get a text asking about would the church have reduced parking? The truth is the church does have reduced parking. So you'll want to carpool with someone. They don't have as many parking places as they do in this pricey garage over here. So if you'll carpool, buddy up, find somebody that you visited with at table. You know, what everybody likes is once you've had a chance to visit with strangers at the table, is ask them two questions, hey, can you give me a ride and will you help me move? Charles.

Charles Anderson, elder, Superintendent of the Northwest District: Let's pray: Lord God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, all glory and honor and blessing be unto you for this fresh and refreshing day. All thanks be unto you for a day full of Kingdom signs and Kingdom-come moments. We thank you for the worship moments of this day for through them you reinvigorated our praise. We thank you for the celebration moments when faithful churches, fruitful churches were rewarded for through them you reinvigorated our hope. We thank you for the remembering moments when we bid Godspeed to those retiring, for in them you reinvigorate our sense of history and legacy. And by faith we thank you for the commissioning and ordaining moments to come, for we know that you will reinvigorate our servant community through them.

Oh Lord, this afternoon, we have had a precious time of holy conversation. We have reexperienced that great Methodist tradition of holy conferencing in acts of common exploration, we've met your living words in the words of each other. We've look in the eyes of our table partners and seen there the light and life of Jesus Christ. You have led us across the thin places between personal communication and profound communion. These are precious gifts. And we're humbled that you entrusted them to us this afternoon. Help to us carry these gifts from here with the tenderness and the respect that both they and you deserve.

Lead us now into the evening and especially into the future of those who'll be commissioned and ordained tonight for we live and breathe and serve and pray in the strong name of Jesus. Amen.

Rev. Gilts: Before you leave, let me say my humor may have been lost on a few here. There is no charge to park at the church. In fact, I've had one of the pastors of the church tell me Jesus paid it all. But you will—they will have parking permits there. They don't have as many spaces, so you'll want to carpool to maximize the effectiveness of that.

Tuesday, May 30, 7:00 p.m.

First United Methodist Church, Houston

Bishop Harvey preached on Isaiah 42:1-10. Bishop Harvey was joined in the act of ordination by Bishop Thomas Bickerton (President of the United Methodist Council of Bishops and Resident Bishop of the New York Episcopal Area), Bishop Michael Rinehart (Bishop of the Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America), and Bishop Lawrence Reddick (Senior Bishop of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church and Presiding Bishop of the 8th Episcopal District of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church). The list of the local pastors recognized, provisional members commissioned, and deacons and elders ordained can be found in the Business of the Annual Conference report, which forms Section G of this Journal.

Business Session VI

Wednesday, May 31, 9:00 a.m.

The Conference was called to order at 9:04 a.m. Business Session VI began with the CF&A report, originally on the agenda for Business Session IV.

Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey: Good morning. You're ready. We're going to start where we stopped yesterday and I'm going to invite Robert and your team and certainly Don Morriss, if you'll come forward. And I know you had to adjust your schedule in order to be back here this morning and I just want to say, Don, thank you. And to your spouse, thank you for understanding and I appreciate you making this adjustment. Thank you.

Report from the Committee on Finance and Administration

Don Morriss, laity, Williams Memorial UMC, Texarkana: Thank you, Bishop. Good morning, members of Conference, my name is Don Morriss, layperson at Williams Memorial United Methodist Church in Texarkana. This is going to be an abbreviated report because we're behind on our schedule. So I'm going to refer you to the Pre-Conference Journal for a lot of what we were going to talk about this morning. But I cannot proceed without thanking the members of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration for your support and your input over the

last year. And also for the Conference staff, the fiscal office, Robert Besser, and Mark Hellums and his team have done a great job. So speaking as a volunteer on this committee, it would not be possible without the expertise and the hand-holding that this Conference staff has done. So I thank you for that before we get started.

So a lot has happened since we last met. I refer you to the Pre-Conference Journal beginning on Page 99. We have a number of slides. We're not going through them today in the interest of time. So I refer you to the Pre-Conference Journal to see that we finished 2022 with donations and receipts exceeding expenses. However, with investment results, we did use a few reserves to make things work out.

The action item this morning is all the way on slide 7 and 8, I believe, if you want to go to that right quick. Our action item is to approve the budget for the next year. Actually it's on slide 8. Beginning on slide 8, it's in the Pre-Conference Journal on Page 105, the proposed budget is in the amount of \$4,231,930. It is a 15.67% decrease as noted on this slide in Column A. There are some reserves we are going to use in 2024 to make this work, because the apportionments are a little short of where this budget needs to be. We could cut the budget completely and make things work, but we would have programs that would suffer and we don't want that to happen, so we're striking a nice balance using some reserves, for instance, some reserves from the pension to cover some of the pension plan expenses So you will see this budget in your Pre-Conference Journal, and Bishop, in the interest of time, if there are questions we can answer those, but I would submit this report and the proposed 2024 budget for approval by the Conference.

Bishop Harvey: This is properly before you. Are there any questions? Seeing none, I will place this before you for a vote. If you will accept the budget that's been proposed, please raise your hand. Anybody opposed, same sign.

Could I just say something here, if I can, Don? I have sat in on the CFA meetings, and I want you to know that it has been sobering and yet these folks have done everything they can—I feel sometimes that old saying squeezing blood out of a turnip—and they have been faithful to their stewardship of the resources that you so graciously share. And I can assure you that it is not lost on us that it is a sacrifice on everybody's behalf. And so we know that we need to be good stewards of the gifts that we do have. And this budget, as Don has told you, is you a pretty big reduction. So especially—not just from last year, but from the previous years. So I just thank you, Don, for leading us in that. And Robert.

Don Morriss: Thank you, Bishop. Before we close we'd like to recognize the East District for its faithful payment of 100% of its apportionments. And we'd ask the new District Superintendent Steve Woody and Claudine Kendricks to come up and receive our thanks.

Don Morriss: I guess you want a motion. We submit the complete Conference Finance Committee report for acceptance by the Annual Conference.

Bishop Harvey: The full report is in your Pre-Conference Journal. If you are in favor, please raise your hand. Anyone opposed, same sign. Thank you. And thank you again—thank you, Don, for changing your schedule. And I pray you make it to your next stop. Thank you.

Thank you. So I think we're caught up to Wednesday. So I'm going to invite Don House and Tom Pace, who are the heads of the delegation, to come forward.

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: That had to be for Tom Pace.

Bishop Harvey: Don, I'd take that personally if I were you.

Rev. Gilts: I would hope so.

Tom Pace, elder, St. Luke's UMC, Houston: Well, good morning. Glad you're here. It's our privilege to report to you on behalf of the longest-serving single delegation in the history of the world. We are the delegation to the postponed 2020 General Conference, postponed to 2022, the Jurisdictional 2020 Conference postponed to 2022 and held in 2022, and then the General Conference of 2020 to be held in 2024. It's complicated.

Bishop Harvey: Could you repeat that? No, don't do it, please.

Rev. Dr. Pace: We really are excited to welcome to the delegation Wayne Haglund and Jan Ervin. That's an exciting thing for us. And I'd like to ask all those who are on our delegation if you're here, if you would stand so that people can see you. Thank you. I do want to say a word of appreciation to all of those who are on the delegation, and even those who resigned from the delegation due to disaffiliation.

Many of you have asked why at the past jurisdictional conference, those who would not be a part of The United Methodist Church going forward were present and voting on bishops. And the question is a valid one. But I will tell you this, our delegation had great conversations together after the interviews with the episcopal candidates. And there was broad consensus in our delegation regarding who were the best candidates across all—whatever camps you could imagine. Everyone was really agreed and so we were glad to have their votes as we worked together. And we'll miss the voices of those who are no longer on the delegation.

So it is also a bit unclear about the path forward for a Jurisdictional Conference. We clearly will need to have one in 2024, as we have to address issues around conference boundaries, etc. And yet we don't know who the delegation to that Jurisdictional Conference will be as the delegation we currently have is to the 2020 General Conference and the 2020 Jurisdictional Conference, which was already held. So we assume that there will be a new delegation that will include a full complement of laity to the next Jurisdictional Conference. But really there is a lack of clarity on that moving forward and we're anxious for the powers that be, whatever those are, to make those clear.

So it's time for us now to begin our work again. Let me just say we had a wonderful Jurisdictional Conference. And one of the wonderful things is that we received a new bishop. Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey. And I was thrilled to have her with us. I was looking yesterday at seeing Bishop Bickerton and Bishop Harvey standing there together. And it occurred to me that

Bishop Bickerton is really tall. And our Bishop is really... awesome. I cleared that with Bishop Bickerton last night to make sure it was safe and he said it was. So we went on ahead.

So now it's time for us to begin our work again. We have a lot to do. We will start looking at some of the legislation that we've looked at before that is still before General Conference. There is important legislation from Wespath regarding our pension fund and we'll want to address that, which moves from us the hybrid defined contribution and defined benefit plan to a purely defined contribution plan. We have a lot of work to do to right-size the budget of the General Conference, and we'll have lots of conversation about that in the days ahead.

But the most significant thing currently circulating is proposals about regionalization. And I just want to say a few words about that. When Nathan Bledsoe took his—withdrew, thank you, thanks for the word. You sit there and keep prompting me. That would help. When he withdrew the proposal from our conversation, I do really hope that you will go on that Pre-Conference Journal and read the resolution that is there because it is really an important thing for us to be considering and here is why: Because if a proposal for regionalization passes at General Conference, then it will have constitutional amendments and next year this Annual Conference, whether it be at our regular Annual Conference or special called Annual Conference will have to vote on those constitutional amendments. And they are complicated. And there will be much, much learning for us to do before we are in the position of being able to vote on those.

And so I really want to encourage you throughout this year to pay attention to what's going on and to read about them. I encourage you to go on to Christmascovenant.com. Read the proposal that is called the Christmas Covenant that came out of the Philippines. It is one of the proposals for regionalization that is before us and has significant constitutional amendments. It grows out of this realization that our current structure is really built out of a time in which that we were a U.S.-centric church, and that the Central Conferences were sort of... that they were special cases out there. It grew out of our colonization of those areas as Bishop Bickerton said yesterday morning, all with good intentions. But that is not our current reality. We are not a U.S.-centric church anymore. We are, excuse the phrase, a truly global church. What can I say? And we need to have a structure that acknowledges that and builds a sense of equity into that.

So what this Christmas Covenant proposal does is... it really does two things: One is it establishes...-it does away with Central Conferences and establishes regional conferences including one in the United States, and gives those regional conferences broad authority to have their own judicial body of some sort, to set their own standards for clergy for chargeable offenses. It really gives every regional conference, the U.S. regional conference and every regional conference around the world authority to work within their context and their mission field to make disciples. And that's the essence of it. But you've got read it because it is complicated and it's going to take a lot of work and restructuring.

It also moves, also, Jurisdictional Conferences from being mandated to being allowed. And that's a big change. That will give us moving forward... should that pass, that will give us flexibility moving forward to build, identify what the most effective and nimble... make us more nimble and gives us the ability to be more effective in being flexible to reach our mission fields. We don't know what the structure will ultimately look like, but I just really want to encourage to

you take a look at all of those things and begin to familiarize yourself with it because we'll have work to do next year.

I want to turn it over now to Don House, my colleague in this great work.

Don House, laity, West District: Thank you, Tom. I want to cover two things. One is the discussions that are taking place in the South Central Jurisdiction Committee on Episcopacy having to do with the possible reduction in the number of Bishops in the South Central Jurisdiction. And also considerations of the role of bishops. These are only in the discussion stage, but I'd like to share it with you.

So you know, the GCFA is going to determine with the Episcopal Fund how many bishops the general church can afford. And it is anticipated that there will be a reduction in the number of Bishops that likely will affect the South Central Jurisdiction of which we are a part. The discussions will take place and determine which conferences are going to have a sole bishop, and which conferences are going to share a bishop. This Conference has always been the largest in the South Central Jurisdiction and, therefore, has always had a bishop that was not shared with any other.

Things have changed. We're not the largest. In fact, there may be as many as six Annual Conferences in this Jurisdiction that are larger than we are. So is it going to be that we will be sharing a bishop and will it also be that there will be possible changes in boundaries? We've had changes in boundaries in the past where different Annual Conferences combined into one. And will that affect us? We're not the largest.

One of the things that we will be looking at, I hope, is the potential for growth. And I think our Annual Conference probably has the greatest potential for growth than any other Annual Conference in this Jurisdiction. But we have to exercise it.

And that's the question, the second question I'd like to address—and those are discussions of the role of the Bishop. And there is some history here. We want to write our story by the Texas Annual Conference because it's a fantastic story, but too few of us know it. Should the bishop provide instructions to both lay and clergy regarding how best can an Annual Conference capture its potential for growth? Is there anything missing in our measurements for growth potential that the bishops are well suited to address? History tells shows we need to consider our past. Speakers at this Conference have mentioned the importance of our connection. It is one of our treasures.

Do we know how our connection has served us in past? I want to share with you some history—I did not know it—that demonstrates just how important the connection has been in the Texas Annual Conference. William Stevenson was a Methodist preacher from Missouri and visited the northeastern section of the Texas territory, now part of the Texas Annual Conference. He asked Stephen F. Austin if he could preach and attract more Methodist preachers into this territory. According to the agreement between Austin and the Mexican government, anyone coming into this territory other than a Roman Catholic, preaching to the residents of the territory, would be imprisoned. This was 1824. How did the Methodists grow under this caustic environment?

In 1835, August of 1835, William B. Travis wrote a letter to the New York Christian Advocate and Journal. It's a Methodist publication. Col. Travis was writing to communicate with the Methodist connection that was in existence at that time, 1835. Here is the letter:

My dear sir, I take the liberty of addressing you from this distant quarter of the world for the purpose of requesting you to receive my name as a subscriber to your widely circulated Advocate. We are very destitute of religious instruction in the extensive fine country and the circulation of your paper will be greatly beneficial in the absence of stated preaching the gospel. Although the exercise of religion in any form is not prohibited here—it is encouraged by the people—yet but few preachers have come among us to dispense the tidings of salvation to upwards of 60,000 of destitute souls. I regret that the Methodist Church with its excellent itinerant system, which has hitherto sent pioneers of the gospel into almost every destitute portion of the globe, should have neglected so long this interesting country. I wish you would do me the good cause, the favor, to publish such remarks as will call the attention of the reverend bishops, the different conferences, and the Board of Missions to the subject of spreading the gospel of Texas. (The connection was in existence.) About five educated and talented young preachers would find employment in Texas and, no doubt, would produce much good from this benighted land. Texas is composed of the shrewdest and most intelligent population of any country on earth. Therefore, a preacher to do good must be respectable and talented. In sending your heralds to the four corners of the earth—remember Texas. Signed, William B. Travis.

The letter was just five months before Col. Travis arrived at the Alamo. The point here is that Methodists had a connection to foster growth. Not so among the Baptists, Presbyterians, and the Congregationalists. This is a story to remember.

As the foundation of Methodism, one historian wrote, the particular theological components of Methodism, its evangelical Arminianism, its doctrine of assurance, and its quest for entire sanctification, are all well known, but what is not sufficiently appreciated is how these components, working together, created a kind of energetic activism for which Methodism became notorious. This connection, combined with John Wesley's sermons and notes, and Charles Wesley's hymns, led the Methodists to represent slightly over 1% of the U.S. population in 1900, to over 10% of the population in 1960. This was achieved in a very caustic environment since 1960 this presented... this percentage returned to 1% in 2020.

Some believe that it was around the 1960's that our focus among the laity began turning to other issues at the expense of our learning about the Wesleyan theology. We began taking in members without knowing the primary treasures of Methodism. Does this in any way explain our rapid decline starting in 1960 and becoming even more rapid in 2001? History argues that indeed it played a role. Can the importance of our connection in Wesley's sermons, notes, and hymns be promoted among the bishops as part of the respective roles? If not, who will? Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Don. Thank you, Tom. Appreciate you. Let me just, while you guys are still up here, just a couple of things that Bishop Bickerton and I were up here

conferring. We're not really sure we're about to give you late-breaking news or how public it is. But we're here and you're here. The Council of Bishops, when we met just a couple of weeks ago, we set the dates for Jurisdictional Conference in 2024. And they are July 10th through the 13th. And it is in Arkansas. And we don't yet know the number of our delegates that will be assigned to us. That decision is made by the Commission on General Conference.

And, therefore, our—it's based on a formula that's too complicated to even explain—but because of the size of this Annual Conference, it is likely that we'll have half the delegates that we've had in previous years. So what we will need to do is—once we get those numbers from the Commission, we will either take that up at our Annual Conference next year or we may need to call a special session just to elect delegates. That's an expensive proposition. But we know that that is important and we will—we're relying on getting the numbers first from the Commission on General Conference before we do any elections. We cannot base our elections on our current allocation. We will have to receive our new numbers.

On the regionalization there is a task group made of the persons from the Connectional Table and also from the Committee on Central Conference Matters. That committee is actually chaired by Bishop Tracy Smith Malone, and they have been meeting on this issue of regionalization and that brings together to the table the authors of the Christmas Covenant, the supporters of all the related pieces of regionalization.

So we will be getting reports from them also in preparation for the 2024—I'm just going to say—the General Conference that's being held in Charlotte. I don't know how else to say it. And I do believe—and I'm biased, I realize that, and I'm sitting with a guy from West Virginia that serves in New York City—but I believe that Texas has the greatest growth potential of any of the states in the South Central jurisdiction. And so we've got to do some careful strategic work. And not only is the College of Bishops, which is the Bishops from all the Annual Conferences in the Jurisdiction—we've been meeting, talking about this, but your three Texas Bishops, Bishop Schnase, Bishop Saenz, and I have kind of joined forces to address this matter. And I'll just tell you I was at the Kinder Institute luncheon a few weeks ago, and the growth potential certainly—it exists in the northern part of our Annual Conference, and it certainly exists in the southern part of our Annual Conference.

And just briefly, I don't want to take up more time, but I think it's important for you to know that the Kinder Institute has been studying Harris County and the Houston area for about 42 years. They've had a survey of about 3,000 people that they have surveyed over these 42 years. During 2024 they are increasing that survey group to 6,000. And they are also going to add to that group, Fort Bend and Montgomery Counties. So when you add Fort Bend, Harris, and Montgomery County—I know that's not the whole Annual Conference, so I'm sensitive to that—but when you combine those three counties, that represents 25% of the population of the State of Texas. Those three counties are in the Texas Annual Conference. So I believe we do have the greatest potential for growth, not only does the State of Texas have the greatest potential for growth.

So I'm going to... Don and Tom, I'm going to take that stand and I'm going to plant my feet pretty firmly on that when we start talking about how to deploy bishops in the future. And it's not just because this is my Conference, this is because I believe strategically: if we're going to invest, this is the Conference that ought to be invested in. And I may not be that bishop that ushers you into that, but I'm going to be the one that carries you to that threshold. And I'm going to assure you that I will put you on my back and carry you over that threshold with everything I've got. So I just wanted to make that commitment to you. I'm making it publicly so that you hold me accountable to it. And I'm going to ask your help in doing that. So we may have some things that work, some things that fail, some things that are outlandish about how we grow this Annual Conference, but we're going to grow this Annual Conference. So I need your help in doing that.

We do have a video that is just—it is hot off the press. This is the premier. We talked about it a little yesterday. It comes from the Council of Bishops and so I think we're prepared to show it.

Rev. Gilts: We are. It's a world premiere.

Bishop Harvey: It's the world premier right here in the Texas Annual Conference. So if we could --

Rev. Gilts: We got it just for the price of parking.

Bishop Harvey: Roll the video.

Video Greetings from the Council of Bishops

Bishop Thomas Bickerton (video): Friends, the time has come. It's now time for you and me to work together to architect the next expression of United Methodism. The future of The United Methodist Church hinges on our ability to deeply pray that God will give us the strength and the courage to do what we must, what we have been called to do all along. I believe it hinges on the faith that Paul talked about in Ephesians when he proclaimed that God-at-work-in-us is able to achieve abundantly far more than any of us can ever ask or imagine.

What do you say we reclaim, revive, and renew our beloved connection together. It's time for us to reclaim this church. We have an opportunity to reclaim our identity, who we are as United Methodists. Personally, I became a Methodist because this "grace" thing worked for me. When life was rough and times were uncertain, there was a refuge from the storm at place called Calvary United Methodist Church in Moundsville, West Virginia. That was my home church. That place did an excellent job of confirming faith as something that I could embrace as my own. The concepts, do not harm, do good, stay in love with God -- they were simple enough that even the son of a blue-collar worker from Appalachia could understand them and live them. Within the community of the church, I found unity around the essentials of grace, hope, joy, love, and justice. I learned to be open enough to listen to the viewpoints of others and give people freedom to celebrate the gifts that God gave to them and, most of all, to love in all things.

Friends, this is the basis of our own reclamation project, to find a renewed sense of call, to seek a new conversion of our spirit, to get out of our churches and into our communities, to preach and teach and heal and comfort the afflicted, to confront the injustices of our day and be willing to

stand anywhere necessary to share with everyone that they are welcome, and to look at what the good news of God's love really means in life.

It's time to revive this church. What do you say we give new energy and passion to the ministry of making disciples for Jesus Christ. Let's revive our belief, our sense of expectancy, and our eagerness for the blessing of the Holy Spirit to guide our steps. Let's once again get curious about the mysterious work of God in our midst and let's love coming to church again and make absolutely sure that when people pass by our buildings, they will know that inside those walls are people who absolutely love God and genuinely love every soul as a part of God's creation. Let's offer our radical love, genuine hospitality, and sincere engagement.

When is the last time you invited someone to go to church with you? Invited them to go because you believed enough in what was happening there that you couldn't contain yourself? Whether it's a refuge from the storm, warm clothes, an open and welcome table, or a soul-stirring worship service, ministry is always about building relationships and it's always about taking someone along with you on the journey toward Christ-like holiness.

It's time for us to renew this church. Recently, our focus hasn't always been trained on the call that God has placed on us. What do you say we sign up again for a life-long commitment to ministry? The missional work we have before us is absolutely vital. The world needs us. So let's renew our response.

You and I, we share a story. I have always believed that United Methodists have the most relevant theology for a broken world. I believe that now more than I ever have. What we have must be passed on with purpose and conviction, our ministries, our faith in Christ, our presence in communities around the world, these are vibrant life-giving transformative opportunities to make this world a better place, the place that God envisioned for all of us, a place where everyone can thrive.

As we look forward, as we architect our next steps together, let us give thanks for our shared values, our shared calling and our beautiful diverse connection, a connection that enables us to reach out and proclaim the love of God in every corner of the world.

Friends, it's time. Won't you join me and millions of your fellow United Methodists across the world as we reclaim, revive, and renew The United Methodist Church. Let's keep this story alive. Let's make it vibrant for today, tomorrow, and always. May it be so. Oh God in heaven, may it be so. Amen.

Bishop Harvey: Amen. Thank you, Bishop Bickerton. I don't know why we showed the video. We could have just had you do that here in person. But you have embodied that for us these three days. So thankful for you.

We're going to make a little change in our agenda, if we could. I'm going to take us to worship. Irv, if you're ready, and then we'll take a break after worship. And we will come back and we will pick up Communications, the nominations report, and the rest of our work for the morning.

I hope that's okay, Shannon. I know you were standing by. But I think—I don't want to keep us from doing worship at this moment. So don't leave the room. Let's rearrange just a tad.

Report from the Center for Communications

Shannon Martin, laity, Director of Communications: Thank you, Bishop Harvey, Bishop Bickerton, Assistant to the Bishop Kip Gilts, laity, as well as clergy. Thank you so much. It is such an honor to be here with you today. I want to introduce to you Troy Griffin, our Associate Director of Media. I am so grateful for this amazing, amazing team.

A moment of privilege, just real quick if I may, Bishop: I want to say a little something about Irv White. A huge thank you to him for this message today. Irv and I go way, way back. Irv is on my Communications team, and Irv and I did the very first videos back in the '90's for the Texas Annual Conference. How about that. A little fun fact there.

So I believe I see very, very familiar faces here in this room. Its good to see all of you. And I want to say if our team has ever worked with any of you on Cross Connection articles, on social media, on a logo, would you please just go ahead and raise your hand. Awesome. Logos, anything—thank you. And if we have not worked with you, please come see me afterwards because we would love to be featuring you somewhere on our channels, so...

As a team, one of our strategic goals this year is to make sure that we are changing the narrative, to make sure that what is going on out there in the news is turned around to be a little more positive. So what we have done, we have disrupted that narrative. And it's been a lot of fun, y'all. In 2023 alone, our department has been sharing your stories. They have been on the front pages of the newspaper, at the top of the local news. We have seen them—our new church starts, national news. We've had eight front page stories over the last year. Which has been a lot of fun.

And this is all to the glory of God. This has nothing to do with our team. These are your stories about church growth. We are telling the stories about your good news, churches. Stories about your churches, about hope, about growth, some of the things the small churches are doing in great big new ways.

And y'all, social media—we are killing it on social media. It's really interesting: I did an audit, so to speak, on all the channels nationwide—every single Conference in the United States, we have the largest following and the largest engagement. Look at these numbers. Over 40,000 people on our channels. And in terms of engagement, that means me talking back to y'all as you're on the channels, we have almost 90% engagement. I just want to say real quickly a thank to Patricia Lund—I know she's here in the room, I'm not going to make her stand—but she has been working our channels during Annual Conference, and Erin Muckleroy—I see her up here in the front—she's been shooting a lot of photos. Thank you to those two who have been on our team. And if you've not been to our new website lately, it rocks. Thank you to Troy who has completely led that and put it together for us. It's been a huge, huge job.

In a nutshell, let me just say our department reaches new people for your churches externally. So we offer lots of free tools to reach your audiences through social media. That means we do many, many—so sorry—social media graphics and posts for your church for Easter, Christmas, back to school. And then for internal audiences, that's you, of course we have Cross Connection that we produce, Delegate Dispatch, and soon to be released You Matter for our clergy.

And then all the videos and of course that is Troy Griffin back here. I think we counted 200 videos that we produced just this year. Of course our website has lots and lots of resources for you. Our Flickr site which has hundreds and hundreds of photos for to you download, if you'll take a look at that, there is lots of photos from this session, and lots of things for the newsletters as well.

But more than anything, friends, we would like to feature you. We'd love to tell your good story, your good news. So please come see me and share your good news or good stories with me. Thank you so much.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Shannon. They work around the clock to get us to this point every year. So I'm grateful. I'm now going to ask Kip to bring forward the nominations report.

Report of the Committee on Nominations

Kip Gilts, elder, Assistant to the Bishop: Thank you, Bishop. Members of the Texas Annual Conference, the Conference Committee on Nominations has been at work pivoting and adapting these last few years. A while back, a few years ago, we asked our officers in 2020 to extend their quadrennium from 2016 to 2020 quadrennium, to extend it one year to go until 2021. They graciously agreed to do so, thereby filling a five-year quadrennium. So then we brought newly organized teams to serve from 2021 through 2024, which meant a three-year quadrennium.

And then last year, a number of our Conference teams were significantly impacted by a little bit of news we've heard something about this week—disaffiliations, withdrawal of clergy—presented us with the task of identifying leaders to complete the one year term left in the three

year quadrennium from 2021 to 2024. I hope you're following this because—Bishop Bickerton, you probably know how to keep score of a baseball game; it's not an easy thing, but it's a lot of fun. It's like driving a four on the floor or a three on the tree, it's a blast, but this is what nominations feels like right now.

So what's presented to you, the 2023 session of the Texas Annual Conference is the complete nominations report. Those you have elected and have been serving for a while and the new nominees who have been vetted and invited to serve on the various teams. Now, let me add that you'll find this on Pages 32 through 56 in your Pre-Conference Journal. These are all great leaders. We've talked to them. We know they're fantastic, but in spite of that, this is not our best work. We were launched into work at the beginning of this calendar year. Had to discover how many vacancies there were, because while it's easy to know what clergy have left, it's not always easy to know what lay members have left because some of them then their churches left, but they went somewhere else, and thereby we did not want to drop them off of our committees. So there was a lot of searching that went on to find if folks were indeed continued to be United Methodists and willing to serve.

We're really in the middle of what we call section 4.3 of our conference rules and structures of filling vacancies between quadrennium, however many years a quadrennium is. And so we are lacking some of the things we value in here. It's not as diverse as we would want it to be. Not ethnically, racially, geographically, age-wise, not every decade of life—what we've tried to do in the past and what we will do next year for the quadrennial elections is that we will make sure that we've examined the roles of our Conference—what are the demographics of our Conference, and how are those represented in the current nominations for the quadrennium that we'll be addressing next year.

So we do begin today our process of the new quadrennium. Our thinking is, it would go from 2024, next year at Annual Conference, to 2028. You've already heard from Bishop Harvey that there is another General Conference scheduled in 2026. And so you may be wondering, "How is that going to impact this quadrennium? And it's a good question, and I'm grateful that Romonica Malone-Wardley will be chairing the Committee on Nominations, and will be addressing that question faithfully and fully. However, for now, our Conference Rules and Structures have a clear process that begins with listing all of the teams, the boards, the agencies, the committees, the commissions, the councils which are subject to election by the Annual Conference. You'll find these listed on the Committee on Nominations report in the Pre-Conference Journal referenced earlier.

I encourage you to talk with the Center Directors and chairpersons and members of those teams that you recognize on there about what kind of time commitment is involved in this, what is scope of work, what are the goals and objectives of this ministry team because I may be interested in it and then I encourage you to fill out the biographical profile noting your preferences in serving as leader in this Conference.

Be sure to tell members of your church—these are not limited to those who are serving as members here of the Texas Annual Conference session of 2023. All your members are eligible to serve on these teams and committees. So be sure to tell them about this process and invite them

to submit their profiles—I think you'd be good at that—with preferences for their involvement. Now, the next few months are going to be crucial months for our Conference to prayerfully discern where God is calling you and the Conference Committee on Nominations, prayerfully seek to identify the best leaders to guide us in the next four years—or whatever kind of quadrennium awaits us—but look at opportunities as folks familiar with the work, fill out the profile that will be launched on our website soon.

For now, however, Bishop Harvey, the Conference Committee on Nominations, in consultation with the Leadership Team, in accordance with our rules Section 4.3, moves the election of these leaders found on the nomination report beginning on Page 32 of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Bishop Harvey: Okay, I'm going to take a breath. That was a lot. And you can tell these times of transition are complicated at best. And we're sitting over here saying, "Oh my gosh. You know what if? What about?"—because there are some other pieces that still need to fall into place that we don't have the answers for. We're not sure we have the right questions for it yet. So we're going to be in this kind of liminal space, this threshold for a while. I'd love to tell you it will be over next year or the year after that. I'm going to take a guess here, it will be about 2028 before this gets settled as far as nominations and I call it the octrinium, instead of a quadrennium. I don't know if that's a word, but I made up that word because it's a lot.

This is an opportunity, any questions that you might have, clarifying questions of Kip and also if there are any nominations from the floor, we know there are gaps. I'm going to stand up because I can only see half the room. Next year, can we move it this way?

Rev. Gilts: We're going to saw off about eight inches of it, I think.

Bishop Harvey: We have to adjust for a short Bishop. We know that there are gaps. We know that. We've just for the last couple of years—I know everybody's just been trying to fill the gaps as best that we can. So this is your opportunity to ask any clarifying questions of Rev. Gilts and/or if you have any nominations from the floor. I see someone at microphone No. 1.

Tom Teekell, elder, SFA Wesley Foundation: Tom Teekell, I'm appointed to the SFA Wesley Foundation in Nacogdoches. This is in reference to page 239 of the Pre-Conference Journal, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. I move to substitute Rev. Jeremy Woodley with Rev. Amy Hodge. I'm happy to speak to that.

Unidentifiable speaker: Second.

Rev. Teekell: Jeremy will be going on personal leave and moving out of the state and will not be able to participate in the level I think is necessary. He's here and he's amenable to this notion. I've also talked with Amy Hodge and she is anxious to serve. Amy was active in our Wesley Foundation as a student. She's an ordained Deacon. She's a former campus minister and she adds representation from the East District which is not currently on the board. Other than the exofficio members, I'm aware that replacing Jeremy with Amy means that there will be only one male on the board. I personally don't have a problem with that. And if it means putting the right

person on the board, that's fine with me and the difference between 80% female to 90% female I think is pretty academic anyway.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you for all of that. This is before you. If you will accept this substitution, would you raise your hand. Is there anybody that's opposed? Thank you. Thank you for that.

Are there any other corrections? That's the other thing I need to say to you. We've tried to do this with a fine-toothed comb and yet we know there are probably still corrections to be made. So corrections should be sent to you, Kip?

Rev. Gilts: Yes. For the next 30 days.

Bishop Harvey: Great.

Rev. Gilts: And to Romonica Malone-Wardley after that.

Bishop Harvey: Until Romonica Malone-Wardley steps in. Are there any other questions? If not, seeing none, I'm going to move to accepting the slate of nominations that is before you. If you would support this slate, please raise your hand. Is there anyone who is opposed? Thank you. Thank you for that. Appreciate it.

Rev. Gilts: Thank you, Bishop.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Kip. We're now moving to the report on new faith communities. Melissa—I think that's where we are. New faith communities, Melissa Maher.

Report from the Office of New Ministry Strategies

Rev. Gilts: Let me return to my role over here. We have a video I believe to introduce this. Our new faith community—the Director of New Faith Communities is for the next—what time is it—12 or 13-and-a-half hours is Morris Matthis. He retires effective midnight. But Morris is in an extension ministry right now somewhere on the east coast. So he's prepared a video for us if we could watch that now.

Bishop Harvey: Let's roll the video.

Morris Matthis, elder, Director of New Faith Communities and Superintendent of the Central North District (video): Hi, my name is Morris Matthis and I have the privilege of serving as the Director of New Faith Communities of the Texas Annual Conference. All this week in different ways we've been hearing about the new faith communities that have been started this year. We're doing that for a lot of different reasons, not just for the ministry that they are doing, but for the hope that they represent. This has been a challenging season for the Conference. But in truth, it's also been an exciting time for starting new churches.

Over these past months, I've had the opportunity to meet some incredible people, people who have a deep commitment to The United Methodist Church. So deep that in spite of the many

reasons they may have chosen to stay with their departing churches, they made the courageous decision to join together with others who were of the same heart and mind and ask the question, "What must be done to continue the proclamation of the gospel with a United Methodist voice in our community?"

So they began to meet in homes, in restaurants, to talk and to pray and to plan. And then they began to meet in places wherever they could find them. We're so grateful to our Episcopal brothers and sisters for opening their churches so we can meet for worship. That's where Water's Edge Church is in Conroe, and United Methodist Church of the Pines in Jasper. They are in Episcopal Churches. Bryan Community Church Is meeting in a Presbyterian church. Our Jacksonville church may have the coolest temporary worship space of them all. It's a chapel that was dismantled in England and restored on private property outside of Jacksonville. Our Woodville church restored a closed United Methodist Church in a little town a few miles away, Chester, and they are meeting there. Our 288 Corridor church will be meeting temporarily at the Glenbrook church near Hobby Airport, but it's not all churches where they've been meeting. Our church in Cy-Fair met for a season in a replica of the Alamo. You remember the Alamo, don't you? Well now they are meeting in a middle school. Our Baytown-Mont Belvieu church is meeting in a barn. A barn that comes with a margarita machine, but as far as I know, they've never turned it on. Some of these new faith communities are as small as 40 people. We have one regularly worshiping over 200 people. And we've got everything in between.

And I'm also excited about our two churches that have already chartered, the United Methodist Church of the Pines in Jasper, and our church in Northwest Houston. But every one of their stories, of all these churches, is unique and their future is far from certain. So we've got to continue to pray for them and support them in every way we possibly can. But here is what they all have in common. It's these incredible, resilient, amazing followers of Jesus who have a willingness to put the pain and heartache of disaffiliation behind them and to create a new faith community.

What I also know is we're not done. I mean there are other groups and other communities that will need the leadership and guidance of the Annual Conference to help shape them into new churches. And we can't forget that churches need to be started in areas of new growth as well as changing neighborhoods with churches that perhaps need to be restarted. There is so much that needs to be done and so much opportunity for new faith communities we can't let that work come to an end.

And the good news is that we aren't. In fact, I really think great things are ahead for new faith communities. I'm retiring this year and I just want to say that I hate to miss Annual Conference this year, but the bishop kindly gave me permission to do so. For those who know me, you're not going to be surprised to know that I'm doing a bicycle run. The ride started right before Annual Conference and so I'm on it right now. The ride starts in Georgia and it ends in Maine covering 1,500 miles and 13 states and it will take about a month. It's raising money for a great ministry called the Fuller Center for Housing. I have never done anything like this before. I don't know if I'll be successful, but I've dreamed of doing such a ride for years.

I just want to say I'm grateful to the Conference for all I've been given the opportunity to do in my ministry. And that being a United Methodist minister is the highest honor of my life, and my hope is that along the way I've done a little bit of good for the kingdom. But just because I'm retiring, the work is in no way going to end. I am so excited that Melissa Maher has accepted the position of the Director of New Ministry Strategies. I've had the opportunity to work with Melissa in connection with the Board of Ordained Ministry. She's wise and thoughtful, a great person to be around. She's done amazing work in her ministry that prepares her to lead the Conference well. I know that you'll be blessed by her leadership and her ministry. In the meantime, have a great Annual Conference. Always wear your helmet and I'll look forward to seeing you at Conference next year.

Bishop Harvey: Melissa, welcome.

Melissa Maher, elder, Chapelwood UMC, Houston: Thank you. If you were a part of one of these new faith communities, would you stand so we could applaud God and you for your courage? As Morris said, my name is Rev. Melissa Maher and as of July 1st I will be the Director of New Ministry Strategies. That does include new faith communities which Morris Matthis has led so faithfully but also will include new mission strategies, working within each district to look towards new and fresh expressions of the kingdom of God and perhaps along the way some of those will become seeds for a new faith community.

I remember the words of Jesus who said to a group of fishermen, "ush out into the deep." Those were the exact words that he said to them as they had toiled through the night, as their boats carried the weight of their disappointment, but did not carry the fruit of their labor. Their backs ached. They were in a constant state of disappointment, sleepless nights—can some of you relate? And so as Jesus says again to us—and Pastor Irv thank you for that message, I see the tie has already come off and you are ready to go—to those who feel stuck or unsure of what is next, push out into the deep. For those who feel a sense of loss, of creativity or the ability to dream, Jesus says push out into the deep. If you feel at a place that you have plateaued in life or your career, you're seeking renewal or reinvigoration, or to reimagine, Jesus says, "push out into the deep."

Now those words came to the disciples in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke as an invitation to a call and to discipleship. John—the gospel of John—places this miracle as a resurrection story. And so, friends, our calling that we have each received into this family of the body of Christ is a calling of discipleship and to go. We're at a moment and a season where we are being invited to push out into the deep and to reimagine and to have those calls for us as individuals and as our churches to have it resurrected. And so I'm excited to join with you in this work to move throughout the boundaries of our Annual Conference to see what God is doing, inviting us to push out into the deep and to not give up before the miracle happens. Amen.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Melissa. Can't wait to see what's next. I now will invite Jill Daniel to give our report on We Love All God's Children.

Report on We Love All God's Children

Jill Daniel, laity, Director of We Love All God's Children: Good morning. This morning I want to especially say thank you, Bishop Harvey, for being here, thank you to our delegation for letting Bishop Harvey be here, for inviting her here, and Bishop, I can't wait to see what God is going to do with all of us in the upcoming time.

So, Bishop, Bishop, Assistant to the Bishop, members of the Annual Conference, and our guests, thank you. In the past year, We Love All God's Children has continued to strive to fulfill its mission to assist churches of the Texas Annual Conference in engaging with their communities to develop, expand, and enhance discipleship, early childhood education and literacy, and positive health outcomes for all young children in our Texas Annual Conference. Through various training events, gatherings of local church leaders, the generosity of Moody's Permanent Endowment Foundation, and the furthering of partnerships with such entities as Texas Workforce Solutions and Neuhaus Education, We Love All God's Children, by the power of the Holy Spirit—by the power of the Holy Spirit—has assisted in discerning and devising successful strategies to equip congregations to change the trajectory of the lives of underserved and unchurched children and families throughout the Texas Annual Conference.

Since we gathered last May, many things have happened, of course, but I want to tell you about just one quick story about some children who in 2019 in a little church deep in East Texas found a preschool called All God's children. And those infants in that low-income area, in that area that struggles with health care and finding appropriate services for children, those kiddos came to our school. Those same children will be entering kindergarten in the fall. And they've already had their procedure with the kindergarten specialist there, getting them ready to enter the public school system and, guess what, every single one of tested on-level, ready to be a kindergarten student, so by time they get to the third grade they'll be reading on-level, and by the team a little more years go through, they'll be graduating from high school, and going on to become productive citizens in this great country that we live in.

Also since we gathered last May, we've opened four brand new United Methodist children's Centers where the trajectory of those kiddos lives are being changed through age-appropriate discipleship, excellent, excellent early childhood education, and some great health outcomes, some great services that were presented for those kiddos and their families. We continued to work with our 13 remaining United Methodist Children's Centers as they strive to reach their goal of becoming Texas Rising Star 4-star centers, the highest accreditation offered by the State of Texas for licensed childcare centers. Congratulations to Bear Creek United Methodist Church Day School for leading us as our first Rising Star center.

We Love All God's Children has worked to remain on target to open new or enhance existing early childhood or after school centers at Westbury United Methodist Church, Ebenezer United Methodist Church, Prairie View United Methodist Church, Fairwood United Methodist Church, and Huntsville First United Methodist Church. For the children and the families in these communities, in these churches' ministry settings, divine blessing is truly on its way as the church opens wide their doors to welcome many who have never heard the stories of Jesus or who have never experienced the love of Christ by the body of Christ.

In the past year, we trained new and current directors as well as other weekday staff in both our United Methodist Children's Centers and our other weekday schools throughout the Texas Annual Conference. We've coordinated connectional Vacation Bible School with upwards of \$20,000 worth of curriculum and decorations shared by larger congregations with smaller congregations to engage their communities with the good news of Christ through the ministry of Vacation Bible School. And we have consulted with 26 local congregations regarding the revitalization or the start-up of ministries to children and families.

In March, we partnered with Ebenezer United Methodist Church in Houston Independent School District to engage school-aged children with our 2023 spring break camp. This camp gave the children of working parents a safe, healthy environment with daily breakfast and lunch as well as Vacation Bible School each morning, followed by sports camp in the afternoon. A special thanks to Ebenezer and to Rev. Enid Henderson for hosting this and a special thanks to the TSU Wesley Foundation, Rev. Tabitha Rankin, and her amazing interns for all of their help during this ministry time.

Once again, this year We Love All God's Children has worked to build more strategic partnerships that allow our local churches to do more than they ever dreamed of or imagined. We once again partnered with the Barbara Bush Literacy Foundation to distribute more than 600 home libraries to underserved children in both our United Methodist Church schools all across the Annual Conference. We also strengthened or began building new relationships with strategic partners, including Collaborative for Children, the University of Texas' Children's Learning Institute, Champions for Children, Texarkana College, Discount School Supply, and Lakeshore Learning and many others.

Within the last half of the year, We Love All God's Children implemented a board-led model for the discernment of various children's ministry opportunities, new United Methodist Children's Centers, and the financial dealings of We Love All God's Children. Members of this new body may be found in your Pre-Conference Journal in the report that we just approved. I would like to ask if you're a member of our board, would you please stand so this body may recognize you and affirm you.

Thank you. In the upcoming year, We Love All God's Children will continue to build a network of United Methodist Children's Centers throughout the Texas Annual Conference to provide a strong foundation in faith, excellent early education, health and wellness habits, parental engagement, and pathways for unchurched families to become actively involved with the local church. We'll bring additional licensed after-school centers into the ministry of United Methodist Children's Centers in order to equip local churches to answer God's call to serve a more diverse age group with unique student and family needs. We'll be planting summer literacy day camps which will provide a means of preventing the summer slide in reading proficiency and we'll be partnering once again with our friends, with Hyde Freedom Schools, to bring freedom schools to some of our areas. We'll offer two Conference-wide trainings for those who work with children, in the fall of 2023, featuring experts in the field of children's ministry and early childhood education. As a follow-up to those trainings, district in-person gatherings will be held to strengthen the Texas Annual Conference commitment to love all God's children. We will also strengthen the We Love All God's Children board through trainings, feedback from local

churches, and through the assignment of board members to ministries matching their individual gifts and interests.

Finally, friends, Jesus said, "Let the children come." And I want to take this opportunity to say thank you to our churches for all you've done and for all that you continue to do to welcome all God's children. It is truly an honor to serve Christ and to serve you. Amen.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Jill. Thank you for everything that you do. I now will ask us to roll a video. We've got video No. 5 I believe—retirement video No. 5.

Retirement Video #5 – On Some Sundays You Have to Laugh

Ricky Ricks, elder, Greggton UMC, Longview (video): I pick up a call and they say, "preacher can you come help?" It's a good thing to ask, because what do they want you to help? This lady calls me. Her name was Betty, and she calls me up on the phone and she said, "Preacher, I've got an emergency over here. I really need you to come over here." And so I grew up in Tyler, and so rural and everything, and I get over to her house and she says to me, she says, "My bull is fighting with the neighbor's bull and I need you to come help me break them up." And I was like, "What!?" And sure enough, we crawl under the barbed wire fence and she said, "Just pick up the biggest stick you can find and start whopping on one of them." And so we did. And she's hitting on one and I'm hitting on the other. And finally, they were dazed or whatever, and they kind of separated. And so Betty says to me, she says, "Okay, Ricky, take your stick and you go stand in front of the gap"—the gap where the bull had come through—"and I'll run him towards you and you turn him and run him back through that gap." And I always thought—when I remember that moment, I remember thinking, "I'm going to die in my first church run over by a bull." But I did it. I stood there. The bull came at me, I waved the stick and he graciously turned and went back where he was supposed to be.

Jack Womack, elder, Hope Community UMC, Pasadena (video): I don't remember the year now, but I was awarded this thing in Pasadena called Minister of the Year. And at that time I was riding a Harley and had kind of long hair. It wasn't in a ponytail. I showed up at the big event, prayer breakfast to receive this award, and the week before that the police department had run over my motorcycle. And so Ed Emmett was there and a lot of people were there and they introduced me and said I was the long-haired, Harley-riding preacher. I stood up and said I was a Harley-riding preacher until the police ran over my motorcycle. It was interesting, the city got really interested in fixing it after that.

Danny Darby, elder (video): My wife went into labor on Sunday morning, and I had nobody to turn to and so I called up Emmett Barrow and I said, "What do I do?" And he says, "well, I can't come preach for you, I have another obligation." He said, "Okay, get out your district directory and go down the list of retired pastors," and I think maybe we had a list of lay speakers. So I did. I started calling and calling and calling and calling. And every—I think I called everyone in the directory and not a single one was available. And so I called Emmett back, and it was getting late by this time. And I asked, "Reverend Barrow, what do I do?" He said, "I can't come preach for you. I have to preach at First Church." And one of the few times he was a little irritated with me. And I heard from the background his wife Ann say, "Tell that boy to get that

girl to the hospital. I'll go preach!" So Ann Barrow preached her first and probably her only sermon for me on that Sunday morning. Did a fine job and we got baby boy out of the deal.

Juanita Rasmus, local pastor, St. John's UMC, Houston (video): So one of our dear friends who lived under 45 and the Pierce Elevated—he's deceased now—his name was Kevin. One day I walked outside with my girls—and Kevin was a paranoid schizophrenic and so you can expect Kevin to say anything, right? So one day I'm walking out with the girls and getting in the truck and Kevin heard me turn, "Hey, Kevin, are you coming to Bible study tonight?" And he said, "No, I am I'm nine months pregnant and my water could break at any time." And then I turned the car on. I was driving a truck. And Kevin said, "Pastor Juanita, you need to get your catalytic converter checked. Something is going on with it"—and he was right.

Rodney Graves, elder, McCabe Roberts Avenue UMC, Beaumont (video): Yeah, at the first congregation that I pastored, I was so excited to get there because one of my predecessors was Bishop Kelly. And we in the neighborhood where—forgive me on this American history, but the man that said give me liberty or give me death—He rode in that area. It's a place called Church Hill. But I was so happy to be there. And I can remember having been exposed to greeters and ambassadors at churches, so I brought up the idea to have greeters. So one of the members, she volunteered, and I gave a few hints about greeting. When you open the door, smile. Greet the people. Welcome and a few other things. Well, one day I came to church and I just kind of listened. And everybody she opened the door for, these were the words she used to greet them: "The devil is busy." And so while I thought it was funny, I didn't like it. I felt like, "what kind of greeting is that?" And just starting out, I was thinking, "Is anything going on here that I don't know about?" She is saying, "The devil is busy." That was just her. And so we had a conversation about it and it got a little better, but I really think that what she did was she stopped saying it when she thought I could hear it. I think she still was saying it. "The devil is busy." And so I thought that was pretty funny. Kind of crazy, but funny.

Charles Anderson, elder, Superintendent of the Northwest District (video): When Lydia and I were moving into a parsonage, early in our ministry, the parsonage had just been renovated. The blinds weren't up yet, neither was the back fence. We were moving in that day when the lay leader's wife came by. And the lay leader's wife was a gracious, kind woman and had brought cookies, and we invited her in to see the parsonage and all the renovations. We were going to the back of the house and showing her things, and she said, "This is nice, Charles. What is that guy doing back there?" And I looked out and there was a guy pushing 90—and pushing it pretty hard—in our backyard with a shotgun. And I said, "Well, I don't know. The squirrels are bad around here." And about that time his wife came out and... from next door... and were arguing in our backyard and started grabbing the gun and pushing it back and forth and then they fell to the ground rolling with this gun between them. The gun went off into the air. Didn't hit anything. Lydia is screaming, "Call 9-1-1! Call 9-1-1!" The lay leader's wife, who was a kind and gracious woman, turns to us and says, "I can see that you're busy right now. I'll come back at a more convenient time." We call 9-1-1. By God's grace, the police were down the street and come roaring up through our yard into the backyard, wrestle the guy to ground and take the gun away from him. The wife screams. I'm going, "Rats, I'm a Methodist pastor and will have to do something." So I went outside and I went to her and said, "Ma'am, are you okay?" "Yes, I'm okay." "Is everyone all right?" "Yes, thank you." And she gives me her name, and I go, "Well,

I'm the Rev. Charles Anderson." And she stops crying and says, "Why, honey, you're our new preacher." And she goes over to her husband on the ground—who is on the ground with hands behind him—"Rufus, oh, Rufus, the new pastor has come to visit us." And from that moment I learned that in all churches you're welcomed by two kinds of people: You're welcomed by those who welcome with open arms, and you're welcomed by those who are well-armed. So that's kind of my memory story of ministry.

Bishop Harvey: Only in Texas. So I'm now going to invite Godfrey Hubert to give our disaster readiness—are you ready? How many of those Hawaiian shirts do you have? Do you have a whole closet of them?

Report from the Disaster Preparedness Coordinator

Rev. Gilts: That does not look like disaster readiness.

Bishop Harvey: That looks like you're ready for vacation, not disaster.

Godfrey Hubert, elder Disaster Readiness Coordinator: Well you know what day it is.

Bishop Harvey: The day the Lord has made.

Rev. Dr. Hubert: May 31st—fat Tuesday in a disaster world.

Bishop Harvey: I know that date well.

Rev. Dr. Hubert: Tomorrow I exchange hats and I wear a safety vest in lieu of my beach hat. Bishops, Texas Annual Conference, I'd like to begin by asking for a moment of personal privilege. Thank you. And for that, Kip, would you join me.

Rev. Gilts: Oh, sure.

Rev. Dr. Hubert: In hhis book, It Ain't Brain Surgery—I don't know if you read it, Larry Dierker's book—he recounts a time when he and Milo were broadcasting in the mid '90's during a terrible losing streak. And the Astros were playing the Marlins in Miami. And they had been swept for two or three series. And during this game the cameras panned the dugout and Milo commented about how dejected and defeated the players looked. And Larry said, "Well, you know what they need?" And Milo said, "What?" "They need Hawaiian shirts." And Milo asked, "How come?" He said, "Have you ever seen anybody wearing a Hawaiian shirt who doesn't have a smile on his face?" Well, Kip, you know my life was changed in Kauai and this to me has become the Hawaiian shirt, a little bit of a liturgical garb to reflect the changes.

Now, folks, I don't know how many of you know, I suspect we all know that over the last three years, nobody in our Annual Conference has carried a heavier load than the man next to me. He was the older brother who had to pick up the pieces and hold the family together after the parent flaked out and went away—I'm sorry, I'm Mennonite, I only know how to say it one way: directly. And I don't know that we fully appreciate the pressures and the burden that Kip has carried. And so, Kip, it's time to start decompressing.

Rev. Gilts: All right. All right.

Rev. Dr. Hubert: And Bishop, I don't know if it's appropriate, but I think we'd all appreciate it if you instructed Kip to go change and start decompressing.

Bishop Harvey: Don't do it all right here. That's a lot to see. Go back stage.

Rev. Dr. Hubert: Kip has been a dear friend to so many of us, and a great boss to me. Romonica, I look forward to working directly with you and for you. And always for you, Bishop. I also want to say that this has been the one and only Annual Conference I've attended in 46 years where you felt the Holy Spirit. Beginning Sunday night with a Churchillian speech, you know, we heard yesterday aren't we glad to have a United Methodist Bishop. Well, there are a lot of United Methodist Bishops, but there is only one Bishop Harvey. And that's what we're glad we have.

Well, so let's talk business. I don't want to hear again after the next tornado or hurricane or fire, "Godfrey, what's the plan?" It's the wrong time to ask. Let me tell what you the plan is, and I will in a second. But the first thing I want to announce to you is something we all need to know. I've seen it on a bumper sticker. It happens. And it will. We just don't know the day or the hour. But it's going to happen. Harvey happens—sorry. Tornadoes happen. Winter storms happen. Pandemics happen. Famines happen. Poverty happens. Wars happen. Hatred happens. Killings happen. It happens.

You know, six years ago when Hurricane Harvey devastated 50 counties, flooding 204,000 homes, we saw the worst that nature can do. But we also saw an incredible display of love as thousands of volunteers from hundreds of churches came out to help their neighbors. Many of you did that. And it was a beautiful sight, but I remember because that was my fifth 500-year flood. And it was always the same story—the volunteers coming out in droves to help their neighbors. And it was beautiful. It was heart warming, but it reminded me a little bit of 5-year-olds playing soccer. Which is also beautiful, energetic, and fun to watch. There are always one or two superstars, and the rest are trailing behind trying to figure it out.

And I thought that's what in every instance disaster response has looked like for me. While many were helped, I have to tell you that Wesley's No. 1 rule was also broken. Harm was done as much as good was done. Harm was done when entire communities were overlooked while wealthy communities or middle-class communities had an abundance of shirts, the blue, gray, orange, yellow, red, all the kinds of shirts you can imagine. And then entire neighborhoods went uncared for. Harm was done when families were revictimized by muck and gut gone wrong and harm was done when yolunteers became frustrated with the lack of coordination.

So some of us began to ask ourselves, "What if?" We wondered, what if we were better prepared. What if volunteers knew what to do and more importantly what not to do? What if churches knew who is going where and who is doing what, so three churches don't show up in the same street to the same house and other streets go uncared for? What if we merged our efforts, came out of our silos, and pooled our resources and started collaborating and

communicating with each other, not just United Methodists with each other, but with the Baptist, the Catholics, the Mormons, the Muslims, the Jewish synagogues? What if?

So a number of faith disaster response organizations sprung up, including the restoration team that came out of Chapelwood, Hope Disaster Recovery, which I founded, 4-B down in Galveston and that area, SURE in Bellaire and so on. We realized we needed long term disaster recovery organizations that would stick around. And we convened over 20 disaster organizations like the American Red Cross, SBP, the Salvation Army, the Offices of Emergency Management, Interfaith Ministries, Catholic Charities, the Jewish Federation, the Islamic Circle of North America, Disaster Relief, and other organizations to develop a comprehensive, collaborative, and coherent plan for the next time, so we would reduce frustration and improve performance and maximize results and we learned that there are three predictors to every good recovery: Communication, coordination, and execution. And we set out to develop a program that would change the landscape of disaster in our region. It's called Texas Congregational Disaster Readiness—TXCDR.

The mission is to expedite relief and recovery to communities impacted by disasters and most of all the vulnerable communities. Our vision is to prepare congregations to respond effectively so that volunteers will have a positive experience and even though they are bone-tired at the end of the day, they are looking forward to going out again.

Our strategy is to provide coordination, communication, and execution so we don't revictimize people. So our goal was to set up congregations for success to make sure that volunteers have that great experience that they are looking for, and most importantly, to make sure families and communities receive excellent service. And what I learned after pastoring Foundry for 34 years, is that no other time is a community more aware of the church. If you want to engage with your community and be remembered for a long time, as a community, as a church with a heart and a church that has engaged the community, engage the communities in a time of disaster. And not just for a day or two, or a week, but we're still repairing Harvey homes.

And so since we launched the program two years ago, we have well over 200 member congregations from all denominations, the United Methodists have more than half of those memberships. We've provided over 4,000 hours of training to over 2,500 volunteers and 11 facets of disaster response and recovery, including sheltering people. We wrote the only program, the only plan in the country on pet sheltering, home repair, mucking, tarping, chainsawing, and supply distribution, and so on and compassioniate care. You can see a full list of those trainings on a sheet that's on the table in front of you. We've also brought back UMCOR early response training after years of inactivity because you need that to go serve in other Annual Conferences.

Now, why is all of this important? Because we need to be ready. The time to get ready is not when we see something brewing in the Gulf. And so last year we assembled, with your help, tools, and materials for mucking and gutting and tarping, enough to outfit 12 trailers. So we can be ready. And as we continue to prepare for this next disaster, we continue to respond to past disasters.

I remember six weeks after Harvey being asked, "Are we still doing Harvey? We're not done yet?" No, we still aren't done. We just completed 45 homes, funded by UMCOR. Harvey homes waiting for all these years to be repaired. Over this past year we repaired over 277 homes from Harvey, winter storm, for the most part those two. At a cost of \$2 million, funded by grants from various sources, including UMCOR, SBP, Samaritan's Purse, Catholic Charities, Greater Houston Community Foundation, and the George Floyd Foundation. People, we continue to ask, "How long are we going to do this?" As long as it takes and as long as there is a little old lady or a retired veteran that is waiting for his house to be put together.

And we have some pictures so you can see the damage and extent of work of our volunteers. I'm grateful to the Volunteers-in-Mission as well as our strategic partners, the Mennonites from which I come. We couldn't have done what we've done in the last four years without our Mennonite and Amish partners. And I'm profoundly grateful to them and proud of the work performed by all those skilled volunteers. Now, you may say, "But I don't have the skills that I'm looking at," and well, we also have another program that was funded by the Texas Annual Conference Mission Endowment. It's called Safe and Healthy Homes. It's for people to go who don't have the ability to repair homes, but have honey-do skills. And we have a list of 24 honey dos that we'll perform in the elderly's homes, or the disabled's homes, from caulking windows, to putting air conditioning units, to changing batteries on the smoke detectors, and cleaning the dryer vents, and so on.

There are opportunities to be engaged and to engage your community and we're asking congregations to provide us with the nominations for those who should receive those services. In the area of health—because disaster isn't only a matter of storm, it can literally be a pandemic, can it not?—When we designed a program and pivoted towards vaccination, it was funded by the Texas Annual Conference Mission Endowment and also by the One Star foundation. We decided there was a tremendous inequity in the vaccination process. Food deserts also mean technology deserts. And so we stood up a team that would go to the most vulnerable places. We chose those communities that are within the .9 to .99 on the social vulnerability index. Just to cut it short, it means families that are making \$18,000 a year or less. And we found out that within the greater Houston area, there are 2.2 million people who live within that demographic.

And so we didn't even try to go through churches because our churches have lost contact with these neighborhoods. We went to law enforcement instead and said, "Tell us where the roughest and the poorest apartment complexes are." And we knocked on over 20,000 doors and returned with a vaccine two days later. We didn't go in the middle of the day when it was convenient or safe. We'd go in the evenings when they'd be home. And we'd come back on the weekends. And we were able to bring some equity to the whole vaccination process. And COVID took an enormous toll in our vulnerable communities. Do you know that the largest demographic in the State of Texas today is called the ALICE demographic? ALICE stands for Asset-Limited, Income-Constrained yet Employed. People who are fully, fully employed oftentimes with two or three jobs, but they don't have a livable wage. And they are one car repair bill, air conditioning repair bill, or medical bill away from falling into poverty. And they are fully employed. 53% of the Texas children live in the ALICE population. 1 in 5 children in Texas have food insecurities and that's why I love what Jill is doing. It's incredible. And I'm proud that she is a colleague of mine.

So let me just draw this to a quick close. Too late for that I know. We need to engage. Every congregation needs to engage. No. 1, make sure your church is insured. And that you have enough money in reserves to pay for the deductible. And then appoint a congregational disaster readiness coordinator and assistant coordinator. Join TXCDR so we can get your folks trained and provide communication and coordination that is necessary to respond.

And then purchase and assemble relief supplies. And you have a brochure in front of you that explains those. Give us a call, I'm so grateful to my colleague, Christine Riggle, just contact either one of us and we'll be glad to walk with you on your first steps towards disaster readiness. Thank you.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you, Godfrey. Looking good, Kip. As the Conference Leadership Team members come forward, I will just need to say this, I would not be here if it were not for Godfrey Hubert. I was a layperson at Foundry, and he is the one that plucked me out of the pew, tapped me on the shoulder and said, "Have you ever thought about full time ordained ministry?" And it was Godfrey who saw that in me when I didn't see it at all and even still today when I have a question about it, I go to him. So thank you, Godfrey. Thank you for calling me.

So if I could invite the Core Leadership Team to come forward.

Consideration of the District Realignment Proposal from the Conference Leadership Team Rev. Gilts: I believe Bishop that was the first time he discovered Harvey happens. So our CLT folks are coming forward. The Conference Leadership Team has submitted a proposal to the Texas Annual Conference 2023, to reduce the number of districts in the Conference from nine to five. Our sub-team co-conveners are coming now and they'll speak more to this as well as move its adoption. They'll introduce themselves to you, but my guess is they really don't need any introductions. So thank y'all.

Reggie Clemons, local pastor, First UMC, Pearland: Thank you, Kip. Bishops, Texas Annual Conference, good morning, I am Reggie Clemons, I'm the senior pastor as First United Methodist Church in Pearland and I'm also the South District Leadership Team Chairperson and the Collaboration Team...Sub-team Co-Convener of the Conference Leadership Team.

Christie Hale, elder, Faith UMC, Fannett: I'm Christie Hale, I am pastor of Faith United Methodist Church in Fannett, DLT chair from the Southeast District, and Co-Convener of the Accountability Sub-team from the CLT.

Bea Garza, laity, Asbury UMC: And I'm Bea Garza, member of Asbury United Methodist Church here in Houston, and District Leadership Team Chair and Innovation Sub-team Co-Convener for the Conference Leadership Team along with this guy.

Michael Jarboe, elder, Memorial Drive UMC, Houston: Friends, I'm Michael Jarboe one of the pastors at Memorial Drive United Methodist Church, and an at-large member of the Conference Leadership Team and I get to work with Bea as an exciting comember of the Innovation Sub-

team. And we are here this morning to move the adoption of the CLT proposal found in addendum I of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Rev. Hale: This proposal is more than the work of all of us standing here before you, or even the entire Conference Leadership Team. It's the collaborative work of our entire Annual Conference. We gathered clergy at Reconnect in February. We asked each of the nine District Leadership Teams throughout the Conference to engage in conversation. We reached out with key leaders and those with institutional memory and we had dialogues with all nine District Superintendents and Center Directors. If you participated in one of those official conversations or an informal conversation about this proposal, will you please stand. I know there is more of y'all out there.

While this isn't everyone in the Conference, you can see that we didn't just talk to ourselves in a room. What we found is that we all have the same heart, that we want our Conference to heal and to grow. This proposal is the next faithful step from the conversations that have been had in this very short time.

Rev. Clemons: One of the things that we've heard a lot recently, even before we got here—and we certainly have heard it and understood it here at this Annual Conference—these are unprecedented times. The size of this Conference has shifted significantly in the past six months and we even received the new Bishop weeks after that. Praise the Lord and pass the mashed potatoes, amen. We've needed to move fast, but even more importantly, we've needed to remember thoughtfully. We have to determine the next best step for an Annual Conference that I believe we have a fantastic future ahead of us. I'd like to say that again: I believe we have a fantastic future ahead of us.

So this is not going the only and certainly not the last step for we are a dynamic Conference. But it's the next best step right now to size us organizationally in order that we can carry out effective connectional ministry without overburdening our congregations with an oversized infrastructure.

Bea Garza: Moving from nine districts to five districts aligns with the five district superintendents appointed by Bishop Harvey to lead this Conference on July 1st. In the current appointments where four district superintendents are serving two districts each, it is important to know that the responsibilities and the terms of the number of churches overseen by a DS and the number of pastors supervised by a DS are on average less per District Superintendent than they were one year ago as you can see on the table.

Rev. Jarboe: Now listen friends, we have a lot of excitement already happening in each of these five areas highlighted in bold. New faith communities are springing up in each area with enthusiasm and commitment to the mission field. Our Discipling Document led us into a season where we value nimbleness, alignment, decentralization, and contextual effectiveness. Moving from nine districts to five districts continues to reflect those values. It will also create some inconsistencies in the Discipling Document and the task force is being created to align the new structure with our strategic declaration.

Rev. Hale: We realize that these cannot all happen at once. We will need to continue to move thoughtfully and carefully. With approval today of this proposal, we will still need about six

months with the expectation that it will all be completed on or before December 31st of this year. The next step in this process is to receive approval of this body of the proposal moving from nine districts to five districts. Providing that approval, we will take the following next steps: Hold district conferences where we have vacant parsonages to sell as well as merge or reform any legal entities within that geographic space. Two, Bishop Harvey will invite us all to participate in a webinar hopefully in August where she will announce new district names, lines, boundaries, and alignment of churches for each new district. And finally, we'll need to complete all the necessary paperwork to move from nine to five.

Rev. Clemons: My brothers and sisters, I certainly want you to know that my colleagues and I on this stage and certainly those that are in the room have certainly given all of this a great deal of thought, discernment, and prayer. And I want you to hear that clearly. But also I want you to know that we realize there are some financial realities that are significant factors in the proposal and we are going to work with Conference leaders to prevent any additional financial burdens on the local church and on the local church connectional giving. But we do believe this is more than financial. We believe it is the best missional and structural step for this season that we're in. And so I urge you to support the proposal that has been presented to you and that the Conference Leadership Team be able to reduce the number of districts in the Texas Annual Conference from nine to five.

All CLT Members: We urge you to support this proposal.

Bea Garza: We are united. Want to try that again? One, two, three:

All CLT Members: We urge you to support this proposal.

Bea Garza: Bishop, we move its adoption.

Bishop Harvey: So this is properly before you. Boy they are just chattering back here. They placed this proposal before you. I'm going to ask you if any of you have clarifying questions. There are groups here—part of this team that's prepared to answer any questions that you might have. And, yes, microphone No. 3.

Todd Jordan, elder, Strawbridge UMC Kingwood: Hi, Todd Jordan, clergy at Strawbridge in Kingwood. A question that—not sure who would answer, maybe Bishop or the CLT. And I'm asking the question knowing there is an answer, just thought it might be helpful for us as a body to hear. With the—there is certainly reduction of churches, but there is an expansion of geographical space that each District Superintendent is now responsible for. I'm wondering, could somebody speak to the way that we're going to care for the spiritual, emotional needs of the District Superintendents as they take on the extra burdens of their area. How are we caring for the cabinet in the changes?

Bishop Harvey: So great question. And I'm going to ask—unless any of you are prepared to answer that question—I'll ask Kip to address that. He's already been working on this for his new districts.

Rev. Gilts: Thank you, Todd. You'll remember when I was your District Superintendent, actually, that we did divide into subdistricts of hubs to where we would have some hub meetings with pastors. And I would break a district into seven district parts and pray for pastor and a church on a particular day and had seven groups for that. But also did my itinerating as a DS throughout the district in that way. My assignment next month, in 30 days, will be roughly the state of Vermont, only not as nice weather. But the geographic region is about that.

And the notion is to just spend a little bit of time in the car doing that. I have colleagues at the Conference office who say that they arrive at the Conference office at five o'clock in the morning to avoid the traffic. Traffic has never bothered me that much to where I needed to do that. So I will—I get up, I'll get on the road and I don't mind doing that, conducting some business while I'm doing that, but I found with the number of churches and the number of pastors that are on the slides here that Steve Woody and I have both talked about having the largest geographic areas that, we feel confident we can do that. Along with a number of pastors, retired pastors who have served as District Superintendents that have come up and said any way we can help, let us know. So there is really that spirit of cooperation.

Bishop Harvey: I hope that answered your question, Todd. Microphone No. 4.

Stacy Pever Anzick, elder, on leave: I'm Stacy Anzick and I'm a clergy on family leave. And I have a question. And I don't want my question to make it sound like I'm not supporting the proposal. But I know when the CLT was formed some time ago, there was concerns about concentration of power in a small group of people from the Annual Conference. And I don't remember when it was written if it said—if it was listed as it named the districts or it just said a member of every district. And so then that would also reduce the CLT and so I didn't know if there was thoughts of then expanding more at-large persons so the CLT would roughly stay the same size or if it would reduce as well?

Bishop Harvey: I'll answer that—it's better if one of you answers it so that I can be the presider.

Rev. Hale: Perfect. So we've had lots of those conversations because we know representation matters. We know that we've looked at even our nominations report and haven't always lived into the Conference rules that we've set. And so until this is proposed, we can't actually line out how we can do that, but there is that commitment that just because we've got all of the old West District and Northwest District that it would be one voice from there is ludicrous because there is so much difference between the West District and the Northwest District, am I right? And difference from the South District to the North District and everything in between. And so it really is our hope that once we get this approval, then we can live more fully into the rules we've already set, and as a part of the Discipling Document, so that we are a diverse group that recognizes and represents our entire Annual Conference. Does that answer your question, Stacy?

Rev. Anzick: Yes, thank you very much.

Bishop Harvey: Anyone else? Are you standing by to go to the microphone. Standing by to go to your seat. Sorry about that. Any other questions? All right, seeing none, if you could restate the motion, whoever—Reggie, if you could do that.

Bishop Harvey: And they've said it. There are parts that we're going to have to work on as we go. This is the next step.

Rev. Gilts: I believe Michael Jarboe said that "we are here to move the adoption of the CLT proposal found in addendum I of the Pre-Conference Journal."

Rev. Jarboe: I'll do it.

Rev. Gilts: If I remember.

Rev. Jarboe: We are here this morning to move this did adoption of the CLT proposal found in addendum I of the Pre-Conference Journal.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you for that. All right, always like to repeat it one more time before you go to vote so you know what you're voting. This is properly before you. If you're in support of the 9 to 5 proposal, please raise your hand. If there is anyone opposed to the 9 to 5 proposal, raise your hand. Thank you. It passes.

We've got some more presentations here. But as they making their way back to their seats, I want to thank these great folks. We met in February and I announced to them that I was going to appoint five superintendents to the nine districts, and they are the ones that said, "Why don't we go ahead and move from nine districts to five, and create that alignment?" And they also knew that there would be a lot of work to do and they've done a lot of work in a very short amount of time in order to bring this proposal to you. So thank you and I'm just grateful that they were eager and amenable to that. So I'll leave it now to you.

Report from the Innovation Sub-Team of the Conference Leadership Team *Bea Garza*: Thank you, Bishop. Well we have all these introductions but you already know who this guy is and you already know who I am. So we're going to move to what we've been doing as the Innovation subcommittee. After creative and thought-provoking gathering in March at the Texas Museum of Broadcast and Communications in Kilgore, we met again in September just a couple of blocks from here at the Angel Share HTX Charity Bar and Kitchen. Angel Share is dedicated to donating proceeds to local nonprofits.

Rev. Jarboe: Now this was for our second innovation lab and the room was filled that day with lively discussion, creative ideas, and hopeful hearts ready to make an impact in their community. We had Dr. Rasmus and Rev. David Briggs share stories of innovation and faith in communities. Dr. Owen Ross, Director of Church Development in the North Texas Annual Conference, led an interactive workshop on the innovation for our attendees, the belly-filling team of GastroChurch provided delicious food and hearty conversation, while the remainder of time was spent with those gathered to teach and honing techniques of writing inspiring grant requests for the Innovation Team's consideration.

Bea Garza: In the weeks that followed, with over 75 church leaders representing every district, we had 17 grants awarded, awarding funds totaling nearly \$124,000. From Canton to Galveston,

and all across our Conference, we helped to turn budding dreams to blossoming realities. With these grants, the Subgroup was and is still gushing with excitement about the stories coming from these recipients.

Rev. Jarboe: And that's what we want to share with you today. That with all of the noise and chaos surrounding the church in our culture, United Methodists are remaining at the forefront in innovation in an ever-changing community that we inhabit. So we asked a few local churches to share how they've been impacted since receiving their innovation grants.

Bea Garza: One recipient said, "Getting the innovation grant has been a first step in moving our church into the 21st century. It's easy to get into the mindset that the best days are behind us. And that nothing new or good will come again. Having this opportunity to build something truly modern has helped our congregation see that more is still possible."

Rev. Jarboe: Another shared this when asked what it meant for them to receive a grant. They said this, "It meant relief and joy. And then we faced a time of being pushed into entering discernment for disaffiliation. For those of us who were committed to United Methodism, we could point to this grant as one more reason for staying, not just because we were gifted money, but that we had evidence of support of the denomination. It's now been six months since receiving this and we have plans to place and launch new music classes for our community this summer. It's amazing the work that can be done."

Bea Garza: And one more, in receiving an innovation grant from the Conference, was not only exciting, but extremely hopeful. "As we witnessed declining numbers in millennium and Gen Z members of our church, we are now prepared to go fishing and casting the reel of grace to our community. We have a long way to go, but we're encouraged by how God is using this grant to grow this ministry. This generosity is helping us put love into action."

Rev. Jarboe: And that's what this is all about. The innovation grant is about putting love into action. Now, at the Angel Share HTX, when you walk in, you're greeted by this big picture of Dolly Parton. She looked almost saintly. Yes, 9 to 5. Oh—that's is a sign. 9 to 5. Districts 9 to 5 with Dolly—it all works. And an innovator herself, in an interview asking about her next chapter of her music career, Dolly Parton said this: "No one can direct the wind, all we can do is adjust our sails." Innovation for the future of the church means listening and seeking new ways the winds of the Spirit are moving toward us and within us and directing our sails for innovation toward, as Bishop Harvey said last night, the precipice of possibility for us as a church.

Bea Garza: There is no better time than now to encourage churches to try an innovative idea. The last word on our list is what? Reinvent? Reinvent—we might have to change the title of our committee, maybe it's about reinventing. No idea is too big and no idea is too small. Be on the lookout for more upcoming innovation gatherings, and ways that you can apply for grant money. God bless you and may God continue to inspire us all.

Bishop Harvey: Thank you. Thank you for that great work. Kip, do we have anything else?

Rev. Gilts: Well, one thing I wanted to point out is we actually have three videos that we have not yet seen. We had one scheduled in your agenda. We had two bonus videos for that opportunity that we might have extra time. We don't. So because we've talked a lot about parking the last few days, so of course the one unfinished business I have is parking stickers. Make sure you get them. Now if you stayed in the hotel you don't need it. You'll get it when you go out. But the videos—the five that we've watched, as well as the Meaningful Moments, Lessons Learned, and Remember Me videos will be on our tac2023 web page, txcumc.org/tac2023. So you'll find all that, you've accessed that a lot in preparation for this, so you'll see that.

I do want to say a quick thank you, but deeply felt to Colly Enochs who pulled this rodeo off. So thank you so much, Colly. You've worked with everyone here. Robin Rodriguez, her partner in crime, and—I mean the Bishop's Executive Assistant. Working side-by-side, Michael and Nikki have done a great job with our worship. You know—yes. I say the worship pieces are kind of like if you imagine this as a mall, they are the big box stores. You know, that's... I don't go the malls anymore, so I don't know what the big box stores are. It used to be Foley's, I don't think that exist anymore. And Sears I don't exist and there was Montgomery Ward for a while. But worship remains, and it remains a big part of this. Thank you, Bishop, for the chance to work alongside you in this role. To Shannon and Troy, and our Communications team for all that they do. And I want to thank Romonica Malone-Wardley for taking this mantle from my shoulders and saying, "Bishop, if Kip can do this, it can't be that hard. Sure. I'll be assistant to the Bishop."

No, it has been an honor to serve and to follow in footsteps of a hero of mine, B. T. Williamson.

Bishop Harvey: I was going say we could not have done this work this week without Kip's careful preparation. You know, going from the world of virtual to in-person in a pretty quick turnaround, he's been amazing, always does it with a sense of humor and keeps us laughing and keeps us joy-filled in our building and I'm going to miss you down the hall because you helped me find where all the snacks and things are. But I know that keeping you at the table—don't tell anyone, but this was in the hallway for about a week and I passed it every day. And I just would look at it and I love animal crackers and Colly told me that they were for the children for daycare and childcare for Annual Conference and I couldn't have any. But every day I longingly look at the little teddy bear of animal crackers and my good friend Kip Gilts broke into it. So if the children were missing a few animal crackers, it's because we ate them.

Rev. Gilts: They had goldfish. They had goldfish. That's enough.

Bishop Harvey: But I am grateful to Kip and will be grateful for his leadership and the district again, there is no one better that can tend to the changes that are happening in these districts as Kip, in addition to these superintendents that will be leading us. I have no doubt the pastors will be cared for, that churches will be cared for, and they are going to do this with grace and the love that they do everything else. And so I'm thankful to Kip, to Steve Woody, to Vincent Harris, to Elizabeth Duffin—did I miss somebody—Elijah Stansel, because without them, I don't know that I would have taken a chance on this proposal, without these people knowing that they would be at their places. So thank you.

Rev. Gilts: Bishop, I know you're going to end on a high note so let me bring us down real quick before that.

I mentioned the parking stickers already and I know you're excited to hear about that, but we also—these table decorations, the centerpieces and everything have been incredible. They did not get here... there was no I Dream of Jeannie who popped them into being. We don't have that much time to take them down. So we could use some help. After the service, if there would be a volunteer from each table that would get the water and the oil—don't get it now because we're going to use it. The water and the oil and take it, there is going to be cart over there. You don't have to do anything besides just put it on the carted and then we need about ten volunteers that will hang out and help with the centerpieces. That's not something that each table needs a volunteer, but about ten of you. If there is 20 of you, Nikki can work with you so please if you're able to do that—I was going to offer all of our new church start folks to do that, because I've been setting up and taking down for a while now. You know how to do this, but they might want some help, too. They might be taking the day off. So thanks.

Bishop Harvey: Just give me a second.

Rev. Gilts: Sure, I've got more. The Astros you'll be happy to know, Bishop, are playing tonight. You've called a Cabinet meeting in the morning so I have to stay in Houston. I just wonder what I'll do. Gee, I wonder what I'll do just thinking about it.

Bishop Harvey: You lose all dignity when you get dressed like this in front of a thousand people.

Fixing of Appointments and Sending Forth

Bishop Harvey: I just wanted to take just a few more minutes of your time, but I'm going to get up here so I can see you. I'm just here to say thank you. Thank you for an amazing Annual Conference. This has truly been holy conferencing. I can feel it. So I want to remind you a little bit about where we've been because I don't know about you, but it feels like we've been here longer than we have.

So remind you about Sunday. And remember Sunday we began with—I hope you agree—it was revival. It was a revival. The Spirit was in this place. It was extraordinary and you brought that spirit with you. So I am just so grateful. The music was amazing. Your participation, your presence was a gift. And this place has been made holy. I don't know who follows us in this place, but there is going to be a little bit of holiness left here for whoever Rotarians or Comic Con or whoever comes next after you. There really has been, not just a sweet spirit, but a powerful Spirit of the Lord has been in this place.

And remember on Monday we began the clergy session. And in that clergy session we heard from Dr. Boggan who really was—she blew it out of the park. I mean she was amazing. There were moments in that clergy session that I will tell you took my breath away. When I got to the place—I think I can do this—when I turned page after page after page of clergy that had withdrawn, it was a moment. And we stopped there—for laity, you need to know. We prayed. We prayed for those pastors. We blessed their ministry. As they went to whatever their "next" is

for their ministry. We prayed for them. We prayed for them. And for me that was a really holy, holy moment. Now the highlight of the day was when we voted for those who would be commissioned and ordained. And those are always high, high, high holy moments. And we celebrated with them with that class.

We moved—some of us moved from the clergy session over to the laity session. We were in this space. We had that panel where we heard from Bishop Bickerton, myself, Dr. Boggan, and Roland Fernandes, and John Esquivel asked some really hard questions. He had no softball questions for us. But I hope we were faithful and answered the questions and we know there are still many questions that need to be answered. We elected two new delegates—two lay delegates to the General Conference. There is more to come. I wish I could tell you when that's coming. You'll find out when I do. Once again, we'll be nimble and flexible is the name of the game.

In the afternoon we came back and celebrated the lives of those who have joined the church triumphant on whose shoulders that we stand. We heard from our guests as they reminded us of how important the connection is. And several of you have mentioned that in the hallways and the lady's bathroom—I learned that's great place to take a picture, believe it or not, we took pictures because that's the only time we had a chance to chat. But it was a moment where we needed to renew our connection to the greater church. And renew what it means to be a United Methodist. So I hope that you were renewed that day. We heard a lot of reports. We heard the first part I of the 9-to-5 report that you just voted on. I hope you felt renewed.

Yesterday we heard from our Leadership Development Team and Connectional Ministries Team. It was another great day of just hearing what's happening in the Annual Conference. I have to tell you that a pension report is not usually my favorite thing on the agenda. It's pretty deep and pretty dense, but I think I'm just thankful for Seann Duffin and the way that he presented it, the grace in which he did it, the great questions that you asked. I hope you felt safe in coming to the microphone and asking your question. And he did a beautiful job. Remember we broke it up into four areas and we adopted all four of those.

We celebrated our retirees with, oh gosh, music that took me back to my youth ministry days. I don't think I've sung "Friends Are Friends" in forever and it still makes me cry.

We voted to support what I believe was groundbreaking, history-making resolution of how we will be with one another. The stillness in the room, the quiet in the room spoke volumes, and it was—the silence was loud, if that makes sense. The silence was loud. You could feel the—I could feel the Spirit moving. I could feel you moving. I could feel you saying, "Yes. This is how I want to be. This is who we need to be with God and with one another."

And if that wasn't enough, the table conversations—kind of another sacred surprise of the Spirit. We'd never done this before. We weren't really sure how that was going to work, but again, the silence, the way you kind of leaned into the center of the table to listen to one another, man, y'all, it was amazing, amazing to watch. Sometimes I wish we could do a rotation where you could sit up there for just a few minutes so that you could see what we see from there. I can't wait to see and read what's in the baskets from your work. It's going to shape the work of the CLT. It's going to shape the future of this Annual Conference. We're going to see what you believe are the

priorities, what do you think we need to be doing. Where do we need to focus? And I think we've got great future together because of the work that you did yesterday.

And if that wants enough, thank you to Michael Vaughn and Nikki for ordering a beautiful, beautiful ordination service. The music—thank you First Church for the amazing music. It was a great, great evening and I'm thankful to the Board of Ordained Ministry also. That's a lot of moving parts. That's a lot of moving parts. So I'm just thankful for the care that Dr. Christians and the way you lead the Board of Ordained Ministry. And if that wasn't enough, when Dr. Christians asked four or five people from the Board to stand at the front during that hymn of invitation, I thought, "They're not going to have anything to do. That's a lot of people." And the people that came to the altar for prayer—we almost didn't have enough Board of Ordained Ministry folks. I turned to Bishop Bickerton, I said, "Well the next one you and I are going to have to go pray for them." They just kept coming. And the freedom that I sensed in the people that came to altar last night, and the spirit in which they came, so thank you to those of you who responded to that. I hope yesterday was an invigorating day.

And then today, budget, nominations, that might just seem like regular old business to you. It's not. It's not. It's holy work. It's holy work and the people that prepare it, do it with a lot of prayer and a lot of commitment. And it is... it's holy work to Robert Besser and his team. It's holy work. They don't take what they are asked to do for granted, and you need to know that. So I'm thankful for that.

The 9-to-5 proposal—I again wasn't sure. I was prepared to do whatever you decided to do. My job is to help you do your best work. And you did your best work today. So thank you for that 9-to-5 proposal. We've got a lot of work to do between now and December, but we'll get it done and we'll let you know what that is around August. So today was a reimagine day. And that 9-to-5 proposal reimagines a new future. The cards that you've got... that you filled out, proposes for us a new future together.

But let me just say that we've got to continue to expand these tables. There's still people who are trying to make their way to our tables. And that's people on the far left, on the far right, in the middle. There are still people... I don't want people to have to elbow their way to the table. I want people to know that this is the place that is reserved for them. That there is always a place at the table. I think that's something really important for us to remember. Us in here might feel like we're okay, but there is a lot of people not here that are not at our tables yet. A lot of places and people that don't know Jesus. They don't know United Methodism from Target. You need to make a place. You need to make a place at the table. I hope in your churches you'll take some of those questions that you struggled with yesterday and you'll model this in your own churches. Ask the same questions. Engage people in those questions.

So I don't know about you, but I'm pretty charged up. I am pretty charged up. I just so appreciate your engagement, and your willingness to say yes, to stay at the table, your spirit that you've brought to this table, it's been powerful. It's been powerful in this place. I never imagined—I knew that the Spirit would be here. I was surprised by the Spirit. And I hope you are, too. I know church people ought never be surprised about the Spirit, but the Spirit surprised. It was a sacred surprise.

So I am thankful to all the people that made this work—that made this work, that when I said I'd like for everybody to sit at table, they all looked at me like, "We have never done that." And I said, "Well, okay, and how many tables can we get in the room and how many chairs?" But nobody ever said no. Nobody ever said no. So I'm just excited to see what God has in store for us for the future. I can't wait to hear us sing a new song, write a new verse to our song.

The appointments will be uploaded on Guidebook and all of that so can you look at those. They are as fixed as they can be at this stage of the game. There's always changes. There will be changes even probably this afternoon.

So I want to try something. Something we probably have never done maybe at Annual Conference, certainly not in my time here.

But there are—there is a small little bowl a letter your table. It looks like a votive holder—not the water, the other one. I think one of the things we need to do before we leave this place is we need a time of anointing. Sometimes that's not real comfortable for some people. But I hope you're comfortable doing that today. So I'm going to invite the new Dean of the cabinet, Dr. Vincent Harris, if you'll go to microphone No. 4. He's going to bless the oil for us, and then what I want you to do, kind of like we've communion a couple of times here at table, One of you start, just pass... pass the anointing to the next person.

Dr. Harris, would you pray over our time?

Vincent Harris, elder, Superintendent of the South District: At the end of the 1984 General Conference, Bishop James Thomas said, "God lead us now to make new history." There is still pain, hurt, and suffering from our journey; but hear these words from the book of James: Are you hurting? Pray. Do you feel great? Sing. Are you sick? Call the church elders together to pray and to anoint you with oil in the name of the master. Believe in prayer will heal you, and Jesus will put on you and on your feet, and if you've sinned, you'll be forgiven, healed inside and out. Make this your common practice. Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you can live together whole and healed. The prayer of a person living right with God is something powerful to be reckoned with.

Let us pray: O God, the giver of health and salvation, we give thanks to you for the gift of oil. As your holy apostles anointed many who were sick and healed them, so pour out your Holy Spirit on us and on this gift that those in faith and repentance receive this anointing, may be made whole through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Bishop Harvey: Amen.

Conference members anointed one another in preparation for departing.

Bishop Harvey: Friends, God is doing amazing things. Amazing things. And I am so excited. We are anointed to lead this work. We're anointed to lead this Annual Conference. We're anointed to sing a new song. And we're anointed to do this new thing. Sometimes we can't perceive it

quite yet, but we know already that God knows what that is. So we're anointed to do this new thing. Because we are an anointed people. We are an anointed people of God, and we are revived, and we are renewed, and reinvigorated people who have reimagined what our future holds, a future that's filled with promise and possibility. We are at the precipice of possibility. Don't forget that.

And we have everything that we need right here, right now. Everything we need is right here, and right now. Everything. And we have everything we need to set a feast. We do need a couple of things though. In a moment I'll say a final prayer and we will have a hymn that we'll sing together. And I'm going to invite whoever has been designated by the CLT to bring those baskets forward during that final hymn as an offering. It is our offering to God for a future that we believe is filled with promise, hope, and possibility, a future that is Spirit-filled, where we're going to encounter the sacred surprise of the Spirit everywhere we go. We need to keep our eyes open and our hearts and our ears open.

I'm going to go back to the prayer that I shared with you on Sunday night about the table, about the feast, because we're about setting this table everywhere we go. So hear these words:

God, you have invited each and every one of us to the great feast that can be our life. You tell us, O God, that it is a feast where joy overshadows our normal worries and pains and where the smallness of our lives is transformed—hear this—is transformed into the largeness of your dream. Thank you, thank you O God, for reminding us that this feast... this feast that we call life is a feast where each of us has a place to sit, to eat, to drink, talk, and even dance, and where our wounds are transformed into gifts. Help us to set our tables for that kind of feast in the Texas Annual Conference, a feast that will change us a little more into who you are—a place where our lives will begin to echo the holy energies of your compassion which our world needs so much right now. Right now.

So I'm going to invite you to stand. If you're comfortable, talk a hand—I was going to try to get us to circle the room, but I don't think we can do that. But somehow create some sort of—I don't know—amoeba. Okay, that's a good one. Some way that we all are connected as we sing this hymn, make our offering to God of what we see for the future, and then you are free to go. You are free to visit, but this is our final moment. Thank you.

Michael Vaughan, laity, Director of Worship: Let's sing together.

Preface to the Texas Annual Conference Rules and Structure

From the very beginning Methodists have believed in both organizing for mission and in the idea of "think and let think." This has translated over into distinct expressions detailing how we live together in the most basic of all Methodist connections, the annual conference. The following rules and structures are thus intended not to restrict or control the free expression of any, but rather to guide us into how we may live out our shared faith and witness within the Texas Annual Conference. They serve as a further delineation of the ideals established in our denominational *Book of Discipline* and are offered in hopes of strengthening our core values as an annual conference and our common mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ so that the world might be transformed to the glory of God.

Our Core Values

In the pursuit of our calling and mission as a conference, we affirm the following values of discipleship:

- Diligent study of scripture
- Fervent prayer
- Radical Hospitality
- Passionate Worship
- Faith Forming Small Groups
- Risk Taking Missions
- Extravagant Generosity
- Connectional Ministry

SECTION 1: GENERAL

- I. The Texas Annual Conference (Conference) establishes Rules by which it operated (Rules) and its Structure for Ministry under authority of paragraph 610 of *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*, 2019 (BOD or Discipline)
- II. The Structure for Ministry and Rules describe Conference Ministries and the procedures by which they operate.
- III. Any conflict between the Structure for Ministry and Rules and *The Book of Discipline* of the United Methodist Church shall be decided in favor of *The Book of Discipline*.

SECTION 2: OFFICERS

- I. The Officers of the Texas Annual Conference shall be the Bishop, Assistant to the Bishop, Secretary, Fiscal Officer, Statistician, and Lay Leader. (*BOD* 603.9a)
- II. The Secretary and the Statistician shall be elected at the last session of each quadrennium to serve during the next quadrennium. (*BOD* 603.7) The minutes of each business session shall be kept on file at Conference headquarters.
- III. A Chancellor(s) shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Conference (BOD 603.8)
- IV. The Treasurer/Director of Administration shall be elected by the Conference, on nomination of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, at the first session of the Conference after the quadrennial session of the General Conference. Upon vacancy, the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall fill the position until the next session of the Texas Annual Conference. (*BOD* 619)

SECTION 3: STRUCTURE FOR MINISTRY IN THE TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- I. Conference Leadership Team
 - A. A Conference Leadership Team will be responsible for implementing decisions approved by the Annual Conference in accordance with Conference Mission, Vision, and Core Beliefs. The Conference Leadership Team creates a culture of accountability within the Conference by conducting an ongoing process of goal setting, strategic planning, and annual reporting to the Annual Conference.
 - B. The Conference Leadership Team will be comprised of:
 - 1. The Bishop (with voice, non-voting)
 - 2. Members (with voice and vote)
 - a. One District Superintendent from each of the Districts
 - b. The District Leadership Team Chairperson or DLT representative from each of the Districts
 - c. Four At-Large Members
 - d. The Conference Lay Leader
 - 3. Ex-Officio Membership (with voice, non-voting)
 - a. The Director of the Center for Leadership Formation
 - b. The Director of the Center for Connectional Resources
 - c. The Conference Director of Communications
 - d. The Assistant to the Bishop
- II. Conference Ministry Centers There will be two (2) Conference Ministry Centers
 - A. The Center for Leadership Formation The purpose of this center is to create an environment of support and accountability that continuously moves lay and clergy leadership of the Annual Conference toward excellence
 - B. The Center for Connectional Resources The purpose of this center is to provide fiscal oversight, property management, and archives and records to undergird the mission and ministry of the Texas Annual Conference.

SECTION 4: NOMINATIONS

I. The Nominations Committee – The Nominations Committee for the Texas Annual Conference of the UMC shall consist of the Assistant to the Bishop, the Dean of the Cabinet, and one representative from each of the nine (9) districts. The District

Representatives shall consist of 3 clergy, 3 lay men and 3 lay women. The Nominations Committee will reflect the diversity of the Texas Annual Conference with regard to ethnicity, age, gender, geography, and church size. The Ex-Officio members with voice and vote shall consist of the Directors of the Centers and the Conference Lay Leader. The chair of the Nominations Committee will be the Assistant to the Bishop.

II. Quadrennium Nominations

- A. At the Annual Conference session one year prior to each new quadrennium, the Assistant to the Bishop will distribute a listing and description of all positions on teams, boards, agencies, committees, commissions and councils which are subject to election by the Annual Conference to all clergy and lay delegates to Annual Conference. The Nominations Committee will list the positions available in the Texas Annual Conference. The Assistant to the Bishop will announce the Nominations process. The delegates are encouraged to take the body of this nominations report to their local churches so they can participate in the nominating process.
- B. Persons interested in being considered for nomination to any TAC positions are encouraged to fill out a biographical profile (Assistant to the Bishop will provide a template on the Conference website) including church, district, conference and spiritual gifts and turn these into the local church pastors and District Superintendents for comments and endorsement. Completed profiles with endorsements should be sent into the office of the Assistant to the Bishop prior to November 15 of the year prior to the new quadrennium. District Superintendents, Center Directors, and the Core Leadership Team and District Leadership Teams may also make nominations.
- C. The Assistant to the Bishop will prepare profiles for the Nominations Committee by January 1. The Nominations Committee will meet prior to January 15. The Nominations Committee will make nominations giving attention to the pool of names submitted. The Nominations Committee will strive to make each Board, Agency, Commission, Committee, and Team as inclusive as possible with regard to ethnicity, age, gender, and church size. The report of the Nominations Committee will be reviewed by the Commission on Religion and Race for inclusivity as specified in the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. The Commission on Religion and Race will report any recommendations back to the Nominations Committee by March 1. All persons nominated by the Nominating Committee will be notified by email or letter and invited to indicate whether they accept or decline the nomination. The Nominations Committee will continue to meet until nominations are finalized. Nominations will be completed by March 15 and will be published in the Pre-Conference Journal. Some nominations may need to be made after the March 15 deadline and these will be presented at Annual Conference. Persons may be nominated for unfilled positions listed in the Pre-Conference Journal.
- D. The aggregate membership of all Ministry Teams, Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees nominated by the Nominating Committee should consist of ½ clergy and ½ laity (this will exclude Board of Ordained Ministry, Administrative Review Committee, and Committee on Investigations).

- E. The Board of Ordained Ministry, Administrative Review Committee and Committee on Investigations will be nominated and elected in accordance with the discipline ¶635, 636, 2703 respectively.
- F. Persons may be nominated from the floor of the Annual Conference. The nominator will indicate which person from the Nominating Committee's report is to be replaced by the nominee. Substitute nominations should maintain or expand the diversity of the Nominations Committee's report. Votes on substitute nominees will be made individually prior to the vote on the full report.
- G. Persons shall not serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on the same Ministry Team, Board, Division, Commission, and Committee except in the case of the persons elected to complete a vacancy occurring during a quadrennium who will be allowed to serve two consecutive full quadrennia.
 - 1. Persons serving in an ex-officio capacity, or as members of the Committee on Nominations, the Administrative Review Committee, and the Committee on Investigation are exempt from this restriction.
 - 2. Exempt from this rule are persons elected to the Committee on Nominations, Administrative Review Committee and Committee on Investigation that by nature meet as needed.
 - 3. Participation on a Task Force that is convened by a Conference Leader or Team will not disqualify an individual from being nominated for or elected to a Conference Ministry Team, Board, Division, Commission, or Committee.
- H. The Chairperson of any Ministry Team, Board, Division, Commission, or Committee shall not serve more than one full quadrennium except in the case of person filling an unexpired term of not over two years.
- I. During the quadrennium, chairpersons of all Ministry Teams, Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees will conduct annual assessments of the leadership for attendance, effectiveness, and evidences of fruitfulness. Based on these assessments, the Center Leaders may request the Conference Leadership Team to recommend remedial action or replacement of leadership.
- J. All Nomination Rules of the Texas Annual Conference are subject to any applicable provisions of the current *Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*.
- K. The Board of Ordained Ministry of the Texas Annual Conference will be subject to Paragraph 635 of the current *Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church* with the exception of the term limit which will be two quadrennia.
- L. Persons elected will begin serving at the close of Annual Conference.
- III. Nominations Between Quadrennia
 - A. Vacancies in elected positions occurring between sessions of Annual Conference will be filled on a temporary basis by a vote of the Conference Leadership Team. Nominations for the Conference Leadership Team to consider for vacancies will be made by the Nominations Committee.
 - B. Vacancies will be permanently filled by the process listed in Section II.
- IV. District Nominations The Districts shall use a process similar to the Conference process subject to the current *Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*.

SECTION 5: PROCEDURES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- I. Pre-Conference Journal
 - A. The Assistant to the Bishop shall be responsible for producing a *Pre-Conference Journal*. Contents of the *Pre-Conference Journal* shall include those materials necessary for the business of the Annual Conference to be conducted. It shall be distributed at least 25 days before the Annual Conference begins.
 - B. Chairpersons are responsible for providing reports and materials to the Assistant to the Bishop on the schedule prescribed by the Assistant to the Bishop.
 - C. Pre-Conference Meetings may be held virtually or in person at least 21 days before the regular session of Annual Conference. All matters that will be voted upon individually at the Annual Conference Session will be presented and discussed at the pre-conference meetings.
- II. Resolutions and Proposals for the regular session of Annual Conference (Resolutions are related to issues. Proposals are related to structures and rules.)
 - A. Resolutions and proposals to be considered by the Annual Conference at its regular session shall be submitted to the office of the Assistant to the Bishop on or before January 31, allowing the appropriate Conference Center to offer any suggested changes to the author of the resolution prior to February 15. If amended, a final draft of a resolution or proposal will subsequently be due in the conference office no later than February 28 in order to be presented to the Conference Leadership Team during their March meeting. After its review, the CLT will submit a written response to accompany the motion, including any recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence, prior to the inclusion of the motion in the *Pre-Conference Journal*. The author of any resolution or proposal may withdraw their motion prior to its consideration by the Annual Conference.
 - B. Resolutions and proposals included in the *Pre-Conference Journal* will be presented in Pre-Conference Delegate Meetings prior to Annual Conference. Any discussion regarding the resolutions/proposals will be conducted in a spirit of Holy Conversation with all sides of the issues being presented and listened to in a spirit of Christian love and respect. Persons making presentations will not be interrogated or cross-examined. Persons present will not participate in applause or partisan or disparaging sounds (boos or hurrahs). No personal attacks will be allowed.
 - C. Resolutions and proposals included in the *Pre-Conference Journal* will be placed on the Agenda of the Annual Conference. When the resolutions/proposals come to the floor of Annual Conference, there may be one predetermined speaker for identified by the maker of the resolution and one predetermined speaker against the resolution/proposal identified by the Conference Leadership Team. Predetermined speakers are allowed a maximum of 5 minutes. Alternating comments shall be no longer than 60 seconds each for and against the resolution/proposal. All comments will be made in the spirit of Holy Conversations as set forth in Section 5: II.B. above. A minute of silent prayer will precede the vote on each resolution/proposal.

- D. Resolutions and proposals not in the *Pre-Conference Journal*, except for courtesy resolutions, may be brought up at Annual Conference provided that:
 - 1. They have been turned in to the Assistant to the Bishop at least 60 days prior to the Annual Conference session and
 - 2. been reviewed by the Conference Leadership Team with a recommendation of concurrence/non-concurrence and/or disposition; and
 - 3. appeared in an Addendum distributed to the delegates so they can be discussed at the Pre-Conference Meetings prior to the Annual Conference
 - 4. Resolutions and Proposals that do not meet the above criteria would require a suspension of rules of 2/3 majority of the delegates in order to be considered.

III. Conference Session Procedures

- A. The Assistant to the Bishop shall prepare an Agenda of all reports and proposals for distribution on the opening day of each Annual Conference.
- B. No report, paper, or proposal shall be considered until three (3) copies have been given to the Secretary.
- C. The Conference Rules may be suspended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the Annual Conference members present and voting. The Rules may be changed by three-fourths (3/4) majority of the Annual Conference members present and voting.
- D. All items that do not require Annual Conference action will be placed on the consent calendar. If the consent calendar is not a part of the *Pre-Conference Journal*, it will be presented on the first day of Annual Conference, and after laying on the table for 24 hours, it will be acted on by motion of the Assistant to the Bishop. Anyone may make a motion that an item be removed from the consent calendar. The item may be placed on the Agenda by a support of 25% of the Annual Conference body present and voting.
- E. Speeches in favor of or in opposition to a motion, will be limited to three (3) minutes each.
- F. A Session of the Texas Annual Conference may be held by remote communication technology by means of a conference telephone or an electronic communications system, including videoconferencing technology or the Internet. Remote communication technology may be used only if the system permits each person participating in the meeting to communicate with all other persons participating in the meeting and if voting is to take place at the meeting, reasonable measures must be implemented to verify that every person voting at the meeting by means of remote communication is sufficiently identified and a record must be kept of any vote or other action taken.

IV. Special Session of Annual Conference

- A. A Special Session of the Annual Conference may be called by the Resident Bishop according to provisions in Paragraph 603.5 of the 2019 Book of Discipline.
- B. The Special Session of the Annual Conference shall be limited only to the matters expressed in the call.

- C. Only petitions and resolutions related to the call will be considered during the Special Session.
- D. Suspension of the rules are not to be considered during a Special Session of the Annual Conference.
- V. Conference Journal
 - A. The Assistant to the Bishop shall be editor of the *Conference Journal*.
 - B. The *Conference Journal* shall include at a minimum:
 - 1. Items required by BOD 606
 - 2. Year-end statement of receipts and expenditures by all Conference bodies
 - 3. List of appointments with and without annuity claim
 - 4. Conference Rules document

SECTION 6: DISTRICTS

- I. Each District will determine an organizational structure that is consistent with the Conference vision and mission, and responsible to specific needs and priorities of the District.
- II. The number of districts will be determined by the Annual Conference.

SECTION 7: CONFERENCE STAFF

- I. Conference staff positions will be determined by the Bishop, the Cabinet, and the Conference Leadership Team.
- II. Compensation of appointed Conference staff positions shall not exceed that of a District Superintendent.
- III. Salaries of District Superintendents may be adjusted annually by the percentage change in the average (mean) base salary of all full-time senior pastors serving in the Texas Annual Conference, providing funds are available.

SECTION 8: FINANCIAL PROCEDURES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- I. Each year, the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (CF&A) shall prepare and recommend a budget for the next calendar year, under appropriate headings, for Conference action.
- II. CF&A shall recommend to the Annual Conference for its action and determination methods or formulae by which all approved budgets shall be apportioned to the churches. All Conference delegates must be informed in writing of the financial consequences of any proposed change in the apportionment method before a vote is taken.
- III. The Treasurer of each church or charge is encouraged to remit to the Conference Fiscal Officer all receipts for Conference connectional and benevolent causes on a monthly basis.
- IV. The Conference Fiscal Officer shall distribute monthly or quarterly a report of budgeted funds available to the credit of agencies in proportion to receipts.
- V. All proposals with financial implications shall be referred to the CF&A before any action is taken by the Annual Conference, including any disbursements from any Reserve Funds held on behalf of the Annual Conference.

- VI. The Conference shall establish a year-end report date no earlier than January 10 and no later than January 17.
- VII. At the end of each fiscal year, all unspent budgeted funds remaining in the Annual Conference budget shall be deposited in the Operating Reserve Fund except the reserves for Pensions and Health Benefits and other designated reserves, which shall be reserved and made available for future expenditures for these designated purposes.
- VIII. Annually, the CF&A shall report for Conference approval a list of special days without offering and a list of special days with offering, including Conference Advance Specials. No appeal shall be made to churches of the Texas Annual Conference without CF&A approval except as provided in *The Book of Discipline*.
- IX. At the request of anyone receiving a salary from the Conference, the Conference Fiscal Officer is authorized to withhold a designated portion of salary annuities, allowances, and/or other benefits, pursuant to Internal Revenue Service regulations.
- X. The CF&A of the Texas Annual Conference, consistent with *BOD* 613.8, shall have limited authority to modify a budget approved by the Annual Conference between its sessions.

SECTION 9: PLAN OF EQUALIZATION - The Plan of Equalization shall follow BOD 602.4. All lay members to annual conference will be elected either by their charge (for those representing their church) or by the District Leadership Team (for those serving as at-large delegates). At large delegates may also be elected by the District Conference upon nomination by the District Leadership Team. At large delegates will reflect the proportional strength and diversity of churches in the district. The Conference Leadership Team will be responsible for drafting a procedure that can be followed in all districts of the Texas Annual Conference.

SECTION 10: ADDITIONAL PROCEDURES

- I. Clergy and Laity Candidate Profile Booklet Eligible clergy members and eligible laity willing to be considered for election as a delegate to General or Jurisdictional Conferences are requested to complete a candidate profile sheet for inclusion in a candidate profile booklet which shall be mailed with the *Pre-Conference Journal*. Eligible persons willing to be considered must agree to attend delegation meetings, to prepare themselves by studying all assigned materials, and to make the necessary preparations to be effective delegates. If any eligible person who is not included in the booklet receives a vote on any ballot, then the individual will be assigned a number to be included in the remainder of the balloting process.
- II. Continuous Accountability: Each year during Annual Conference meetings, the CLT will make progress reports detailing steps taken to implement this proposal and steps taken to continue cultivating growing, vibrant, missional congregations; forming transforming lay and clergy leaders; and investing in the young. The CLT will also be responsible for scheduling an external "Ministry Audit" every two years. During this "Ministry Audit," an outside professional may be engaged to review Conference progress toward implementing this proposal and

accomplishing its strategic foci; help the CLT articulate measurable outcomes and set clear benchmarks; and then make a full report to the CLT and to the Annual Conference. As implementation continues, if questions or concerns arise, all Conference delegates should feel free to contact District Superintendents, Center Directors, or the Assistant to the Bishop.

III. Vacation Policy for Clergy

This Vacation Policy for Clergy is to standardize clergy vacations across the Conference. The policy is for clergy appointed within the bounds of the Texas Conference.

NOTE: Years of service (under appointment) refer to years of service in an Annual Conference(s) of The United Methodist Church, not years of service in the local church to which the clergy is appointed.

For every week's vacation, a paid Sunday off is included.

Time used for Continuing Education, Spiritual formation and Course of Study as defined by the *Book of Discipline* of The United Methodist Church and according to the rules set by the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, shall **not be** considered as vacation time or used in lieu of vacation time. Vacation time is calculated on a conference year basis (7/1- 6/30). Vacation time not used in one year cannot be carried into the next year. There will be no pay in lieu of unused vacation time.

Every year there seems to be scripture that speaks profoundly into the moment. This year it has been Genesis 15:1-6. It is the very first time in scripture when Abram (later to be renamed Abraham) speaks. He has been around for several chapters, picking up and going to a land the Lord would show him, building an altar when God appeared to him beyond the familiar boundaries of home, and stepping off the dimensions of a new home. From Genesis 12:1 to Genesis 15:2 a pattern was established where God spoke and Abram acted, but then in Genesis 15:2, Abram spoke. At first it was a mild protest, "I continue childless," but then it grew in its boldness. The very next verse, Abram said, "YOU have given me no offspring!" Frustration, anger, disappointment all proceed from the patriarch's mouth.

Genesis 15:1-6 seems to me to depict a Bridge of Belief that spans the Land of Problems and the Land of Promise. The land of pain has obstacles and impossibilities. The Land of Promise is filled with divine assurances. Between the two stands the bridge of belief where "Abram believed the Lord and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness."

I don't have be the most creative person to recognize the connection between Abram's world in Genesis 15 and our world in 2023. The Land of Problems is easy to see: a coronavirus that continues to cause alarm, racism that continues to be persistently present, and disaffiliation that has generated many false accusations and deep hurt.

Yet, God's promises do not yield any ground, "Look toward the heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them. So shall your descendants be." I used to think God was presenting a math problem to Abram, suggesting that he calculate the number of stars. I researched this once and discovered that there about 9,110 naked eye stars (stars you can see in your backyard if you live in the middle of nowhere with an arid climate and no ambient light). Astronomers estimate between 70 sextillion and 300 sextillion stars in the universe. I can't even fathom that, but am entertained that people who study this have a high range that is more than 4 times the low range! However, I am convinced that God was not challenging Abram to count stars that seem to move. I now have this image of the Lord standing out in the backyard with Abram as he surveys the sky, puts his divine arm around the patriarch and says, "If I can do all of that, I'm quite capable of addressing your problems."

I had dinner with a retired pastor from the East Coast about a month ago. He is now an amazing coach and was sharing with me that in one of his clergy groups that he coaches, a group of high capacity leaders from all around the world, he noted that none of the churches were growing. He asked me, "Where is God moving in this world?"

I felt God's arm drape around my shoulders and whisper, "Look toward the heaven and count the stars..."

I told my new friend, that I'm sure God is moving in places beyond the church, but I am also sure that God will not abandon the church as a principal conduit of conveying grace upon a world that needs that grace as much, if not more, than ever.

It has been a busy year as I reflect on all that has occurred since last we gathered at the Hilton Americas in our Together Again Conference last year. The summer was filled with Future Discernment Task Force meetings. The fall had so many painful conversations that quickly degenerated into us/them conversations. The winter had us gathering in a Special Session of Annual Conference, saying "good-bye" to one bishop, saying "hello" to our new bishop with "At the Table" sessions and Celebration worship services. And now it's spring – a season for new growth and revived souls. I can already see it. I can already feel it. And as I do, I sense the arm of the Lord draped around as God whispers, "Look toward the heaven and count the stars..."

Below are reports from teams that see clearly the land of promise even while walking and working in a land of problems. These teams are made up of people who believe the Lord and it is reckoned to them as righteousness. I am grateful to be partner with each and every one of them.

Quadrennial Nominations:

2024 will be the start of a new quadrennium. We will be seeking new members for our Conference teams, boards, agencies, committees, commissions and councils. Included in this report are the descriptions of each Conference Team that has elected members. The Timeline for developing the Quadrennial Nominations Report is as follows:

- TAC 2023 a list of Ministry Teams is distributed to our lay and clergy delegates who are encouraged to take it back to their congregations encouraging participation.
- Interested persons submit a biographical profile by November 15, 2023, that includes interest and preference to serve on a particular team or teams.
- District Superintendents, Conference Leadership Team members, Center Directors and District Leadership Team members are also encouraged to make nominations.
- The Assistant to the Bishop prepares all profiles and nominations for the Conference Committee on Nominations by January 1, 2024, which will meet before January 15, 2024, to make nominations from the pool of names submitted.
- The Committee on Nominations will submit the preliminary report of the committee to the Church & Society Team to review with regards to guidelines regarding diversity from the Commission on Race and Religion. The Church and Society Team will make its recommendation by March 1.
- The final report of the Committee on Nominations will be complete by March 15 and printed in the 2024 Pre-Conference Journal. Any necessary additions to the final report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented at the 2024 Session of the Texas Annual Conference.

In order to facilitate collaboration between Districts and simplify and streamline communications, the Core Leadership Team (CLT) will be re-structured and re-named in this proposal. It will be re-named the "Conference Leadership Team," to mirror the language used for the District Leadership Teams (DLTs). Instead of Center Directors, one District Superintendent, and District representatives (the current model), the new CLT will include:

Composition:

- Bishop (chair, with voice, non-voting)
- All 9 District Superintendents (with voice and vote)
- All 9 District Leadership Team Chairpersons- the District Superintendents will necessarily need to collaborate in their selection of DLT Chairpersons in order to maintain our commitment to lay and clergy representation and all aspects of diversity in the TAC (with voice and vote)
- 4 at-large positions to ensure laity, young lay and clergy leaders, and TAC ethnicities are well represented (with voice and vote)
- Conference Lay Leader (with voice and vote)
- Conference Communications Director (with voice, non-voting)
- Center Directors (2) (with voice, non-voting)
- Assistant to the Bishop (with voice, non-voting)

The Bishop will preside. The Assistant to the Bishop will help organize and direct the work of the CLT. To reorient Conference work from generating programs to facilitating, resourcing, and empowering District and local church ministries to implement contextually appropriate missions and ministries in their geographic areas, the CLT as a whole will focus on collaboration, accountability and innovation, and organize itself into sub-teams to focus in those three areas and on other areas, as needed.

Collaboration Sub-Team

The CLT Collaboration Sub-Team will seek to facilitate collaboration throughout the connection by focusing on how local churches, Districts, and Conference centers and ministries can cooperate in partnership with one another by sharing best practices and creating channels through which these practices can be disseminated, and by creating cross- connection task forces, as needed, through which people can work together toward common goals

Accountability Sub-Team

The CLT Accountability Sub-Team will work to assure that this strategic proposal is implemented and all strategic foci are accomplished. In covenant with one another, this Sub-Team will seek to hold themselves and their CLT colleagues accountable to accomplish the work the Conference has entrusted to them.

The Accountability Sub-Team will be responsible for scheduling an external "Ministry Audit" every two years. During this "Ministry Audit," an outside professional will be engaged to review Conference progress toward implementing this proposal and accomplishing its strategic foci, help the CLT articulate measurable outcomes and set clear benchmarks, and then make a full report to the CLT and to the Annual Conference.

The Accountability Sub-Team will also maintain regular contact with District Leadership Teams (DLTs). The CLT will offer guidance and direction regarding the structure, scope and functioning of each DLT, and will ensure that DLTs across the

conference function consistently and with integrity, while allowing for contextualization.

Innovation Sub-Team

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As part of the 2020 TAC Strategic Mapping Team proposal, funds were allocated to the Conference Leadership Team to support innovative ministries designed to make disciples of Jesus Christ. A "task force" within the Conference Leadership Team was created to design a process by which districts would access these new Conference Funds.

In 2022, the Innovation Task Force presented two opportunities for local churches to participate in an "Innovation Lab" — a day conference with innovation presenters and exercises and introduction of the application process. These labs were well attended and surveys support that those in attendance found the information and exercise valuable.

The Innovation Task Force held 2 Innovation Labs (in Kilgore and Houston) with a total of 75 church leaders representing all districts in attendance. We had two grant cycles (spring and fall). In total, 17 grants were awarded funds totaling \$123,522.24.

In 2023, we will follow-up with all of the 2022 grant recipients as the grant application clearly defined that a report on how funds were spent was required. We will also reconvene the task force and anticipate implementing suggestions from our previous attendees to reach a greater number of churches and to elevate our communications.

o Structure:

- To fulfill its missional mandate, the CLT will convene after Annual Conference to begin orientation and training and begin meeting together quarterly. In order to maintain momentum and communication while saving both travel time and travel costs, the CLT may also meet monthly via video conference.
- In order to be both efficient and effective, the CLT may divide into Sub-Teams or task forces in addition to the Sub-Teams listed above. All Sub-Teams and/or task forces would meet, as needed. For example, the CLT may choose to create one additional Sub-Team focused on recommending and approving Specialists, to work with the Associate Director of Church Leadership and the Center for Leadership Formation's Church Leadership Team; and a task force might be created to train District Leadership Teams.
- The large composition of the CLT creates an opportunity for any and all Sub-Teams and/or task forces to be well staffed, according to the gifts and graces of the team.

Conference Lay Leader's Report

Sisters and Brothers,

I believe that is where the Texas Annual Conference is today. We have the opportunity, in the words of Bishop Bickerton, President of the Council of Bishops, to Reclaim, Revive and Renew.

Let us reclaim who we have always been; a church with an evangelical mission to "make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." Let us focus on what it means to BE the Church and less on WHERE we go to Church. Let us Be the Church to a hurting world that is in need to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ. And in Jesus Christ his only Son, our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, Born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontus Pilate, was crucified, dead and buried."

We have not pruned back whatsoever our belief that:

"The third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead."

We steadfastly:

"Believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting. Amen."

Yes, brothers and sisters, our Conference may have been pruned back as measured by the number of churches; however, let there be no doubt, whatsoever, that we have not pruned back our beliefs as contained in the Apostles Creed or the Articles of Religion as contained in the Book of Discipline. Conference Leadership Team

It has been a year of transition for the CLT. Like many churches, we were just emerging out of the pandemic and a season of restructuring, only to find ourselves dealing with matters of disaffiliation. The last half of 2022 was spent being prepared for a called session of the Annual Conference and the first half of 2023 has been spent adjusting to a whole new landscape. To put it bluntly, the Conference Leadership Team has experienced the paralyzing impact of distractions. And yet, we have hope and we have purpose. We do have a Discipling Document that guides us into a decentralized, value driven, nimble ministry as a Texas Annual Conference. We will continue to focus on innovation, foster collaboration, and promote accountability.

- In 2023, we are anticipating opening up new grants for innovation in the local setting.

Regarding Collaboration:

After the Annual Conference in May of 2022, the Collaboration Team did not meet, as there were no new initiatives to undertake. As this was a year of transition, time was devoted to monitoring the objectives from last year: continued review of the Discipling Strategic Plan, review of Ministry Specialists and addition of new Ministry Specialists as they were approved. We anticipate holding a meeting after this year's Annual Conference (2023) to discuss future objectives and directives for this team. We look forward with great anticipation to what the

future holds for our Conference, and the role this team will play in bringing these objectives to fruition!

Regarding Accountability:

One year ago, the Accountability Sub-Team reported that a lot had changed since our last in person gathering as an Annual Conference in 2019. We re-stated our task to keep us faithful to the direction and vision of the Texas Annual Conference. We reported the good news that the implementation of the Strategic Mapping Plan and Discipling Document was completed ahead of schedule. We were excited to report that we built new things like the Innovation Lab. We talked about working to collaborate with each other more. The end of Annual Conference we were excited about what was to come. But we did not get to any of that. Instead the summer and fall was spent in discernment and disaffiliation conversations. When CLT met in the Fall we were not doing the work that we thought we were going to do. Instead of beginning an internal audit in January 2023, we were meeting with our new Bishop to strategize about how to minister in this time. But God has been faithfully at work in our midst, even when we didn't know it. We have begun the work of internally asking what is working and what hasn't even when we didn't label it as auditing. We've been asking, not just ourselves, but others, what do we need more of and what do we need less of. Organically we began to live into a more collaborative process that had been outlined but not yet lived. We know that God is not finished with the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. We know that we are a work in progress and God's grace and love leads us through this time in the wilderness. But God is faithful and we will keep on pressing on.

We will continue to work with District Leadership Teams encouraging contextual ministry and connecting ministry specialists in areas of need: whether that is a coach for clergy, a youth ministry specialist, a consultant for men's ministry, or a host of other opportunities. We will continue to host Innovation Labs that prove to be catalytic in so many settings ignite imaginations for fresh ministry in growing mission fields.

Church & Society Team

Rev. Kate Flint, Chair

In its second year, the Church and Society Team of the Texas Annual Conference has continued to develop action steps in the areas of justice and mercy. Many concerns are held dear by the members of the team but in order to make progress in any of them, the team has identified five main areas where we will focus our energy at this time: Environmental Stewardship, Early Childhood Development, Voting Access, Intercultural Dialogues, and the Status and Role of Women. Each of these areas has a dedicated team member leading and is supported by the work of the team as a whole to develop short- and long-term goals for each area. We are developing a Church and Society page that will connect your congregation with United Methodist Church and Society initiatives and offer specific resources for each of our focus areas.

Environmental Stewardship

Responding to our God-given task of Creation care, team members have begun collecting resources that will help congregations build more sustainable habits and systems. We are creating content which will be distributed through the TAC website and periodical publications so that congregations have resources for starting Green Teams and educating members on more ecologically friendly choices. Once a foundation is established, we will encourage United Methodists to engage with environmental issues more broadly, including through public policy.

Intercultural Dialogues

We recognize that paradigm-shifting encounters are better facilitated through relationship than lectures. To create intentional space for these relationships, we aim to build partnerships between congregations of different cultures. Each partnership will be given a curriculum for structured dinner conversations where members can meet around a table and share a brave space of learning and vulnerability with the goal of greater understanding and healing. Beyond these conversations, we look for ways that congregations may serve their communities side-by-side, working together as the Body of Christ.

Status and Role of Women

Much of our work in this area is related to measurements of progress for gender equality in appointments, voice, and representation. Following the tremendous denominational shift, this team is gathering updated information about where we see female clergy appointed in our Conference.

We support the identification of liaisons between clergy and lay leadership in churches where gender is a concern.

Early Childhood Development

Jill Daniel, leading the We Love All God's Children initiative, has continued to support and celebrate UM Children's Centers opening around our Conference to serve local communities. In addition to resourcing, updating and promoting these day schools, WLAGC is partnering with the Barbara Bush Parent Center to distribute books in the Houston area and expanding further north. The Conference will also provide training workshops for teachers, childcare staff, church volunteers and parents, connecting developmentally appropriate practices for Early Childhood with our Wesleyan theological values. We continue to match churches across the Connection that can share children's ministry resources, from swapping VBS supplies to co-hosting community events.

Election Access

We believe that it is crucial to the health of our communities that all eligible voters have equal access to opportunities to vote. Representing the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church on the board of Texas Impact, Scott Atnip is working to connect congregations to ways to help. We encourage our churches to hold voter registration events and prepare members to participate in election staffing by offering training or sending members to local trainings.

Texas Impact also provides information and action steps to empower Texans of faith to engage with legislation that reflects our values of justice and mercy.

In addition to these main areas of focus, the Church and Society Team has brought attention to community resources for families of children with special needs, consulted with Conference leadership to support holy conferencing in our gatherings, and collaborated with our TAC Missions Committee to seek out ways to support vulnerable populations locally and globally.

Disaster Readiness and Response

Rev. Godfrey Hubert

Texas Annual Conference Disaster Response continued to respond to past disasters, and in preparation for what may come. We could not have accomplished it without our collaborative partners, including Hope Disaster Recovery, The Restoration Team, Southwest Houston United Responds, and 4-B.

- Home Repair Program: Repaired 232 homes in 13 counties with \$1,783,600 in funding.
 - Additionally, we rolled out the Help at Long Last program, funded by UMCOR in the amount of \$350,000 to repair 35 Hurricane Harvey damaged homes during the first half of 2023. Finally, the Safe and Healthy Homes campaign totaling \$50,000 got under way to make "honey-do" repairs to 50 homes of the elderly and disabled.
- Donations/Hunger Relief Program: We received and distributed basic needs, including food, appliances, cleaning products, sanitation products, personal care kits, etc. valued at over \$750.000 to 75 organizations and congregations in 12 counties, and 3 parishes.
- **Covid Relief:** Assisted 63 families with rental assistance (to avoid eviction), utility assistance, and food assistance. Additionally, we concluded an 18-month-long campaign to make the vaccine available to over 20,000 individuals living in low-income housing projects.
- Disaster Readiness Program (Texas Congregational Disaster Readiness.org): Trained over 500 participants for 770 hours on 11 facets of disaster response. Additionally, UMCOR provided Early Response Training (ERT) to 18 volunteers.

Congregations are encouraged to participate in two ways.

- 1) Provide skilled volunteers to help make home repairs.
- 2) Schedule disaster readiness training so the congregation will be ready to respond effectively after a disaster.

Conference Advance

Transformation and sustainability are becoming more of a reality due to the partnership and relationships between the TAC Board of Ordained Ministry and the Methodist Church in Laos. BOM members have led in the education, resourcing, and credentialing of those who have responded to God's call as ordained and licensed pastors. The Missions Team has collaborated with BOM to further educate and extend opportunities through the TAC to join God in the work that he began and that we have the privilege of participating in.

Through the support of the Texas Annual Conference, our partners in Laos have identified as our Conference Advance Special the priorities as WELD (Water, Education, and Leadership Development). Safe water is becoming more accessible. Support is needed for the children to become educated and reverse generational poverty. The goal of the LMI Laos Mission Initiative is to scholarship 20 students for a year; the cost is \$550.00.

Our Laotian partners thirst for education and empowerment and, as a result, continue to grow in their faith and financial strength. The Seed Project is a micro-loan program for women and their families to start small family businesses or support their existing livelihood and farming jobs. Equally as helpful is the CHAD program, Combined Health Agencies Drive to aid with sanitation projects and raising farm animals.

As God advances the people in Laos and beyond in discipleship, we have the privilege and opportunity to make a difference for the Kingdom of God through our giving to the Advance of the TAC.

We Love All God's Children

In the past year, We Love All God's Children has continued to strive to fulfill its mission to assist churches of the Texas Annual Conference in engaging with their communities to develop, expand, and enhance discipleship, early childhood literacy and positive health outcomes for all young children in a local church's mission field. Through various training events,



gatherings of local church leaders, the generosity of Moody's Permanent Endowment Foundation and the furthering of partnerships with such entities as Texas Workforce Solutions, University of Texas' Children's Learning Institute, Barbara Bush Literacy Foundation, Neuhaus Education, Collaborative for Children and Lakeshore Learning, We Love All God's Children – by the power of the Holy Spirit - has assisted in discerning and devising successful strategies to equip congregations to change the trajectory of the lives of underserved and unchurched children and families throughout the Texas Annual Conference.

Since we gathered last May, We Love All God's Children has...

- Opened 4 new United Methodist Children's Centers where the trajectory of the lives of underserved and unchurched children are being changed through age-appropriate discipleship, excellent early childhood education and literacy programs, and provided health resources and therapies to both children and their families.
- Worked with our 13 United Methodist Children's Centers as they strive to reach their goal of becoming Texas Rising Star 4-star centers, the highest accreditation offered by the state of Texas for licensed childcare centers. Congratulations to Bear Creek United Methodist Church Day School for leading the way as our first Rising Star 4-star center.
- Remained on target to open new or enhanced existing early childhood or after school centers at Westbury United Methodist Church, Ebenezer United Methodist Church, Fairwood United Methodist Church, and Huntsville First United Methodist Church.
- Trained new and current directors as well as other weekday staff in both our United Methodist Children's Centers and other weekday schools throughout the Texas Annual Conference.
- Coordinated connectional Vacation Bible Schools with upwards of \$20,000 worth of curriculum and decorations shared by larger congregations with smaller congregations, thus allowing more of our congregations to engage their community with the Good News of Christ through Vacation Bible School.
- Consulted with 26 local congregations regarding revitalization or the start-up of ministries to children and families.
- Partnered with the Barbara Bush Literacy Foundation to distribute more than 600 home libraries containing 12 age-appropriate books to underserved children in both our United Methodist Children's Centers and day schools.

- In partnership with Ebenezer UMC and Houston Independent School District, engaged school-age children with our 2023 Spring Break Camp. This camp gave the children of working parents a safe, healthy environment with daily breakfast and lunch as well as Vacation Bible School each morning followed by sports camp in the afternoon.
- Strengthened or began building relationships with strategic partners including those
 with the Barbara Bush Literacy Foundation, Collaborative for Children, University of
 Texas' Children's Learning Institute, Children's Museum of Houston, University of
 Houston, Texas Southern University, Scholastic, Discount School Supply, Lakeshore
 Learning and others.
- Implemented a board-led model for the discernment of various children's ministry opportunities, new United Methodist Children's Centers, and financial dealings of We Love All God's Children.

In the upcoming year, We Love All God's Children will...

- Continue to build a network of United Methodist Children's Centers throughout the Texas Annual Conference to provide a strong foundation in faith, excellent early education, health and wellness habits, parental engagement, and pathways for unchurched families to become actively involved with the local church.
- Bring additional licensed after-school centers into the ministry of United Methodist Children's Centers in order to equip local churches to answer God's call to serve a more diverse age group with unique student and family needs.
- Plant summer literacy day camps which will provide a means of preventing the summer slide in reading proficiency. Day camps will have a strong Christian ethos and will provide pathways for families to become part of local church congregations.
- Offer two Conference-wide trainings for those who work with children in Fall, 2023 featuring experts in the field of children's ministry and education. As a follow-up to the trainings, District in-person gatherings will be held to strengthen the Texas Annual Conference's commitment to love all God's children.
- Strengthen the We Love All God's Children board through trainings, feedback from local churches, and through the assignment of board members to ministries matching their individual gifts and interests.

CENTER FOR LEADERSHIP FORMATION

Center for Leadership Formation

The purpose of our center is: "to recruit, develop, and support clergy leaders, and to equip and empower the lay and clergy leaders of the Texas Annual Conference". 2022 was a year of transition in our newly created (in 2021) center. As our churches and clergy spent time in discernment, momentum forward with our purpose was difficult to maintain. We experience staff transition in our center, and begin 2023 more lean in staff, but fully committed to living fully into our purpose.

We begin 2023 excited to move forward into a future with hope for the Texas Annual Conference – our clergy and our churches. Below you will find the reports on our center. We invite you to join us in seeing the possibilities for what God can do in the years to come. Don't hesitate to reach out to our team to find out more and see how we can best serve you.

Clergy Leadership Team

In the second year of our convening, the Clergy Leadership Team continued to focus on its goal to design, implement, and evaluate programs and systems to be most effective in recruiting, developing, and supporting the clergy of the TAC so that clergy leaders experience and represent Jesus Christ and function as effective and accountable leaders in the TAC.

However, this year was unique. Knowing many of our clergy where in the process of disaffiliation, or processing the impact of disaffiliation, we sought to emphasize our support of the clergy in emailing targeted ways to promote mental and wholistic health. Emails spearheaded by our support sub-committee. One of which encouraged therapy and reminded clergy of the benefits they have through the conference.

Additionally, we hosted several events and programs:

U-35 for young adults at Annual Conference

- Conference Pastoral Leadership Program
- Partnering pastors with coaches at specified intersections of ministry
- The Gathering
- And many more

As we continue to recover from the impact of the special session in December, the Clergy Leadership Team will eagerly purpose its purpose in recruiting, developing, and supporting the many beautiful, gifted, and diverse clergy of the Texas Annual Conference for years to come.

Board of Ordained Ministry

I am honored to serve as the BOM Chair and grateful to be serving along with the members of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry (BOM), the nine District Committees on Ministry; and in coordination with the Conference Center for Leadership Formation and its staff, and with our Bishop and Cabinet. My admiration for the Conference and District staff continues to increase and it is a joy to serve with them.

The BOM's work is to be guided by our vision and mission:

Vision: Fruitful ministerial leadership in every charge of the Texas Annual Conference

Mission: The Texas Annual Conference BOM recruits, discerns, and guides individuals who feel called to ministerial leadership and credentials fruitful leaders.

The BOM coordinates the enlistment, recruitment, candidacy, and mentoring for the candidates for minister; and is responsible to ensure that the candidate's theological education is complete, the candidates are examined, and recommended to the clergy leadership on behalf of the Texas Annual Conference. The laity and clergy who comprise the BOM hold this as a privilege and high responsibility.

With this privilege and high responsibility, comes hearts that are dedicated to serve relationships that are born out of a common love for God and for one another. The BOM is also concerned for the well-being of the clergy of the TAC and plans activities to help support and provide encouragement. As such, with the events of this past year, with hearts broken and relationships fractured, the BOM worked with the Cabinet and Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey to provide the Reconnect Clergy Gathering held in February this year. The timing and space created for our fellow clergy to come together to be encouraged and provided hope for their future and the future of the UMC.

With fewer candidates coming for interviews, the BOM was able to modify the interviewing process so that each member of the BOM would have an opportunity to meet and interview each candidate. This proved to be worthwhile for both the candidates and the BOM.

In addition to the change in the interviewing process for the candidates, the Candidacy Leadership Team within the BOM is preparing a group mentoring plan that will better serve the candidates and those who serve as mentors.

In February, the BOM interviewed seven candidates to be provisional members of TAC. Of those, four were approved to come before the full clergy session at Annual Conference. The four candidates for provisional membership are:

- David Lee Elder
- William Murphree Elder
- Ellen Elizabeth Thornburg Elder
- Kyle Austin Tremblay Elder

At the time of this writing, the BOM has not interviewed the candidates for full membership. These interviews are scheduled for April 11.

In August of 2022, representatives of the BOM traveled to Laos to further the work of the Laos Mission Initiative. It is inspiring to hear how people have come to faith in Jesus Christ and to see churches continuing to grow in the midst of an environment that is predominantly animist and Buddhist, and not receptive to the Christian faith. During our visit, two individuals, one female and one male, were ordained as Local Pastors in Mission. Six other individuals were commissioned as Local Pastors in Mission. The goal of the TAC BOM is to: help the Laotian pastors and their congregations grow to the level that it becomes self-sustaining, that there is a sufficient number of pastors to create their own Provisional Annual Conference, and that they become more fully equipped to lead with less reliance on the TAC BOM.

Transitional Intentional Interim Ministry

Transitional Intentional Interim Ministry Specialist (TIIMS) is committed to equipping congregations to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, especially during transitional times of ministry. Opportunities are provided for continued learning, as well as training seminars for those wishing to be certified interims. The TIIMS are experienced clergy who have received advanced training in ways to process critical needs. Some of the TIIMS in the Texas Annual Conference have also received Approval Status from GBHEM, acknowledging their experience in working with churches in transition. In 2022, there were 21 transitional intentional interim ministry specialist appointments to serve in churches located within 8 of the nine districts.

The goals for this year are to continue providing highly effective interims for appointments with various transitional needs in this conference and beyond. Interims are placed for a variety of situations which may include churches experiencing conflict, anxiousness, or grief. There may be times in which an interim pastor is placed in a church when their pastor is taking a sabbatical, maternity, paternity, or medical leave. For these transitional situations and others, interims provide an intentional focus on the specific needs of that congregation.

TIIMS training is an important element of interim ministry. Over the last 14+ years, over 97 individuals have taken the Transitional Intentional Interim Ministry (TIIMS) training in the Texas Annual Conference. This training offers expertise in systems, conflict, grief, and other important skills needed in transitional needs. Rev. Bonnie Osteen is a current Lead Trainer with the national team of trainers for United Methodists Interims - TIIMSA. Trainings are offered yearly, and the information can be found on the TIIMS website - www.tiims.org. Those interested in interim ministry should speak to their District Superintendent, who is key to identifying pastors who have the skills to serve in the fast pace of transitional intentional interim ministry. The training also may be taken by a pastor wanting to learn more about the topics taught in the seminar for their own study of advanced skills. The training seminar has been offered by Zoom and at Perkins School of Theology, SMU, as well as other locations across the country.

One of the focuses for the use of Transitional Intentional Interims is clergy sabbatical. Pastors are encouraged to speak to their district superintendents to discuss an appropriate time to take a sabbatical. This 'stepping away' allows for a time of reflection, learning, and renewal. Not only is this transformation process life-giving to pastors, but it also serves well for congregations who experience a time of looking at their identity, direction, leadership, and connection, while their pastor is away. Churches have the opportunity to grow in their faith journey as they serve in ministry with an Intentional Interim, and specifically address transitional needs. When requested, a certified interim may be provided to the congregation.

The Board of Directors for Transitional Interim Ministry Specialists Association (TIIMSA) continues to share information from conference to conference to discover ways to be the most

effective in interim ministry and to be a resource to conferences who are introducing interim ministry. This group consists of 14 members of trained and experienced TIIMS from all jurisdictions in the United States. Rev. Bonnie Osteen, the Coordinator of Interim Ministry for Texas Annual Conference, serves on the National TIIMSA Board of Directors, and is currently serving as the Treasurer of the TIIMSA Board of Directors. The 16th Annual Gathering for United Methodist Intentional Interims was held by Zoom Conference in April 2022. The focus was 'How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You Are Going, Leading in a Liminal Season' with Susan Beaumont as the keynote speaker. In April 2023, the TIIMSA Gathering by Zoom, focuses on 'Embracing the New Normal' with Rev. Rebekah Simon-Peter.

Ministry Specialist Initiative

Rev. Bonnie Osteen and Rev. Julius Wardley

The church leadership team met in 2020 and 2021 to create the Ministry Specialist Initiative (MSI). This initiative was created to provide tools for clergy and churches to better serve their communities and to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.

Once it was created and operational, the committee was available to assist Rev. Robert Besser for implementation. There have been several clergy and congregations who have used this initiative to strengthen their ministries. We are grateful as more faith communities lean into this resource.

Ministry Specialists in the Texas Annual Conference are devoted to helping congregations with the next steps of their journey. The new Ministry Specialist Initiative (MSI) reflects a commitment of empowering churches with experts and the tools needed for success.

With the MSI, the local church will assess their needs for improvement. Then, with the help of the District Superintendent and the Coordinator of MSI, Rev. Bonnie Osteen, a specialist will be matched to assist them in the next steps. This may include phone conversations, virtual discussions, in-person dialogue with leadership, or church wide gathering.

There are 62 categories, each match one of the Conference values, practices, or areas of focus and over 135 qualified specialists, both laity and clergy. The cost of the first consultation, or "engagement," with the Ministry Specialist is covered by the Conference. The remaining expenses will vary depending on the congregation's needs and the expert involved, each project will be different.

The MSI is a vast resource for churches, providing expertise to take them to a whole new level and help them better serve God's kingdom.

Board of Education & Campus Ministry (BHECM)

It is an honor for me to serve as chair of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry at this significant time for our campus ministries. Racial & Ethnic Ministries

Bishop, Members of the Cabinet, Delegates of Texas Annual Conference, sisters and brothers in Christ, the peace and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

We have had to live through one of the most challenging historical moments for the United Methodist Church, not only because of the churches that disaffiliated, but also because of the challenge of seeking new opportunities to multiply and make ourselves visible where we do not currently have a presence of the United Methodist Church.

And in the midst of this process that we are experiencing, we have ethnic and racial Methodist communities that continue to worship the Lord and that need our help to multiply and grow in their mission fields through Bible studies, prayer groups, and community outreach training workshops. The Racial and Ethnic Ministries must be the answer to this need for attention and service to people of different ethnic and racial minorities.

Racial and Ethnic Ministries must work on Leadership Development, offering training and development programs that include teaching and preaching skills, and program and project management.

We must focus on reaching the new generation through youth programs, Bible study groups, cultural and sporting events, and community projects.

Above all, we must serve as cultural bridge between cultures and races within the church and collaborate with other ministries and organizations.

We have had to reorganize the Hispanic Ministries and try to reconnect with the pastors that continue to serve in the UMC. In reference to Hispanic Ministries, we have eleven Hispanic congregations and three United Methodist Churches that have outreach programs to the Hispanic community. Our office has been in conversations with pastors who have seen how their communities around their churches have changed in recent times, reaching more Hispanics and we are looking for a way to open new worship services in Spanish or other possibilities to reach those communities.

We are not paralyzed as a Ministry; with the Lord's help we will seek opportunities to serve the ethnic and racial communities of the Texas Annual Conference.

Racial & Ethnic Ministries Team

Last year I presented to the annual conference a year of beginnings. We launched this committee in 2021 with the focus of helping the conference decentralize its support while still offering quality assistance to churches, pastors, and lay leaders looking to make an impact for the Kingdom of God. Our specific focus at inception was to offer aid in recommending specialists and other resources to equip Districts and local churches to minister with and to racial and ethnic constituencies. Yet, we find ourselves in a new season of ministry. A season that has included a great deal of change in team membership and conference demographics.

Our team began dreaming and visioning for what this new season may require of us. We begin asking questions that focus around three key themes that follow from the Apostle Paul's teaching to the church in Ephesus in chapter 4 when Paul charges that we are to use our gifts "¹² to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, ¹³ until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ."

- 1. How can we be a support to, or build up, minority clergy and their families.
- 2. How shall we go about the work of equipping the saints for ministry in this season?
- 3. How can we support racial equity so that we can "come to the unity of the faith"?

This is the work we see as the natural flow from our original mission. We also will strive for greater cohesion with committees to allow our team to achieve our mission and purpose. We will focus in on these goals for the coming year. We ask for your prayers and look forward to partnering with you in ministry.

African-American Church Initiative

Dr. Elijah Stansell, Director

<u>Purpose:</u> The purpose of this initiative is to craft strategies for strengthening the predominantly black congregations of the Texas Annual Conference.

<u>AACI</u>: Transitioning Toward the Future requires us to address the challenges of emerging and diverse, urban, and rural communities in the Texas Annual Conference. This strategy includes broader scopes than historical African American congregations. We recognize that the greatest concentration of African American congregations is in urban areas, but this process will work with every African American congregation that wishes to engage—current churches and churches into the future. This strategic initiative is designed to meet the transitions that have occurred in our communities.

Rationale: To address the changing dynamics within the present communities of faith that will empower & enable them to be vital congregations in their mission fields.

<u>Disciplinary Statements:</u> 2016 Book of Discipline, Part VI: Organization and Administration, Section IV: Churches in Transitional Communities

- ¶ 212. Since many of the communities in which the local church is located are experiencing transition, special attention must be given to forms of ministry required in such communities. The local church is required to respond to the changes that are occurring in its surrounding community and to organize its mission and ministry accordingly. (See points 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 following)
- ¶ 213. A Process for Assessment of Local Church Potential—Since every congregation is in a community in some type of transition, every local church is encouraged to study their congregation's potential. Upon the request of the congregation the district superintendent shall appoint a study task force to assist in an extensive study of the past, present, and potential ministry of that local church. Alternatively, the district superintendent may appoint such a task force when the future viability of the congregation is in question or whenever he/she deems it necessary for other reasons. The task force shall be composed of an equal number of lay and clergypersons and shall include persons from that congregation. (See points 1, 2, 3 following)

<u>Implementation</u>: Through a process of consultation and collaboration, congregations will be invited to participate in this process, which yields a framework and opportunity for vibrancy; outcomes that lead to health and vitality in the local church.

Activities of Engagement

- Transforming Pastoral Leadership Cohort #4, started with 10 congregations including lay and clergy. The participants will engage in the concept of "Normalizing Next" utilizing resources geared to the post-Covid world. The goal is to equip leaders with tools which will meet the "ever-changing landscape" the Church in general faces today. Consultant Rev. Olu Brown completed the Cohort with the pastors and congregations having outstanding results in transformation.
- Congregational engagement in Generosity Cohort #5, will begin in May 2023. The focus
 will include Generosity Templates, Strategy Seminars, Congregation Assessment,
 Coaching and methods of raising and exceeding your budgets.
- In 2022 several predominantly African American congregations disaffiliated. The AACI initiative held quarterly sessions with clergy intentionally focused on healing, blessing and finding God's creative movement for a brighter future.
- May the winds of the Holy Spirit bless each and every clergy and congregation into God's preferred future.

The leadership of the AACI is grateful for the opportunity to partner with the lay and clergy leadership in strengthening their congregations. Many thanks for your prayers and support. Looking forward to a successful 2023.

Equitable Compensation

The Commission on Equitable Compensation (COEC) is charged by the 2016 Book of Discipline (¶ 625) to: support full-time clergy serving as pastors in the charges of the annual conference by:

- a. recommending conference standards for pastoral support;
- b. administering funds to be used in base compensation supplementation; and
- **c.** providing counsel and advisory material on pastoral support to District Superintendents and committees on pastor-parish relations.

The elimination of exceptions to COEC guidelines, stricter enforcement of the 5-year rule for equitable support, adjustments of pastoral appointments, and realignment of charges should continue to reduce the financial burden of our Conference to ensure equitable compensation for all of our pastors. A question on the affordability of Pastors Minimum Salary was discussed

this year. As we are in a time of uncertainty and fluctuation, we have made provisions to help the Bishop and cabinet to address this issue on a case-by-case basis.

With the anticipated rising costs of relocations, the inability of many charges to make significant progress in being self-sufficient in their clergy support, and the necessity to reduce apportionment loads on local congregations require that the COEC continues to take necessary steps to work with the Cabinet, the Conference Centers, the District Offices, and the Local Church Charges to reduce equitable support costs and bring greater fiscal responsibility to our support of clergy throughout the Annual Conference. Our goal is vibrant growing fruitful congregations served by transforming clergy leaders. COEC funds should be used to help churches fill a short-term need to a healthier more vibrant place, so God may be glorified.

The Notes Are Important

COEC wants this report to be user-friendly. Thus, we've attempted to give you the information you need in an easily to read format. The Notes in the body of the report and at the end of the report are important and could pertain to you! Please read them.

What Makes Up Your Salary

"Salary" means all compensation paid by a charge as lined out on the Total Compensation Worksheet (completed at Charge Conference) PLUS any other compensation/assistance from denominational sources:

SALARY = Total Compensation + Other Denominational Compensation

Minimum Salary (MS)

Equitable Compensation (EC) is based on what is known as "minimum salary" (MS). **Minimum salary only applies to full-time appointments**. There are no minimum salary requirements for part-time appointments. Minimum Salary consists of the following:

- 1. Total cash salary
- 2. Housing-related allowances and utilities (includes utilities paid FOR the pastor)
- 3. Accountable reimbursements (does not include utilities paid FOR the pastor)

The Equitable Compensation and Texas Annual Conference Minimum Salaries for 2021 – 2024 as are as follows:

All churches / charges receiving equitable compensation are encouraged to provide an annual salary increase of 2.5% with the understanding that the above-mentioned salaries are the starting point for equitable compensation and minimum Conference salaries for the respective years.

EC Is Available for a Maximum of Five Years

EC is designed to help charges grow through the benefit of having the appropriate pastoral staffing even though they might not initially be able to afford it. The goal is to enable charges to grow in ministry and mission so that they can, after a maximum of five years, afford to pay the full MS for their clergyperson without any assistance.

Although an exception to this five-year rule may be granted by a unanimous vote of COEC and the Cabinet, in the past few years, these exceptions have become so many that they are depleting COEC funds for the assistance of charges/churches who meet all requirements. In order to properly steward its resources, COEC will hold more steadily to the five-year maximum.

How Your Charge Can Qualify for EC

To qualify for EC, your charge must pay 75% of your clergyperson's salary. To qualify for EC, your charge must pay 100% of the **Medical Benefits Program.**

To qualify for EC, your charge must pay 50% of the following apportionments:

- World Service
- Ministerial Education Fund
- District Superintendents Fund
- Episcopal Fund
- Equitable Compensation Fund
- Missions & Communications
- Center for Leadership Formation
- Center for Connectional Resources

WHEN to Request EC for a Charge

The pastor, PPRC chair, or the DS may initiate the request for EC. For clergypersons to receive EC in a timely fashion, the pastor should submit the request to the DS and the DS should deliver the request to COEC as soon as possible. PPRCs and pastors should work together in an ongoing, transparent dialogue about the ability of the church(es) to sustain a fulltime pastor and seek counsel from the DS about creative solutions for future ministry opportunities.

EC Grant for Pastor's Portion of the Conference Health Insurance Program

Clergypersons who serve EC charges can apply, through their DS, for a grant from EC that pays the clergyperson portion of the Conference Health Insurance Program. The DS must forward the application to the Chair of COEC (by no later than January 15th), with detailed reasons for the request. All applications must be approved by COEC before any grants can be awarded.

Note: Requests for Health Insurance grants MUST be made separately from EC requests. In other words, being granted EC funds does not automatically guarantee a Health Insurance grant.

Additional EC Assistance for Full-time Clergy (100% appointment) Serving More than Two Churches in a Charge.

These clergy whose charges consist of more than two churches may request additional support. For the third church they may request an additional \$400 per year. For a fourth church or more they may request an additional \$400 per year. The total requested may not exceed \$800 per year.

Note: Requests for this additional assistance MUST be made separately from standard EC requests. In other words, being granted EC funds does not automatically guarantee additional assistance for charges consisting of more than two churches.

One Round-Trip-Per-Week Commuter Allowances for Student, Retired, Part-time Local, and Lay Appointments

Those listed are eligible to receive a commuter allowance for ONE round trip per week (equal to 30 cents per mile) from their school or residence to the parsonage or the logical center of the parish, up to a maximum of 300 miles per week. Full-time appointments are NOT eligible for a commuter allowance.

Note: To be considered for a Commuter Allowance, you must fill in the commuter mileage on the "Other Items" page of the electronic Salary Sheet System and apply through your DS. The DS must forward the application to the Chair of COEC (by no later than January 15th), with exact information about the mileage and locations driven between. All applications must be approved by COEC before any allowances can be awarded.

Note: Requests for Commuter Allowances MUST be input into the electronic Compensation Administration System and will be considered along with EC requests. In other words, being granted EC funds does not automatically guarantee a Commuter Allowance.

Clergy Move Policy

Procedures and Guidelines may be found on the Conference Website – www.txcumc.org under Leadership Formation > Relocation Information. The proposed move policy effective 7/1/2023 is also found as Addendum 1 at the end of this report.

Please Note – Paid Moving Expense are Taxable Income

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (the "Act") made numerous changes to the taxation of both individuals and organizations. Several of the changes relate to deductions available to individuals. One such change involves moving expenses.

The end result is that (1) moving expenses incurred will not be a deductible expense (except for certain members of the Armed Forces) and (2) any reimbursement by, or payment of, moving expenses by an employer will need to be reported as taxable income to the employee.

Thus, for example, if a local church covers some or all of the moving expenses of an employee, such as its pastor, the church will need to report that amount on Form W-2 as taxable income to the employee. And, as another example, if the payment of moving expenses is made by an annual conference on behalf of a pastor serving a local church, the conference will need to issue that pastor a Form 1099-MISC reflecting the amount paid (the instructions to Form 1099-NEC state Box 1 should include "taxable fringe benefits for nonemployees," which will presumably include moving expenses for the years during which Sections 217 and 132(g) are suspended).

Housing and Parsonage Standards for the Texas Annual Conference.

The church today demands the clergy to be not only a preacher, as was the early circuit rider, but a resident pastor and responsible citizen in the community. In order to meet these felt needs, and to call men and women to a dedicated ministry, the church must provide living

conditions that will establish an adequate base from which to operate. Fulltime Elders (including Provisional Elders), Associate Members, and Fulltime Local Pastors shall be provided either a parsonage or a housing allowance.

Minimum Housing Allowance

In the case of no parsonage, the minimum housing allowance amount for clergy (and clergy couples) will be set using a rate of 25% of pension cash for each clergy. The calculated allowance(s) will be compared to an amount (i.e., annual cost) determined to be the fair market value for homes in the respective neighborhood where the clergy home is located. If the annual cost for fair market value is greater than the calculated housing allowance, then the allowance is increased to equate to the fair market cost.

Note: The above Clergy Housing Allowance Policy and the requirement for either a parsonage or housing allowance in lieu of parsonage pertain only to Fulltime Elders (including Provisional Elders), Associate Members and Full-time Local Pastors. The primary concern in establishing a minimum housing allowance amount was to ensure that clergy at the lower end of the compensation range and that clergy couples each receive an adequate housing allowance.

It is the privilege and responsibility of the members of each congregation to provide a physical setting which will give the parsonage family the comfort and convenience so that the energies of the pastor may be more concentrated on his or her task and willing service in the Church of God. It is the responsibility of the parsonage family to provide cleaning and care of the parsonage, which will protect the interior facilities and amenities such as paint and floor coverings.

Because the parsonage, like the church building, reflects upon the congregation and pastor, it should be in such condition that all concerned can be justifiably proud of it. In view of this, we make the following recommendations regarding parsonage Standards for this Annual Conference.

1. Size of Building and Living Areas. The new or remodeled parsonage should be large enough to accommodate the pastor's family. It should provide adequate space for the entertainment of guests. It should be remembered in selecting a parsonage that the present parsonage family is not the only one who will live in that parsonage and that the house should be adaptable for a variety of family sizes and situations.

We **recommend** the following minimum standards:

- a. 1800 square feet of living space
- b. 3 bedrooms and 2 bathrooms
- c. Adequate major appliances (stove, refrigerator, washer, dryer)
- d. Hot and cold running water in bathrooms, kitchen, and laundry
- e. Adequate heating and air conditioning
- f. Adequate closet and storage space

g. Adequate garage or carport space with outdoor storage area

2. Health and Safety

- a. Proper sewer disposal according to the standards of local and/or State Department of Health
- b. Fire extinguisher in kitchen with yearly inspection
- c. Provide smoke detectors for kitchen, living, and bedroom area
- d. Provide carbon monoxide detectors in kitchen and bedroom area

3. Furnishings

- a. Window covering, drapes, curtains, and blinds should be provided to ensure adequate privacy.
- b. If the parsonage family is expected to maintain the lawn, the church should provide a mower, lawn tools, and hoses.

4. Miscellaneous

a. Discovering Needs: The Chairperson of the Pastor Parish Committee, the Pastor and the Chairperson of the Trustees or Parsonage Committee should inspect the parsonage at least once a year using the standards identified in Paragraph 258 g (16) of the 2016 Discipline to discover needed repairs, improvements, and decorations. The Committee or Trustees should assume the initiative since it is their responsibility to maintain the parsonage in good condition, and since prompt attention lessens total cost of maintenance. An evaluation form will be provided by the Conference Commission on Equitable Compensation to the District Superintendents and be included in the Charge Conference packets.

It needs to be remembered that the parsonage is the PASTOR'S HOME and inspection should be scheduled in plenty of time to meet the convenience of the parsonage family. b. Insurance: The Trustees should be certain that the church owned house and contents are insured for at least 80% of replacement cost against fire, wind, and other hazards. Public liability insurance should be carried on parsonage property. A separate flood insurance policy should be provided by the church.

c. It is highly recommended that all ministers purchase tenant homeowner's insurance to cover personal possessions and liability.

IT IS THE SOLE REPONSIBILITY OF THE PASTOR TO INSURE PERSONAL PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE PASTOR AND FAMILY.

Parsonage Record Book: It is recommended that each church establish a Parsonage Record Book containing an inventory of parsonage furnishings owned by the church, any warranties on items purchased for the parsonage, a service and repair record with dates of repair or service copies of the annual inspection and moving day checklist, and any other receipts, printed materials, or pertinent information.

A copy of these standards shall be distributed at Charge Conference by the District Superintendent to each church with a copy of the Evaluation forms. The PPR Committee, Trustees or Parsonage Committee shall conduct a review of the parsonage and how it related to these standards (below average, average, meet standards, needs immediate attention) and submits their findings at each Charge Conference. Action should be taken as soon as possible to bring each parsonage within an acceptable range based on these minimal standards.

Addendum 1 - Clergy Relocation Committee Guidelines and Moving Policy

The Texas Annual Conference (TAC) has approved this moving policy, effective for moves related to appointments starting on and after July 1, 2023. The TAC will reimburse up to \$4000 for a clergy move.

This Moving Policy applies to appointments in the TAC where the clergy person will have the Conference Status of FE, PE, AM, or FL (unless the clergy is also attending seminary); it also applies when a member of the clergy retires, dies, or is appointed to Incapacity Leave. Clergy appointed to an Extension Ministry under the provisions of ¶ 344.1.a.1 are eligible. Failure to comply with the provisions of this Moving Policy will result in forfeiture of this benefit.

A. General Procedure

- 1. Once an appointment is made, the Center for Leadership Formation will complete and sign Part 1 of the Clergy Relocation Form (CRF) and then send it to the clergy via E-mail. This E-mail also includes the Moving Policy, with important information about moving and clergy benefits. Copies of this email are sent to the District Superintendent (DS) and District Administrative Assistants (DAA(s)) of the districts involved.
- 2. Clergy are responsible for packing their own belongings. The Conference will pay up to a total of \$550 (included in the \$4,000 maximum) moving reimbursement for special packing (mattresses, mirrors, etc.) by the moving company and also for moving supplies. The charge for special packing is usually included in the quote from the moving company and paid to them. If the moving company provides boxes and moving supplies, the cost will be also included in their quote. For items purchased by the clergy, reimbursement to the clergy for these supplies can be obtained by submitting the original invoices to the Center for Leadership Formation at the address on the Contact Information sheet. Please include your mailing address with the invoices. Please note that any packing materials billed by the moving company and shown in the estimate they submit are included in the \$550 total. Electronic detailed receipts are permitted but must be legible.
- 3. Clergy are responsible to submit a W-9 on agreement to their moving terms.

B. Using A Moving Company Billing the Annual Conference

1. The clergy chooses a moving company and sets up an appointment with the moving company for an estimate. This should be done within 7 days of receiving the e-mail from

- the Center for Leadership Formation office. We recommend that the clergy obtain two or more estimates and chose the one that seems best.
- 2. When the moving company has agreed to bill the annual conference directly, then the clergy completes and signs Part 2 of the Clergy Relocation Form (CRF) and sends it with the selected moving company estimate to the Center for Leadership Formation office.
- 3. Following the move, the clergy submits all documentation and receipts to the Center for Leadership Formation office for reimbursement.
- 4. The Center for Leadership Formation sends an approval letter (with copies of the Relocation Form and quote) to the moving company to authorize the move.
- 5. A copy of the approval letter and attachments is also sent to the clergy.
- 6. After each move, the moving company will bill the TAC directly for the portion of the move that has been approved. Any additional amounts are the responsibility of the clergy and should be paid at the time of the move.
- 7. In the event clergy do not live in a parsonage, clergy must complete their move no later than 120 days after the date of their appointment. Exceptions must be approved by Cabinet.

C. Self-Move

- 1. Clergy may elect to move themselves and will have to pay up front for all of the costs of the move. Reimbursement up to \$4000 will be provided upon receiving the receipts.
- 2. TAC will reimburse the clergy for reasonable expenses for a self-move. These include truck rental, moving/packing supplies, and gas used for the rental truck (or mileage at the current IRS rate for moving). The TAC reserves the right to determine which expenses are "reasonable".
- 3. Original receipts must be sent to the Center for Leadership Formation at the address on the Contact Information Sheet together with the Clergy Relocation Form. Electronic receipts are permitted but must be legible.

D. Special Situations

- 1. In the event of a move originating from outside (or moving to outside) the Texas Annual Conference, the TAC will only pay for the cost incurred inside the Conference boundary.
- 2. When a pastor is moving to an appointment as Student Pastor inside the Texas Annual Conference, expenses will be reimbursed up to a maximum of \$500. In this case, the clergy will submit a Clergy Relocation Form and receipts for reimbursement after the move.
- 3. When a clergy couple is moving to a new appointment, an additional \$500 may be approved to allow for additional books and additional stops.
- 4. Deacon moves are not currently covered by this policy, but the local church is encouraged to assist deacons with expenses incurred during a move to a new appointment.
- 5. The Conference reserves the right to make a decision (based on the intent of the policy) if a particular issue is not specifically covered by the Policy.

- Seminary students moving to the TAC for an appointment may be reimbursed the full amount of eligible expenses incurred for a self-move. Policies under Section E are applicable.
- 7. Seminary students moving to the TAC may be reimbursed for Storage fees needed for the time between graduation and the start of an appointment. This is handled on a case-by-case basis.

E. Relocation Costs Over the Approved Amount

1. Clergy will be obligated to pay for amounts not covered by the Moving Policy and this is a matter between the clergy and the moving company.

F. Moving Dates

- 1. There will need to be some flexibility of moving dates with a range of 2 or 3 days.
- 2. Clergy will need to check with the clergy at the new appointment to see when the parsonage is available. This should be done early in the move process, to allow for coordination of the moves.

G. Tax Implications

- 1. Under the 2018 changes to the Income Tax Code, all moving expenses paid or reimbursed by either the Texas Annual Conference or your church will now be treated as taxable income to you. You will receive the appropriate documentation at year-end and should be prepared to withhold extra taxes to cover your liability.
- 2. For further information see IRS Publication 521 or consult your income tax professional.

2023 Items Requiring a Vote:

New Faith Communities

It's the story of a wandering people who no longer have a home being cared for by a mighty God and being led to a promised land. It's the story of a broken hearted group of disciples who found renewed hope in the presence and power of a risen Savior. That's the Biblical story and it has been the story of many of the people called United Methodist in the Texas Annual Conference. Certainly, the disaffiliations of so many churches has loomed large in our life together over this past year. But what will be remembered and celebrated by so many in our conference in the years to come is the faithfulness and courage of so many who were committed to the continued proclamation of the gospel in a United Methodist voice in their communities. Their stories have inspired pastors and church members in our conference and even beyond. During this past year churches have been started in Jasper, Woodville, Baytown, Jacksonville, Bryan and Conroe. A church has also been started in northwest Houston with plans for another in the south.

In addition, there are conversations about churches in other places as well. While not totally abandoning conventional wisdom about church planting, this unique moment, which represents significant kingdom opportunity, has required out of the box thinking. These are plants like no others. Not parachute drops. Not mergers. Not second campuses. The core of these churches are people who have a mature understanding of what it means to be a follower of Jesus, what it means to be the church, and what it takes for a church to fulfill its mission. While the conference has made a significant commitment to supporting these new churches, not a one of them would exist without the faithfulness of these leaders.

Even as we celebrate the launch of these new churches, their future and the future of additional new churches yet started will depend on the continued commitment of the conference to provide funding, support, and pastoral leadership to these churches. That means not only starting churches as we have traditionally known them but also being open to learning new models for church planting that may take us back to our Biblical roots of people gathering in places that don't look like church and yet being the church in every way. As God's people crossed the Jordan river, as the disciples first saw their risen friend and Savior, they couldn't imagine the future God had in store for them. We don't know what God has for us in the years to come.

But as they were faithful, when we are faithful amazing things can happen. Let it be so friends! Let it be so!

United Methodist Men

Robert Wright, President

The Texas Conference leadership held an online meeting on March 17 and made several decisions, which included the holding of the half-day men's ministry event—Men of the Spirit-- in Houston on July 23.



In May we made site visits to St. Matthew's UMC and St. Paul's UMC, both in Houston. There had been previous contact with both via phone and email. The former was the planned site for a *Men of the Spirit* half-day event on July 23; the latter was to be the site for a *Lead Like Jesus* Encounter in September.

Robert Wright preached at St. Matthew's UMC (Houston) on Father's Day (June 19). The title was *The God You May Not Know*; the theme was developing a closer relationship with the Holy Spirit.

On July 11 we spoke to the men at Clear Lake UMC about the United Men's Ministry platform and the connection between GCUMM, the jurisdictions, conferences, and local units.

On July 12 we met with Jeff Springer, of Suit Up Ministries (Magnolia, TX), a group that focuses on discipling dads. We hope to contact other groups in the Houston area to help promote each other's events and collaborate on future events.

On October 5 we met with the UMM of Naples UMC. This was more of a general discussion and needs assessment. They want to grow their ministry, with a focus on attracting younger men into the group. We have gathered and synthesized relevant GCUMM resources and will make a follow-up presentation in February

We hope to continue to meet with local men's ministries. Much of our past efforts have focused on the Houston-Galveston area of the conference. We now seek to focus on the more northern districts and smaller, rural churches.

Events

The Men's Ministry had a display at the 2022 Annual Conference (May 27-June 1). It was well-received and several new contacts were made.

We worked with St. Matthews UMC in Houston to hold a half-day *Men of the Spirit* event on July 23. Bishop Scott Jones was the keynote speaker. Other speakers included:

- Ken Rheingans (virtual), The Epworth League
- Reverend Marvin Hood Pastor, Newgate Fellowship UMC (Spring, TX)

The event was attended by 32 men. In the future, such events will be planned for either before annual conference or after Memorial Day; scheduling a summer event is difficult as it conflicts with people's vacations plans.

We worked with Mark Lubbock to create a presentation for the SCJ Conference in November. Robert Wright made the presentation to the conference on November 5.

Live Bold & United Men's Ministry Platform

We have stopped promoting the United Men's Ministry platform after receiving reports that there are no new offering since the initial March release. We did not want to lead groups into investing in a dead end.

We are pushing the *Live* Bold app and are using that as the tip of the spear for our promotional activities.

We are working with Greg Arnold of the General Commission on United Methodist Men on a study of the Live Bold app; once approved by the University of North Texas Institutional Review Board (an ethics committee), we hope to begin the study in the first quarter of 2023.

Membership

We are looking at the 2022 conference journal to identify the more active men's ministries in the conference, with the plan to contact and visit them. The preoccupation with disaffiliation hindered interest in UMM activities.

Of the 598 congregations of the TAC, 298 (49.8%) chose to disaffiliate and were approved at the December 3 Special Session. An early list of remaining churches was distributed by an unofficial lay group; but this proved to be inaccurate; we are getting an updated list from the conference and will contact remaining UMM units and their congregations.

1. Apportionment Receipts 2022:

Receipts & Expenses

In 2022, Conference receipts exceeded expenses by \$1.382 million. Investment returns resulted in losses totaling \$2.371 million. The net effect was a decline in Conference operating reserves in the amount of \$0.989 million during the year. In 2021, Conference expenses exceeded receipts by \$0.432 million. Investment returns resulted in gains totaling \$1.046 million. As a result, Conference operating reserves increased by a net amount of \$0.614 million during the year.

90.42% (\$15.374 million) total apportionment income was received in 2022, which was an increase of 16.69 percentage points over 2021 (73.73%). Much of this was a result of the disaffiliated churches required to pay both their 2021 and 2022 apportionments.

As of January 1, 2023, 300 churches remained in the Texas Annual Conference. Of those, 233 (77%) of the United Methodist churches in the Texas Annual Conference paid 100% of their General Church, Jurisdictional, and Conference apportionments in 2022.

Please refer to <u>Addendum A</u> at the end of this report. It compares apportionment receipts in all three categories of connectional giving for 2021 with 2022. If you look at the "apportionments total" (including General & Jurisdictional, Texas Annual Conference and Fair Share Goals totals), you'll see we received a total of 88.00% in 2022 vs. 72.17% in 2021, approximately 15.83 percentage points more.

<u>Addendum B</u> at the end of this report compares budgeted receipts to actual receipts for 2022. However, considering the challenges faced by our local churches in 2022, we are grateful members and churches were willing and able to be very generous. It also has the 2023 Spending Guide summary.

Please remember: Apportionments are divided into three categories of connectional giving:

- Texas Conference
 Texas Conference apportionments are conference budget funds that serve the
 ministries of the Texas Annual Conference and are apportioned to our local churches.
 Each year, the Council on Finance and Administration recommends a budget for Annual
 Conference approval for the coming year, which determines these totals.
- Fair Share Goals

Fair Share Goals are optional benevolent giving opportunities which benefit wonderful conference and connectional ministries. Fair Share Goal ministries and dollar goals are determined by the Council on Finance and Administration.

General and Jurisdictional
 General and Jurisdictional apportionments are general church and South Central
 Jurisdictional budget funds apportioned to Annual Conferences. By the Book of
 Discipline, our conference cannot change or reduce these amounts. Our 2024 General
 Church Apportionments is reduced by 45.77% from \$6,629,997 to \$3,595,604. Our 2024
 Jurisdictional Apportionments is unchanged at \$232,667.

2. Fiscal Assets

The chart labeled Addendum C at the end of this report is a "Visual Balance Sheet," if you will; a way of "seeing" on one page all conference fiscal assets as of the end of 2022 and how they can be used.

Rectangles on the right side of the Visual Balance Sheet show our total fiscal assets: \$2.659 million in **Cash** at Hancock-Whitney Bank; \$27.338 million **Nonrestricted Investments** (funds invested with Wespath and Texas Methodist Foundation; which are not permanently restricted, but either temporarily restricted or available to use as needed for ministries and/or operating expenses); and \$11.103 million in **Restricted Investments** (funds invested with Wespath and Texas Methodist Foundation; which are permanently donor restricted, and can only be used for certain types of ministries). Fiscal assets total \$41.100 million.

Rectangles on the left side of the Visual Balance Sheet show the same fiscal assets categorized differently. Fiscal assets still total \$41.100 million. However, after subtracting the **Restricted Investments** (which can only be used for certain types of ministries), we see that of the assets available for use as needed (**Cash + Nonrestricted Investments** on the right side), at the end of 2022, we had \$0 in **Current Liabilities**, \$19.888 million in **Designated Reserves** and \$10.109 million in **Operating Reserves**.

A few definitions:

Cash is literally the cash in our checking account at Hancock-Whitney Bank, used for ministries, compensation, and other operating expenses.

Nonrestricted Investments include our Designated Reserves, which are temporarily restricted. However, all the remaining funds within them and all earnings on these investments are Operating Reserves which can be used as needed for ministries and/or operating expenses. A list of Nonrestricted Investments can be found in <u>Addendum</u> E at the end of this report.

Most **Restricted Investments** are governed by endowment documents, which permanently restrict the initial investment or principal, and restrict the earnings on those investments for specific purposes, often with specific withdrawal instructions designed to fund ministry without depleting the original investment. Examples of Restricted Investments include the Missions Endowment invested at Vanguard and the Emerging Leaders Endowment invested at TMF. A list of Restricted Investments can be found in *Addendum E* at the end of this report.

Designated Reserves are temporarily restricted funds our council has chosen to restrict for certain purposes or ministries. They include some donor restricted funds (like the proceeds from conference-wide appeals for disaster relief) and funds which were temporarily restricted for a specific purpose (for example, property proceeds reserved for campus ministries). A list of Designated Reserves can be found in *Addendum D* at the end of this report.

Current Liabilities are amounts owed to others, which we cannot claim as unrestricted assets. These are mainly the result of timing issues; funds owed at the end of the fiscal year and are paid in Quarter 1 of the following year.

Operating Reserves are the funds which remain when all other claims on our assets are subtracted from the total. These funds can be used as needed for ministries and/or operating expenses. Total Assets minus Restricted Investments minus Current Liabilities minus Designated Reserves = Operating Reserves. A common "rule of thumb": organizations should keep a minimum of 10% of their annual budget in operating reserves. At the end of 2022, we had over 100% of our annual conference budget in operating reserves. We are financially stable and ready for future opportunities!

3. Designated Reserves

Please refer to Addendum D at the end of this report. (As of 12/31/2022)

Designated Reserves are temporarily reserved funds our council has chosen to restrict for certain purposes or ministries. As you can see in the list labeled Addendum D at the end of this report, these reserves include some donor restricted funds (which were donated for certain ministries under one of three categories: Assistant to the Bishop, Center for Leadership Formation, or Center for Connectional Resources).

The Council on Finance and Administration plans to keep all Designated Reserve funds restricted, unless at some point in the future the intended ministries no longer exist. In that case, the council could redesignate those funds to be used for similar purposes.

Of course, Designated Reserve fund totals change every month as funds are used for ministry and as new funds are established. Fund balances are reported each year here in the journal, reported to center directors monthly, and made available to others as needed through the conference fiscal office. At the beginning of 2022, the balance was \$9,908,014.63 and ended the year with a balance of \$19,887,800.85.

4. Fiscal Investments

Please refer to Addendum E at the end of this report. (As of 12/31/2022)

Fiscal non-restricted investments increased by \$9.311 million in 2022. Investment returns were negative during the year. Aggregate performance across investment positions netted a loss of

\$2.371 million; a negative return for the year of -13.2%. Net contributions to investment positions in 2022 totaled \$11.682 million. The ending market value of the non-restricted investments totaled \$27.338 million as of December 31, 2022.

The spreadsheet labeled Addendum E (effective 12/31/2022) at the end of this report shows all fiscal funds except those in our Hancock-Whitney Bank Checking Account, including funds invested with Wespath and TMF (Texas Methodist Foundation). Shaded areas highlight our **Nonrestricted Investments.** Every line item not shaded is a **Restricted Investment.**

Most **Restricted Investments** are governed by endowment documents, which permanently restrict the initial investment or principal, and restrict investment earnings for specific purposes, often with specific withdrawal instructions designed to fund ministry without depleting the original investment. Examples of Restricted Investments include the Missions Endowment invested at Wespath and the Emerging Leaders Endowment invested at TMF.

As of December 31, 2022, **Nonrestricted Investments** totaled \$27.338 million, of which \$19.889 million was identified as designated reserves.

5. Strategy for 2023

Prior to disaffiliation, the TAC 2023 approved budget was \$9,285,854. The conference apportionment amounts of the disaffiliated churches is \$4,267,692, which represents a 45.96% decrease in conference apportionment receipts. The apportionment target of the remaining United Methodist Churches is \$5,018,162. See the chart below:

6. Projections and Expenditure Guidelines 2023

Please refer to Addendum II and Addendum III - 2023 Spending Guide at the end of this report.

Each year, the Council on Finance and Administration relies on the conference fiscal office's end-of-year projections to help conference staff align spending with expected receipts. This year's need for every congregation to pay 100% of their apportionments is critically important. For the ministries of the Texas Annual Conference to continue, we must pull together as one body—to continue serving and making disciples of those inside the church, while at the same time reaching those outside the church.

The chart below shows the 300 congregations in the Texas Annual Conference by district. Their apportionment amounts in 2022 were \$5,217,604. In 2023, their apportionments totals are \$5,018,162. If every church paid 100% of their apportionment asks, our income for the ministries would receive \$5,018,162 in receipts. Our 2023 spending guide (budget) is based upon 100% payout of every United Methodist church.

General and Jurisdictional Apportionments decreased from \$6,862,664 to \$3,828,271 (44.22%) reduction. Texas Annual Conference Apportionments decreased from \$5,018,162 to \$4,231,930 (15.67%) reduction. Fair Share Goals stay the same.

8. Apportionment Giving

What is an apportionment?

In the United Methodist Church, the vital web of the interactive relationships of connectionalism are funded through apportionments, "a portion meant" for others.

Apportionments are divided into three categories of connectional giving:

- Texas Annual Conference Ministries
 Conference apportionments are conference budget funds apportioned to local churches. Each year, the council recommends a budget for Annual Conference approval for the coming year, which determines these totals.
- Texas Annual Conference: Fair Share Goals Ministries
 Fair Share Goals are optional benevolent giving opportunities which benefit wonderful conference and connectional ministries. Fair Share Goal ministries and dollar goals are determined by the council each year.
 - General and Jurisdictional Ministries
 General and Jurisdictional apportionments are general church and South-Central
 Jurisdictional budget funds apportioned to annual conferences. By discipline, our
 conference cannot change or reduce these amounts. Recommendations to lower
 general church apportionments (by about \$1 million/year for our conference) have been
 delayed because of the pandemic-caused postponement of General Conference 2020.

How are apportionments calculated?

After a budget for the following year is approved at Annual Conference, budget totals are apportioned to local churches using an expenditure-based formula. An explanation of how apportionments are calculated can be found on our conference website txcumc.org. For more information, contact our Conference Treasurer at rbesser@txcumc.org

Each fall, apportionment statements for the following year are sent to a representative of each church by email. By discipline, apportioned amounts must be paid monthly by local churches to the conference fiscal office. During each year, monthly apportionment statements showing amounts and percentages paid are sent to a representative of each church by email. How are apportionments paid?

By discipline, apportioned amounts must be paid monthly by local churches to the conference fiscal office. There are several ways to pay:

- 2. **Monday's Memorial Service:** Monday afternoon at our Memorial Service we will have the opportunity to continue to partner with the Laos WELD Project: Water, Education, and Leadership Development. This project focuses on bringing clean water to communities deeply impacted by illnesses associated with the lack of clean water; education of children who do not have access to public education; and

Leadership Development as we continue to equip pastoral leaders for this country that is experiencing revival in wonderful ways.

3. Tuesday's Ordination/Commissioning Service: On Tuesday night we will celebrate the commissioning and ordination of clergy for the Texas Annual Conference. Bishop Harvey has a custom of taking ordinands on a trip to The Holy Land every other year. This coming January, she hopes to take those who were ordained last year and those being ordained this year with her to the land often referred to as the Fifth Gospel. Few things impact a clergy person's pastoral ministry as much as a trip to The Holy Land where one has the opportunity to stand by the Sea of Galilee and read the Beatitudes, kneel at the Pool of Bethsaida and almost hear Jesus ask, "Do you want to be made well?", walk down the Palm Sunday road with Jerusalem in sight remembering Jesus weeping over the city, and so many other moving experiences. It's an honor to invest in this trip for our clergy.

So, this year come to the Texas Annual Conference prepared to invest in these ministries that are guaranteed to have an exponential return on their investment through kingdom impact.

Conference-wide Appeals

From time to time, when the opportunity to address extraordinary needs arises, the council approves a conference-wide appeal, an offering for a specific purpose for a specific time.

10. Report Day 2024

What is Report Day?

After the end of each fiscal year in January, each local church submits an End of Year Report (local church statistics) to their district and any remaining apportionment payments to the conference on what is traditionally referred to as "Report Day." Report Day is scheduled for **January 9 and 10, 2024**. Each district may choose one or both days to report.

Why is Report Day so early?

The conference would love to schedule Report Day for late January or February to give every local church plenty of time to complete reports and forward apportionments. However, general church apportionments are due to the General Council on Finance and Administration during the week of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, usually on or about January 19 or 20. And End of Year Report statistics are used by our Texas Annual Conference Cabinet during inventory and appointment season, which begins in late January. Thanks so much for reporting 2022 statistics and paying 2022 apportionments by January 11, 2023.

11. Annual Audits

Each year, the Texas Annual Conference fiscal, episcopal, and benefits offices are audited by an independent certified public accountant. As we write this pre-conference journal report, the CPA firm, Ratliff and Associates, is reviewing our accounts. Copies of our completed audits will be available in the Conference Office. Investment Committee

Buck Thornton, Chairperson Rev. Robert Besser, Treasurer Mark Hellums, Controller

The Investment Committee elected by the Texas Annual Conference in 2021 is responsible for making recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration and Board of Pensions concerning all invested fiscal and benefits funds. The committee meets four times each year to review market conditions and investment earnings. Guided by Investment Policy Statements, committee members seek to be good stewards of Texas Annual Conference resources.

This report is divided into five sections:

1. Historical Returns

Benefits

- In 2022, Pensions investments produced a loss of -17.31% and Group Health Benefits investments produced a loss of -17.57%. Over the past 16 years, Pension and Group Health Benefits investments have returned positive returns 11 times. Losses in 2022, were the largest since 2008 when returns were -23.48% for Pensions and -27.82% for Group Health Benefits.
- Over a 16-year period, annualized returns are 6.02% for Pensions and 5.13% for GHB.

Fiscal Office

• In 2022, non-restricted investments produced a loss of -13.15% and the restricted Mission Endowment Fund produced a loss of -16.63%. Over the past four years, annualized returns are 4.61% for non-restricted investments and 5.50% for the Mission Endowment Fund.

3. Investment performance for Benefit Plan investments

As of the December close, 86.6% of assets are invested in Wespath strategies, 11.4% advised by Morgan Stanley and the balance is with Texas Methodist Foundation.

Wespath's U.S. Equity Fund, International Equity Fund and Multiple Asset Fund continued to underperform the benchmarks in 2022. The U.S. Equity Fund and International Equity Fund has underperformed its benchmark for the 3-year reporting period ending 12-31-22 while slightly outperforming the benchmark for the 5-year reporting period ending 12-31-22. The Multiple Asset Fund has outperformed its benchmarks for the 3-year and 5-year reporting periods ending 12-31-22. The Board of Trustees serve as directors of the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, incorporated as a Texas nonprofit corporation, and registered with the office of the Texas Secretary of State. Your Conference Board of Trustees (BOT) is charged with the responsibility for all properties owned by the Texas Annual Conference (TAC), plus any local church properties within the Conference that have closed or been declared discontinued or abandoned.

The Board of Trustees works to advance the vision and mission of the Annual Conference by being good stewards of the properties and resources entrusted to it. This includes the responsibility "to invest, reinvest, buy, sell, transfer and convey any and all funds and properties that it may hold in trust, subject always to the terms of the legacy, devise, or donation." ¶2512.3c (2016 United Methodist Book of Discipline)

We also assist local churches and pastors by providing wisdom and consultation regarding property and insurance issues facing local churches through the Office of Connectional Resources which supports the work of the Trustees.

The BOT maintains appropriate insurance, manages, and maintains all properties owned by the TAC, including those properties that have been acquired as churches have closed, been discontinued, or abandoned. (See details on spreadsheet at the end of this report.)

Principles Regarding Local Church Requests for Disaffiliation (approved by the 2020 Texas Annual Conference)

In anticipation of the General Conference to be held in August of 2021, it is possible that local churches will seek to leave The United Methodist Church. The Texas Annual Conference hereby clarifies the principles governing its approval process for any such request. We believe these to be fair to all. As of this date, ¶2548.2 and ¶2553 of the *Book of Discipline* govern procedures by which a local church can be granted permission to disaffiliate from The United Methodist Church and depart with its property and other assets. We are aware that ¶2553 may be revised by General Conference or by the Judicial Council, and that other proposals may supersede these Disciplinary paragraphs in the future.

Both paragraphs of the *Book of Discipline* require approval of the annual conference for a church to disaffiliate. While other approvals may be necessary as well, the following are the minimum requirements for the annual conference to approve such a step under the current *Book of Discipline*:

- 1. First, the Pastor and Lay Leadership of the Church (Lay Leader, Church Council Chair and/or Lay Delegate to Annual Conference) meet with their District Superintendent to discuss 'why' to disaffiliate.
- 2. Members of the local church must complete an appropriate process of discernment. The determination of whether a process is appropriate is made by the church's District Superintendent.

- 3. After the local church nears completion of the process of discernment, the annual conference will calculate apportionment and unfunded pension liability estimates for that local church.
- 4. The local church may vote to move forward with the disaffiliation process. To move forward, disaffiliation must be affirmed by a simple majority (¶2548.2) or a two-thirds majority (¶2553) of a duly called church conference.
- 5. The local church must pay in full the previous year's apportionments and the current year's apportionments.
- 6. The local church must pay in full the unfunded pension liability, as calculated by the TAC Board of Pensions in accordance with Wespath's guidance.
 - a. The valuation is based on a market valuation of unfunded liability
 - b. The valuation takes in to account the local church's share of the liability
 - c. The valuation gives the local church credit for its contributions to the Conference's pension reserves with credit for earning over time.
- 7. The local church must complete all forms in accordance with GCFA's disaffiliation guidance.
- 8. After all the foregoing steps have been completed, the TAC may vote to release the local church from any obligations under the trust clause in ¶2503 in accordance with the then applicable Book of Discipline.

The Texas Conference Board of Pensions brings this report to the 2023 Annual Conference in full and appreciative recognition of the sacrificial giving, careful planning and dedicated stewardship of predecessor Annual Conferences and Conference Boards of Pensions. We owe a debt of gratitude to our laity and to our clergy who have established the pension infrastructure on which the Texas Conference now stands. We are grateful as we make this report for the work they have done and for the opportunity to continue to work on the pension programs of the Texas Annual Conference and the United Methodist Church which helps grow transforming clergy that lead vibrant growing congregations.

The Board of Pensions supports the Vision and Mission of the Texas Annual Conference by funding and administering the outstanding retirement benefit programs for Clergy which helps empower Clergy to make disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world to the glory of God. This strategy allows clergy to Invest in the Young, Grow Fruitful Churches and Create Transforming Lay and Clergy Leaders.

Report items requiring a vote include the following:

- Acceptance of this report and the forecast for 2024.
- Basic Recommendations for 2024:
 - o 1. Funding Pensions for Past Service Rate

- Clergy on Medical Leave will continue to receive their group health subsidy through the Sustentation Fund. 60% of the monthly cost of the participant's elected medical coverage will be covered by the Sustentation Fund.
- In 2023, the UMPIP non-matching contribution was 3%. There is no change in 2024. The non-matching contribution rate remains 3% through 2024.

Section I. Basic Recommendations

1. Funding Pensions for Past Service Rate

Past Service is that service rendered prior to January 1, 1982, by clergy members and Full-Time Local Pastors which has been approved for pension credit. Funding for pensions for past service is provided through earnings on pension reserves. The Texas Annual Conference's past service rate for 2023 is \$912.00. In 2023, the Texas Annual Conference's past service rate was the third highest across 52 Conferences. In addition, the \$912.00 does not include the Pre-92 Group Health Benefits subsidy which is unique to TAC. Since 2015, the annualized rate of inflation in the U.S. has been 2.67%. The recommendation is to increase the PSR for 2024 by 3.00%.

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1) That the 2024 Past Service Rate for approved service rendered by ordained Ministers and Full-Time Local Pastors be set at \$939.00 (reflects a 3.00% increase from the 2023 rate of \$912.00).
- 2) That the rate for Surviving Spouses be set at 75% of the Past Service Rate.
- 3) That the 2024 Past Service Rate becomes effective January 1, 2024.

2. CRSP Funding Pensions for Current Service

Current Service is that service rendered on and after January 1, 2024, by clergy. Funding for pensions for current service is the responsibility of the salary-paying unit to which the appointment is made. The funding for pensions and a reserve fund is through the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) administered by Wespath.

WHEREAS the United Methodist Church began in 2007 a new pension program for all years of service beginning January 1, 2007,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That we affirm the action taken at 2006 session of the Texas Annual Conference which placed the church contribution for each clergy participant according to the following CRSP Funding Plan:

- A) Defined Benefit (DB) a/
 - I. Projected Total Cost to Texas Annual Conference (TAC) would be: 6.2460% x \$78,292 (DAC) x 1.07 x 473.25 (Eligible Participants) = \$2,476,246 (Total DB)
 - II. Plan Compensation of Eligible Participant ÷ Total TAC Plan Compensation = "Decimal"
 - III. Funding for Eligible Participant = "Total DB \$" x "Decimal"
- B) Defined Contribution (DC)
 - 1. 2% x Plan Compensation of Eligible Participant
 - 2. UMPIP 1% x Plan Compensation of Eligible Participant
- C) Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)

3% x Plan Compensation of Eligible Participant (Not to exceed an annual contribution of \$4,697.52)

- D) Reserve Fund
 - .25% x Plan Compensation of Eligible Participants
- E) Sustentation Fund
 - .75% x Plan Compensation of Eligible Participant

a/ Eligible participants of 473.25 assume CRSP eligibility for 75% appointment and above in 2024.

NOTE:

- 1) The "contribution base" (Plan Compensation) of a clergyperson's salary consists of:
 - 1. taxable cash salary
 - 2. housing related allowances and utilities
 - 3. salary-reduction contributions to Internal Revenue Code section 125 or 403(b) plans, and
 - 4. when a parsonage is provided, 25% of the sum of 1, 2 and 3, or housing allowance in lieu of a parsonage.
- 2) The Denominational Average Compensation in 2024 will be \$78,292. Thus, the maximum CPP contribution by any Texas Conference participant will be 3% of twice the DAC or \$4,697.52.
- 3) The minimum level for participating in CPP in 2024 is a contribution base equal to 25% of the Denominational Average Compensation. In 2024, 25% of DAC will be \$19,573.00. Thus, a cash salary of \$15,658.40 will be necessary to reach

this 25% requirement since $\frac{$15,658.40}{}$ plus 25% (\$3,914.60) for housing = $\frac{$19,573.00}{}$.

Section III. Pre-1982 Years of Service and Ministerial Pension Plan

Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Pre-82 Plan, provides clergy with a pension for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church prior to 1982. The plan is designed to provide participants with one piece of their overall retirement portfolio.

The Pre-82 Plan was replaced by MPP effective January 1, 1982. The Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) is a 403(b)-retirement plan administered by Wespath that provides benefits to eligible United Methodist Church clergy with service from 1982 through 2006.

MPP is part of the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP). MPP was closed to new enrollments and no contributions were made after December 31, 2006. MPP was replaced by CRSP on January 1, 2007. The accounts of clergy who participated in MPP continue to be invested, and benefits are available at retirement or at age 62 for terminated clergy.

Section IV. Housing Resolution

RESOLUTIONS RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS

The Texas Annual Conference (the "Conference") adopts the following resolutions relating to rental/housing allowances for retired or disabled clergypersons of the Conference:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the Church ("Clergypersons");

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active Clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental/housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to retired and disabled Clergypersons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to retired and disabled Clergypersons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental/housing allowance for Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT an amount equal to **100% of the pension or disability payments** received from plans authorized under *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (the "Discipline"), which includes all such payments from Wespath, during the years 2023 and 2024 by each retired or disabled Clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental/housing allowance for each such Clergyperson; and

THAT the pension or disability payments to which this rental/housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the *Discipline*, including such payments from Wespath and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a Wespath plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the *Discipline*, that result from any service a Clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired or disabled Clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the

Church, or any other employer that employed the Clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such retired or disabled Clergyperson's pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a Clergyperson's gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations there under to the <u>least</u> of:

- (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the Clergyperson's employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year;
- (2) the amount expended by the Clergyperson to rent or provide a home in such year; or
- (3) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

The housing/rental allowance exclusion is available only to clergy, not to surviving spouses, but the death of a minister during the year does not invalidate the exclusion for the entire year. The exclusion is still available for the part of the year the minister was alive.

Since neither Wespath nor the Texas Annual Conference gives legal tax advice, each minister should consult with his or her own attorney, CPA, or other tax advisor.

Section V. Comprehensive Protection Plan Summary

The current Comprehensive Protection Plan Adoption Agreement was signed by the Texas Conference in 2016 to be effective 1-1-17. It shall be effective until amended by the Conference and agreed to by the Administrator in accordance with the provisions of the Comprehensive Protection Plan. Every year the benefits are communicated by Wespath.

Section VI. Adoption Agreement – Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP)

The Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) Adoption Agreement was adopted by the Texas Conference as defined in the Clergy Retirement Security Program Plan Document and agreed to by Wespath for the Plan Year commencing January 1, 2007. It shall be effective until amended by the Conference and agreed to by the Board in accordance with the provisions of the Clergy Retirement Security Program. Previous Adoption Agreements shall remain in effect for the Plan Years to which they apply.

Section VII. Electronic Funds Transfer

An important aspect of the CRSP pension structure is that each Annual Conference is responsible for all pensions-related billing and collections, beginning January 1, 2007. The Board of Pensions, therefore, requires that the Texas Annual Conference utilize Electronic Funds Transfer for pension collections. The Board of Pensions has negotiated an Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) agreement with Hancock Whitney Bank, the banking institution for the Texas Annual Conference.

Section VIII. The Sustentation Fund

1. Statement of Intent

The Sustentation Fund of the Texas Annual Conference is a fund representing a tangible expression of a collegial relationship among clergy under appointment in the conference to provide transitional aid. The Sustentation Fund will provide temporary financial assistance to clergy who are placed on Medical Leave, Leave of Absence, Emergency Assistance, and to assist local congregations in times of clergy transition. Sustentation Fund payments shall be the responsibility of each local congregation, shall be part of the benefit program through the Conference Board of Pensions, and shall not exceed 0.75% of each clergy's total compensation.

2. Eligibility for Membership

Clergy under appointment who participate in the Wespath program administered by the Texas Annual Conference are eligible.

A. Structure

- 1. The Board of Pensions is the supervising agency for the Sustentation Fund. The activities of the Sustentation Fund are reported to the Board of Pensions on a semi-annual basis.
- 2. The Conference Benefits Officer (CBO) of the Texas Annual Conference shall have direct responsibility for the administration of the Sustentation Fund.
- 3. The Conference Benefits Officer (CBO) of the Texas Annual Conference shall be the custodian of the permanent records of the Sustentation Fund.
- 4. The Fiscal Officer of the Texas Annual Conference shall manage all resources of the Sustentation Fund by deposit, investment, and dispersal of all funds.

B. Disclaimer

The Sustentation Fund shall not accept responsibility nor does its existence constitute responsibility by the Texas Annual Conference or any of its agencies for any resources beyond the benefits specifically identified in these guidelines which cannot, do not, and will not be extended beyond the range of (12) months length from the beginning of such benefits.

This limitation on the payment of premiums for Group Health Benefits for clergy Medical Leave shall not apply. On recommendation of the Cabinet, and at the determination of the Sustentation Fund Committee based on available resources, assistance in the payment of Group Health Benefits may be extended beyond the original twelve (12) month period.

C. Benefits

The Sustentation Fund is limited to providing cash benefits for the following purposes:

- For Payment of required CPP contributions for CPP participants who are on Medical Leave and on Leave of Absence when payment of CPP is authorized by the Cabinet.
- For assistance in payment of Group Health Benefits contributions for persons on Medical Leave and are covered by the Texas Conference's self-insured group health plan. This assistance will be as follows:
 - i) 60% of contributions to be paid by Sustentation Fund / 40% of contributions to be paid by participant.
- 3. For assistance in payment of Group Health Benefits contributions for persons on Leave of Absence as requested by the Cabinet. This assistance during the Leave of Absence will be as follows:
 - i) 60% of contributions to be paid by Sustentation Fund / 40% of contributions to be paid by participant.
- 4. For payment of benefits to persons re-entering General Ministry on recommendation from and requisition by the Committee on Conference Relations and the Cabinet with concurrence by Sustentation Fund Committee. Pre-approved items will include, but may not be limited to, such services as vocational assessment, counseling, temporary housing, medical insurance protection and shall not exceed \$15,000 per year.
- 5. For Emergency Assistance as defined by the Cabinet.
- 6. For providing interim clergy support.

D. Funding and Budgeting

- 1. The Sustentation Fund shall be funded by contribution of the salary paying unit on behalf of each eligible participant of the Texas Annual Conference on an amount equal to 0.75% of Plan Compensation, which is the basis of the calculation of Pensions through Wespath.
- 2. When the Sustentation Fund was established in 2006, funds were allocated according to the following percentages: Interim Clergy Support (50%), Group Health Benefits Support for clergy on Medical Leave (25%), and Emergency Relief (25%). An increase in Group Health Benefits costs for clergy on Medical Leave caused that portion of the Sustentation Fund to run a deficit, while the other portions of the fund had a surplus. To address this imbalance, the Board of

Pensions eliminated the percentage allocations of the Sustentation Fund effective January 1, 2011, and this action was approved at the 2011 Annual Conference.

E. The Process of Collection of Sustentation Fund Resources

- 1. The Center for Connectional Resources shall bill each local congregation with eligible clergy serving under appointment.
- 2. Contributions to the Sustentation Fund shall be in accord with the established procedures of the Texas Annual Conference for pension billing.

Section IX. Intentional Interim Ministers

A. Settings for Intentional Interim Ministers

- 1. Sabbaticals
- 2. Health issues
- 3. Ministerial transitions, such as retirement, transfers, appointments to ministry of Superintendency
- 4. Death of a Pastor
- 5. Ending of the appointment of a beloved or long-tenured pastor
- 6. Traumatic departure of a Pastor
- 7. Unhealthy or conflicted congregation
- 8. Other factors that contribute to a disruption in congregational life

B. Compensation

- 1) A covenant for compensation will be signed at the initial meeting with the Pastor-Staff Relations.
- 2) The District Superintendent and the Center for Clergy Excellence will negotiate the compensation package and prepare the covenant to be signed.

- 3) Short Term Interim Ministers will be compensated at a level no less than the Conference Equitable Compensation.
- 4) Long Term Interim Ministers shall be compensated at a minimum level no less than the local congregation's pastoral compensation, but not less than the Conference Average Compensation.
 - a) If the local congregation's pastoral compensation is below the Conference Average Compensation, then the Sustentation Fund of the Texas Annual Conference will provide funding for the difference.
- 5) Housing will be considered as part of the compensation package, negotiated and included in the covenant.

Section X. 2023 Update from the Board of Pensions

1. UMPIP non-matching contribution remains set at 3% each year through 12/31/24

Due to the termination of the retiree medical benefit for those individuals who were age 55 or younger on January 1, 2017, and to assist under age 55 clergy to accumulate the assets necessary to provide for their own retiree medical coverage, the Board of Pensions instituted an additional 2% contribution to the UMPIP. The UMPIP contribution rate is 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves) and has been unchanged since January 1, 2018. The additional 2% contribution to UMPIP from pension reserves is reviewed on an annual basis. Due to the postponement of 2020 General Conference and the subsequent delay of the implementation of the proposed new Wespath Compass Pension Plan, the Board of Pensions is recommending the UMPIP contribution rate of 3% remain in place through 12/31/24. The UMPIP non-matching contribution rate, by year, since 2014:

- 2014 2% (1% paid by churches / 1% paid from pension reserves)
- 2015 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2016 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2017 2% (1% paid by churches / 1% paid from pension reserves)
- 2018 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2019 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2020 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2021 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2022 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2023 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)
- 2024 3% (1% paid by churches / 2% paid from pension reserves)

In addition to the UMPIP non-matching contribution, there is a matching contribution feature within the Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP). Clergy personal contributions to UMPIP are matched in an equal amount up to a maximum of 1% of plan compensation. The matching contribution is paid from the pension reserves and is deposited in the participant's CRSP DC account. In summary, a clergy participant making a 1% personal

contribution to UMPIP would accumulate church and pension reserve-paid contributions in 2023 and 2024 as follows:

The UMPIP non-matching contribution is unique to the Texas Conference. No other conference within the denomination offers such a pension benefit.

2. Retiree Medical HRA Contributions

Contributions to retiree participant HRAs continue to be funded by investment earnings in the Retiree Medical Fund.

3. Comprehensive Funding Plan

Beginning in 2013, annual conferences are required to submit a Comprehensive Funding Plan to Wespath. A Comprehensive Funding Plan is a formal plan that describes how a conference will pay for benefit programs, including those obligations that are dependent on the conference continuing its current benefit programs. The intent of the funding plan is to align benefit design expectations with Conference funding patterns. The plan to be submitted in 2023 will address benefit obligations for plan year 2024.

The development of a Comprehensive Funding Plan stems from the necessity to determine financial viability at the denominational level where benefit plan liabilities are concerned. Long-term financial obligations for the Church were discussed by the Council of Bishops, attendees of the Financial Leadership Forum, and the Sustainability Advisory Board. Wespath has been tasked with compiling conference information regarding funding for long-term obligations for clergy and staff across the denomination.

The timeline requires each conference to obtain a favorable opinion letter from Wespath and approval from its respective Annual Conference ahead of the plan's effective date (i.e., 1-1-24). As of the date of the Board of Pensions 2023 Pre-Conference Journal Report, the Comprehensive Funding Plan for the Texas Conference is presently in draft status. The Comprehensive Funding Plan for the Texas Conference will be submitted to Wespath prior

to May 1, 2023. The expectation is the receipt of a favorable opinion letter from Wespath and will be included in the 2023 Annual Conference journal.

Section XI. Review of Pension Reserve, Group Health Reserve and Retiree Medical Reserve

The Texas Annual Conference, UMC, benefits reserves are comprised of three separate reserve pools: (1) Pension Reserve; (2) Group Health Reserve; and (3) Retiree Medical Reserve. The benefits reserves exist to fund, as needed, plan costs related to pension, active medical and retiree medical programs as sponsored by the Texas Annual Conference. The benefit reserves are distinct from the Conference reserves disclosed within the fiscal operations of the Texas Annual Conference. Any use of the reserves, that deviate from costs related to Conference sponsored benefit programs must be approved by CF&A and subsequently the entire body of the Texas Annual Conference.

The market value of the reserves, as of 12-31-22, were as follows:

Pension Reserve \$ 39.262M
 Group Health Reserve \$ 9.863M
 Retiree Medical Reserve \$ 2.509M *

Included in the <u>Board of Pensions Report</u> to Annual Conference 2023 is the review of the Pension Reserve updated for actual 2022 experience. Included in this review is an overview of the resolutions relating to the administration and use of reserve funds. The standing resolutions are as follows:

WHEREAS, the 2007 resolution provided for a review of the "Pension Reserve" to be reported to Annual Conference in 2012,

WHEREAS, the Quadrennial review process determined a need to clarify the purposes and oversight of the "Pension Reserve" for future generations,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the "Pension Reserve" be administered by the Board of Pensions including the approval of any use of funds.

That the "Pension Reserve" be used as the account whereby "excess" pension funds (pension receipts *less* pension disbursements) are invested.

That the "Pension Reserve" be used to provide the following:

 Funding to meet increased costs of any defined benefit pension plan due to unfunded liabilities.

- Funding to meet the costs of retiree benefit obligations.
- Funding for pension related initiatives as approved annually by the Annual Conference.
- Funding to meet the costs of Conference Benefits Administration with the amount to be approved annually by the Annual Conference. *

^{*} Effective June 1, 2010, Conference Benefits Administration was approved to be funded via the Pension Reserve. This change was made to allow better utilization of current reserves and prevent future cost increases being passed on to the local congregations.

1. Review of 2022 Results

A. Financial Results for Active Group Health

During 2022, the Group Health Benefit Plan's operating deficit was \$2.6 million compared to a deficit of \$2.7 million in 2021. Over the 4-year period 2019 to 2022, Plan expenses have exceeded receipts by \$12.9 million. Investment income, over the same 4-year period, has been positive thus offsetting \$5.1 million of the \$12.9 million in net expenses.

In 2022, Plan expenses were \$14.9 million up from \$14.3 million in 2021 primarily due to higher prescription drug claims costs. However, a full year's worth of pharmacy rebates, received in 2022, exceeded the higher drug claims cost. The result was a slight overall decline in net expenses for the year. Investment returns in 2022 were -18.1% which resulted in a loss of \$2.7 million. The operating deficit of \$2.6 million, coupled with the investment loss of \$2.7 million, produced the year over year decline in the reserve position of \$5.3 million. As of December 31, 2022, reserves available for Active Group Health was \$9.9 million down from \$15.2 million as of December 31, 2021.

B. Financial Results for the Retiree Medical Plan

The Retiree Medical Plan at the close of 2022 was in a surplus position of \$2.5 million. During the year, negative investment performance eroded the Plan's funded status. Investment returns for the year were -18.0% thus producing losses of \$5.038 million. As a result, the funded ratio fell to 113% in 2022. At the close of 2022, \$1.065 million was withdrawn from the Retiree Medical Reserve to fund retiree HRA accounts.

2. 2023 Updates

A. Eliminate Group Health Apportionment by 2024

In 2020, approval was granted to eliminate Group Health apportionment receipts over a four-year period beginning in 2021. Outlined below, is the approved scheduled reduction in apportionment receipts whereby zero is reached in 2024:

2021 \$1,568,000 2022 \$1,068,000 2023 \$ 568,000 2024 \$ 0

In 2023 and 2024, the budget for Group Health apportionment receipts will be \$568,000 and \$0 respectively. The intent of the elimination of the Group Health apportionment funding is to fund 100% of monthly group health contributions through the existing monthly group health draft process (i.e., the existing Electronic Funds Transfer [EFT] presently used for monthly group health contributions). Beginning in 2024, church apportionment payments will no longer be used to fund the Group Health plan. Since historically Group Health apportionments have been assessed to all churches, including those with clergy who

are not eligible to participate in the Group Health plan, eliminating the Group Health apportionment and moving to a 100% EFT process over a four-year period will ensure that only churches and clergy participating in the Group Health plan will be paying for those benefits.

Following is the historical record of Group Health apportionment receipts since 2005. Actual and budgeted receipts are shown along with the percent of budgeted collected for the given year:

The Group Health Plan has been funded through four sources of receipts: church contributions, participant contributions, apportionment collections and investment returns. The elimination of apportionment receipts, as a component of Group Health Plan funding, removed a significant funding component of the Plan. To offset the annual losses of funding, the church contribution was increased effective January 1, 2021.

B. Increase in Church Contribution Rates Offset Loss of Apportionment Funding

The stair-stepped increase in the church contribution rate was enacted in 2021. In 2023 the church contribution rate is 11.20%. In 2024, the church contribution rate will increase to 12.50%. The impact stemming from the church contribution rates have been incorporated into the forecast for the years 2023 through 2024. The gradual increase in the rate was designed to offset the 4-year reduction in church apportionments. The change in the church contribution rates has been implemented as follows to correspond with the elimination of apportionment receipts from future Group Health Plan funding:

C. Post-Retirement Medical Liability and Future Funding Requirements

As of December 31, 2022, the estimated TAC Post-Retirement Medical Liability was \$19,308,200. This liability will be recalculated as of January 1, 2023, by external actuaries and will be provided to Annual Conference attendees. The estimated completion date for the next actuarial valuation is March 2023.

As addressed in Section 1.B., the funded ratio of the Postretirement Medical Liability is 113.0%. If the funded status for the Retiree Medical Plan remains in a surplus position, there will be no funding requirement on a go-forward basis.

D. Retiree Medical Subsidy Funding in 2023

Since 2020, the Retiree Medical Reserve has been used to fund all future Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA) contributions to retiree participant accounts. The intent is for the reserve balance to be maintained at a level whereby investment returns are ample in meeting the annual contributions made to retiree HRA accounts.

The flat rate contribution of \$190/month (\$2,280/year) per eligible Medicare primary participant (or the scheduled amount based on years of service for first TAC appointment on or after July 1, 2005) remains unchanged in 2023. The 2023 Retiree Medical Subsidy is estimated to be \$1,073,880. An estimated incremental \$5,520 will be paid to clergy who retired prior to 1992 (or to surviving spouses of retirees who retired prior to 1992). In total, the Retiree Medical Fund is expected to distribute \$1,079,400 to retiree participant HRA accounts in 2023.

E. Health Care Reform Reporting & Legislative Changes

The Center for Connectional Resources distributed form 1095B to all participants of the self-funded plan in February 2023 as required under ACA regulations.

F. Wellness Program

The Group Health Benefits Committee encourages all participants to take advantage of the TAC GHB Wellness Program. Participants can reduce their cost for the Group Health Benefits plan by earning cash incentives (up to \$300 annually in the Walking Program, up to \$1,000 for losing the weight to reach a BMI of 25 or less, and \$1,000 annually for maintaining a BMI of 25 or less). The Group Health Plan paid out Wellness and (or) Virgin Pulse walking incentives totaling \$152,889 in 2022.

2023 Group Health Contribution Rates

Change in the 2023 Church Group Health Contribution Rate

The Church Group Health Benefits contribution rate will increase from 9.8% in 2022 to 11.2% of the clergy's Total Group Health Benefits Compensation as specified on the clergy's salary sheet for 2023.

This increase in the Church Group Health Benefits contribution rate is being made to offset a further reduction in the Group Health Benefits (GHB) apportionment as part of a preapproved 4-year plan to eliminate the total \$2M GHB apportionment by January 1, 2024, and replace it with 100% monthly direct billing (EFT). The GHB apportionment was reduced by \$500,000 in 2021 and \$1M in 2022 and will be reduced by \$1.5M in 2023 and \$2M in 2024 to a \$0 GHB apportionment as of 1/1/2024.

No Change in 2023 Clergy Group Health Contribution Rates

Clergy Group Health contribution rates will remain the same in 2023 as they were in 2022 for both the Standard PPO and the High Deductible PPO Plans as specified below. The following percentages are applied to the clergy's Total Group Health Benefits Compensation as specified on the clergy's salary sheet. High Deductible PPO Plan and a Health Savings Account

Enrollment in the High Deductible PPO Plan allows you to set up a tax-advantaged Health Savings Account (HSA) to help pay for eligible healthcare expenses today and down the road. Funds in the HSA account can be used to pay for your deductible and any eligible medical expense, even if the expense is not covered by the medical plan. Eligible dental and vision expenses may be reimbursed through an HSA account as well.

Your HSA contributions accumulate in your account, earning interest, until you need them. The funds contributed to the account are not subject to federal income tax, thus reducing your taxable income, and interest you earn on your HSA balance is tax-free. Unused HSA funds roll over from year-to-year, allowing your balance to grow over time.

An HSA is opened like a typical bank account at your preferred bank or financial institution. Another option is to use the online HSA Bank. Go to https://ioe.hsabank.com/home for further information. HSA Bank provides you with a debit card to use when paying for qualified healthcare expenses. You can deposit one lump sum for the year (up to the IRS

contribution limit) or make smaller deposits throughout the year. Additional information can be found in the brochure in this packet.

Note: You cannot be enrolled in Medicare or Tricare and make contributions to an HSA. Also, the Houston Methodist Hospital write-off of deductibles and co-insurance is not available to TAC High Deductible Health Plan participants due to HSA rules.

Optional Dental/Vision Plans

The Texas Annual Conference Group Health Benefits Plan will continue to offer optional **Dental PPO** and **Vision** Coverage through **Humana in 2023**:

Following are the eligibility requirements to enroll in optional dental and or vision coverage:

- 1. Employee must be a participant of the Group Health Benefits Plan of the Texas Annual Conference. Eligible dependents do not have to participate in the medical plan to participate in the TAC Dental PPO and/or Vision plans.
- 2. Your salary-paying unit (e.g., your local church) will be drafted for your optional dental/vision coverage along with your medical contributions each month.

There are no increases in the Humana Dental PPO rates or Humana Vision Plan rates for 2023:

H. Effective 1/1/2024, Marriage and Family Counseling Added as a Covered Benefit under both TAC Medical Plans – 1/1/2024 Termination of the Supplemental Counseling Benefit

The TAC Standard PPO and High Deductible PPO Medical Plans provide unlimited mental health visits in a calendar year for treatment of covered mental health issues. However, marriage and family counseling have not been a covered benefit under either the TAC Standard PPO or High Deductible PPO Medical Plans since marriage and family counseling typically are not covered by most medical plans.

Currently, marriage and family counseling are provided as follows:

- Employee Assistance Plan (EAP) The EAP, through Aetna Resources for Living, provides up to 6 counseling visits per issue per calendar year to all TAC active clergy and dependents, including clergy who are not enrolled in the TAC Group Health Benefits Plan. Marriage and family counseling are covered.
- Supplemental Counseling Benefit Provides up to 50 counseling visits in a calendar year to participants in the TAC Standard PPO Plan only with a \$25 copay and a \$95 plan payment. Charges more than \$120 are the responsibility of the participant. Available to use with appropriately licensed out-of-network mental health providers. Marriage and family counseling are covered.

Originally, the Supplemental Counseling Benefit was intended to be offered to participants enrolled in the TAC High Deductible PPO Medical Plan as well as the Standard PPO Medical Plan. However, one of the primary benefits of enrolling in a high deductible plan is to be able to make tax-free contributions into a Health Savings Account (HSA) up to the annual HSA contribution limits. For a high deductible plan to be qualified for participants to make tax-free HSA contributions, IRS rules require that high deductible plan participants must pay their full annual deductible out-of-pocket before receiving any "substantial" benefits under the plan, except for their annual Wellness exams which are covered prior to meeting the annual deductible.

Since the Supplemental Counseling Benefit provides up to 50 counseling visits in a calendar year, a "substantial" medical benefit is provided without having to first meet the participant's annual deductible. As a result, the Supplemental Counseling Benefit cannot be offered to TAC High Deductible PPO Plan participants for the plan to remain HSA-qualified.

To provide marriage and family counseling to participants in both TAC medical plans, effective 1/1/2024, unlimited marriage and family counseling visits will be added as a covered benefit under both the Standard PPO and High Deductible PPO Plans. The current Supplemental Counseling Benefit will be terminated effective 1/1/2024 since it will be replaced by the new marriage and family counseling benefit provided under both medical plans.

Effective 1/1/2024, cost sharing for *all mental health counseling visits* (including but not limited to marriage and family counseling) will be as follows:

• Standard PPO Plan

- There will be a **\$25** copay for all in-network mental health counseling visits (including marriage and family counseling) under the Standard PPO Plan.
- Out-of-network mental health counseling visits (including marriage and family counseling) will be subject to applicable Standard PPO Plan out-ofnetwork deductibles and co-insurance.

• High Deductible PPO Plan

 All mental health counseling visits (including marriage and family counseling) will be subject to in-network and out-of-network deductibles and coinsurance as applicable under the High Deductible PPO Plan.

Other mental health (non-counseling) office visits as well as all other mental health benefits under both the Standard PPO and High Deductible PPO Plans will be subject to applicable Standard PPO and High Deductible PPO Plan cost sharing (copays, deductibles, and coinsurance).

I. Effective 1/1/2024, Hearing Aids Added as a Covered Benefit under both TAC Medical Plans – 1/1/2024 Termination of the Hearing Aid Out-of-Pocket Reimbursement Benefit

The TAC currently provides a Hearing Aid Out-of-Pocket Reimbursement Benefit to Active Clergy and TAC Fiscal Office Lay Employees enrolled in the TAC GHB Plan for hearing aid(s) once every three years for each ear if required (dependents and retirees are not eligible). Eligible hearing aid expenses are reimbursed after payment of a \$250 co-pay on the first \$2,500 of total eligible expenses, including hearing exam and hearing aid(s). The participant pays a 10% co-insurance for eligible expenses that exceed \$2,500. The calendar year deductible applicable to the participant's PPO plan does not apply to this Hearing Aid Out-of-Pocket Reimbursement Benefit.

Effective 1/1/2024, the current Hearing Aid Out-of-Pocket Reimbursement Benefit will be terminated.

Effective 1/1/2024, hearing aids will be a covered benefit available to Active Clergy and TAC Fiscal Office Lay Employees and dependents as well as under age 65 Early Retirees and dependents enrolled in the TAC Standard PPO and High Deductible PPO Plans. Hearing aid(s) will be covered once every three years for each ear if required. Applicable Standard PPO and High Deductible PPO Plan in-network and out-of-network deductibles, coinsurance and maximum out-of-pocket expense limits will apply.

Covered benefits include:

- 1) a hearing aid instrument, monaural or binaural, including ear mold(s).
- 2) visit for fitting, counseling, and adjustments;
- 3) the initial battery;
- 4) cords;
- 5) other ancillary equipment.

The following are not covered:

1) purchase of batteries or other ancillary equipment except those covered under the terms of the initial hearing aid purchase;

- 2) charges for a hearing aid that exceed the specifications prescribed for correction of a hearing loss;
- 3) replacement parts for hearing aids, repair of a hearing aid after the covered warranty period, and replacement of a hearing aid more than once in any 36-month period;
- 4) surgically implanted hearing devices.

3. Operating Deficits & Continual Decline in Active Medical Plan Reserves


A. Actual Performance 2013 - 2022

Since 2015, the Plan has been operating in a deficit position meaning plan disbursements have exceeded plan receipts. During the ten-year period, 2013 – 2022, plan disbursements have exceeded plan receipts by \$14.4 million. The \$14.4 million of incremental expense has been funded by investment returns and plan reserves. Investment gains and plan reserves have covered \$10.6 million and \$3.8 million of the \$14.4 million deficit respectively.


B. Actual Plan Receipts and Plan Disbursements 2013 - 2022

Plan year 2022 marked the 8th consecutive year where disbursements have exceeded receipts. Since 2018, the average annual operating deficit has been \$2.75 million. The largest deficit was in 2020 where expenses exceeded receipts by \$4.0 million. In the graph below, receipts are shaded in green, and disbursements are shaded in red:



C. Actual Plan Reserve Levels 2013 - 2022

Plan reserves reached a peak of \$19.8 million in 2017. Over the next five plan years (2018 – 2022), the reserve declined by 50% thus ending 2022 with a reserve balance of \$9.9 million. During this five-year period, plan disbursements exceeded plan receipts by \$13.8 million. Positive investment returns of \$3.8 million offset a portion of the \$13.8 million deficit. The remaining balance of the deficit was covered by the release of reserves.



D. Projected Performance 2023 - 2025

Disaffiliation in 2022 has resulted in a decline in the number of covered participants as of January 1, 2023. Plan participation has declined from 524 actives to 317 actives (does not include covered dependents). The reduction in the plan population will reduce plan expenses whereby operating deficits are projected to decline to \$0.8 million and \$1.5 million in 2023 and 2024 respectively. However, expenses are expected to continue to outpace receipts in 2023 and beyond. As of the close of 2024 and 2025, the reserve fund is expected to approach \$8.4 million and \$7.2 million respectively.

4. Recommended Changes to the Active Group Health Plan

In 2022, The Group Health Benefits Committee directed the Center for Connectional Resources Benefits Staff in conjunction with the TAC Benefits Consultants, Alera Group, to research and present proposals for alternatives to the current self-funded Active GHB plan to the Committee for future consideration.

A. Group Health Plan to Remain Self-insured for 2024

Analysis was conducted to determine plan viability under the following design options: (1) remaining self-insured; or (2) remaining self-insured with revised premium rates paid by participants and churches; or (3) outsource to a fully insured plan model. Based on analysis and requests for proposals from 3rd party insurers, the Group Health Benefits Committee recommends continuing to operate the Group Health Plan through the existing self-insured model, as remaining self-insured resulted in significant savings over the fully insured proposals received.

B. Close Operating Deficits (i.e., the expense gap) by Increasing Plan Receipts

2024 – Increase participant paid premiums.

To eliminate the GHB operating deficit, participant paid premiums and church billing rates will be increased in 2024 and 2025 respectively. Historically, participant paid premiums (based on clergy billing rates) have been heavily subsidized for dependent coverage. Effective 1-1-2024, clergy billing rates will be adjusted whereby a greater portion of actual

expenses are covered via premium collections for dependent coverage in the plan. In addition, direct billing rates for laity, early retiree, surviving spouse, dependents of Medicare eligible participants and long-term disabled will be adjusted upwards accordingly.

Proposed increases to align dependent rates with industry norms for dependent coverage were considered in 2020 but were delayed due to the unprecedent impact resulting from the COVID pandemic in 2020 and 2021. Rate increases for dependent coverage were once again examined in 2022 but were delayed due to the uncertainty surrounding the disaffiliation process.

The increases in the clergy billing rate and the direct billing rates for all other classes of plan participants is expected to recover roughly \$1 million of the forecasted \$1.5 million operating deficit in 2024.

2025 – Increase the church billing rate to 14.5%.

Effective 1-1-25, the church billing rate will be increased from 12.5% to 14.5%. The increase in the church billing rate to 14.5% is expected to recover the remaining \$0.5 million of the forecasted operating deficit in 2025.

Plan receipts to remain on par with plan disbursements.

On a go-forward basis, participant paid premiums and church billing rates will be reviewed annually to ensure plan receipts remain on par with plan disbursements. Plan reserves and investment returns are available to offset unforeseen claims costs outside of expected year over year increases. Plan reserves and investment returns are no longer anticipated to be a major component of plan funding in future years.

5. Revised Billing Rates, Average Paid Premiums and Participant Share of Costs

A. Billing Rates and Average Paid Premiums 2023 vs. 2024

Billing rates and the average **monthly** premium paid (based on average GHB compensation of \$95,992) for 2023 and 2024 are outlined in the table below. Please note, the 2024 premiums are calculated using the revised rates.

Sample premium amounts below are based TAC average 2023 GHB compensation of \$95,992.

6. Active Medical Plan Forecast

The increase in the participant paid premiums in 2024, via revised clergy rates and revised direct billing rates for all other participant categories, and the increase in the church contribution rate to 14.50% in 2025 have been incorporated into the forecast for the years 2024 through 2025. As a result, the operating deficits for 2023, 2024 and 2025 are projected to be \$1.4 million, \$0.5 million, and \$0.0 million, respectively.

As referenced in section 4B. of the report, the changes in the clergy billing rates, changes in the direct billing rates for all other participant categories, and the increase in the church contribution rate in 2025, were instituted to bring plan receipts in line with plan disbursements. As reflected in the forecast, the positive impacts on operating performance are highlighted in green. As of the close of 2025, the goal is to no longer be dependent on the liquidation of plan reserves and investment returns to close the expense gaps that have been common in this plan.

7. Future Active GHB Plan Considerations

As indicated in previous reports, multiple factors have contributed to TAC GHB Plan operating deficits over the past several years, including the higher than average age of clergy and the increase in health care costs associated with an older population; high levels of stress associated with active ministry; the prevalence of chronic conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, and coronary artery disease; and gaps in self-care with regards to medication management and participation in disease management programs. The Group Health Benefits Committee recognizes that a comprehensive, long-term solution is needed to address these issues to provide a sustainable GHB plan in the future for TAC active clergy and families.

Accordingly, the Group Health Benefits Committee has directed the Center for Connectional Resources Benefits Staff in conjunction with the TAC Benefits Consultants, Alera Group, to research and present proposals for alternatives to Boon-Chapman, the current TAC GHB Plan Third Party Administrator (TPA). A change in the TPA is sought to provide a higher level of customer service, claims processing and administrative efficiencies to active TAC GHB Plan participants, as well as evaluate other health care options such as Care Navigation/Coordination, Centers of Excellence, Condition-Specific Point Solutions, and

alternative Disease Management and Wellness Programs, with the goal of providing both improved health outcomes for participants as well as long-term mitigation of increasing health care costs.

Proposals for a new TPA will be considered during the 2nd and 3rd quarters of 2023. If warranted, a new TPA will be announced during the open enrollment period for the 2024 plan year. Any change in the TPA will be accompanied by investments in health care solutions, managed within the new TPA contract, aimed at utilizing health care resources most effectively to enhance member engagement and improve participant health outcomes, thereby reducing claims costs over time.

8. Retiree Medical Plan Forecast

The retiree medical plan surplus is projected to grow to 117.9% in 2023; 123.3% in 2024; and 129.2% in 2025. The reserve balances are expected to produce investment returns of 5% thus maintaining levels ample in meeting the annual funding of retiree HRAs. The 2023 – 2025 forecast for the retiree medical plan is reflected in the chart below. The forecast does not comprehend future design changes being contemplated as of the writing of this report.

9. Eligible Active GHB Participant Settlement Payout in lieu of Retiree Medical Subsidy Benefit

(TAC GHB Retiree Health Benefits Policy 130)

The Texas Annual Conference (TAC) has provided a Retiree Medical Subsidy to assist retired clergy and their spouses or surviving spouses who are Medicare Primary with the cost of their health care in retirement. The basic subsidy is \$190 per person per month, or \$2,280 per year. Prior to January 1, 2018, the Retiree Medical Subsidy was used to reduce the amount charged retirees each month for their coverage in the TAC Retiree Group Health Plans.

Effective January 1, 2018, the Retiree Medical Subsidy has been provided to eligible Medicare Primary retirees, spouses and surviving spouses through a tax-free Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA) Account administered through Via Benefits (previously named OneExchange).

Since the inception of the policy, the TAC GHB Policy 130 Retiree Health Benefits has provided retiree health benefits to eligible TAC retired clergy, spouses and surviving spouses who meet the eligibility criteria as specified in the eligibility provisions of the policy. This is not nor has it been an entitlement or guaranteed benefit as specified on page 6 of the policy, but rather a gift that the TAC has provided to TAC retired clergy to assist with the cost of their health care in retirement.

TAC GHB Policy 130 has been amended as needed by the TAC Group Health Benefits Committee with the approval of the Board of Pensions and with the concurrence of Annual Conference. Prior to 1/1/2017, all active TAC clergy enrolled in the TAC GHB Plan could receive the Retiree Medical Subsidy Benefit at retirement if otherwise eligible; at the time the liability to the TAC was approximately \$24 million which was unsustainable. As a result, Policy 130 was amended effective 1/1/2017 so that only clergy who were 55 years or older as of 1/1/2017 (born prior to 1/1/1962) would be eligible to receive the Retiree Medical Subsidy at retirement. That eliminated approximately half of all active TAC clergy, along with all new hires on or after 1/1/2017, from receiving the Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding) as future retirees.

As of January 1, 2023, there are 475 Medicare eligible individuals (TAC retirees, spouses and surviving spouses) receiving the TAC Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding through Via Benefits). There are currently 56 active clergy and 38 spouse dependents in the active TAC GHB Plan who would be eligible for the TAC Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding through Via Benefits) upon their future retirement date.

The Group Health Benefits Committee is recommending a settlement plan whereby active clergy and spouses currently eligible for the TAC Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding) at a future retirement date (currently 56 clergy + 38 spouses) would receive a lump-sum payment in lieu of receiving the TAC Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding through Via

Benefits) at retirement. The lump-sum payment would be made to eligible individuals as of January 1, 2024.

An external actuarial firm, Aon, has determined the aggregate costs of the settlement plan. The costs of the program represent the sum of all payments calculated on a specific eligible individual basis. The total is used to determine a uniform amount that will be paid to each qualified individual. Each eligible individual will receive a payment of \$24,000.00. An eligible couple will receive twice the lump-sum payment of a single eligible individual. The lump-sum payment will be reduced by service percentage for those whose first appointment was on or after July 1, 2005.

The lump sum payment will be considered taxable income for the 2024 tax year. The Conference will gross-up the amount using a rate of 20.0% to cover the tax incurred on the payment. A lump sum payment of \$24,000.00 will be paid out in the amount of \$30,000.00 (\$24,000.00 + 20% gross up). The total lump sum amount for 56 eligible clergy (along with 38 eligible spouses) is \$2,011,200 or \$2,514,000 with the 20% tax gross up. The Retiree Medical Reserve will be the source of funds used to make the payments.

All TAC retirees, spouses and surviving spouses eligible for and receiving the TAC Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding through Via Benefits) prior to 1/1/2024 would continue to receive their Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding) and would not be eligible for or affected by the settlement payout to eligible active TAC GHB clergy and spouses. This would limit eligibility for the TAC Retiree Medical Subsidy (HRA funding through Via Benefits) to current participants as of 1/1/2024.

Once the lump-sum distributions are made to those eligible individuals, the retiree medical benefit (i.e., contribution to HRA account) would be closed to new participants. The plan closure shortens the duration of the existing accrued benefit liability. Benefits of the lump-sum payout to eligible recipients are as follows:

- Cash payment is not limited to reimbursement of health care expenses. Recipients have the flexibility to utilize funds as desired.
- Cash payment is available for immediate investment and future returns.
- Taxes associated with distribution are mitigated by the 20% gross up applied towards the payment.

10. Summary of Active Group Health Plan Status and Forthcoming Changes (see report section)

Present Status

- Plan year 2022 was the 8th consecutive year where disbursements have exceeded receipts. (3A)
- Since 2018, the average annual operating deficit has been \$2.75 million. (3B)
- Largest deficit was in 2020 where expenses exceeded receipts by \$4.0 million. (3B)
- During the period 2018 2022, plan reserves declined by 50% and plan disbursements exceeded plan receipts by \$13.8 million thus resulting in a 50% decline in reserve levels. (3C)
- Ending reserve balance for 2022 was \$9.9 million, down from \$19.8 million in 2017.
 (3C)

Plan Changes Considered (section 4A)

- The Group Health Benefits Committee considered moving the TAC Group Health
 Plan from its existing self-insured arrangement to a fully insured arrangement with a
 3rd party insurance company.
- Committee evaluated various plan designs with Wespath's Healthflex fully insured plan and an outsourced model with Blue Cross Blue Shield.
- In all cases, the costs would be greater under a fully insured arrangement.
- Committee recommended to continue to operate the Group Health Plan through the existing self-insured model.

Align Plan Receipts with Plan Expenses - Close Operating Deficits by Increasing Plan Receipts (section 4B)

2024

- Clergy billing rates increased so that a greater portion of actual expenses are covered via premium collections for dependent coverage in the plan.
- Direct billing rates for laity, early retiree, surviving spouse, dependents of Medicare eligible participants and long-term disabled will be increased accordingly.
- Increases in the clergy billing rate and the direct billing rates for all other classes of plan participants is expected to recover roughly \$1 million of the forecasted \$1.5 million operating deficit.

2025

- Church billing rate will be increased from 12.5% to 14.5%.
- Increase in the church billing rate to 14.5% is expected to recover the remaining \$0.5 million of the forecasted operating deficit.

Implement Solutions to Control Claims Costs (section 7)

11. Items Requiring a Vote

A. Marriage and Family Counseling

- Effective 1/1/2024, add marriage and family counseling as a covered benefit under both TAC Medical Plans
- Effective 1/1/2024, terminate the Supplemental Counseling Benefit

B. Hearing Aids

- Effective 1/1/2024, add hearing aids as a covered benefit under both TAC Medical Plans
- Effective 1/1/2024, terminate the Hearing Aid Out-of-Pocket Reimbursement Benefit

C. Increase Plan Receipts via Billing Rate Adjustments

- Increase participant-paid premiums effective January 1, 2024 (detail of rate changes are included in Addendum D).
- Change the Church contribution rate to 14.50% for 2025 (increase from 12.50% in 2024)

D. Eligible Active GHB Participant Settlement Payout In lieu of Retiree Medical Subsidy Benefit

(TAC GHB Retiree Health Benefits Policy 130)

• A lump-sum payment is made to qualified individuals in lieu of the retiree medical benefits received in retirement.

All invested funds reflect the Social Investment Guidelines as provided for by Wespath and follows the Investment Policy Statement adopted by both the Group Health Benefits Committee and the Board of Pensions.

All reserves are invested according to the Investment Policy Statement (IPS) under the supervision of the Investment Committee. The Group Health Benefits Committee with the concurrence of the Board of Pensions and CF&A and the approval of Annual Conference has complete discretion regarding how these funds will be utilized. While budgeted (forecasted) amounts are anticipated to be accurate, the Group Health Benefits Committee reserves the right to spend part of their reserves in the provision of budgeted programs in the event revenues decrease or expenses escalate. The Group Health Benefits Committee is a subcommittee of the Board of Pensions which according to the Discipline has over-all

responsibility for the funding (in conjunction with CF&A) and provision of both pension and health care benefits to clergy.

The Group Health Benefits Plan has a self-insured PPO and a self-insured prescription drug plan which covers clergy and laity. Retirees and surviving spouses over the age of 65 who meet the eligibility requirements are provided a contribution toward the cost of their medical insurance as provided for in Group Health Benefits Policy 130. The Group Health Benefits Plan is not a form of entitlement, and it should be noted that the Group Health Benefits Committee under the direction of and subject to the approval of the Board of Pensions, with the concurrence of Annual Conference, reserves the right to amend or possibly eliminate both the active and retiree benefits.

Joint Committee on Medical Leave

The Joint Committee on Medical Leave in conjunction with the Cabinet approves medical leave for clergy members of the conference who are unable to perform their ministerial work due to health matters and disabling conditions.

The committee considers each case anonymously. If approved for medical leave, the clergy person receives short-term or long-term medical leave benefits as eligible when unable to work because of a health issue or disability.

Archives & History

Rev. Bill Hedges, Archivist

The Archives Center was built in 2017 after the closure of the Dornbush Historical Library at Lon Morris College in Jacksonville, Texas. It is located at the junction of State Highway 105 East and Loop North 336E in Conroe, Texas and shares the campus with the Texas Annual Conference Mission Center (Depot).

The Archives Center is the depository of the records of the Texas Annual Conference and its predecessors since 1840 as well as articles, books and documents pertaining to the South-Central Jurisdiction and General Conference of the United Methodist Church. We are governed by the Director of Connectional Resources in Houston and the Commission on Archives and History.

Within our collection one can find copies of the Disciplines, the General Minutes of the Methodist Church, the Annual Journals of the East Texas, Texas and Trinity Conferences since 1840 to the present, District records, copies of Local Church historical records and books on Methodist history.

We follow the guidelines of the General Commission on Archives and History in Madison, N.J. for our collection in the receiving, accessing, cataloging and disposal, if need be, of materials sent to us. We cooperate with historians and archivists in other Annual Conferences by sharing data that might be of value to them.

Of special note are the "Finding Aids" listing the data collected, such as when the churches and districts were first organized, when and where the bishops held the Conferences and the clergy who were appointed by them. The Archives Centers maintains a list of clergy who served in the Texas Annual Conference since 1840. Using the data from the Journal we can also offer a list of pastors who have served a given church or circuit.

The input received by the Committee was invaluable and welcomed tools in the preparation of our report.

Committee on Episcopal Residence

The Episcopal residence is well maintained and meets the needs of Bishop Cynthia Fiero Harvey and her family. The residence is assessed and maintained by the Texas Conference Board of Trustees and the Council on Finance and Administration who keep it in excellent repair. Prior to Bishop Harvey and Dean moving into the residence in late 2022, all the interior walls were painted, the exterior was power washed and painted in some areas, the garage was painted, the HVAC system was checked and filters replaced, several lights were repaired and updated, the Ice Maker and Kitchen Vent were replaced, the water heater was repaired, Internet access was updated, a window was repaired, landscaping was updated,

and the entire house was professionally cleaned. The episcopal residence is a beautiful home for our episcopal leader and is located close to the offices of the Texas Annual Conference.

The Center for Connectional Resources would like to express its gratitude to Hal Sharp, Chair of the Board of Trustees, and all who work so faithfully to care for our Episcopal residence.

Safe Sanctuary Committee

Rev. Reagan Seaton, Chairperson

Our Safe Sanctuary Committee started in 2021 with 3 goals for this quadrennium: first, to rewrite the Conference Safe Sanctuary policy and provide quality examples to churches of all sizes; second, to investigate and find the best background check software that meets the needs of the conference and churches; and third, to provide training in writing a safe sanctuary policy, running background checks, and training youth, adults, and children around safe sanctuary.

First, we are almost done with the new Safe Sanctuary Policy for the Conference. We plan to have that ready for everyone by the Summer of 2023. We also have been working to have sample policies for churches of different sizes. Those should be on our conference website by Annual Conference 2023. As a reminder, we are asking every church to turn in their Safe Sanctuary Policy during Charge Conference of 2023. Please make sure you are looking these over and have them ready for the Fall.

Second, we have done thorough research on background check companies. Due to our size, the number of users, and the number of background checks we run, we have not found a company that can meet our needs without causing exuberant costs to the Annual Conference and local churches. We will continue to look for new companies but for the time being there will be no change to our background check company.

Finally, due to disaffiliation, we will be pushing back our training around Safe Sanctuary. Our priority will be to develop the training to write a safe sanctuary policy. Then we will work on running background checks, and training youth, adults, and children around safe sanctuary.

As we work through these three areas, we will update the conference website to reflect more information. We want churches and pastors to have the resources to truly make churches and ministries safe for all people. Thank you in advance for your support in this call to holy living.

Presently, there are no Safe Sanctuary actions that require a vote.

Houston Methodist broke ground on its seventh community hospital, which will serve the fast-growing Cypress area, in spring 2022. Houston Methodist is primarily affiliated with Weill Cornell Medicine and NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital, two of the nation's leading centers for clinical care. Houston Methodist also has affiliations with Texas A&M Health Science Center and the University of Houston. Houston Methodist leverages these affiliations to take on the toughest challenges in medicine to pioneer better treatments and provide high-quality patient care and cutting-edge research.

Houston Methodist Hospital, the flagship hospital of Houston Methodist, is located in the Texas Medical Center. For more than 100 years, Houston Methodist Hospital has served the Houston community and the world with the highest-quality patient care in a cost-effective, spiritual environment. Six of the ranked specialties appear in the top 20, and two were ranked in the top 10. Among its community hospitals, Houston Methodist Sugar Land was ranked No. 5 in Houston and No. 9 in Texas.


Houston Methodist continued to also treat COVID-19 patients along with non-COVID-19 patients in 2022. It has been a true leader on all fronts of battling this virus. Since the beginning of the pandemic in March 2020, the system has treated more than 38,000 COVID-19 inpatients. Physicians, nurses and staff have worked tirelessly through five different surges of COVID-19 patients. It's no wonder our hospitals continue to be recognized as some of the best in the country and our admission numbers have been strong.

In 2022, Houston Methodist Hospital and all six of our community hospitals were all recognized as top performers in the Bernard A. Birnbaum, MD, Quality Leadership annual rankings from Vizient. The top performer designation recognizes hospitals in different categories that demonstrate excellence in delivering high-quality care based on measures in the Vizient Quality and Accountability ranking system. All seven Houston Methodist hospitals also received an "A" Leapfrog Hospital Safety Grade in 2022. The Leapfrog Hospital Safety Grade is the only hospital rating focused exclusively on hospital safety. The safety grade provides consumers with critical information on how likely they are to experience accidents, injuries, errors or harm while in the hospital.

Justice For All Immigrants (JFAI)

Justice for all Immigrants welcomed 480 new clients from 36 different countries in 2022, including many newcomers from Afghanistan, Venezuela, Cuba, and the Ukraine. JFAI managed 1,300 cases in 2022 including: 638 advice and counsel, 218 work authorization, 46 citizenship, 213 escaping violence, and 185 family reunification cases. Additionally, JFAI participated in 35 outreach events including asylum workshops, panels and presentations, community consultations, and immigration 101 trainings. We expanded our services and opened offices in San Antonio and Corpus Christi, Texas, and staff members attended national training conferences in Baltimore and New York City.



Client Profile

Emmanuel was born in Liberia, and entered the United States in 1998 on a student visa. He was a victim of the Liberian Civil War, and became an orphan as a child and took refuge in another country. When he came to the United States, his host family consulted with an attorney who advised keeping Emmanuel on a student visa until he finished graduate school

in 2014. After one year of being in the United States, Emmanuel was deprived of the opportunity to apply for asylum, even though he would have likely won his case. After his student visa expired, Emmanuel applied for Temporary Protected Status (TPS), and later he was eventually able to get his residency (green card) through a rare immigration program called the Liberian Refugee Immigration Fairness (LRIF). Ultimately, the program allowed Emmanuel to fast track to becoming a U.S. citizen, and on January 6, 2023, he took the Oath of Allegiance to the United States after being in the country for nearly 25 years.



2023 Projects & Goals

- JFAI plans to expand its Asylum Project to provide immigration legal services to individuals and families seeking asylum. The Asylum Project is currently supported by the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and the Houston Immigration Legal Services Collaborative (HILSC).
- JFAI returned to in-person legal clinics at St. Luke's UMC Gethsemane Campus. The legal clinics are held once a month.
- JFAI initiated a new Refugee Assistance Legal Clinic, also at St. Luke's UMC Gethsemane Campus. This clinic will serve the specific legal needs of refugees in the Gulfton and Sharpstown neighborhoods.

Greetings from Methodist Children's Home (MCH) and the more than 10,000 children, youth and families we serve each year. We appreciate your continued friendship through the Texas Annual Conference. In light of changes occurring in the church, and as an independent 501c3 organization, your continued voluntary support of our vision to empower all we serve to experience life to the fullest is as important as ever.

I invite each of you to visit our website at MCH.org. There you can download stories, identify resources, view a transparent listing of our financial resources and services delivered, find out how to refer a child for placement, or learn more about a call to join our ministry.

Your support provides the resources needed to offer the care, programs and talented individuals needed to positively impact the lives of those we serve through residential care on the Waco campus and Boys Ranch and through 14 MCH Family Outreach offices, including Bryan/College Station, Houston and Tyler in the Texas Conference.

We are now in our 133rd year serving children, youth and families. Here are a few highlights of the past year:

- The MCH Board of Directors unanimously approved a proposal to begin a master planning process for the MCH Boys Ranch. This includes expansion of programs and examining how MCH can be even more effective in meeting the needs of children through residential placement.
- For the 10th consecutive time since 1986, MCH earned national reaccreditation from the Council on Accreditation (COA). MCH was evaluated on more than 800 standards, which examined all areas of our operations.
- Secured multiple million-dollar gifts for the Stone and Harris Homes on the Waco campus, and construction is underway. These new homes are the 10th and 11th new additions and complete Phase 4 of the multiyear Building Hope Capital Campaign.
- Raised more than \$900,000 in support of the launch of the 14th MCH Family Outreach office, which will be located in the Permian Basin and open in 2023.
- Strengthened the "Together We Flourish" initiative designed to maximize and steward our resources for ministry through collective impact, generosity and support in order to achieve the MCH vision and mission in a greater way. This initiative guides us as we seek out collaborations with other organizations and strengthen the cohesion between our ministry programs.
- MCH leadership attended the 2022 United Methodist Association (UMA) Conference in Savannah, Georgia. President and CEO Trey Oakley, Vice President for Programs Traci Wagner, and Community Engagement and Training Specialist John Warren presented at the conference.

- Launched a new Emergent Services program with MCH Family Outreach. Emergent Services allows staff to offer referral consultation, assistance and support in an efficient and impactful manner.
- Strengthened our partnership with the Fostering Collective in Tyler, which consists of more than 40 East Texas agencies, churches and groups that serve families. We also hosted one of the Collective's monthly prayer meetings at our Family Outreach office in Tyler.
- Launched a pilot program to provide free professional counseling services for individuals and families. The program is initially being offered through the MCH Family Outreach offices in Abilene and Waco, with hopes of expanding to other MCH Family Outreach locations.
- MCH recognized Stephanie Cummings, residential supervisor on the Waco campus, who received the award for "General Residential Operation Staff of the Year" from the Texas Alliance of Child and Family Services. She was later recognized at the TACFS Administrators Conference.
- Children, youth and families enjoyed fun summer activities across our residential and Family Outreach programs. Youth participated in faith formation camps, volunteer opportunities and service-based mission trips.
- The MCH football team was named Texas Private School of the Week by Dave Campbell's Texas Football. The Bulldogs were recognized for their 46-40 win against state champion Wylie Prep in Week 3.
- Dedicated the Florence C. Howard Prayer Labyrinth on the Waco campus. The prayer labyrinth is a space for outdoor worship, personal spiritual growth and contemplation.

Our achievements in the past and those yet to come are directly related to the many individuals and congregations throughout our service area, including the Texas Annual Conference, who support our work and ministry through financial gifts, prayers, advocacy and service on the Board of Directors. - 4. Strengthen MRC's advocacy and community engagement initiatives.

Action plans for each of these initiatives will lead us to reach and engage more older adults with diverse services and a purpose driven work force.

The MRC Family

MRC has grown to a system with assets of over \$430 million and an annual operating budget of \$110 million. Every day, approximately 2,075 people are being served on our 13 campuses. We continue to serve residents in many settings, with a focus on providing each person an opportunity to enjoy life through engagement and meaningful relationships.

- Independent Living homes and apartments, at a wide range of price points, offer a variety of programs, activities and services.
 - Some are HUD subsidized for those with restricted income levels.
 - Some are rentals for those with limited assets.
 - Some have mostly refundable entry fees for those planning for all future possibilities while preserving their estate.
- Assisted Living apartments for those seeking three meals a day and help with various activities of daily living such as bathing, medication monitoring, toileting, dressing, eating and other activities.
- Memory Support suites for those with forgetfulness where specialized programs and activities are available to assist with specific needs and to facilitate dignified living.
- o Long-term Skilled Nursing units for those needing 24/7 nursing care.
- Short-term rehabilitation units for those needing an optimal place for recovery, or even preparation ahead of a needed surgery.
- Home Health to help individuals remain in the most independent setting possible.

Growth

Our newest community, Stevenson Oaks, opened in May 2022 and includes:

 172 residential Independent Living apartment homes, 40 Assisted Living apartment homes, 24 Memory Support suites for those living with forgetfulness, and an Outpatient Rehab Center that will help residents remain in their homes within their community.

Quality

- MRC communities continue to perform with excellence and often superior outcomes in the many surveys we routinely encounter every year as part of the strong regulatory environment in which we operate.
 - This further solidifies our long-standing reputation as an organization whose services, programs, housing, care and activities represent quality to residents.
 - This also results in hospitals and managed care organizations viewing MRC communities as the place to send those seeking rehab.
- An example of this superior quality is the CMS (Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services) grading system for the healthcare/nursing home sections of our communities. CMS rates everyone 1-5 stars, with 5 being the best; and we are extremely proud that MRC communities all rate at a 4 or 5.
- MRC continues to exceed nationwide benchmarks in resident and employee engagement.

Philanthropy

Psalm 71:9
Do not cast me off in the time of old age;
Do not forsake me when my strength fails.

MRC began with a gift of property and cash. We could not begin to do what we do without the generous support of donors. Many older adults cannot afford services when they need them and some have resources, but simply outlive them. In 2022, we provided over \$3.4 million in benevolence support through our Covenant Fund. The amount of support we can provide is only limited by the gifts we receive.

We are especially grateful for the TAC's support of a Mother's Day offering to benefit the Covenant Fund. Last year we received gifts from 39 churches/church groups. Thank you! The need for benevolent support increases each year and we encourage more churches to consider participating in this offering.

Those that lead and are a part of MRC understand the importance of financial gifts to support the Covenant Fund and other things that set us apart. 100% of our Board, 100% of our Executive Team, 100% of our campus Executive Teams, and 41% of all employees make financial gifts to MRC.

Human Resources

Every day over 1,000 employees work to provide quality services to our residents and their families while exemplifying the values that define MRC as a faith-based organization. These values are defined by our ICARE program that all employees learn and follow as they serve each day.

- ICARE is an acronym for Integrity, Compassion, Accountability, Respect and Excellence.
 - Every potential new employee coming into the system is evaluated with regard to these values.
 - Every employee is evaluated annually to reflect on how well each conducted themselves according to these values.
 - Consistently throughout the year, a variety of mandatory training classes are held to reinforce ICARE values with each employee.
 - New and different ICARE programs are implemented throughout the year to keep a focus on these values.
 - Employees and residents alike are encouraged to submit "ICARE" cards that identify specific employee(s) who have been observed exhibiting one or more of the ICARE values. The number of cards turned in are tabulated by each community to help ensure a constant focus on these values.
 - In lieu of Employee of the Year, we select an ICARE Champion of the year for each community. These Champions are presented to the Board of Directors at a special luncheon during the February board meeting.

MRC is committed to supporting and helping our employees continue to grow. In 2022 we expanded and initiated the following:

Talent Acquisition

MRC created a talent acquisition team for centralized employee recruitment. This team reaches new pools of potential applicants and builds relationships with those applicants quickly. People are finding purpose driven work at MRC. Open positions have been reduced by 28% and employee turnover has decreased by 5%.

Employee Scholarship Fund

The Employee Scholarship Program is active at 4 of our campuses and will expand to others in 2023. The program at each of these communities is fully resident driven and primarily resident funded. For 2022, scholarships totaling \$59,137 were awarded to 23 employees. Being able to give and receive the gift of education makes us all stronger.

Employee Emergency Fund

The Employee Emergency Fund was created in February 2021 to assist employees in financial need as a result of an emergency or crisis situation. In 2022, 444 employees contributed to the fund and 21 employees received assistance totaling \$19,052. This is a great way for all of us to help each other in difficult times.

Addendum 2

AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS OF METHODIST RETIREMENT COMMUNITIES

ARTICLE 1

STRUCTURE AND ORGANIZATION

- 1.01. Structure. Methodist Retirement Communities ("MRC" or "Corporation") is a nonprofit corporation organized under the laws of the State of Texas.
- 1.02. *Member.* The corporation has no members.
- 1.03. Principal Place of Business. The principal place of business of the Corporation will be located at 1440 Lake Front Circle, Suite 140, The Woodlands, Texas 77380. The Corporation may have such other offices, either within or without the State of Texas, as the Board of Directors may determine or as the affairs of the Corporation may require from time to time.
- 1.04. Registered Office and Registered Agent. The Corporation will have and continuously maintain in the State of Texas a registered office and a registered agent whose office is the Corporation's registered office, as required by the Texas Business Organizations Code (the "Code"). The registered office may, but need not be, identical with the principal office of the Corporation in the State of Texas and the address of the registered office may be changed from time to time by the Board of Directors in accordance with applicable law.

ARTICLE 2

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

2.01. Classes, Powers, Number and Term of Office. The property and affairs of MRC will be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors, and subject to the restrictions imposed by law, by the Certificate of Formation or by these Bylaws, the Board of Directors will exercise all of the powers of MRC. The Board of Directors will consist of two (2) classes of Directors; "Elected Directors" and "Ex-Officio Directors." At least one half (1/2) or fifty percent (50%) of the Board of Directors will be members of the United Methodist Church. The Elected Directors and the voting Ex-Officio Director will be entitled to vote on all MRC matters at any annual, regular or special meetings of the Board of Directors.

- 2.02. Elected Directors. The number of Elected Directors will be no fewer than five (5) and no greater than twenty (20), as determined by the Board of Directors. Elected Directors will be entitled to vote on all MRC matters at any annual, regular or special meeting. The number of Elected Directors may be increased or decreased (providing that such decrease does not have the effect of shortening the term of any incumbent Elected Director) from time to time by majority vote of the then-qualified voting members of the Board of Directors.
 - (a) Elected Directors will consist of duly-elected members from MRC Crestview, MRC PineCrest, MRC TownCreek d/b/a Creekside, and MRC Cornerstone boards, MRC Foundation and possible other related entities and members at large. There will be no fewer than one (1) from each affiliated entity, where residents are being serviced, elected to the MRC Board. The balance of the directors will be at-large members.
 - (b) Unless a position is specifically determined and stated otherwise by the Board for purposes of staggering terms, the term of office for an Elected Director will be three (3) years, effective July 1 following his or her election. No Elected Director will serve more than three (3) consecutive three (3) year terms plus any partial term he or she has served due to a vacancy in the Board of Directors; provided, however, that a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson or Immediate Past Chairperson may remain on the Board while continuing to serve as Chairperson, Vice Chairperson or Immediate Past Chairperson, including during successive officer terms in such position; and further provided that an Elected Director who has served three (3) consecutive three (3) year terms may, after a lapse of one (1) year, be elected to a new term. Director terms will be staggered as evenly as possible. For purposes of staggering the terms, the Board may choose at its discretion, subject to majority vote, to elect a Director for less than a three (3) year term.
 - (c) Elected Directors will be (i) nominated by the Governance Committee of the Board of Directors, (ii) elected by majority vote of the Board of Directors then in office, and (iii) ratified by the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.
 - (d) An Elected Director will hold office until his or her respective (i) expiration of term of office as provided for in these Bylaws, (ii) resignation, (iii) removal, or (iv) death. In any event, an Elected Director will continue to serve until his or her respective successor will have been elected and qualified. Any Elected Director who fails to attend at least two consecutive board meetings per term year (July 1 through June 30) without due cause or with unexcused absences will be deemed to have resigned as an Elected Director.
 - (e) Any Elected Director may resign at any time. Such resignation will be made in writing and will take effect at the time specified therein, or, if no time is specified, at the time of its receipt by the President or Secretary. The

- acceptance of a resignation will not be necessary to make it effective, unless expressly provided in the resignation.
- Any Elected Director may be removed from office at any time with or without cause, by the vote of the majority of the directors then in office.
 Such removal will be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the individual so removed.
- (g) Any vacancy occurring among the Elected Directors, whether by increase in number of Elected Directors or otherwise, will be filled by majority vote of the Board of Directors then in office, though less than a quorum, upon nomination of the Governance Committee.
- 2.03. *Ex-Officio Directors*. The Board of Directors of MRC will include the following Ex-Officio Directors, with voting rights as stated:
 - (a) The Resident Bishop of the Texas Annual Conference or the Bishop's designee shall have voting rights;
 - (b) The President of MRC will be non-voting.

Ex-Officio Directors will serve so long as they remain in the positions qualifying them as ex-officio directors. The Elected Directors and the Ex-Officio Directors are referred to collectively as the "Board of Directors," the "Board," or the "MRC Board."

- 2.04. Meetings of Directors. The Board of Directors may hold their meetings and may have an office and keep the books of MRC at such place or places in the State of Texas, or outside the State of Texas, as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine, provided, however, in the absence of any such determination, such place will be the registered office of MRC in the State of Texas.
- 2.05. Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors ("Annual Meeting") will be held at such time and place as designated from time to time by the Board of Directors and as stated in the notice for such meeting. Notice of the Annual Meeting is required.
- 2.06. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors will be held quarterly at a time and place as designated from time to time by the Board of Directors and stated in the notice for such meeting. Notice of the regular meetings will be given to each Director as required.
- 2.07. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Board of Directors ("Special Meetings") will be held at such time and place as designated from time to time by the Chairperson or the Vice Chairperson in the absence or disability of the Chairperson, the President, or by the written request of a majority of the directors. Notice of Special Meetings will be required.

Unless otherwise indicated in the notice thereof, any and all matters pertaining to the purposes of MRC may be considered and acted upon at a Special Meeting, including but not limited to personnel matters described under Section 7.04. At any meeting at which

- every Director will be present, even though without any notice, any matter pertaining to the purposes of MRC may be considered and acted upon.
- 2.08. *Quorum.* One-half (1/2) of the directors, excluding Ex-Officio Directors, will constitute a quorum.
- 2.09. *Proxies.* A director may not vote by proxy.
- 2.10. Compensation of Directors. Persons serving as directors will not receive any salary or compensation for their services as directors; provided, however, that nothing contained herein will be construed to preclude any director from receiving compensation in a reasonable amount for personal services rendered (other than services rendered as a "Director") that are reasonable and necessary in carrying out MRC's purposes as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine. A director will be entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred by him or her in carrying out his or her duties as a director.
- 2.11. Duties of Directors. A director will discharge the director's duties in good faith, with ordinary care, and in a manner the director reasonably believes to be in the best interest of MRC. In the discharge of any duty imposed or power conferred on a director, the director may in good faith rely on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data, concerning MRC or another person that were prepared or presented by one (1) or more officers or employees of MRC; legal counsel, public accountants; or other persons acting solely in their professional capacity and not as volunteer directors as to matters the director reasonably believes are within the person's professional or expert competence. A director is not liable to MRC or any other person for any action taken or not taken as a director if the director acted in compliance with this Section.
- 2.12. Actions of Board of Directors. The Board of Directors will try to act by consensus. However, the vote of a majority of directors present and voting at a meeting at which a quorum is present will be sufficient to constitute the act of the Board of Directors unless the act of a greater number is required by law or the Bylaws. A director who is present at a meeting and abstains from a vote is considered to be present and voting for the purpose of determining the decision of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE 3

OFFICERS

3.01. *Titles and Term of Office.* The officers of MRC will be a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Immediate Past Chairperson, President, Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers and assistant officers as the Board of Directors may from time to time elect or appoint. One

person may hold more than one office, except that the Chairperson will not hold the office of Secretary. The MRC President who will hold office of President so long as he/she is the MRC President and, as such, Subsections (a) – (d) below do not apply to the position of President, it being understood that the President's role as an officer is subject to the terms of his/her employment as determined by the Board. If the Secretary and/or Treasurer are staff, they will not have terms and will hold office as appointed by the Board.

- (a) The term of office for each officer will be a one-year period commencing on July 1 following the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors at which each such officer is elected. No officer may serve more than three (3) consecutive one-year terms in the same office unless the reason for a specific one-time exception is approved by the appropriate Board.
- (b) All officers will hold office until their respective (a) expiration of term of office as provided for in these Bylaws, (b) resignation, (c) removal, or (d) death. In any event, a duly-elected officer will serve in the office to which he or she is elected until his or her respective successor will have been elected and qualified.
- (c) Any officer may resign at any time. Such resignation will be made in writing and will take effect at the time specified therein, or, if no time is specified, at the time of its receipt by the President or Secretary. The acceptance of a resignation will not be necessary to make it effective, unless expressly provided in the resignation.
- (d) All officers will be subject to removal, with or without cause, at any time by a majority vote of the Board of Directors then in office. A vacancy in the office of any officer, whether by increase in the number of offices or otherwise, will be filled by a majority vote of the Board of Directors then in office.
- 3.02. Chairperson. The Chairperson will preside at all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee. He or she will appoint special committees as authorized by the Board of Directors, will appoint the chairpersons of committees and will perform all other duties incident to the office as required by the Bylaws or assigned to him or her from time to time by the Board of Directors. The Chairperson of the MRC Board may designate the Vice-Chairperson or any MRC Executive Committee Member to act in the Chairperson's capacity with full authority of the MRC Chairperson's office, including voting privileges. Such designation and its scope and duration shall be communicated in writing to the President of MRC. The Chairperson of any meeting of the Board of Directors will determine the procedure at the meeting, including, without limitation, conduct of the discussion and the order of business.
- 3.03 Vice Chairperson. The Vice Chairperson will have such powers and duties as may be assigned to him or her by the Board of Directors including the performance of the duties of the Chairperson upon the death, absence or resignation of the Chairperson or upon the Chairperson's inability to perform the duties of his or her office. Any action taken by the

Vice Chairperson in the performance of the duties of the Chairperson will be conclusive evidence of the Chairperson's absence or inability to act at the time such action was taken.

- 3.04 *Immediate Past Chairperson.* The Immediate Past Chairperson will have such powers and duties as may be assigned to him or her by the Board of Directors.
- 3.05 Treasurer. The Treasurer, with the support of any appointed Assistant Treasurer, will oversee all the funds and securities of MRC and will see that proper records of all financial transactions of MRC are faithfully kept. The Treasurer and all others who oversee or handle MRC's funds will, if required by the Board of Directors, be bonded with approved sureties in such form and amount as the Board of Directors may require. The financial records will be audited annually by a certified public accountant approved by the Board of Directors, Finance Committee or Board appointed Committee such as an Audit Committee, if one exists, and as provided for in Section 6.02. The individual serving as Treasurer may also serve as Secretary. A Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer, if a staff member, will have no voting rights.
- 3.06 Secretary. The Secretary will keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose and will have such other powers and duties as may be assigned to him or her by the Board of Directors. The individual serving as Secretary may also serve as Treasurer. A Secretary, if a staff member, will have no voting rights.
- 3.07 Compensation of Officers. Persons serving as officers, as such, will not receive any salary or compensation for their services as officers; provided, however, that nothing contained herein will be construed to preclude any officer from receiving compensation in a reasonable amount for personal services rendered (other than services rendered as an "Officer") that are reasonable and necessary in carrying out MRC's purposes as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine. An officer will be entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred by him or her in carrying out his or her duties as an officer.

ARTICLE 4

PRESIDENT

4.01 President. The Board of Directors will select, employ and retain upon terms and conditions satisfactory to the Board, a President of MRC, preferably a member of the United Methodist Church. The President of MRC will be the chief executive officer of MRC and, subject to the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of MRC, he or she will be in general charge of property, assets and daily management of MRC. The President may execute any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments that the Board of Directors has authorized to be executed. The President may designate other executives to execute local, operational contracts of a short-term nature; generally, not exceeding one year. The specific duties, the term of service and the compensation of the President will be designated by the Board of Directors. As provided in Article 2 of these Bylaws, the President will be an Ex-Officio non-voting member of the Board of Directors.

The President will select, employ, retain and direct such personnel as the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee may authorize for the efficient and effective operation of MRC and its related entities, it being understood that such authority does not restrict the ability of the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee to engage outside consultants, legal advisors, or others as necessary to carry out its duties.

As chief executive officer under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors, the President will carry on the general affairs of the Corporation. It will be his or her duty to approve the expenditure of the monies appropriated by the Board of Directors in accordance with the budget approved by the Board. The President will make an annual report and periodic reports to the Board concerning the programs of MRC. He or she will comply with all orders from the Board.

The President will serve as or will designate an individual to serve as Ex-Officio non-voting member of the Board and President of each corporation that is a subsidiary or affiliate of MRC, whether or not MRC serves as the sole member of the corporation.

4.02 *Vice President.* The President may appoint one or more Vice Presidents who will serve as non-voting officers.

ARTICLE 5

COMMITTEES

5.01. Executive Committee. The Executive Committee of MRC will consist of the Chairperson, the Vice Chairperson, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Immediate Past Chairperson, and other MRC Board members who shall have been nominated and elected to the Executive Committee by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. If staff members are serving as Secretary or Treasurer, such staff will not have a vote on the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee will have and may exercise all of the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of MRC, when the Board of Directors is not in session, except where action of the Board of Directors is specified by statute. The Executive Committee will exercise all authority of the Board of Directors in operations with respect to programs of city, county, state or federal departments and agencies. Actions of the Executive Committee may be ratified by the Board of Directors at subsequent meetings. The Executive Committee will adopt its own rules of procedure. The Executive Committee will keep regular minutes of the transactions of its meetings, will cause such minutes to be recorded in books kept for that purpose in the office of MRC, and will report the same to the Board of Directors from time to time. The President will attend Executive Committee meetings as required by the Executive Committee.

Regular Meetings of the Executive Committee may be held between regular meetings of the Board. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Chairperson, by the Vice Chairperson in the absence, death or disability of the Chairperson. Notice of all meetings of the Executive Committee will be given to each member pursuant to Section 6.03 at least five (5) days before the meeting.

5.02. Other Committees.

- (a) The Board of Directors may provide for the appointment of such other committees, in addition to those committees set forth in this Article 5, as the Board of Directors deems necessary having such powers as the Board of Directors may determine and specify in the resolutions creating such committees along with their charge from the board and length of service, if specified. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors, or a designee appointed by the Chairperson will be an Ex-Officio Member of all committees, including those described in this Article 5. The President or his or her designee will be a non-voting ex-officio member of all committees, including those described in this Article 5, except the Executive Committee.
- (b) The establishment of a committee or the delegation of authority to it will not relieve the Board of Directors, or any individual director, of any responsibility imposed by the Bylaws or otherwise imposed by law. In the event a committee is not properly constituted or fails to perform, the Executive Committee will assume and perform all the rights, privileges and responsibilities of such committee.
- (c) The term of office for each Committee Chair will be a one-year period commencing on July 1 following the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors at which such Committee Chair is appointed. No Committee Chair may serve more than three (3) consecutive one-year terms in the same office unless the reason for a specific one-time exception is approved by the appropriate Board or Committee.
- (d) No committee will have the authority of the Board of Directors to:
 - (i) Amend the Certificate of Formation.
 - (ii) Adopt a plan of merger or a plan of consolidation with another corporation.
 - (iii) Authorize the sale, lease, exchange, or mortgage of all or substantially all of the property and assets of MRC.
 - (iv) Authorize the voluntary dissolution of MRC.
 - (v) Revoke proceedings for the voluntary dissolution of MRC.
 - (vi) Adopt a plan for the distribution of the assets of MRC.
 - (vii) Amend, alter, or repeal the Bylaws.
 - (viii) Elect, appoint, or remove a member of a committee or a Director or officer of MRC.
 - (ix) Approve any transaction to which MRC is a party and that involves a potential conflict of interest.
 - (x) Take any action outside the scope of authority delegated to it by the Board of Directors.
 - (xi) Take final action on a matter that requires the approval of the Board.

- 5.03. The Finance Committee. The Finance Committee ("Finance") will consist of five (5) or more members including the Treasurer of MRC who, except if the Treasurer is a staff member, will be the Chairperson of Finance. If the Treasurer is a staff member, the Finance Committee Chairperson shall be elected by the MRC Board. Finance will supervise all of the funds and accounts of MRC, including the investment of capital funds, and will oversee monthly reports, if available and desired, and regular quarterly reports to the Executive Committee and MRC Board. Finance will oversee and review annual budgets that are submitted by MRC management to the Board of Directors for approval and adoption.
- 5.04. The Governance Committee. The Governance Committee ("Governance" or "Governance Committee") will consist of five (5) or more members, at least two (2) of whom must be members of the Executive Committee. Governance will give thought throughout the year to replacing directors whose terms will expire within the current year with men or women who are particularly qualified to bring the finest possible leadership to MRC. When submitting nominations, Governance will assess the qualifications for membership on MRC and MRC affiliate/subsidiary boards. Such assessment will include, but not be limited to, the leadership needs of affiliate boards and their business cycle. These and other considerations to be made may be expressed in a Nominations Philosophy Statement which will be in keeping with MRC's core values.
 - (a) At the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors, Governance will submit the names of nominees for election to the Board of Directors at least fifty percent (50%) of whom will be members of the United Methodist Church. After election by majority vote of the Board of Directors, Governance will be responsible for presenting the names of the directors to the Texas Annual Conference for ratification by the next session of the Texas Annual Conference. If and when vacancies occur during any year, Governance will submit to the Board of Directors nominations to fill such vacancies.
 - (b) Governance will also bring to the Annual Meeting nominations for the officers of the Board of Directors, to be elected in accordance with Section 3.01 hereof. If and when vacancies occur during any year, Governance will submit to the Board of Directors nominations to fill such vacancies.

(c) Governance will:

- (i) Identify a self-assessment tool for evaluation of the boards of directors and individual directors;
- (ii) Monitor attendance, board member financial contributions, and other activities or requirements for directors, as noted in these Bylaws under Article 2;

- (iii) Participate in orientation of new and current directors, including guidance for materials included in the Board Manual for directors;
- (iv) Review the bylaws from time to time for changes or updates required due to changes in regulations, or changes in law or practice:
- (v) Share with the MRC Board no less than once each year the results of self-assessment. The Chairperson of the Governance Committee will be the Immediate Past Chair of the MRC Board of Directors. If the immediate past Chair of the MRC Board is unable to serve, the MRC Chairperson will nominate another Board member to serve upon the ratification of the MRC Board.
- 5.05. *Procedures; Meetings; Quorum*. Any committee created by the Board of Directors or these Bylaws, unless otherwise expressly provided herein or provided by resolution of the Board of Directors, will:
 - (a) Have a Chairperson designated by the Board of Directors;
 - (b) Fix its own rules or procedures;
 - (c) Meet at such times and at such place or places as may be provided by such rules or by resolution of the Board of Directors; and
 - (d) Keep minutes of its meetings and report to the Board of Directors at its next succeeding meeting.

At every meeting of any such committee, the presence of a half of all the members thereof will constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the members present will be necessary for the adoption by it of any action, unless otherwise expressly provided in the committee's rules or procedures or these Bylaws or by the Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors may designate one (1) or more directors as alternate members of any committee, who may replace any absent or disqualified member at any meeting of such committee. In the absence or disqualification of a member of a committee, the member or members present at any meeting of such committee and not disqualified from voting, whether or not constituting a quorum, may unanimously appoint the designated alternate director to act at that meeting, in the place of the absent or disqualified member.

ARTICLE 6

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 6.01. *Fiscal Year.* The fiscal year of MRC will be determined from time to time by the Board of Directors.
- 6.02. Audit. The Executive Committee or an Audit Committee authorized by the Executive Committee will select the auditing firm that will perform the annual audit.

- 6.03. Notice and Waiver of Notice. Whenever any notice is required to be given by mail under the provisions of these Bylaws, such notice will be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail in a sealed postpaid wrapper addressed to the person entitled thereto at such person's post office address, as such appears in the records of the Corporation, and such notice will be deemed to have been given on the date of such mailing. If transmitted by facsimile or other means such as e-mail, notice is deemed to be delivered on successful transmission of the facsimile or other electronic means. A waiver of notice in writing signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, will be deemed equivalent to notice.

 The attendance of a person at a meeting will constitute a waiver of notice of the meeting unless the person attends for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.
- 6.04. Decision Without Meeting. Any action required by the Code to be taken at a meeting of the directors of Corporation or any action that may be taken at a meeting of the directors of any committee may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action to be taken, is signed by a sufficient number of directors or committee members as would be necessary to take that action at a meeting at which all of the directors, or members of the committee were present and voted, as required by the Code. The consent must have the date of each director's or committee member's signature. Prompt notice of the taking of any action by directors or a committee without a meeting by less than unanimous written consent will be given to all directors or committee members who did not consent in writing to the action.
- 6.05. Meeting via Telephone or other Remote Electronic Communications. Subject to the requirements of law for notice of meetings, unless otherwise restricted by the Certificate of Formation or these Bylaws, directors, or members of any committee may participate in and hold a meeting of such directors, or committee members, as the case may be, by means of a conference telephone or another remote electronic communications system, including videoconferencing technology or the Internet, only if:
 - (a) Each person entitled to participate in the meeting consents to the meeting being held by means of that system, with consent being deemed as given if no objection within 48 hours of the meeting notification date and time; and
 - (b) The system provides access to the meeting in a manner or using a method by which each person participating will be able to communicate with the others.
- 6.06. Contracts. Except as otherwise limited by these Bylaws and subject to Network Best Practices, the Board of Directors may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents of MRC, in addition to the officers so authorized by these Bylaws, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of MRC, and such authority may be general or confined to a specific instance.

- 6.07. Checks, Drafts, or Orders for Payment. All checks, drafts, or orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of MRC will be signed by the President or Treasurer, the Board of Directors may designate by resolution other such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Corporation until such time as the positions of President and Treasurer are filled. In the interim absence of a President or Treasurer, the Board of Directors may designate, by resolution, other such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Corporation until such time as the positions of President and Treasurer are filled.
- 6.08. Deposits. Absent a specific designation by the Board of Directors, or restriction resulting from a previous agreement, such as being part of an obligated group, the President or President's designee will determine such banks, trust companies or other depositories to be utilized by the Corporation.
- 6.09. Gifts. The Board of Directors may accept on behalf of MRC any contribution, gift, bequest, or devise for the general purposes, or for any specific purpose, for which MRC has been created. The Board of Directors may make gifts and give charitable contributions that are not prohibited by the Bylaws, the Certificate of Formation, state law, and any requirements for maintaining MRC's federal and state tax status.
- 6.10. *Prohibited Acts.* As long as MRC is in existence, and except with the prior approval of the Board of Directors, no Director, officer, or committee member of MRC will:
 - (a) Do any act in violation of the Bylaws or a binding obligation of MRC.
 - (b) Do any act with the intention of harming MRC or any of its operations.
 - (c) Do any act that would make it impossible or unnecessarily difficult to carry on the intended or ordinary business of MRC.
 - (d) Receive an improper personal benefit from the operation of MRC.
 - (e) Use the assets of MRC, directly or indirectly, for any purpose other than carrying on the business of MRC.
 - (f) Wrongfully transfer or dispose of MRC property, including intangible property such as good will.
 - (g) Use the name of MRC (or any substantially similar name) or any trademark or trade name adopted by MRC, except on behalf of MRC in the ordinary course of MRC's business.
 - (h) Disclose any MRC business practices, trade secrets, or any other information not generally known to the business community to any person not authorized to receive it.
 - (i) Represent themselves as authorized representatives of the Board of Directors.
- 6.11. Private Inurement. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Certificate of Formation or these Bylaws, MRC will not engage in any activities which are not permitted (1) by a nonprofit corporation exempt from federal corporate tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the

- Internal Revenue Code, or (2) by a nonprofit corporation's contributions to which are to be deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- 6.12. Required Books and Records. MRC will keep correct and complete books and records of account, financial statements and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Directors, and committees having any of the authority of the Board of Directors. Any Director, officer, or committee member of MRC may inspect and receive copies of all books and records of MRC required to be kept by the Bylaws if the person has a proper purpose related to the person's interest in MRC and if the person submits a request in writing, subject to legal requirements of confidentiality. Any person entitled to inspect and copy MRC's books and records may do so through his or her attorney or other duly-authorized representative.
- 6.13. Alternative Recordkeeping. The books, records, and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and any committee thereof may be created and maintained in any form capable of being converted into written paper form within a reasonable time, including but not limited to electronic form.
- 6.14. Signatures. A facsimile, electronic mail or similar transmission by an officer, director, or member of a committee or a photographic, photostatic, facsimile, or similar reproduction of a writing signed by an officer, director or member of a committee shall be regarded as signed by the director or member of a committee.

ARTICLE 7

TRANSACTIONS AND CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- 7.01. *Duality of Interest*. Any duality of interest or possible conflict of interest on the part of any member of the Board of Directors will be disclosed to the other directors and made a matter of record (i) through an annual procedure and (ii) when such interest or conflict becomes a matter of the Board of Directors or Executive Committee action.
- 7.02. *Procedure*. Conflict of interest may exist when the interests or activities of any director, officer or staff member may be seen as competing with the interests or activities of MRC, or the director, officer or staff member derives a financial or other material gain as a result of a direct or indirect relationship.
 - (a) Any possible conflict of interest will be disclosed to the Board of Directors by the person concerned, if that person is a director or the President of MRC, or to the President, or to such person or persons as he or she may designate, if the person is a member of the staff.

- (b) When any conflict of interest is relevant to a matter requiring action by the Board of Directors, the interested person will call it to the attention of the Board of Directors or its appropriate committee and such person will not vote on the matter; provided, however, any director disclosing a possible conflict of interest may be counted in determining the presence of a quorum at a meeting of the Board of Directors or a committee thereof.
- (c) Unless requested to remain present during the meeting, the person having the conflict will retire from the room in which the Board or its committee is meeting and will not participate in the final deliberation or decision regarding the matter under consideration. However, that person will provide the Board or committee with any and all relevant information.
- (d) The minutes of the meeting of the Board or committee will reflect that the conflict of interest was disclosed and that the interested person was not present during the final discussion or vote and did not vote. When there is doubt as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the matter will be resolved by a vote of the Board of Directors or its committee, excluding the person concerning whose situation the doubt has arisen.
- (e) A copy of this conflict of interest Bylaw will be furnished each director, officer and senior staff member who is presently serving MRC, or who may hereafter become associated with MRC. This policy will be reviewed annually for the information and guidance of directors, officers and staff members. Any new directors, officers or staff members will be advised of this policy upon undertaking the duties of such office.
- 7.03. Loans to Officers and Directors Prohibited. MRC will not make any loan to a director or officer of MRC. Any director voting for or assenting to the making of any such loan and any director or officer participating in the making thereof will be jointly and severally liable to MRC for the amount of such loan until repayment thereof.
 A director, officer, or committee member of MRC may lend money to and otherwise transact business with MRC except as otherwise provided by the Bylaws, Certificate of Formation, and all applicable laws. Such a person transacting business with MRC has the same rights and obligations relating to those matters as other persons transacting business with MRC. MRC will not borrow money from or otherwise transact business with a director, officer, or committee member of MRC unless the transaction is described fully in a legally binding instrument and is in the best interests of MRC. MRC will not borrow money from or otherwise transact business with the director, officer, or committee member of MRC without full disclosure of all relevant facts and without the approval of the Board of Directors, not including the vote of any person having a personal interest in the transaction.
- 7.04. Personnel and Performance Matters. For the avoidance of doubt, any officer, director, or committee member that is employed by, or is contracted with MRC has a conflict of interest for purposes of any meeting of the Board or any committee thereof, or any discussion within a meeting, involving his or her own performance, employment, or contract, whether such meeting or discussion is held by the full Board of Directors, or by any committee thereof. By way of example but not limitation, meeting and discussion

topics that trigger the recusal obligations hereunder may include the following: (a) setting personal goals, (b) evaluating performance, (c) considering disciplinary action up to and including termination, (d) deciding raise or bonus amounts, and (e) discussing or changing a job description. Unless requested to attend such meeting or discussion by the Chairperson of the Board or the Committee Chair, as applicable, the employee or contractor will not attend the meeting (if the sole purpose of the meeting is to discuss the performance, employment or contract matter), or will leave the meeting for such portions of the meeting relating to the individual's performance, employment or contract (if such discussion is part of a meeting that involves additional matters). If the employee or contractor in question fails to recuse himself or herself as required hereunder, he or she will do so upon request of the Chairperson of Committee Chair, as applicable. Furthermore, no subordinate of the recused employee or contractor shall participate in the meeting or discussion of the performance, employment or contract of the recused employee or contractor. In addition, to the extent that the Board or any committee thereof desires to discuss the performance of a director that is not employed by or contracted with MRC (e.g. a volunteer director), the director that is the subject of the discussion shall recuse himself or herself from the meeting or discussion. Following any meeting governed by this Section 7.04, the Chairperson of the Board or the Committee Chair, as applicable, will inform the recused individual that was the subject of the discussion about the outcome of the meeting.

In accordance with this Section 7.04, and for the avoidance of doubt, it shall not be necessary for purposes of satisfying meeting notice requirements under these Bylaws to share with the employee, contractor or director in question, or his or her subordinates, any performance, employment or contract-related information that will be discussed during the meeting or discussion. To the extent of any inconsistency between any provision of these Bylaws and this Section 7.04, this Section 7.04 shall control.

ARTICLE 8

INDEMNIFICATION

Pursuant to Chapter 8 of the Code, the Corporation will provide mandatory and permissive indemnification.

The Corporation will indemnify a governing person or a former governing person against reasonable expenses actually incurred by the person in connection with a proceeding in which the person is a respondent because the person is or was a governing person if the person is wholly successful on the merits or otherwise in the defense of the proceeding, as mandated in Chapter 8, Subchapter B of the Code.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Corporation may pursuant to the Code, indemnify a person who was, is, or is threatened to be made a named defendant or respondent in litigation or other proceedings because the person is or was a director or other person related to the Corporation as provided by Chapter 8, Subchapter C of the Code governing

permissive indemnification. Such indemnification may include, without limitation, advancing the indemnified party his or her reasonable expenses.

ARTICLE 9

AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the Board of Directors at any Annual, Regular or Special Meeting, provided that the proposed amendment will be submitted in writing with the notice of such meeting at least ten (10) days in advance. Any such amendment must be ratified by the Texas Annual Conference at its next session following adoption of the amendment.

Texas Methodist Foundation

Texas Methodist Foundation ended 2022 with deep gratitude for the many investors, philanthropists, borrowers, and leaders we have been blessed to serve in ministry. In 2022 TMF honored Tom Locke for 33-years of service, awarding him the Medallion of Merit at his retirement celebration in November. Over the last five years, TMF has cumulatively invested over \$130.1 million of revenue and endowment distributions in Methodist churches and nonprofits across Texas and New Mexico. During this time of change, and with our new President & CEO, Rev. Lisa Greenwood, we remain steadfast in our commitment to partnering with the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, walking alongside congregations, together creating cultures of purpose, generosity, and courage.

Rev. Melvin Amerson and Rev. Mark Woodward are Texas Senior Area Representatives and the primary contact and bridge between congregations, clergy and laity, and Texas Methodist Foundation. As partners in ministry, Melvin and Mark connect members of the Texas Conference to relevant resources available at Texas Methodist Foundation.

TMF, headquartered in Austin, serves Methodist individuals, churches, and agencies within the six annual conferences in Texas and New Mexico. We appreciate the opportunity to report some of the ways we served Methodists last year.

Within the Texas Conference

- Loans to churches in the Texas Conference totaled \$92.3 million at the end of 2022.
- Churches and agencies, not including individuals, within the Texas Conference had \$55.9 million invested in the Methodist Loan Fund.

Throughout Texas and New Mexico

- As of December 31, 2022, total assets under management by TMF were \$647.9 million.
- Methodist Loan Fund investments ended the year at \$312.2 million, and our loan portfolio at \$290.4 million.
- Total gifts to TMF's ministries equaled \$1.2 million, including gifts to Leadership Ministry, Grants, and TMF's Undesignated Endowment.
- Total gifts to TMF for the benefit of others ended 2022 at \$1.8 million, including all planned giving Endowments, Charitable Gift Annuities, Trusts, Donor-Advised Funds.
- In 2022, the TMF Grants Ministry funded approximately \$2.03 million in support of 82 churches and nonprofits. Of that total, TMF granted \$1.49 million from its

- restricted permanent endowment funds, and the remainder from its operating budget.
- TMF's Leadership Ministry works to equip leaders for deep change through conversations of courage, learning, and innovation. Some of these conversations take the form of ongoing peer groups and others as stand-alone conversations around an adaptive issue. These peer relationships offer fresh perspectives, renew their sense of calling and embolden them for courageous leadership.
- In 2022, 25 clergy from the Texas Conference participated in a TMF peer learning group. To date, 64 clergy from TAC have been a part of a TMF group.
- In March 2023, TMF hosted a gathering exploring innovative ministry with 75+ leaders in Houston, including 15 from the Texas Conference.
- Fueled by the desire to encourage and support, the TMF team of Area Representatives continues to remain steadfast and loyal to those they serve. As walk-beside partners in ministry, the Area Representative team equips and empowers faith communities by providing financial best practices, inspiring cultures of generosity, and cultivating strategies of legacy giving (often initiated by the workshop Putting Your House in Order). Churches who desire to nurture purpose and innovation embrace a process of discernment guided by this question, "What difference is God calling us to make in this time and in this place?" Engaging both informal conversation and contract services church leadership use Holy Conversations (4-6 months with a team of 7-9) and Holy Excavations (half-day workshop with 25-30 people) to explore their call.

The Texas United Methodist College Association exists to advocate for our Texas Methodist college students attending one of the six United Methodist institutions of higher learning in Texas. Gifts received from our Annual Conference partners are passed along to deserving students through the Texas Methodist Scholarship Program. During the 2022-23 academic year, we awarded over \$172,000 in scholarship support through this program to students at Huston-Tillotson University, McMurry University, Southern Methodist University, Southwestern University, Texas Wesleyan University and Wiley College. Throughout the year, the residual effects from the pandemic and inflation continued to impact our clients' well-being. The demand for basic assistance -food, rent, and utilities - remained high. Despite the hurdles, we welcomed many clients, including more children, back in the building.

Facilities Expansion: Due to the increasing interest in Wesley Community Center's workforce development and adult education services, we are embarking on a facilities expansion. A capital campaign is underway to raise \$4.2 million for a new Workforce and Adult Education building. We have currently raised \$1.8 million towards this goal and with plans to begin construction in early 2024. This new facility will allow us to run more of our workforce trainings, GED, ESL, and digital literacy classes to meet the needs of the community.

DELIVERING THE MISSION

Services for Adults

Financial Opportunity Center (Adult Workforce, Education)

The Financial Opportunity Center achieved the following results in 2022 through early December:

- Over 900 individuals received services in our Financial Opportunity Center, with over 400 receiving one on one coaching
- 88% received all three FOC services, income supports, workforce services and financial services

Selected employment outcomes:

- 307 clients received career/employment coaching
- 88 clients received scholarships for vocational training through our Bridge program
- 48 received recognized credentials

Selected financial outcomes:

- 444 received financial coaching
- 323 increased their net worth
- 396 increased their credit (FICO) score

Other results

 We launched our Digital Literacy program to close the gap in knowledge of computers and technology. 381 clients received digital literacy/computer assistance. Wesley began a customer service training program in partnership with CenterPoint Energy. Clients received 3-week employability workshops at Wesley and can apply for CenterPoint's Call Center jobs.

Wesley received several grants for workforce/adult literacy-related services:

- Harris County Hire Up
- LISC and others for a Digital Literacy program (coaching, training and technology)
- Methodist Hospital and others for a GED program

This additional funding allowed us to add new staff positions and expand our upskilling programs. Wesley now offers preparatory classes for Medical Assistant, LVN, Pharmacy Technician, and Sterile Processing. Clients completing these prep classes earn scholarships to local community colleges to complete their training.

Basic Needs – Emergency Services

This year, we have continued to see high demand for emergency services. We expect to end the year havingprovided over 7,000 households with financial assistance. Families are still struggling to find work and to pay their bills due to the rise in costs of gas and groceries.

The food pantry continues to provide high quality, safe and efficient services for thousands of individuals.

As of the end of 2022, we had 145 seniors enrolled in our program. We were able to reopen our in-person seniors program in March of 2022, much to the delight of both seniors and staff. Average daily attendance is around 50 seniors. Seniors have participated in Bingo-cise (exercise bingo), digital literacy, financial seminars, games, dances, and festive holiday parties.

Services for Children and Youth

Early Childhood Education

At the end of 2022, Wesley is currently served 102 children in Early Head Start and Pre-K. Wesley was able to provide safe, quality early childhood education for families so parents could continue to work. We held a variety of parent engagement activities monthly.

Youth Services

Over the year, we served a total of 86 children, unduplicated. Our numbers of students are back to our pre-pandemic levels. Students participate in after school during the year and summer camp, as well as camp during breaks.

INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING REPORTS

Africa University

James H. Salley, Associate Vice Chancellor for Institutional Advancement

United Methodists worldwide celebrated an 'Ebenezer' moment in the ministry of Africa University in 2022, marking 30 years of faithfulness, generosity, growth, and impact within and beyond The United Methodist Church.

God's presence and provision in the life of Africa University are evident, thanks to the prayers and generous support of the Texas Conference. Thank you! The Texas Conference invested 85.68 percent of its share of general church giving to support the day-to-day operations of Africa University. At 83.7 percent overall in 2022, giving to the Africa University Fund (AUF) remained resilient in all five jurisdictions in the United States.

Supported by strong missional engagement and investment by Texas United Methodists and church members across the denomination, Africa University embraced new opportunities as it emerged from pandemic-related restrictions in 2022.

- Enrollment: Strategic recruitment and retention initiatives, including blended learning options, technology upgrades, and additional mental health support and financial aid, helped Africa University achieve a total enrollment at 2,791 students in August 2022. Female students comprised 58 percent of the student population and 23 African nations were represented.
- Academic Growth: Africa University launched its first new academic unit in almost twenty years—The School of Law—with a pioneer cohort of 20 students pursuing the Bachelor of Laws (Honors) (LLBS) degree program. The institution has five new undergraduate and graduate programs approved for implementation by the Zimbabwe Council for Higher Education (ZIMCHE), the national accreditation and quality assurance agency.
- Infrastructure expansion: Construction of a new residence hall for female students at Africa University is ongoing. Funding to build and equip the facility was provided by the East Ohio Conference (EOC). The EOC's *Teach * Reach * Bless* campaign raised more than \$1.5 million.

Africa University's year-long 30th anniversary program culminated in October 2022 with a gathering of more than 3,000 people at its main campus in Mutare, Zimbabwe. Amidst the commemoration and joyful thanksgiving livestreamed to the world, the Rev. Dr. Peter Mageto was formally installed as the fifth vice chancellor (president) of the institution.

Mageto, a Kenyan and academician specializing in theological ethics, echoed the gratitude of the students, faculty, staff, trustees, and alumni of Africa University for the incalculable sum of answered prayers that are the Africa University story. His inaugural address highlighted the optimism and commitment to purpose that are the foundation of the university's unfolding vision.

"Today, Africa University turns 30. The number 30 is in itself a blessed figure. Thirty was the age of our Lord Jesus Christ when he commenced his ministry here on earth. It gives us great faith to be walking resolutely towards the fourth decade," Mageto said.

Thank you, Texas Conference, for nurturing change leaders and building an enduring legacy through the ministry of Africa University. Let us continue to journey together—learning, leading, and serving God, all the time, everywhere.

Boston University School of Theology

G. Sujin Pak, Dean

A year like 2022 makes even more relevant BUSTH's historic and ongoing commitments to peace and justice in equipping transformational leaders. We remain hopeful and vigilant in our continued partnership with you.

BREAKING NEWS:

- **Students**: Our academic year 2022-23 entering class was among our most diverse, with 88 new students enrolling, 34% of whom are international students.
- Faculty: In September we welcomed three new <u>faculty members</u>: James McCarty, Assistant Clinical Professor of Religion and Conflict Transformation; Eunil David Cho, Assistant Professor of Spiritual Care; and Peng Yin, Assistant Professor of Ethics.
- New Online Degree First Cohort: BUSTH's first fully online master's degree—the
 Master of Religion and Public Leadership (MARPL)—welcomed its first students in
 fall 2022. MARPL seeks students who wish to be prepared for leadership roles that
 creatively engage the challenges of public life. Learn more at bu.edu/sth/marpl.
- Faculty Research: Prof. Filipe Maia was awarded a Louisville Institute book grant in April, and Prof. Luis Menéndez-Antuña was awarded a grant from the Catholic Biblical Association in August. Other large grants continue to move forward,

including the Trauma Responsive Congregations Project led by Prof. Shelly Rambo and supported by the Lilly Endowment, and the Positive Psychology and Formation-Based Flourishing grant led by Prof. Steven Sandage and supported by the Peale Foundation.

- **Scholarships**: This year, we announced free tuition for all residential master's candidates. We continue to offer free tuition to UMC-registered candidates for ordained ministry and leadership fellowships that support students in ethnic, gender, and sexuality studies. New funds include the Research & Teaching Fund and Affirmation & Empowerment Fund as well as the following endowed funds: DEI, Theology & the Arts, and Doctor of Ministry.
- Accreditation Visit: BUSTH just welcomed the United Methodist University Senate Review team on February 1-3 for our re-accreditation visit.
- Online Lifelong Learning: BUSTH offers online courses for professional and spiritual enrichment of religious leaders. Recent offerings include "Ethics and Video Games," and "Spiritual Mending for Helping Professionals." To learn more, visit bu.edu/sth/oll.
- **Development**: Recent accomplishments include endowing the Faith and Ecological Justice Fund, and new funding for student scholarships and academic programs.

COMMITMENT TO JUSTICE and COMPASSION:

- BUSTH's Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion offers webinars on timely inclusion efforts, such as "Increasing Participation of Students of Underrepresented Backgrounds."
- This year's <u>Lowell Lecture</u> topics explore the spiritual dimension of artistic expression. This fall, Dr. Emmett G. Price III highlighted the brilliant resilience and demonstrative hope of Black folk through the lens of two exceptional spiritual beings: Nina Simone and John Coltrane. A diverse panel response fostered rich conversation.
- Work continues to improve accessibility, sustainability, and responsible investing.
 BUSTH is the first certified Green School at BU and is active in the Green Seminary Initiative.

Candler School of Theology

Jan Love, Dean

Since 1914, **Candler School of Theology at Emory University** has educated faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries throughout the world. An official seminary of The United Methodist Church, Candler holds true to the Methodist value of ecumenical openness, enthusiastically welcoming students from more than 42 denominations, with nearly half of Master of Divinity students coming from the Wesleyan tradition, including United Methodist, African Methodist Episcopal, African Methodist Episcopal Zion, Christian Methodist Episcopal, Wesleyan, Free Methodist, Church of the Nazarene, and others. Our student body reflects the diversity and breadth of the Christian faithful, with an enrollment of 417 from 16 countries and 33 states, and 43% persons of color. This diversity is a blessing, enriching our life together and providing a "learning laboratory" for ministry in the 21st century—ministry that cultivates community across difference, welcomes all to contribute and belong, and embodies Christ's love in and among us.

Candler offers six single degrees and ten dual degrees, most of which are available in hybrid or online formats so students can remain rooted in their home communities as they pursue their degrees. Our new hybrid Master of Divinity blending online classes and in-person intensives launches in Fall 2023, and our successful Doctor of Ministry—with its high 87% completion rate—is 90% online. Hybrid and online options are also available in the Master of Religious Leadership and the Master of Religion and Public Life programs. Plus, Candler's Teaching Parish program allows student pastors to earn contextual education credit as they serve their churches. We are excited that these flexible learning formats make a first-rate Candler education possible for even more people who are called to ministry.

Alleviating student debt through generous financial aid is a top priority for Candler. In 2021-2022, we awarded \$7.3 million in scholarship support, with 100% of MDiv students receiving aid. All MDiv students who are certified candidates for ordained ministry in the UMC receive full-tuition scholarships, and all MDiv, MTS, MRL, and ThM students receive a scholarship covering at least 50% of tuition. MDiv students also complete a financial literacy program to strengthen their financial and budgeting skills and reduce debt.

Candler was recently honored as one of 16 theological schools to receive a "Pathways to Tomorrow" grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. The \$5 million grant will support Candler in establishing a set of initiatives to create an interconnected continuum of offerings for the education of pastoral leaders. This will position Candler as a hub of theological learning with multiple entry points, including The Candler Foundry, our innovative program to make theological education accessible to the public, the United Methodist Course of Study, undergraduate classes, and a new venture, La Mesa Academy for Theological Studies. Set to launch in Fall 2023, La Mesa Academy will offer diplomas in pastoral leadership via a two-

year hybrid program with courses in Spanish and English. An optional third year of study will be offered to those aspiring to continue to a graduate professional degree at Candler.

This year, we welcomed the Rev. Dr. Brett Opalinski as Assistant Dean of Methodist Studies, a position made available by the retirement of the Rev. Dr. Anne Burkholder. Brett is an elder in full connection in the Florida Annual Conference and most recently served for nine years as senior pastor of Christ Church United Methodist in Ft. Lauderdale. In addition to other pastoral appointments, he has held a variety of leadership roles in the Florida Conference, including chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry. He is deeply committed to working with students in discerning their call, spiritual formation, and guiding them through the commissioning and ordination process.

Candler's ability to fulfill our mission to provide the church with the faithful and creative leaders it needs depends upon your prayers, partnership, and support. Drew University Theological School

Edwin David Aponte, Interim Dean

Drew educates and mentors pastors, preachers, deacons, activists, teachers, thought leaders, and change agents. In Fall 2022 Drew welcomed 77 new students, and as of February 2023 Drew has a total enrollment of 408 students. Many Drew students are just beginning their ministry, while others come to graduate theological education with substantial ministry experience. The latter reflects a growing trend among all theological schools in the United States and Canada. During 2022, Drew classes met on campus in Madison, New Jersey, but also some classes met exclusively online, while other met in hybrid fashion, i.e., partially online, partially in-person. This was also the case with chapel worship. This reflects both our ongoing emergence from the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown, but also Drew leaning into what it means to be a global school with a global student population.

With 35% of students coming from 28 different countries Drew Theological School is truly global and diverse in theology, vocations, age, as well as racial, ethnic, national, and international identities. Drew's interdisciplinary degree programs foster out-of-the-box thinking, provide real-world apprenticeships, promotes adaptive leadership skills, and encourages innovation through a team-taught core courses reflecting the integration of the theological disciplines and practices characteristic of the life of faith.

The faculty articulated shared values are infused across the teaching and learning at Drew: a commitment to anti-racism; gender and sexual-identity equality; eco-sustainability and

environmental justice; and interfaith understanding and cooperation. The Theological School has seen an increase in United Methodist students. Moreover, Drew has many United Methodist Global Fellows who chose to pursue education for ministry at Drew. UMC graduates are serving in conferences across the United States as well as in our regional conferences in Greater New Jersey, Eastern Pennsylvania, and New York Annual Conference.

Duke Divinity School

Edgardo Colón-Emeric, Dean

Duke Divinity School has continued in its commitment to form ministers of the gospel who will seek God's justice and mercy. Our faculty have been leaders in the Duke Climate Initiative participating with colleagues from the Nicholas School for the Environment in the event "Pastoral Care for Climate Change: Weaving Together Science and Theology for Justice." Divinity faculty have also co-taught a university course titled "Let's Talk about Climate Change," and welcomed 30 young faith leaders to understand better how to engage their faith communities in the fight for our climate.

The Office of Black Church Studies, commemorating its 50th anniversary year, hosted "Justice Ministry Reimagined: Reentry Simulation" for pastors, students, and lay leaders to learn more about how to support people reentering the community after incarceration. We launched the Prison Engagement Initiative with the Kenan Institute for Ethics. Divinity faculty taught a "Trauma Engaged Duke" seminar and led the team Developing Best Practices for Trauma-Informed Teaching and Learning.

We welcomed 226 entering students from 35 different states and eight other countries. The Master of Divinity program gained 88 residential students and 42 in the hybrid program. The Master of Arts in Christian Practice enrolled 13 new students; the Doctor of Ministry, 28; Master of Theology, six; Master of Theological Studies, 22; the Doctor of Theology welcomed six residential. The Certificate in Theology and Health Care welcomed four residential students and 16 in the hybrid program. Across all degree programs, 30 percent of the incoming class identified as a race or ethnicity other than white. Black students made up 18 percent of all students; Latinx students, six percent; Asian students, five percent; and American Indian students, one percent. Fifty-seven percent of students in the incoming class are female.

DDS continued to build on its rich tradition of ecumenical engagement, with Dean Colón-Emeric participating in the Methodist-Roman Catholic International Commission Dialogue meeting with Pope Francis at the Vatican. Student Eliza Love, M.Div.'23, was awarded the \$10,000 Bossey Institute scholarship from the United Methodist Church Council of Bishops to attend the World Council of Church Ecumenical Institute.

Three new associate deans have accepted appointments: Daniel Castelo as associate dean for Academic Formation; Jung Choi as associate dean for Global and Intercultural Formation; and Sangwoo Kim as associate dean for Vocational Formation. Linda Coley has also joined as the executive director for the Ormond Center.

The Ormond Center launched the Community Craft Collaborative to create resources for equipping lay and congregational leaders. The Certificate in Conflict Transformation and Reconciliation provides a learning opportunity for pastors and other church leaders seeking theological and practical skills to foster reconciliation in their congregations and surrounding communities. We celebrate the expansion of our connection to UMC colleges through a partnership with Wesleyan College in Macon, Ga., to enable qualified undergraduates to take courses through the Duke Accelerated Pastoral Formation Program.

Convocation & Pastors' School returned to an in-person format for the first time since 2019 with the theme, Creativity & Courage: From Trauma to Tough Hope. Professional dancers, visual artists, musicians, and scholars guided participants in facing brokenness and sin honestly, as they offered glimpses of "the beauty of holiness."

Gammon Theological Seminary

Candace M. Lewis. President-Dean

Gammon Theological Seminary is the Interdenominational Theological Center's United Methodist constituent member in Atlanta, Georgia. The Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) is a Christian Africentric ecumenical consortium of seminaries and fellowships that educate students to commit to practicing justice and peace through a liberating and transforming spirituality to become leaders in the church and local/global communities.

Gammon was founded in 1883, bearing the name of the Rev. Elijah H. Gammon, a generous clergyman, businessman, and philanthropist. Rev. Elijah H. Gammon invested and endowed the founding of Gammon Seminary in partnership with Bishop Henry Warren and the Freedman's Aid Society. Gammon has educated Black Clergy for almost 140 years, with graduates serving every level of the church, including Bishops, Superintendents, General church leaders, Conference staff, and Clergy in every jurisdiction. Today, Gammon Theological Seminary is the only predominately Black Seminary of the thirteen approved United Methodist-related Theological Institutions. The ITC's accreditation is with the Association of Theological Schools and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools

Commission on Colleges. Gammon/ITC offers the following degree programs: the Master of Divinity, the Master of Arts in Religion and Education, and the Doctor of Ministry.

The support given to The United Methodist Ministerial Education Fund by United Methodist Conferences continues to enable Gammon students to be grounded in the Wesleyan tradition of theological education. Our 17th President/Dean, Rev. Dr. Candace M Lewis, is the first woman to lead the Seminary in our 139-year history. Dr. Lewis and the Gammon staff team continue to lead innovatively in chartering a "Brand New Day" for Gammon's recruitment, retention, research and resources, fund development, and scholarship endowments in her first two years of service.

Our new initiatives and celebrations this year, 2022-2023, at Gammon include:

- We established The Rev. Walter H. McKelvey Endowed Scholarship Fund with the South Carolina Methodist Foundation. Dr. McKelvey was Gammon's 14th President/Dean, serving from 1997-2010. Under Dr. McKelvey's leadership, Gammon's enrollment and graduation rate increased, and buildings were renovated. Our initial goal is to raise \$100,000.00. We have already received a matching fund pledge of \$50,000.00 from Dr. Loretta F. McKelvey (wife of the late Rev. McKelvey).
- Spring 2023 International Student travel. Gammon students traveled to Belfast, Ireland, with the North Georgia Conference as a part of the Rethinking Conflict experience. Gammon students also traveled to Johannesburg, South Africa, on the Doctor of Ministry Immersion experience.
- Commissioned two National Research Projects, the first one related to the Impact
 of COVID on UMC BIPOC Clergy in partnership with Wespath Benefits and
 Investments CFWI Clergy Financial Wellbeing Initiative. The second research
 project is "Perspectives" The Future of Blacks in the United Methodist Church—
 public release of research reports of the Gammon Research Institute scheduled for
 Summer 2023.

The greatest challenge facing Gammon Seminary is the rising cost of theological education and the significant debt our students incur as they answer their call to full-time ministry. Therefore, Gammon is committed to raising a million dollars in the next two years to offer full-tuition scholarships to students called and committed to full-time ministry in the United Methodist Church. We are grateful to this Annual Conference for your support of theological education and your commitment to ensuring pastoral leadership is theologically trained to lead us forward in the Wesleyan tradition.

Perkins School of Theology

Southern Methodist University
Bishop Michael McKee, Dean ad interim

Perkins celebrates our vital connections with the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

- Forty-six (46) students affiliated with the Texas Annual Conference are enrolled at Perkins, including: 28 Master of Divinity students, 8 Master of Arts of Ministry students, 3 Master of Theological Studies students, 3 Doctor of Ministry students, 1 Master of Theology student, 1 Doctoral of Pastoral Ministry student and 2 non-major students.
- During the 2022-23 academic year, 30 students from the Texas Annual Conference received funding from the PACE (Perkins Annual Conference Endowment) grant, with the average overall financial aid award per student totaling \$4,336.60.
- Thirteen (13) Perkins students from the Texas Annual Conference currently are taking part in internships.

Enrollment Update

Enrollment at Perkins for the 2022-23 academic year totaled 257 students. The hybrid Houston-Galveston Extension Program, in its fifth year of providing a combination of online and residential classes leading to the M.Div. and M.A.M. degrees, totaled 96 students during the 2022-23 academic year.

Institutional Highlights

- Craig C. Hill, who became the 11th dean of Perkins School of Theology in July 2016, retired as dean December 31, 2022, due to medical reasons. Hill, the Leighton K. Farrell Endowed Dean and Professor of New Testament, will remain a member of the Perkins faculty until December 31, 2023. During his years at Perkins, he led a thorough study and reorganization of the Office of Enrollment Management, doubling new student enrollment from 2016-17 to 2019-20. Under his leadership, financial aid to students increased by 50 percent. He also reinvigorated the Houston-Galveston extension site as a hybrid program. Hill broadened academic offerings to include the development of the Baptist House of Studies, the Black/Africana Studies and a healthcare chaplaincy program.
- Bishop Michael McKee began his service as Dean of Perkins School of Theology ad
 interim effective January 1, 2023. He will serve until a permanent dean has been
 named. Bishop McKee previously served as episcopal leader of the North Texas
 Annual Conference since his election by the South Central Jurisdiction in 2012, from

- which he retired on January 1, 2023. As interim dean, he will provide leadership development with students and alumni and, at a time of particular challenge within the Methodist denomination, will further strengthen SMU's ties with donors, congregations and institutions within our region as well as nationally.
- Perkins was honored to have Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey preach a Chapel service during the first week of classes for our Houston/Galveston in January 2023. That same week, Bishop McKee traveled to Houston to visit with our hybrid students for the first time as interim dean.
- The inaugural William J. Abraham Memorial Lecture took place Oct. 17 in Perkins Chapel, with Dr. Fred Aquino delivering the lecture and a reception following in the Blue Room in Bridwell Library. Bridwell Library (SMU Libraries) and Perkins School of Theology established the annual Memorial Lecture to bring a scholar to the SMU campus each year to engage in a topic related to Abraham's work of the scholar's choosing. Dr. Abraham, 73, died suddenly in October 2021. He was the Albert Cook Outler Professor of Wesley Studies at Perkins from 1995 until his retirement in May 2021.
- Bishop Ruben Saenz Jr. (M.Div. '97; D.Min. '09) was honored as the 2022 recipient of the Perkins Distinguished Alumnus/a Award. Saenz, a native of south Texas and lifelong United Methodist, was elected bishop in 2016 at the South Central Jurisdictional Conference. He currently serves as episcopal leader of the North Texas and Central Texas annual conferences. The banquet, which took place Nov. 14, also recognized the 2021 Award recipient, Evelyn Parker, and the 2020 Award recipients, the Rev. Donald W. Underwood and the Rev. Dr. Sidney G. Hall, III.
- Eight congregations were selected for the second cohort of the Lilly Endowment-funded Testimony HQ initiative to develop thriving congregations through the practice of testimony as community engagement. These congregations were selected from applications submitted from churches within a 350-mile radius of Dallas. The cohort congregations will each receive up to \$5,000 in grant funding to support their Testimony HQ work from January through December 2023. The following year, in 2024, each of these churches will mentor a church selected to participate in the third cohort.
- An anonymous donor gifted to Perkins and Bridwell Library a Heritage Edition of the St. John's Bible. Only 299 copies are being produced, with only a few copies in the State of Texas. Renowned calligrapher Donald Jackson produced the hand-written, hand-illuminated Bible. The volumes are bound by hand –in a single piece of Italian calfskin leather and adorned with a solid silver clasp. The headbands are handsewn in Pakistan. Each volume is numbered and initialed by Donald Jackson and protected in a burgundy clamshell box.
- Perkins is continuing its curriculum review process, chaired by Dr. Rebekah Miles, as
 it seeks refinement in its degree programs that will enhance flexibility for students
 while also providing opportunities to engage with the school's degree
 concentrations. We hope to implement the revised curriculum beginning Fall 2024.

- Following a formal campus visit by a seven-member review committee in September, the University Senate of the General Board for Higher Education and Ministry provided SMU and Perkins School of Theology a positive recommendation with regard to institutional integrity, well-structured programs, sound management and clearly defined church relationships. This review process takes place once every 10 years.
- Dr. Rebekah Miles and Dr. Ted Campbell were formally installed as the holders of two endowed chairs: Miles as the Susanna Wesley Centennial Professor of Practical Theology and Ethics and Campbell as the Albert Cook Outler Professor of Wesley Studies. Not only do the two chairs involve professorial positions, but the new chairholders also received an engraved desk chair as part of the formal installation ceremony. Miles and Campbell also each delivered a lecture on a topic of their choosing as part of the installation.
- Dr. Bruce Marshall, Lehman Professor of Christian Doctrine, was awarded the 2023 Altshuler Distinguished Teaching Award. Bestowed annually since 2001, the award recognizes four SMU faculty members for their notable commitment to and achievements in fostering student learning. These are teachers whose concerns for higher education go beyond classroom boundaries and often the boundaries of their own disciplines. In student mentoring, in discussions about teaching, and in continuous reflection about their own successes and ways to improve, they represent the highest achievement in reaching the goals of higher education.
- Rev. Dr. Elias H. Lopez (M.Div. '10, D.Min. '18) joined the faculty and staff as Associate Director of the Intern Program. Dr. Lopez brings a strong background in pastoral care and theology to this position. Prior to Perkins, he served as Director of Pastoral Care at Methodist Health System in Dallas, leading a team of 36 chaplains in providing spiritual support to the entire healthcare system.
- We are saddened to announce the death of Kenneth Hart, Professor Emeritus of Sacred Music and former Director of the Sacred Music program from 1987 to 2005.
 Among his scholarship, he wrote and published the 2014 volume titled A Day for Dancing: The Life and Music of Lloyd Pfautsch.

The highlights listed above are reflective of the vibrant engagement of Perkins faculty, staff and students. Our mission is to equip persons for faithful leadership and Christian ministry in a changing church and society; to educate those seeking a deeper understanding of the Christian faith; and to strengthen the church, academy, and world through service, scholarship, and advocacy. We thank our many colleagues, friends and alumni in the Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church for your generous support, including referrals of prospective students.

Saint Paul School of Theology

Neil Blair, President

Educating tomorrow's leaders by offering on-campus, online, and hybrid learning courses at a FLEXible schedule, Saint Paul School of Theology is a seminary serving a diverse community committed to the formation of people for innovative, creative ministry through rigorous academic life. Grounded in the academic study of faith and ministry, theology is practiced in a traditional classroom and in remote spaces. Our contextual curriculum features Ministry Collaboration Groups, Practicums, Spiritual Formation Retreats, and Seminars. Students learn from dedicated faculty, experienced pastors, and community leaders about best ministry practices leaving our graduates with the tools and first-hand experience necessary to meet the needs of a changing world.

We continue to implement the changes the last few years have integrated into our daily lives. Our weekly chapel service utilizes a hybrid format, where participants may join inperson or online, allowing staff and students to come together as one institution where all are invited to create a sacred atmosphere from wherever they are. In addition, Saint Paul offers weekly Spiritual Formation allowing students to engage in spiritual practices led by Rev. Jen Logsdon-Kellogg. Some practices will take us outdoors or to other sacred spaces, and others will have us connect with community leaders.

Saint Paul welcomed over 30 new students for the 2022-2023 academic year. Enrollment remained solid for the Master of Divinity (MDiv) degree program with promising growth on our Oklahoma campus. With COVID-19 restrictions lifted yet monitored, prospective students returned to in-person visits on both campuses, experiencing community meals, worship, and the newly implemented "Hammock ministry" on the Oklahoma campus. The Admissions team continues to expand travel to meet new students, including the Carolinas, Washington, D.C., and various parts of Texas.

This year we have focused on strengthening the Master of Arts in Christian Ministry by creating two specializations: Women, Society, and Church; and Social Justice and Advocacy. In each case, the student takes 22 hours of MACM required courses, and then the remaining 12 hours of the degree are comprised of courses focusing upon the specialization. The two existing specializations, Prophetic Witness and Service; and Deacon Ministries, will continue to be offered as well. The Women, Society, and Church Studies specialization is also available in the MDiv program, as is a specialization in Wesleyan Studies.

Saint Paul staff and faculty continue contributing to the academy, church, and society. This year, we welcomed Rev. Dr. Sharon Betsworth as our new Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean and Professor of New Testament. The faculty of Saint Paul School of Theology maintains high standards of scholarship, research, publication, and

engagement. Over the past year, their many activities and publications have been so numerous that space permits only sharing selected highlights.

- Rev. Dr. Sharon Betsworth co-authored a journal article with Julie Faith Parker,
 "'Where Have All the Young Girls Gone?' Discovering the Girls of the Bible through
 Childist Analysis of Exodus 2 and Mark 5–7," in Journal of Feminist Studies in Religion 38, no. 2 (Fall 2022).
- Dr. Casey Sigmon, Assistant Professor of Preaching and Worship and Director of Contextual Education, was the keynote speaker for the United Methodist Church Missouri Preaching Academy "Offering the Word to a Digital World." She published "Failure to Discern the Online/Hybrid Body: A Captivity of the Eucharist" for the special issue of Currents in Theology and Mission: Eucharist and Online Worship: Toward Extended Theological Reflection, vol. 50, no. 1 (2023) and published the chapter "Liturgical Authority and the Table in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)" in Liturgical Authority in Free Church Traditions, edited by Sarah Johnson and Andrew Wymer, Calvin Worship and Witness Series.
- Dr. Joshua Bartholomew, Assistant Professor of Ethics, Church, and Society, led a "Race, Liberation, and Political Economics" series at Second Presbyterian. He also spoke at The Open Table KC on "Race, Liberation, and Economics."
- Dr. Amy Oden, Adjunct Professor of Early Church History and Spirituality, was a guest speaker at numerous events around the country this year, including at a Five Day Academy for Spiritual Formation in Oklahoma, the Beyond Conference in St. Louis, and the Academy for Spiritual Formation in Alabama.

In October, Saint Paul hosted a forum on "Innovative, Creative Ministry" featuring alumni Matt Austin '18, Fabian Gonzalez '20, Bo Ireland '18, Matt Patrick '18, & Abby Peper '22, with each sharing their personal stories of innovation in ministry. In November, Saint Paul Evangelical Society, led by Dr. Israel Kamudzandu, hosted a forum given by Rev. Mike Slaughter, former lead pastor at Ginghamsburg Church, on "Spiritual Awakening: the here and the not yet." Later in the year, the Evangelical Society hosted a lecture featuring Dr. Cheryl Bridges Johns, Visiting Professor of Pentecostal Studies and Director of the Global Pentecostal House of Study at United Theological Seminary. And on May 12, Saint Paul again held a hybrid commencement celebration via Zoom, allowing graduates to come together from both campuses with attendees viewing from around the country. During the ceremony, we honored the 2023 Distinguished Graduate Award Winner and Commencement Speaker Bishop Delores J. "Dee" Williamston.

Saint Paul Board of Trustees changed leadership this year as long-time faculty and board member Rev. Dr. Tex Sample concluded his term as chair of the Board. Dr. Amy Hogan, Professor of Education and Dean of the School of Education at Ottawa University, has succeeded him as chair. Dr. Hogan possesses a deep reservoir of experience in teaching, research, and accreditation. In response to President Neil Blair's announcement that he will retire on December 31, 2023, Dr. Hogan appointed a search committee composed of faculty, staff, students, and trustees charged with identifying Saint Paul's next president. The search committee is currently conferring with Saint Paul's constituent groups to

prepare the position prospectus that will describe Saint Paul's needs and aspirations to candidates.

In September 2022, Saint Paul School of Theology hosted a review team from the Higher Learning Commission (HLC), one of Saint Paul's primary accreditation agencies, as part of the Seminary's regular reaffirmation cycle. On November 18, 2022, the Higher Learning Commission notified Saint Paul that the Commission "continued the accreditation of Saint Paul School of Theology with the next Reaffirmation of Accreditation in 2028-2029." The Seminary's Board of Trustees also devoted considerable time to improving its governance capacity. For example, in April 2022, trustees invested a significant portion of their meeting in a facilitated Emotional Intelligence and Trust-Building workshop. The workshop was led by Gail Parker, a noted management consultant who has worked with clients such as KPMG, Goldman Sachs, and Disney, among many others. In October 2022, former executive director of the Association of Theological Schools, Dan Aleshire, offered an overview of demographic and enrollment trends in the nation's seminaries, focusing on how those trends affect institutions' diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. As these activities suggest, the Board remains deeply committed to enhancing its capabilities to guide Saint Paul effectively and knowledgeably.

We are happy to report that Saint Paul School of Theology is financially sound. We operate with a balanced budget, no debt, and an endowment 9-10 times the size of our annual expenses. As always, we continue to be grateful for donations from the community that provide technology, scholarships, and evolving academic programs to students. As of the close of 2022, over one hundred alumni and friends of Saint Paul contributed more than \$60,000 to create the Tex and Peggy Sample Endowed Scholarship Fund honoring the life and work of Tex and Peggy Sample. Sustainability has been our focus over the past five years, and we have achieved our goal. Investments in our future bring exciting new opportunities for our students, staff, and faculty. Our significant technological investments have allowed us to maintain a hybrid educational delivery model providing a flexible working arrangement for our students.

We are continuing to enhance our partnership with Zoom and Neat. Late last Spring, in conjunction with our Neat Board electronic whiteboards and Neat Bars, we implemented Neat's newest product, their Neat Bar Pros, in our large classrooms. These new bars are designed to offer a superior video and audio experience in large spaces and the ability to output to multiple large screens to enhance the overall classroom experience significantly. We have rolled out additional Zoom Room Neat Boards in numerous common areas to encourage ad-hoc use of the technology for breakout groups and other miscellaneous meetings between our two campuses and remote students. One of the best features of this technology is its ability to receive automatic real-time over-the-air features upgrades. Several significant enhancements have rolled out this past year, including improved voice cancellation, Zoom Room Breakout Groups, real-time Closed Captions with transcripts, and updated use of AI to split each in-classroom student into their individual zoomed-in Zoom window. In addition, our Neat equipment continuously monitors several environmental

factors within our classrooms; air quality, temperature, humidity, VOC, and CO2, as well as being able to tell if the classrooms are occupied and how many individuals are in the room. We can also monitor the audio/video quality and network connectivity in each of our classrooms, as well as the connection quality for all remote students attending the class. We are excited about the additional enhancements that will come to our classrooms from Neat and Zoom over this next year and look forward to our continued partnership with Neat and Zoom on this groundbreaking technology.

Saint Paul School of Theology is blessed to be your partner in ministry and help those seeking to discover more and answer the call. We are grateful for your support of our students and our seminary. May we continue to live into the call of Jesus Christ to be faithful witnesses for generations to come.

Southern Methodist University

R. Gerald Turner, President

Southern Methodist University (SMU) has served as a nonsectarian institution of higher learning since its founding in 1911 by the citizens of Dallas and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. SMU's mission is to expand knowledge through research and teaching and to serve as an igniter and facilitator of growth in Dallas and North Texas. With continued Methodist representation on the Board of Trustees and by welcoming students of all faiths, SMU is reaching a higher level of accomplishment and global recognition in our second century of shaping world changers. Consistent with the University's appreciation of our Wesleyan heritage, SMU voluntarily submits this report to the Texas Annual Conference.

Students, faculty, and staff

Each year SMU continues to attract more academically qualified and diverse students. The 1,639 students of the Class of 2026 entered with the highest grade-point average (3.71) of any previous first-year class. Equally important, nearly a third of these incoming students (32%) identified as being from an underrepresented background. Just over 100 of these new Mustangs had their tuition fully met through SMU's scholarship for high-achieving Texas students who are eligible for federal Pell grants. Most of them (59%) come to Dallas from other states, 38% are homegrown Texans and 3% are international students.

As our incoming students reach new heights of academic excellence, research by our faculty members, graduate students, and even undergraduates benefits our region and the world around us. SMU remains committed to our goal of becoming a Research One (R1) institution

in the Carnegie Classification system, which will further elevate our national rankings and reputation.

Rankings

SMU continues to receive strong recognition and high rankings among prestigious reviewers, including:

- Top 20% best national universities by *U.S. News & World Report* (2023). Also cited among the Top Performers on Social Mobility and Best Colleges for Veterans and Best Value Schools (2023).
- Top 12% (No. 94 out of 796) of U.S. public and private universities by the *Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education* (2022).
- One of the nation's best institutions for undergraduate education by *The Princeton Review*'s The Best 388 Colleges and among its 2023 Best Colleges: Region by Region.
- Top 5% best nationwide colleges (91 out of 2,241) by College Factual (2023). Also, SMU alumni ranked among the top 10% in pay for graduates across a range of fields.
- SMU's Perkins Chapel at No. 16 out of 35 of the nation's most beautiful college churches and chapels by College Rank.
- "Higher research activity" as classified by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

Capital campaign and research funding

Momentum is growing as the University moves into the second year of the comprehensive campaign *SMU Ignited: Boldly Shaping Tomorrow*. As of March 1, 2023, donors have contributed over \$991 million to this multiyear \$1.5 billion campaign to attract and support outstanding students and faculty, explore new fields and cutting-edge technologies, and positively impact Dallas and the world beyond.

In fiscal year 2023, SMU received nearly \$46 million in external funding for domestic and global research. Current funding agencies include the National Science Foundation, National Institutes of Health, U.S. Department of Education, U.S. Department of Energy, Google, and Toyota USA Foundation.

Perkins School of Theology

After six and a half years of service, Craig Hill retired as dean of the Perkins School of Theology on December 31, 2022, but is continuing as a member of the faculty until December 31, 2023. We are pleased to have Bishop Michael McKee '78 serving as interim dean until a successor is brought aboard.

The Caren and Vin Prothro Organ project is fully funded. The 1927 Skinner organ has been restored, and installation of this rare instrument in our Perkins Chapel should be completed by November 2023.

SMU remains grateful for the enduring work of our Perkins School of Theology in the instruction and training of clergy for all Wesleyan traditions and other denominations. We ask for your prayers and continued support as we strive to further our mission to make a positive impact on the world around us.

Southwestern University

Laura E. Skandera Trombley, President

Southwestern University continues to rank among the best liberal arts institutions in the nation. In 2022, Southwestern rose 13 places in *U.S. News & World Report's* Best Colleges rankings, the biggest single-year jump in school history. The publication ranked the University 85th among national liberal arts colleges and first among national undergraduate liberal arts colleges in Texas. Southwestern also ranked 44th in the social mobility category, which measures how well schools graduated students who received federal Pell Grants.

Southwestern officially closed the class of 2026 in June, marking one of the earliest dates the University has finalized its incoming class in institutional history. A record 5,557 applicants competed for a spot, an increase of 17% over last year. Southwestern ultimately welcomed 436 first-year students for a total enrollment of 1,483 in fall 2022. The University's acceptance rate fell by 7%, and Southwestern also met its academic and diversity goals, with more than 25% of incoming students identifying as Hispanic for the third year in a row.

Our world-class faculty of scholar-teachers celebrated a number of accomplishments in 2022. Ten faculty members received Sam Taylor Fellowships from the United Methodist General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Jessica Hower (history) published *Mary I in Writing: Letters, Literature, and Representation* and *Writing Mary I: History, Historiography, and Fiction,* a two-volume edited collection. Michael Gesinski (chemistry and biochemistry) was awarded a \$16,000 grant from Organic Syntheses Inc. to fund student research on gold catalysis. Jennifer Stokes (kinesiology) received the 2022 Early Career Award in Education Research from the American Physiological Society Teaching Section.

Our students received several honors and recognitions. Thirty-four students were inducted into Southwestern's chapter of the Phi Beta Kappa honor society. Two students were awarded scholarships from the Texas United Methodist College Association, two students received Benjamin Gilman International Scholarships, and one student was named a

Newman Civic Fellow. Three recent graduates were selected as 2022–2023 Fulbright award winners.

In athletics, Southwestern finished second for the SCAC President's Trophy. The Pirates garnered 76 all-conference selections, including 38 first-team selections, 19 second-team selections, and 19 honorable mention selections, as well as four SCAC Coach of the Year awards. The Pirates also earned three All-America honors in 2022 and six All-Region selections. Men's golf won the SCAC Championship. Three programs earned NCAA Tournament bids.

In 2022, Southwestern hosted the 40th Brown Symposium, which featured five distinguished experts who spoke on the theme of attraction. More than 250 students, mentored by 52 faculty and staff, led panels, presented posters, gave performances, and set up exhibitions during the 23rd annual Research and Creative Works Symposium. Southwestern recognized the class of 2022 during its Commencement Convocation in May, with Southwestern alumna and applied mathematician Cassandra M. McZeal '92 serving as the keynote speaker.

Ratification of Trustees

As stated in the University By-Laws, "Conference trustees are nominated by the University's board of trustees, upon recommendation to the board's trusteeship committee, and elected by their respective conferences." Conference confirmation of "trustees at large" is no longer required by the By-Laws.

The following names are submitted to the Texas Conference for re-election:

 Dr. Cassandra M. McZeal nominated by the Board of Trustees for election to a threeyear term concluding 2027.

United Theological Seminary

Dr. Kent Millard, President

United Theological Seminary celebrated rising enrollment in the 2022-2023 academic year. In the previous year, 464 students were enrolled at United; in 2022-2023, the seminary is serving 541 students, a 17% increase. A diverse community of many denominations, races and nationalities, United welcomed students from 36 states, 21 countries, and 43 denominations, with 42% of students identifying as United Methodist.* The Seminary prepared 103 Course of Study students** and served 10 students through the Hispanic Christian Academy, a 3-year online course of ministry program for Hispanic/Latino lay pastors and leaders serving United Methodist congregations.

Houses of Study

In large part, this enrollment growth is a result of the seminary's House of Study initiative, which is supported by a \$1 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc.'s Pathways for Tomorrow Initiative. As of 2022-2023, the Seminary has established five Houses of Study that are equipping master's students for the unique ministry needs of the communities, movements and denominations in which they serve:

- Fresh Expressions, directed by Dr. Michael Beck;
- Full Gospel Baptist Fellowship, directed by Bishop Lisa Weah;
- Global Methodist, directed by Rev. Gregory Stover;
- Global Pentecostal, directed by Dr. Cheryl Bridges Johns;
- and Hispanic, directed by Dr. Jorge Ochoa.

The largest of these communities is the Hispanic House of Study (Casa de Estudios Hispana), which is meeting a need for Hispanic/Latino pastors and church leaders ready to pursue a Master of Divinity in their native language. Nearly 50 students from across the United States and Latin America, including students from Mexico, Cuba, Columbia, and Peru, started in the online program in the 2022-2023 academic year.

As United continues to expand its offerings to support church leaders, it is preparing to launch three new Houses of Study in the 2023-2024 academic year: a Korean House of Study, taught 100% in Korean for Korean-speaking students, led by Dr. Seok Jae Jeon; an African Methodist Episcopal Zion House of Study led by Bishop Eric Leake; and a Global Lutheran House of Study led by Dr. Richard Blue, Dr. Tom Thorstad and Dr. Dan Landin.

Doctor of Ministry

The Seminary is also seeing growth in its Doctor of Ministry program. In 2022-2023, the Doctor of Ministry program has grown to 250 students, an increase of 32% over the past

five years.* Doctoral students at United are actively engaged in ministry and seeking to become more effective leaders for the Church through a Doctor of Ministry degree. Students identify a need within their congregations or communities and, with the support of a peer group, mentor and United faculty, they develop a model of ministry to address the challenge.

Bishop Bruce Ough Innovation Center

Launched in Fall 2021, the Bishop Bruce Ough Innovation Center, directed by Rev. Sue Nilson Kibbey, is connecting with pastors, ministry leaders and congregational members hungry to bring God's renewal to their faith communities. In the past year alone, the Innovation Center has engaged more than 1,000 participants through more than 40 live webinars, training events and courses. The Innovation Center has also partnered with The Center for Spiritual Formation, a connectional ministry of the Susquehanna Conference of The United Methodist Church, to offer a two-year online training course for those called to the ministry of spiritual direction. In addition, the Center is partnering with two United Methodist conferences to provide its Breakthrough Prayer Initiative training for all clergy in these conferences. Through these and other new opportunities, the Innovation Center seeks to set the stage for the increased vitality of leaders and congregations everywhere.



Randy was preceded in death by his parents and his brother Gary Fitzgerald.



Audrey was born March 31, 1944, and passed away on July 21, 2022.







He is a graduate of the United States Army Chaplain School. He obtained an Associate of Arts degree from Angelina College, a Bachelor of Arts from Stephen F. Austin State University, and a Doctorate from Anchor Theological Seminary.

Behind the pulpit, Phil Worley, through the Holy Spirit, was known for beauty in his delivery. His passion was in just that, delivering God's word. He held pastorates in Texas, Tennessee, Missouri, Iowa, Washington, Alabama, Arkansas, and Nevada. Also, during 1970-1971, he worked through the office of Evangelism of the Missouri Baptist Convention conducting Willing Witness Revivals. Dr. Jack Stanton of Southern Baptist University commended Phil for his contribution to Lay Evangelism schools saying, "Thank you for the great contribution you made to the beginning of the Lay Evangelism Schools. God has used these schools, and continues to use them, not only across America, but around the world. In 1972, we launched the Lay Evangelism School ministry, using WIN materials, and Southern Baptists water baptized more people than ever before or since. The next two highest times of baptism came when a number of states, not all of them, but a great number of states, had Lay Evangelism Schools within a given year. So, the three years where we baptized the most people the Lay Evangelism School played an important part, and you helped us immensely as we prayed and sought God's will in the formulating of what later became known as the Lay Evangelism School. God bless you for your help." Let it be said that Philmore lived by faith and loved Jesus. This was evident in his 73 years serving in the Gospel Ministry. He was most proud of this accomplishment.

Not only was Dr. Phil Worley known for his oratory skills as a minister of God's word, but he was also known for his craftsmanship in the monument industry. Phil was a fourth-generation memorialist. His family was known for and had monument companies throughout Texas, Georgia, Mississippi, Virginia, and Arkansas over the years.

After a sudden illness, on Wednesday, November 30, 2022, Philmore expressed that he was ready to see Jesus. Within an hour, he did just that. 


Virginia Lee Luce Fleming

Spouse of the late Rev. Roxann R. Schulte September 29, 1950 – July 5, 2022


